CANADIANS PREFER DEATH TO SURRENDER

GERMANS CLAIM RUSSIAN DRIVE CHECKED -- CARRANZA HAS CLIMBED DOWN

NO SURRENDER FOR CANADIANS IN YPRES FIGHT

General Mercer and Staff Refused to be Taken—German Socialist Leader Gets Severe Sentence.

(Special to The Daily News)

London, June 29.—The German newspapers comment upon the gallantry of the Canadian troops in the fighting around Ypres on the third of June. They state that one general and several other officers preferred death to surrender. The general, presumably General Mercer bravely drew his sword and cut an enemy sergeant through the face when surrender was demanded, whereupon he was bayoneted by the German infantry. Many of the Canadians resisted so desperately that they were refused all mercy and were cleared out with bombs.

Riots in Roumania.

Amsterdam, June 29.—Fourteen have been killed and thirty-five wounded in a working-men's demonstration against the high food prices prevailing in Galatz, Roumania.

Liebknacht Jailed.

Berlin, June 29.—Herr Liebknacht, the Socialist leader, has been sentenced to thirty months' penal servitude for attempted treason.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT MAY GO TO IRELAND

London, June 29.—It is stated on good authority that the Duke of Connaught, on returning from Canada, may represent the King in that portion of Ireland which is affected by Home Rule. His Royal Highness is anxious to secure an appointment nearer home on account of the health of the Duchess.

CONTRACTOR KELLY CONDUCTS OWN CASE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Winnipeg, June 29.—Contractor Kelly, who is charged with fraud in connection with the construction of the Parliament Buildings of Manitoba, is conducting his own defence. Yesterday, he addressed the court for forty-five minutes.

He denied that there had been overpayments made and insisted that the province still owed him money. He declared that he had been persecuted by the Liberals and renewed his offer to submit the disputed questions to arbitration, claiming that the government agreed later to delaying the proceeding, pending the result of the present criminal action. Kelly continues his own defence today.

AMERICA EXPERIMENTS WITH GERMAN WEAPONS

BERLIN FEARS TROUBLE FROM EAST AND WEST

British Artillery Activity, Combined with Russian Advance is Creating Fears in German Capital.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 29.—Berlin expects intensified artillery activity on the British portion of the western front and is doing her utmost to bring along reinforcements of both men and guns.

Confidential reports from the German capital state that there is great fear of serious trouble on account of the extraordinary Russian infantry and artillery attacks. Russia is making the greatest advances, which must inevitably lead to very heavy losses for the defending forces. It is admitted that the renewed British activity taken in conjunction with the terrible Russian attacks is creating a very serious situation.

Berlin Claims Gain.

Berlin, June 29.—The Germans have checked the Russian advance in Volhynia and have captured the village of Winiewka and have also taken Russian positions to the south of it.

The Austrians also report successes against the Russians near Kutj, in Bukowina.

KITCHENER, ONTARIO, INSTEAD OF BERLIN

(Special to The Daily News.)

Toronto, June 29.—The citizens of Berlin, Ont., have for months past been trying to arrive at a decision as to a new name for their city. The Lieutenant-Governor of the province has requested that the name Kitchener be adopted in place of Berlin.

PRINCE HENRY OF BAVARIA IS AMONG WOUNDED

Italians are Still Advancing on Trentino Front—Bavarian Prince Wounded—Casement on Trial.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, June 29.—The Italians are still advancing in the Trentino region and also on the Asiago Plateau. The Italian armies now occupy the north end of the Arso Valley.

Prince Henry Wounded.

Munich, June 29.—Prince Henry of Bavaria, who has been leading one of the German divisions, has been wounded but not seriously.

Catching Subs.

Geneva, June 29.—The Italians have been successful in entrapping enemy submarines in steel nets placed at various points around the coast.

Casement on Trial.

London, June 29.—Sir Roger Casement, who is now on trial on a charge of high treason, denies that Teuton money was given to assist the cause of the Irish and states that Berlin must be absolved from all blame in connection with the up-rising. He also claims that he never tried to get aid from the Germans.

ONTARIO NEWSPAPER SEIZED BY MILITARY

Ottawa, June 29.—The Sault Ste. Marie Express has been suppressed by order of Ernest J. Chambers, chief press censor, and the plant has been seized by the military authorities on account of its having published violent anti-recruiting utterances and treasonable statements. 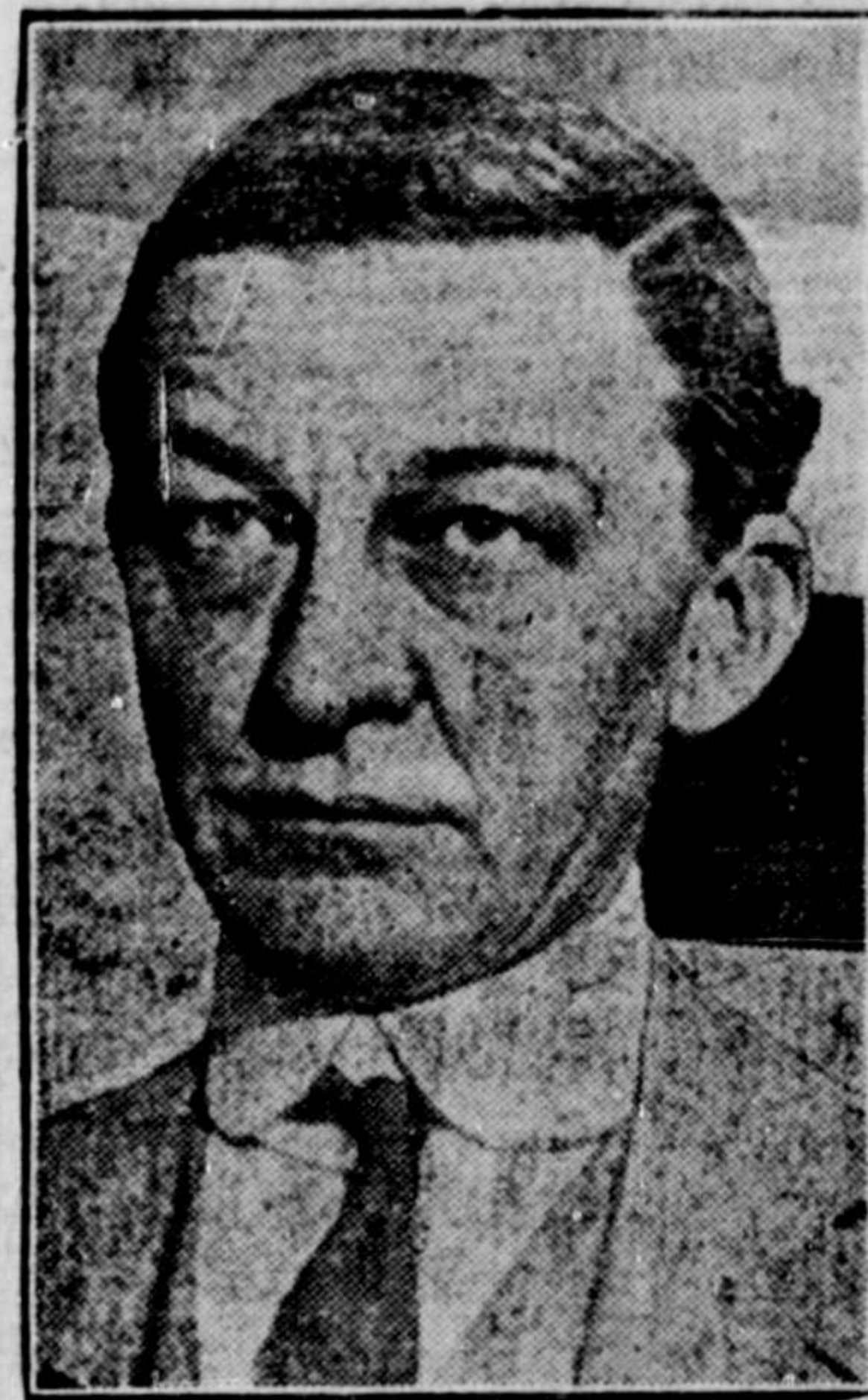
GRANBY COMPANY AGAIN MAKES GOOD SHOWING

The Granby Company has declared a quarterly dividend of \$1.50 per share and an extra dividend of 50 cents, making a total distribution of \$299,970 for the quarter. This makes a total for the year of \$749,924 and a grand total of \$6,476,847 paid out in dividends by this company.

For the fiscal year ending June 30th the earnings of the company total over \$3,000,000, or equal to \$20 per share on the issued stock. The production of copper matte at Anxoy now amounts to 3,000,000 pounds monthly. Development work in the north is being proceeded with and cost of production is being kept so low that good profits will be shown even after the price of copper has returned to about normal.

New York, June 29.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and Charles E. Hughes dined together in this city last evening.

The Progressive leader and the Republican nominee for the Presidency chatted amiably together for two hours and a half and it is declared that a complete understanding exists between the two leaders and that "Teddy" will give every support in his power to Hughes in the coming election.

STEAMER NORTHLAND WRECKED OFF KOKE

The steamer Northland, of the Border Line, has been wrecked on the Alaskan coast. On Sunday, while off Koke, a cannery port to the west of Petersburg, she encountered very heavy weather and developed a list and foundered. There was no loss of life, the vessel going over in shallow water.

The Northland was a steel vessel and was built by Moran Bros., of Seattle. She put in here on her last voyage south and took a shipment of ore to Tacoma for the Rocher De Boule Copper Company.

MEXICO DECIDES TO COMPLY WITH WILSON DEMAND

Prisoners Released—Washington is Still Preparing—Apology is Demanded From Austria.

(Special to The Daily News.)

El Paso, June 29.—Mexico has decided to comply with the request of the United States and to release the twenty-three troopers who were taken prisoner at Carrizal. Washington is continuing preparations for war.

Another Note.

Washington, June 29.—The United States demands an apology from Austria for the submarine attack upon the steamer Petrolite in the Mediterranean recently.

The note also demands that the commander of the Austrian vessel be punished and that an indemnity be paid. The Washington communication characterizes the action of the submarine commander as a deliberate insult to the American flag and an invasion of the rights of American citizens.

HUGH KILLIN POSTED AMONGST THE MISSING

Mrs. Hugh Killin received a wire from Ottawa last evening stating that her husband had been posted as missing since the night of June 11th and 12th. Mr. Killin was one of the Scotch party which joined the 62nd Battalion. Mrs. Killin is anxiously awaiting further news and there is every likelihood that it will be found that Hugh was taken prisoner in the give and take fighting which took place in the early part of June.

MANY RUPERTONIANS NOW AT ANCHORAGE

Olof Hanson returned this morning on the steamer Spokane from Anchorage, Alaska. He describes Anchorage as a live railroad construction town of about 6,000 people, many of them men who worked on the construction here in the early days. There are so many people from here that the residents declare that the men from Prince Rupert will sway the elections when the city is incorporated.

Mr. Hanson met Jack Chisholm, C. B. Wark and several other well known Rupertonians. C. B. Wark is in the commission business and is also building a three-story hotel. A three-story concrete theatre is under construction and many other buildings are going up. The townsite is level with a sandy soil. Anchorage is looked upon as the coming railroad town of the north but it labors under considerable difficulties in the way of harbor accommodation. All freight and passengers arriving from the south have to get aboard scows a mile and a half from the shore to make a landing as, even at high tide, mud flats extend for that distance.

The day before Mr. Hanson left for the south the Omineca arrived from Prince Rupert, having been towed across the gulf from Yakutat. She immediately started loading for her first voyage up the Sushitna river.

But a few months ago the first newspaper published in Anchorage reached this office. Today there are two and one of them, the Daily Times, runs to twelve pages and seems to be prosperous.

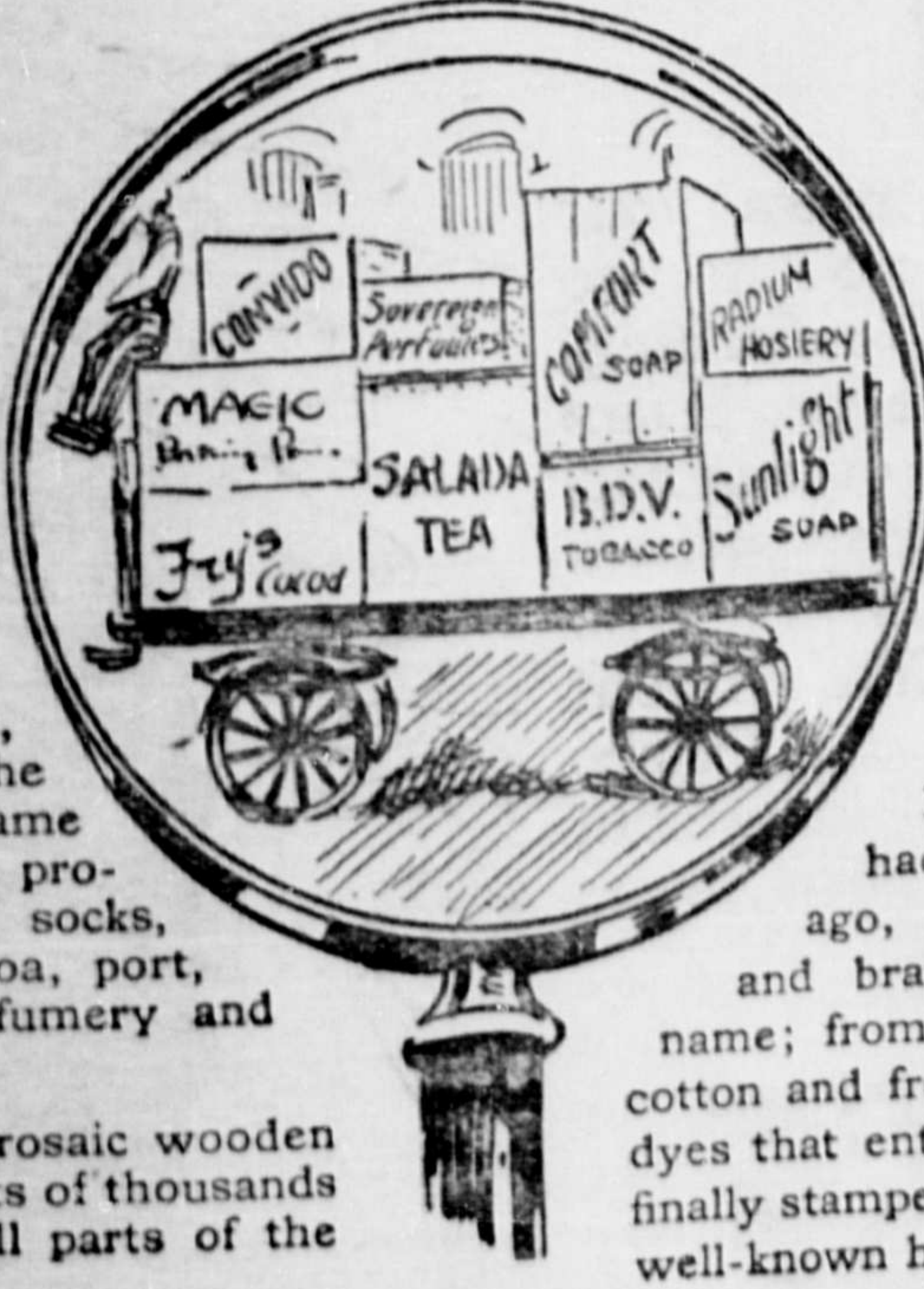
The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.



The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.

The tea was gathered by swart-skinned natives of the romantic island of Ceylon; from sunny Portugal the luscious, big grapes had been gathered years ago, fermented, bottled and branded with a famous name; from Egypt had come the cotton and from South America the dyes that entered into the product finally stamped with the brand of a well-known hosiery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. 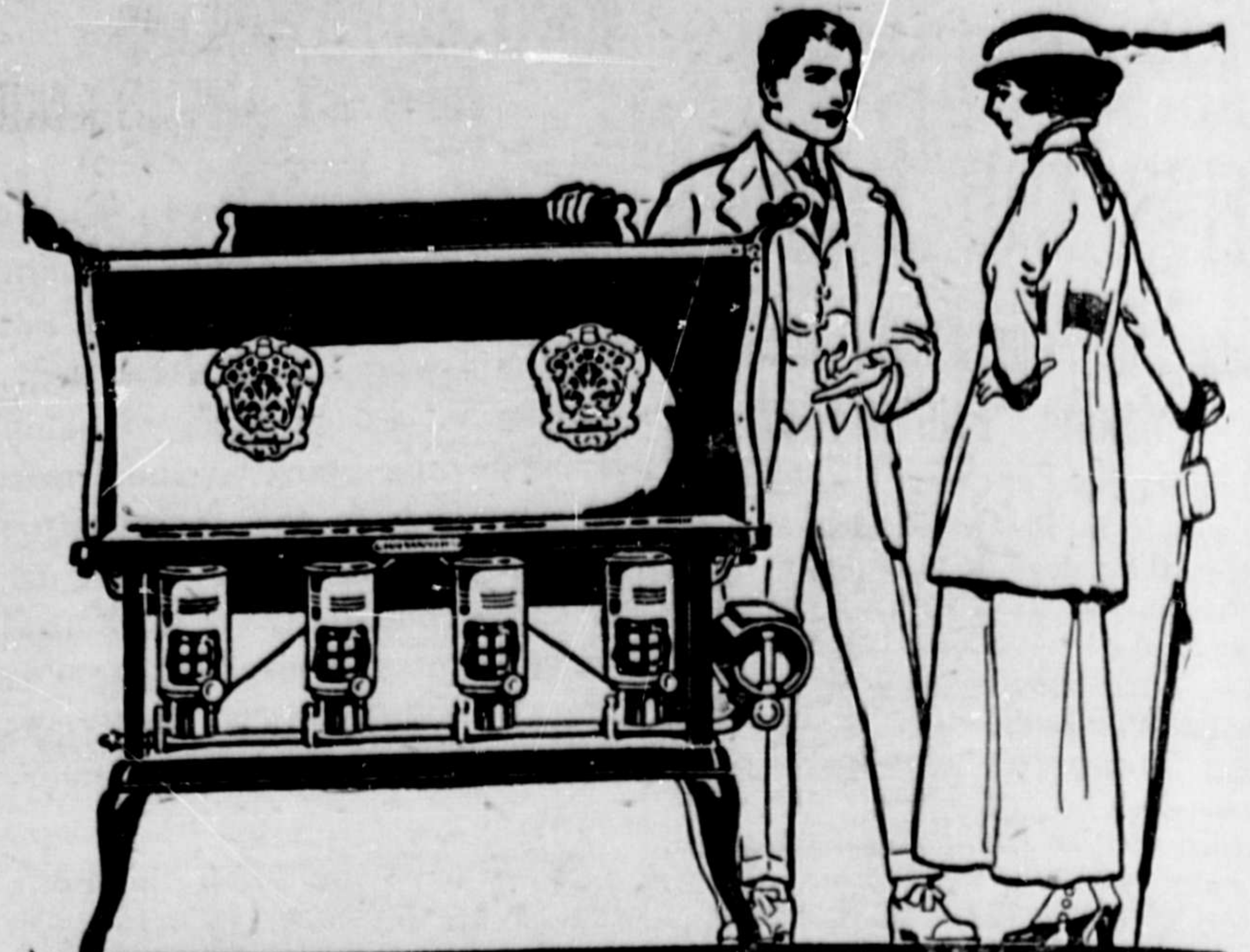
