## AUSTRIANS SUGGEST VERDUN ABANDONED

### KAISER VISITS THE EASTERN FRONT -- BULGARIA SHOWS SIGNS OF UNEASINESS

#### AUSTRIANS ASK HUNS TO LEAVE VERDUN ALONE

Kaiser at Kovel where Teutons are Hard Pressed -- Further Russian Successes in Bukowina.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, June 30.—The Austrians have been compelled to retire by the Russians on a twenty-five-mile front in the big advance on Kolomea to the north of the Bukowinian border.

In Galicia, the Russians are securing access to the passes through the Carpathian Mountains. In the fighting around Sady, in Bukowina, the Russians captured twelve thousand Austrians, thus giving ample contradiction to the Berlin report that the Austrians had been successful at this point.

Kaiser at Kovel.  
The Kaiser has arrived at Kovel to supervise the Austro-German operations. The Austrians and Germans are losing heavily and the Russians are keeping up a sustained attack. The enemy is sending reinforcements from the western front in an endeavor to meet the continued Russian advance.

The Austrians want the Germans to abandon the Verdun offensive entirely in order that the German troops may be released for defensive work on the eastern front.

Petrograd Report.  
Petrograd, June 30.—The Russians have inflicted a great defeat upon the Teutonic forces between the Dniester and Pruth rivers and have captured three lines of enemy trenches.

#### DUNCANS TORIES OPPOSE BOWSERISM

Detailed reports which have arrived from Duncans, where the Conservative association met last Saturday and selected Capt. W. H. Hayward, now at the front, to be their candidate, show that the association is opposed to the Bowser machine and had no hesitancy in saying so, in the following resolution:

"The Conservatives of Cowichan electoral district, not being in accord with some of the enactments of the present government, endorse the action of their executive in deciding that Capt. W. H. Hayward should contest the coming election as an Independent Conservative, and pledge themselves to use their best efforts to secure his re-election.

"The Conservatives of the district regret the introduction by the provincial government at its last session of controversial legislation for which they consider there was no immediate necessity, and especially disapprove of its action in adopting the principle of the referendum, and that at a time when the best blood of the province is absent and too profoundly engaged in so grand a struggle for principles vital to the Empire to give thoughtful consideration to political matters. "They hold that a Conservative government should occupy a higher plane that would enable it to see over and beyond the fluctuating impulses of the moment and thus qualify itself for the exercise of a steadying influence on the electorate.

"The Conservatives of Cowichan district, in pledging their support to Capt. Hayward, wish to place on record their appreciation of his invaluable services in promoting the interests of the chief industry of this district during the last nine years, and of the important part he played in bringing about the enactment of the Agricultural Credit Act."—Vancouver Sun.

#### ALASKAN TRADER HAD NARROW ESCAPE

Seattle, June 28.—The Alaska Steamship Company's mail steamer Dora, which plies between Seward, Alaska, and the Aleutian Islands, put into Uyak, Shelikoff Strait, in distress yesterday, according to a message received by the company. The Dora struck Uzinka Reef June 23, but succeeded in getting off and proceeded to Uyak under her own power. She is leaking but the pumps were able to overcome the flow. The company decided to hold the Dora at Uyak until the freight steamer Cordova, returning from Nome, and due at Unimak Pass today, calls at Uyak to tow the Dora to Seattle for repairs.

#### AUSTRIANS ARE HELD FAST BY ITALIAN GUNS

Enemy Driven Back on Trentino Front—Three More Italian Steamers Sunk—Canadian Arrested.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, June 30.—In the Austro-Italian theatre of war the enemy on the Trentino front are being driven steadily back. At various points the Austrians have made efforts to advance but have been unable to gain a yard against a terrific fire from the Italian batteries.

**Italian Steamers Sunk.**  
Lloyd's announces the sinking of the Italian steamers Montibell, Roma and Pino in the Mediterranean.

**Canadian Arrested.**  
Seattle, June 30.—Captain Thompson, an officer in the Canadian army, has been found guilty in the district court, of violating United States neutrality by enlisting citizens for overseas service. He has been released on bond pending sentence.

**Casement to Die.**  
London, June 30.—Sir Roger Casement, who has been found guilty of high treason, was sentenced to death at the Old Bailey this morning. His accomplice has been discharged.

#### BRITISH USING DEADLY GAS ON WESTERN FRONT

Roumania Preparing to Join the Allies—Eighty-one Hun Submarines Captured up to May 1st.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, June 30.—The British on the western front are carrying out a heavy bombardment of the German positions along the whole of the line. The British troops used gas with deadly effect in the fighting yesterday in the region of La Bassee.

**Roumania Preparing.**  
It is reported that Roumania is preparing to throw in her lot with the Allies. Bulgaria has closed her frontier against the Roumanians and is concentrating troops along the border in the expectation of a Roumanian advance.

**81 Submarines Gone.**  
Monte Video, June 30.—Up to the first day of May the British destroyed or captured eighty-one German submarines. The British press has not been allowed to publish details in regard to the captures though the work has been carried on steadily and successfully.

#### GENERAL MERCER'S BODY HAS BEEN RECOVERED

Ottawa, June 28.—Details of the death and burial of Major-General Mercer are conveyed in a cable received today from the Canadian representative in the field. It states:

"The body of Major-General Mercer was recovered from a demolished dugout in the Armagh. All the buttons and decorations on his serge had been cut off, but rank badges had not been touched. Examination showed that the general had been severely wounded in the leg and had also received bullet wounds in the head, either of which would have been sufficient to cause death.

"General Mercer's body was carried back and buried in a military cemetery close to Poperinghe. A large number of officers, including the corps commander and the late general's staff, attended the funeral. Some of the latter had travelled all night."

#### BULGARS FEAR TROUBLE FROM GREEK LEADER

Greece agrees to Entente demands and Venizelos gains in Strength—Bulgaria is Uneasy.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 30.—The Greek government has agreed to accede to the Allied demands, and a sign of the change of opinion in Greece is contained in the fact that the newly appointed chief of police is an ardent follower of Venizelos.

**Bulgaria Uneasy.**  
Berlin, June 30.—Bulgaria is uneasy owing to the possible consequences of the Greek capitulation to the Entente demands. If, as is not unlikely, Greece comes under the dictatorship of ex-Premier Venizelos, Bulgaria would regard Greece as an enemy of the Central Powers.

#### Allied Distrust.

Athens, June 30.—The Allied powers still mistrust Greece regarding promises of demobilization. A month is regarded as sufficient time to carry out the scheme and the Greek plea for a longer period is regarded with suspicion.

#### Bulgarian Attack.

Saloniki, June 30.—Bulgarian troops at Lumnitza have bombarded the Allied positions but were repulsed. Heavy losses were sustained on both sides.

DEVELOPMENT

The Victoria Colonist, evidently tired of the Mackenzie-Mann idea of development and the Songhees Matsonian idea of progress, has made the discovery that there is a "psychological side to provincial development." It also says:—

"Great resources are important; great opportunities are invaluable; but the mind to utilize them is greater than either, and it is in respect to the latter that the people of British Columbia do not, as a rule, measure up to what is necessary if the province is to become what we are all confident nature intended it to be. The opportunities are so many, the resources are so extensive and varied, that we think of progress in terms of large dimensions and usually as the result of things that others will do rather than we ourselves. We expect too much from governments; we look too much to investors from other places; we rely too little upon ourselves."

This is rather an illuminating statement, coming, as it does, from an organ which preached the doctrine of relying upon Sir William Mackenzie, Sir Donald Mann, Sir Richard McBride, Hon. W. J. Bowser and the rest of the beautiful bunch. The Colonist and the Matsonian press throughout the province have dinned into the ears of the people for years the false doctrine that the Tory politicians and the railroad magnates would bring prosperity to British Columbia. Now that the people realize that the railroad magnate and the land speculator are interested only in their own schemes of getting all they can for nothing, they are told that they must rely upon themselves. That the province is an oyster, as it were, that must be opened by the efforts of the people and the people alone.

When one figures up the acreage which has been grabbed

by the speculators and the millions which have been handed over to the railroad magnates, the capital and interest of which must come out of the earnings of the people of this province, one begins to think that the province WAS an oyster, and that it was neatly opened some years ago by the Mackenzie & Mann; Pat Welsh and J. W. Stewart, and the land speculators, and all that is left for the people to experiment with is the empty shell.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

That General Mercer and his officers preferred death to surrender is a great tribute to their bravery but it was not good tactics from a military standpoint. Had they surrendered they had still a chance to escape, as many have done, and might have given much useful service to Canada and the Empire. Their bravery was great and that is just why we cannot afford to lose such men.

At last the Canadian Northern is to begin work on its terminals in Vancouver. The city to the south has had a long hard fight to bring things to moving point.

Editor Smith, of the Soo Express, must have been serving up some high explosive stuff.

America is experimenting with gas and other unpleasant up-to-date weapons of war. With a gas factory in Frankford and a note factory in Washington the United States begins to look quite like a belligerent.

Contractor Kelly of the Manitoba Parliament Buildings, says he was persecuted by the Liberals. It was probably to escape such persecution that he fled to the States and was so reluctant to return.

When the war is over, Washington will have a whole department busy filing away apologies received from the Central Powers.

## NEW FRENCH AEROPLANE SPEEDIER THAN FOKKER

The wonderful new aeroplane which is making rings round the Fokker, has been inspected by Mr. H. J. Greenwall, the Paris correspondent of the Daily Express.

The Fokker has been described as a hawk; the newest French machine is a swallow, a graceful, almost frail-looking biplane. It is called Spad, a word derived from the initial letters of "Societe pour l'aviation et derives."

"Frail-looking as it is, M. Bleriot assured me," says Mr. Greenwall, "that the Spad belies its appearance. It climbs rapidly and smoothly, and it can attain a speed of over 125 miles per hour. The Fokker's speed is 100 miles per hour. On account of its swiftness, the Spad can only be entrusted to the most expert pilots, because, although the speed can be reduced a little, only the most skilled airmen can alight without smashing a machine. France, however, has no lack of expert aviators, and the deadly work of the Spads may be traced through the now daily French communications relating to warfare in the air.

"I asked M. Bleriot his opinion of the Fokker." He answered me without hesitation. A very greatly overrated machine, he said. It is no better than an aeroplane we have had in France for a long time; I refer to the Morane-Saulnier. German machines are without doubt inferior to ours or yours," he continued, "but they have an engine, the Mercedes, which is as good as but none better than the French engines.

"I believe France has the best airmen in the world, but the British follow us very closely," said M. Bleriot. "Never for a moment has Germany held the mastership of the air, and now we have this

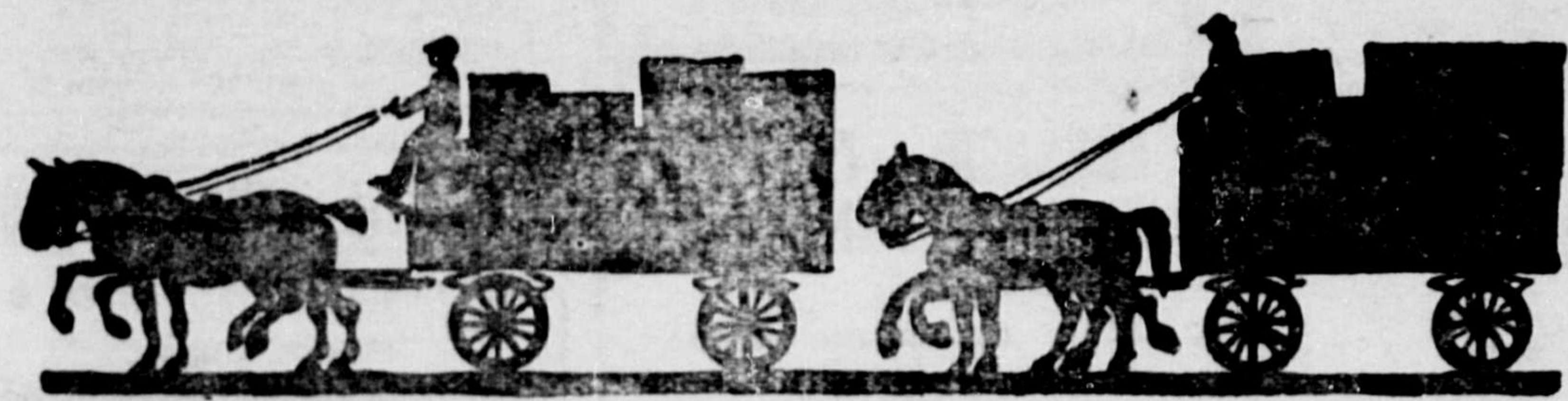

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

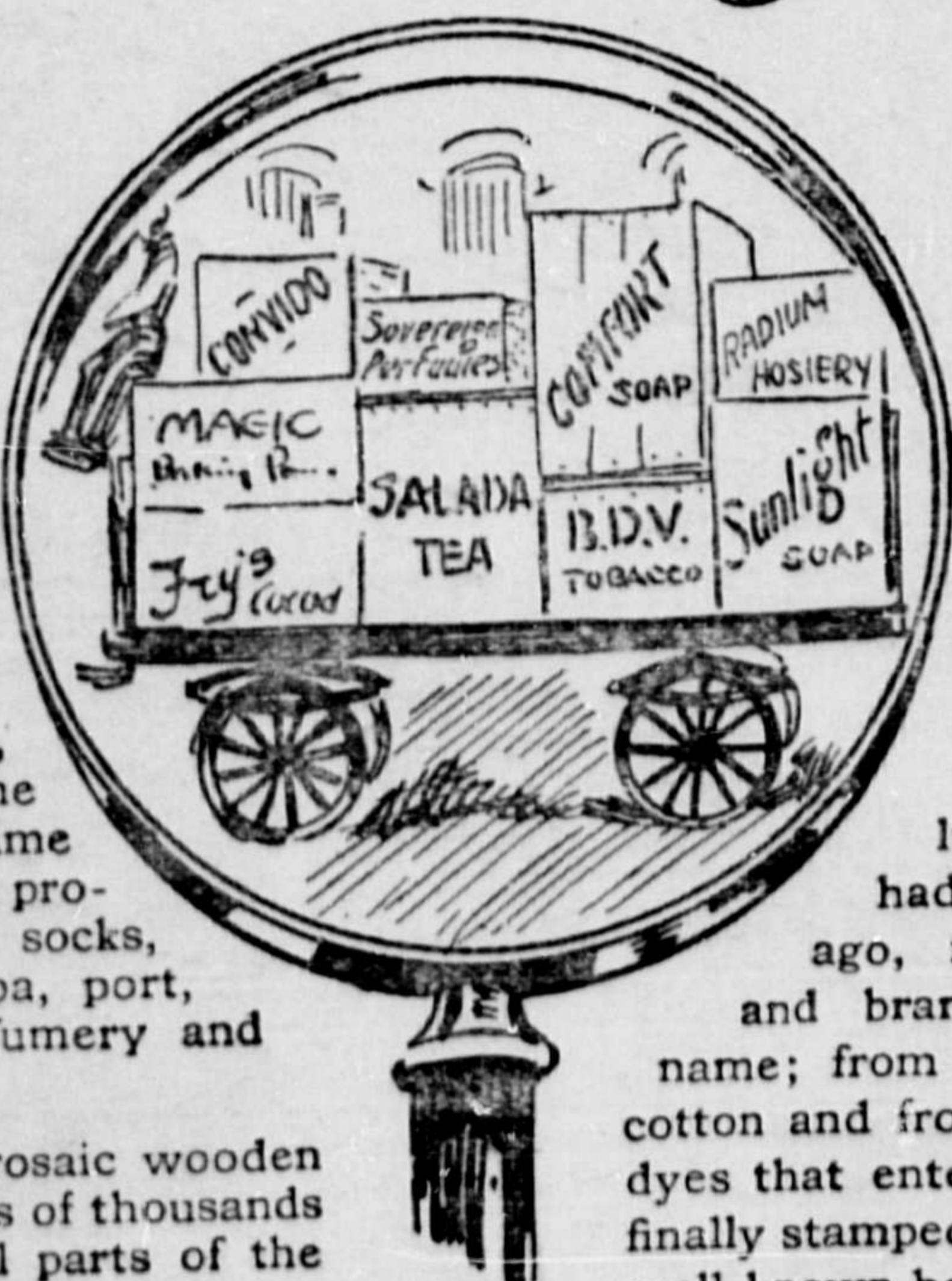
There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
