Vancouver, B. C. June 28, 1916.. M. A. Macdonald, Esq., Barrister, etc., co. Messrs. Russell,

Macdonald & Hancox, Credit-Foncier, Bldg, Vancouver. My dear Macdonald,-I have to go to Winnipeg on an important appointment, otherwise I would be glad to attend the public meeting which I understand, is to be addressed by Mr. Brewster and you.

Some other opportunity will occur when I can personally express in public my admiration for the manner in which Mr. Brewster and you discharged your duties during the last session and for the complete justification so afforded of those Conservatives who, like myself, voted for you at the by-election.

None of the mud so persistently thrown at you has stuck. You have signally shown that the reputation of an honest man cannot be affected by the machinations of a desperate, discredited conglomeration of political opponents, even though the public chest be open to them in their malicious work.

It is beyond question that the government of this province is tottering to its fall, and, in my opinion, unless much of the legislation of last session is repealed by the next government, its fate will be the same.

# HUNS WELCOMED CAPTURE ON THE

Whole Battalion Surrendered Rather than Face the Terrible Attack of the Allies.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 5 .- The London Times correspondent, in describing the bombardment of the German positions on the western front, assserts that one hundred shells a minute were exploded

during four days. In the great offensive, which extended over a ninety-mile front, the German prisoners welcomed capture, as they had had enough of it. They praise the gallantry of the British troops and shudder at the mention of the artillery engagement.





# The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber byloaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product-soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.

The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.

The tea was gathered by swartskinned natives of the romantic island of Ceylon; from sunny Portugal the luscious, big grapes had been gathered years

ago, fermented, bottled and branded with a famous name; from Egypt had come the cotton and from South America the dyes that entered into the product finally stamped with the brand of a well-known hosiery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorrie were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
