### PRISONERS WELCOME CAPTURE--RUSSIAN CAVALRY ACROSS THE CARPATHIANS

#### RUSSIANS OVER CARPATHIANS INTO HUNGARY

Russian Successes Continue—Roumania Commandeers Austrian Cars—Russian Liberalism.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 5.—Wireless reports from Bucharest state that the Russian cavalry has crossed the Carpathian Mountains and has entered Hungary.

##### Another Success.

Petrograd, July 5.—The Russians have smashed the German defences at Baranovichi and have captured twenty-eight hundred prisoners and several guns.

##### Russian Liberalism.

The Duma has adopted a bill according to the peasantry the same civil rights as are enjoyed by the rest of the Russian population.

##### Roumania Gets Busy.

London, July 5.—Roumania has confiscated six Austrian engines and two hundred and fifty freight cars which were delivered across the border during the Russian advance in Bukovina.

All exportations from Roumania to Bulgaria have been suspended.

##### Air Attack on Sofia.

A squadron of French aeroplanes has dropped bombs on Sofia, wrecking the military buildings there.

#### NEW INVENTION DESTROYS WIRE ENTANGLEMENTS

Egyptian Engineer has Solved Big Problem—More Germans Surrender—King Reviews Canadians.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 5.—A despatch from the French headquarters on the western front says that an invention by an Egyptian government engineer has revolutionized the methods of the Allies in attacking the German defences.

The new invention, which for obvious reasons is not described, thoroughly destroys the German barbed wire entanglements and enables the British and French troops to advance without interruption.

##### More Surrender.

Five hundred Germans who have surrendered state that they were rushed from the Dantzig valley to Rheims and Lille to reinforce the defences there against the Allied attack.

##### King Reviews Canadians.

As a recognition of Canada's assistance in the great struggle, King George visited Bramshot Camp on Saturday. He traversed the ranks of the various battalions (which must have included the 102nd) and complimented the men upon the work which had been done by Canada. The flag was half-masted in honor of Earl Kitchener.

#### No Mud Has "Stuck"

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper was invited to speak at the Liberal meeting held in Vancouver last night, but, owing to an important appointment in Winnipeg, was unable to be present. The following is his reply to the invitation.

Vancouver, B. C. June 28, 1916.

M. A. Macdonald, Esq., Barrister, etc., co. Messrs. Russell, Macdonald & Hancox, Credit-Foncier, Bldg, Vancouver. My dear Macdonald,—I have to go to Winnipeg on an important appointment, otherwise I would be glad to attend the public meeting which I understand, is to be addressed by Mr. Brewster and you.

Some other opportunity will occur when I can personally express in public my admiration for the manner in which Mr. Brewster and you discharged your duties during the last session and for the complete justification so afforded of those Conservatives who, like myself, voted for you at the by-election.

None of the mud so persistently thrown at you has stuck. You have signally shown that the reputation of an honest man cannot be affected by the machinations of a desperate, discredited conglomeration of political opponents, even though the public chest be open to them in their malicious work.

It is beyond question that the government of this province is tottering to its fall, and, in my opinion, unless much of the legislation of last session is repealed by the next government, its fate will be the same.

I firmly believe that the people as a whole are determined to have clean, honest government and sane legislation, and care little what party flag is flown.

#### LAST GERMAN EFFORT WITH SUBMARINES

Unrestricted Operations to Hinder Munitions Reaching France and to Cripple British Shipping.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, July 5.—Following the announcement by the British government of the abandonment of the Declaration of London, a Berlin report declares that Germany proposes to institute unrestricted submarine operations in order to injure British shipping and to prevent munitions from arriving in France and to force Britain to respect international law.

##### German Seaplane Wrecked.

The Danish steamer Politiken rescued a German seaplane which was found wrecked in the North Sea and carried it to a Danish port. The crew was transferred to a German warship.

##### Greek Blockade Raised.

Athens, July 5.—The Entente blockade of the Greek ports has been raised since demobilization of the Greek army has been effected. As a result of the blockade there have been bread riots on the Island of Mitylene.

##### Greek Officers Surrendered.

The Greek government has surrendered to France the officers who have been accused of participation in an attack upon French officers at Rizoastis.

##### East Africa.

Havre, July 5.—The Belgians in German East Africa are compelling the Germans to retreat across the Kagera river. The Belgian troops have captured prisoners, food and stores of ammunition.

#### HUNS WELCOMED CAPTURE ON THE WESTERN FRONT

A Whole Battalion Surrendered Rather than Face the Terrible Attack of the Allies.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 5.—The London Times correspondent, in describing the bombardment of the German positions on the western front, asserts that one hundred shells a minute were exploded during four days.

In the great offensive, which extended over a ninety-mile front, the German prisoners welcomed capture, as they had had enough of it. They praise the gallantry of the British troops and shudder at the mention of the artillery engagement.

##### Whole Battalion Taken.

A despatch from the British headquarters in France states that an entire battalion of Prussian infantry, which was assigned to replace the casualties in the recent big Allied offensive, absolutely refused to face the terrific assaults of the British and French and surrendered in a body at Fricourt.

#### MEXICAN REPLY TO WILSON NOTE

Washington, July 5.—The Mexican Embassy has received Carranza's answer to the last Wilson note. It will be delivered to Secretary Lansing today and it is believed that its tone is conciliatory.

TUPPER'S LETTER

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper's letter to M.A. Macdonald, which we reproduce in this issue, is eloquent of the attitude of thinking Conservatives towards the Bowser government and its methods.

"None of the mud so persistently thrown at you has stuck," says Sir Hibbert, and "You have signally shown that the reputation of an honest man cannot be affected by the machinations of a desperate, discredited conglomeration of political opponents, even though the public chest be open to them in their malicious work."

That there are many more Conservatives who view matters from the same standpoint as Sir Hibbert Tupper is evident from the recent resolution passed by the Conservative Association of Duncans, V. I. After the Vancouver by-election, the Tory press claimed that many Conservatives voted for Macdonald.

are not actively party men, and, as was predicted by the Liberal press, the attempt to blacken the character of M. A. Macdonald, and through him the Liberal party, has simply proven a boomerang which has returned to the men who caused it to be thrown.

The Bowser policy has been to crush ruthlessly anything that looked like opposition, but the machine is powerless against a man of the sterling character of M. A. Macdonald. In Prince Rupert, the premier had planned to make a similar attack upon T. D. Pattullo, but it failed miserably, because the people of this city know Mr. Pattullo to be thoroughly clean.

The sole reason why the attack was made upon Macdonald was because he had dared to successfully combat Bowserism, and the reason why Pattullo was attacked was because he had the courage to assist Macdonald in fighting for clean government.

The Allies have taken a long time to make up their minds to use gas, but now that they have started they seem to have chosen the right kind, for it has struck terror into the people of Berlin.

There has been no mention of the number of prisoners taken by the British in the recent fighting, but the French have captured 14,000 in two days and it may be taken for granted that the British got a few thousands as well, in addition to artillery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.
