## GERMANS STEADILY RETREATING IN WEST

### RUSSIANS CUT RAILROAD FOR LEMBERG -- CANADIAN TROOPS IN BIG BATTLE

#### GERMANS STILL RETREATING ON WESTERN FRONT

Allies Now on Outskirts of Strong Enemy Position at Peronne—Germans Rushing Along Reinforcements.

(Special to The Daily News)  
British Field Headquarters, July 6.—The Franco-British troops are advancing in the Fricourt region and all the territory between the Saumont farm and Hill 63, on the road from Fricourt to Baloux is in our possession.

The Germans are steadily retreating in order to escape slaughter and capture and are taking their artillery with them. Progress is being steadily made by the Allies on both sides of the Somme and up to last night, 15,000 prisoners had been taken and the German losses amounted to 60,000. Other important positions in the Somme region have been captured.

#### French Advance.

Paris, July 6.—The French have captured Hem and the second line German positions south of Somme on a front of ten kilometers (about nine miles), and have occupied Estrees, where two hundred Germans surrendered. The French have advanced to the outskirts of Peronne where the left wing is delayed awaiting the British right wing to come up to continue a concentrated offensive on this strong position.

The Germans are rushing reinforcements to the Somme front from Verdun to the east and from Lens to the north and heavy fighting continues all along the front. At Verdun, the enemy made a strong attack on the west bank of the Meuse but were repelled with heavy losses.

#### "FOURTH" CASUALTIES

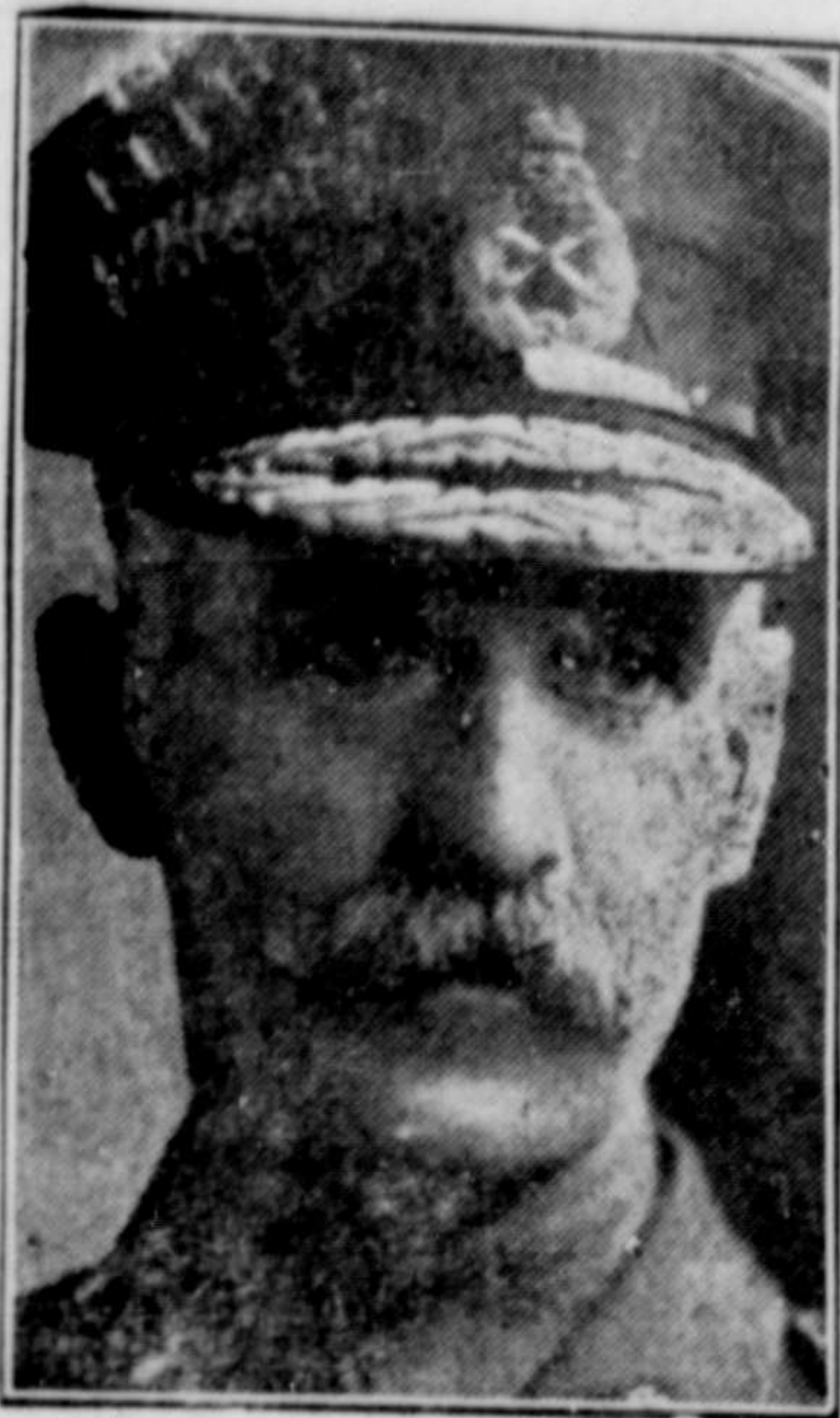
Chicago, July 6.—Twelve are dead and three hundred and seventy-six injured as a result of the fourth of July celebrations.

#### GOSDEN STILL WORKS FOR THE GOVERNMENT

In a speech at Luxton, in Esquimaux on Saturday night, M. A. Macdonald dealt with the "plugging" charges as follows:

"After all these investigations," Mr. Macdonald said, "I have not lost one inch of stature or one hour of sleep. At the Vancouver election there were undoubtedly 'irregularities.' But if we were to get behind some of these incidents we would discover that they were really the machinations of the machine government of this province to work up evidence against their political opponents.

"When Gosden appeared before the legislative committee and gave his evidence, I knew he was lying and I believe that he was paid to lie. I do not believe that he was acting on his own initiative. And thanks to the action of one jurymen, according to the statement of the foreman of the jury, this man Gosden is still at large doing political scavenging for the Government.

"So far as the Liberal party and myself were concerned we conducted a clean election in the Vancouver contest. If Scott did only the work he was paid for there would have been no trouble. But he did not do this. He fell by the wayside and by becoming implicated in this matter, he was acting not only as a traitor to me and the Liberal party, but as the result of the receipt of money from some source. It doesn't follow that if one gets a dishonest man in his employ that the employer himself is dishonest.

"In the investigations the attorney-general was afraid of Scott's evidence. That's why he had the warrant issued against him, which kept him from coming into British Columbia, after immunity from arrest had been granted all other witnesses in the case.

"The whole thing was dastardly. The thing for the people of this province to do now is to ascertain the full facts and mete out the punishment due."

#### CANADIANS AND AUSTRALIANS IN GREAT ADVANCE

Heavy Casualty Lists but Mostly Wounded—Joffre Sure of Final Triumph—Kills to Remain.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 6.—The Canadian infantry, mounted rifles and machine gun sections, along with the Australian infantry and the Royal Warwicks, were in the thick of the fighting on the Somme front, and are mentioned in despatches for their gallant work. One hundred and four officers from these battalions figure in the casualty lists, of which thirty-two are dead. The casualties amongst the rank and file amount to 1,439, of whom only 312 are dead.

#### Kills to Remain.

Ottawa, July 6.—The order to suspend the organization of additional Highland Battalions in Canada has been rescinded on information received from the front. Sir Sam Hughes is in favor of the kills in the trenches.

#### Joffre Confident.

The Rupert Hotel bulletin says that General Joffre states that the Allies' new plans are now in full swing and mean final triumph.

#### Honors for Grey.

London, July 6.—The Daily Chronicle reports that King George has decided to confer a peerage upon Sir Edward Grey, the Secretary for Foreign Affairs.

#### BELLA COOLA INDIAN MEETS TRAGIC DEATH

Milo Stauser, a Bella Coola Indian, met his death under very sad circumstances last week. Two launch parties of Indians left for South Bentinck Arm to do hand-logging. On one of the launches, the engine became ignited and Milo Stauser rushed over to the engine to put out the flames. His clothes caught fire and he jumped into the water. An oar was thrown to him but he was too weak to retain his hold and sank.

Walter King another occupant of the launch threw flour on the fire and speedily put it out though in doing so he was rather severely burned. The body of the drowned man was not recovered. Milo Stauser was a youth of 19 and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. The tragedy cast a deep gloom over the Indian village.

#### ELECTION DATE

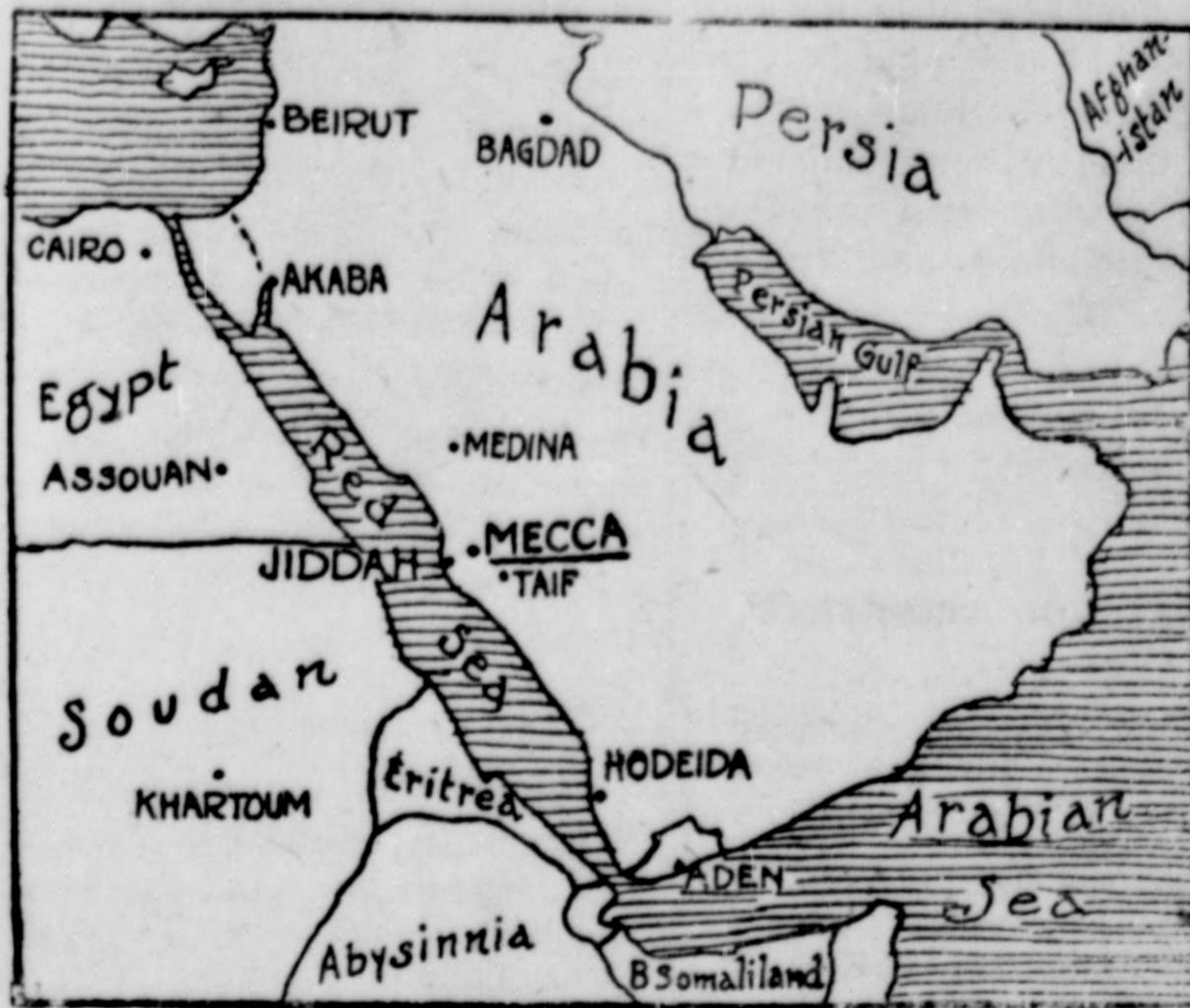

The reply states that Mexico looks upon the presence of foreign militia within her borders as trespassing.

#### SIR RIDER HAGGARD WILL ARRIVE FRIDAY

Sir H. Rider Haggard and party will arrive from the south tomorrow on their way east. The famous novelist and agriculturist is touring the Dominion gathering information for the British Government as to the facilities for settling men on the land after the war. Sir Rider Haggard has already visited South Africa, the scene of many of his most popular books; New Zealand and Australia. He arrived in Victoria some days ago, where he was the guest of his brother, Colonel Haggard.

#### RUSSIANS CUT CHIEF GERMAN RAILWAY LINE

Communication Line for Lemberg Defence is Gone—Germans Routed on Dniester—Berlin Claims.

Petrograd, July 6.—The Russians have cut the Delatyn-Korosmezo railway which is the principal communication line for the Austro-German forces which are defending Lemberg. The enemy is so busy trying to combat the plans of the Russians that he is without any strategic plans of his own whatever.

#### Germans Routed.

Along the right bank of the Dniester, the Germans have been routed and the Russians are pressing on towards the mountains.

#### German Claims.

Berlin, July 6.—Germany claims that 23,000 Russian prisoners have been captured during the month of June.

#### Austrian Report.

Vienna, July 6.—The Austrians report the capture of 900 Russians at Whereben.

#### Italian Advance.

Rome, July 6.—In the Trentino offensive, our troops have captured the summits of Monte Corno and Monte Sollugio.

#### Roumania.

London, July 6.—The Jonesca and Filipeco parties favor Roumania joining the Entente Allies.

### IN THE LETTER BOX

Editor, Daily News,  
 Dear Sir:—Within the past few days, much has been heard of the attitude this firm is taking in regard to closing on Wednesday afternoon, and remaining open on Saturday. Our sole reason for doing so is that, during the next three months, the salmon fishermen come to town on Saturday, as they are obliged to lay off under the Act. We get a considerable share of their shopping business, and, if we are closed on Saturdays, that business will go out of town, probably to the cannery stores which do business only in the south.

Wild threats have been made, some of which we hardly credit to be true, as they savor of past centuries, as to what will be done if we do not close on Saturdays. Several other merchants who signed an agreement to close on Wednesdays were bluffed by these threats and remained open yesterday.

We do not seek to dictate to any store, nor do we have any objection to giving our clerks the Saturday half-holiday, but, in order to protect our business we shall remain open on Saturdays, until the citizens decide the question in January. This is a free country and the law is on our side and we refuse to allow business to be driven out of Prince Rupert, as would happen if we closed on Saturday.

# The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.



The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.

The tea was gathered by swart-skinned natives of the romantic island of Ceylon; from sunny Portugal the luscious, big grapes had been gathered years ago, fermented, bottled and branded with a famous name; from Egypt had come the cotton and from South America the dyes that entered into the product finally stamped with the brand of a well-known hosiery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.
