TREMENDOUS RIGA OFFENSIVE HAS BEGUN

GERMANS UNABLE TO COMBAT TERRIFIC ATTACK -- GAINS ON WESTERN FRONT

GERMANS FAIL TO WITHSTAND RUSSIAN BLOWS

Terrific Russian Attack Along a 300-Mile Front—Big Riga Offensive has Begun—Huns Retreating.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 8.—The Russians have inaugurated an unprecedented offensive along a three hundred-mile front and are delivering smashing blows against the enemy lines.

The Germans are quite unable to defend themselves against this furious attack and the Russians have captured several villages; important railway stations; fortified enemy positions, and immense quantities of artillery and military accessories. Two hundred and seventy officers and 9,900 men have been taken in the past two days.

Riga Offensive.

Petrograd, July 8.—The Russians have launched a terrific offensive on the Riga front and are firing fifty times the quantity of ammunition which they did in 1914, rendering the Germans helpless and compelling their withdrawal to a new location.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, July 8.—The German salient in Volhynia, facing Czar-torysk, has been abandoned owing to the tremendous superiority of the Russian force which is bringing terrific pressure to bear on our troops.

Peculiar Report.

Petrograd, July 8.—The extreme heat has compelled the Russians to evacuate Bagdad.

(We have had no report that the Russians ever occupied Bagdad, and this probably means that the Caucasian army has abandoned its efforts to reach Bagdad.—Editor.)

LYDD GEORGE IS SUCCESSOR TO KITCHENER

Members Discuss Reports of the Hampshire Disaster—Canadians Arrive—Italians Still Gaining.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 8.—There are mysterious rumors regarding the Hampshire disaster and the indirect evidence of Kitchener's death has been the subject of much discussion in the House of Commons.

Richard Comag has demanded that a court martial be held, in order to get at the facts, while Mr. McNamara, the Liberal member, is opposed to this procedure on account of the statements made by the survivors.

Kitchener's Successor.

Hon. David Lloyd George, minister of Munitions, has been appointed Secretary of State for War, in succession to Earl Kitchener and Lord Derby has been appointed Under-Secretary.

Canadians Arrive.

Ottawa, July 8.—It is officially announced that six thousand more Canadian troops have arrived safely in England.

Italian Front.

Rome, July 8.—The Italian drive on the Trentino front continues and the Austrians are being forced to retreat to stronger positions.

Papal Appointment.

La Catemli has been appointed Papal Nuncio to Belgium.

LIBERAL LEADERS WILL SPEAK HERE ON FRIDAY

H. C. Brewster and M. A. Macdonald, who have held rousing meetings in Vancouver and Victoria, will leave for Prince Rupert on Wednesday, arriving here on Friday morning, the 14th. On that evening there will be a public meeting in the Westholme Theatre, under the auspices of the Liberal Association when speeches will be delivered by the Liberal leader, M. A. Macdonald and T. D. Pattullo.

COLD STORAGE STRIKE HAS BEEN SETTLED

The strike at the Cold Storage has been amicably settled, the management having agreed to pay 10 cents per hour ordinary time and 50 cents per hour overtime. To The Daily News this morning, Mr. T. H. Johnson expressed great satisfaction because of the good spirit displayed by the men during the time they had a difference of opinion. The fact that there was no sign or threat of violence did much towards bringing about an early and satisfactory settlement.

BRITISH HAVE TAKEN STRONG HUN POSITION

Germans Compelled to Retreat in Face of Intensive Combined Attack—Germans Want Peace.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 8.—The British bombardment on the western front now extends from La Basse to Armentieres and the attack on this part of the front, combined with the intense Anglo-French offensive, has compelled the enemy to withdraw their reserve forces from the Verdun front. The enemy casualties are particularly severe.

The British have captured the Leipzig redoubt, a very strong piece of fortification which the Germans have held for the past eighteen months.

Clamor for Peace.

Berlin, July 8.—Regardless of the penalties attached to any breach of discipline the Socialists are clamoring for peace, while the population is surrounding the bakeries and demanding food.

General Von Haesler is advising the Crown Prince Frederick as to the movements of his army on the western front.

U. S. Cruiser in Europe.

Ville, France, July 8.—The United States cruiser Des Moines has arrived here.

Kaiser in West.

London, July 8.—The Kaiser, realizing that defeat is imminent, has arrived on the Somme front with his general staff to take command of the German defence against the great Allied offensive.

French Waiting.

Paris, July 8.—The French are meantime suspending their advances in the Somme district, waiting until their opponents have been sufficiently disorganized by the artillery bombardment and the attacks at other points.

Wild Rumor.

There was a rumor yesterday that the Kaiser had been wounded. No such report came over any of the wires; and there is no truth whatever in the statement.

MAJOR M'MORDIE LOST EYE IN BIG CHARGE

Mrs. McMordie has written to a friend in the city stating that Major S. P. McMordie has lost an eye and also has ten shrapnel wounds. The major led a charge in the taking of the 1,500 yards at Ypres and his adjutant has written to Mrs. McMordie telling her of his gallantry. Mr. McMordie is still in hospital in France but will shortly be moved to England.

DETAILS REGARDING ART. JOHNSON'S DEATH

W. W. Johnson, of Cut Knife, Sask., has written to a friend in this city giving the details regarding the death of his brother, Arthur Johnson, formerly engineer at the Digby Marine Depot. On May 21st, during a German bombardment "somewhere in France" a piece of shrapnel struck him in the head, lodging in the brain. He lingered in a semi-conscious condition, and apparently suffering no pain, until May 25th. His two sisters went over to France from England and were with him when he died.

Arthur was one of the most popular of the Scotch boys in this city and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. His brother in Saskatchewan has just enlisted for active service.

AMERICAN NOTES

BREWSTER AND MACDONALD OPEN THE LIBERAL CAMPAIGN

ENTHUSIASTIC AUDIENCE AT VANCOUVER GIVES GREAT RECEPTION TO LIBERAL LEADERS—MACDONALD MAKES VITRIOLIC ATTACK ON BOWSER MACHINE METHODS

The opening meeting of the Liberal campaign in Vancouver on Tuesday evening was the greatest demonstration of the kind ever given in the city. The Empress Theatre was packed to the doors, and the huge audience rose to its feet and cheered frantically while, at times, there was a grim silence which boded ill for the administration.

H. C. Brewster delivered a masterful analysis of conditions in British Columbia under the maladministration of the Bowser machine and reviewed the legislation which the opposition and the imminence of an election forced upon the Government.

At the outset, Charles E. Campbell read the letter to M. A. Macdonald by Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, great cheering following Sir Charles' condemnation of the Bowser machine and its corrupt methods.

Mr. Brewster said he had no fight with the man who was genuinely of Conservative or Socialist opinions, but he was bitterly opposed to those in charge at Victoria, who did not represent the great Conservative party in any sense. "The day is past in this province when the people will hand over the government to a machine," said the leader. Because his colleague, Mr. Macdonald, had committed the sin of defeating a cabinet minister, the Bowser gang had tried to crucify him.

Dealing with the legislation of the past session, Mr. Brewster said that the Workmen's Compensation Act and the Agricultural Act had been taken from the Liberal platform while the government's idea of helping mining was to grant \$200,000 to be used at the discretion of the representative. "The Liberal party has done more for you out of power than the Conservative party in," said the Liberal leader. He went on to deal with the Soldiers' Homestead Bill describing it as a double-barrelled affair which contained one good principle. "They've got you going and coming," said Mr. Brewster, "they took the old flag and wrapped it round their rotten land system and made a Soldiers' Homestead Bill out of it."

Dealing with the high financing at Victoria, the speaker said it had been proven that hundreds of thousands of dollars had been practically stolen and not properly accounted for. On the parliament buildings the "L" addition had cost \$1,200,000, a greater cost than the entire building. The contracts for the work were let to the highest and not the the lowest bidders, and "you will be asked to believe such business never cost the province a dollar—the contractor just donated it," asserted the speaker. "A letter

which was written to the premier by the main contractor was not allowed to go before the investigating committee."

Mr. Brewster dealt at length with the Price-Love letters arranging for the buying of votes in Vancouver and Victoria; the vote of \$15,000 a year to McBride and particularly the handing over of millions to the P. G. E., contrary to the law. "Had the premier done his duty, the road would have been completed now," he said. The twenty-five millions of stock had been apportioned by Foley, Welch & Stewart without one cent being paid into the treasury. The opposition asked the government for an enquiry, but at Bowser's nod it was voted down.

With Head Erect.

When M. A. Macdonald rose to address the meeting, the audience rose to its feet and applauded and cheered again and again. After thanking them for the cordiality of their reception, the junior member for Vancouver traced the history of the maladministration at Victoria, leading up to the Vancouver by-election. "On Feb. 26th, last, with the help of the people of Vancouver, I committed a grave offense against this corrupt organization; an unpardonable sin. I made the first breach in their armor. We delivered a death blow to the government. If since then I have been attacked with poisoned weapons and with a degree of virulence never before perhaps exceeded in Canada, I can tell you I came through it all with head erect and shoulders well set back still ready to carry the war into Africa. I am ready to show these traducers, who, if they could, would bury me under an avalanche of lies, that they will never do so long as I have, as I have today, freedom from the taint which my opponents would gladly fasten upon me, and as long as I have an ounce of fighting blood in my veins." (Cheers).

Mr. Macdonald went on to compare the Vancouver election charges with the charges made against Premier Norris of Manitoba by the Roblin gangsters.

Corrupt Organization.

"I do not propose to allow this corrupt organization, masquerading under the name 'Conservative,' to sweep its filth onto my doorstep and pretend it was there all the time. And let me repeat it again, that in discussing, as I intend to discuss, the base, cowardly

CALLING THE PREMIER

Is the Prime Minister of Canada asleep? Are his Cabinet Ministers away from home, or are they helpless, or are they merely stupid? Is there no one about Ottawa who will arouse Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues to a sense of conditions in military affairs that are rapidly converging to a crisis? Are they all so dull, or so self-satisfied, as not to see that all over Canada, and especially in Ontario, the people who know at firsthand the recruiting situation, and particularly know it is handicapped by the Militia Department from the Minister down, are becoming almost rebellious in their indignation? Cannot Premier Borden be made to understand that this is no time for merely "holding down a job"? and that he must either tackle the Militia administration himself or appoint a recruiting director with brains enough to understand the problem, authority enough to do the essential things, and power enough to prevent or to repair the damage done by Sir Sam Hughes and his arrogant insults to men who are sacrificing their all, both in money and in service, for the good of the regiments?

In the regular and ordinary administration of the affairs of the Militia, the Department at Ottawa has failed and fallen down at every point—yes, at every point. In the arduous work of recruiting, the officers in charge have been hindered instead of helped by the officials in the Department. Wherever he goes the Minister by his cheap affectation of contempt for law and precedent, and, as at London last week, by his unpardonable and offensive rebukes to the officers in the presence and hearing of their regiments, makes the task of recruiting and of discipline needlessly difficult.

Not only are officers of the highest equipment and of unblemished personal character

insulted by the lawless and undisciplined Minister of Militia, but other officers, whose characters are openly scandalous and whose conduct has been condemned, are retained in high command in defiance of all the interests involved, both moral and military. A notorious case of this sort developed in Toronto, crammed with all the elements of a public scandal. A battalion was sent overseas a fortnight ago, and a large number of both officers and men were in a mutinous mood against their Colonel, whose conduct had been the subject of secret investigation by a Court of Inquiry. The facts, as known to many friends of the officers and men of the battalion, were laid before the Premier. He promised much, but did nothing.

It is high time this boasting by the Premier and by the Minister of Militia about what has been done in raising Canada's army utterly ceased. The fact is, the raising of the regiments, in nearly every instance, was retarded by the Government's negligence, rather than promoted by the Government's aid. It was the officers and local friends who did the work and provided most of the necessary funds. The point has now been reached when there is threatening an outbreak of public indignation unless the Premier plays the Premier part and rids the country of the obstacles which the Department of Militia puts in the way. The People call the Premier.—Toronto Globe.

ardly and dastardly attempt to besmirch my reputation with the aid of paid thugs and perjured hirelings from a neighboring city under the tutelage of John L. Sullivan, I do so not by way of defence, but by way of attack on the men and the machine responsible for this villainy. The day will never come when this organization against which I have fought since 1909 will place me on the defensive (applause).

After declaring most emphatically that he had always stood, and would always stand for clean government, Mr. Macdonald went on to show how little sincerity there was in the government talk of clean elections, instancing the turning down by the machine of Mr. Brewster's amendment to make all voters sign their names. He next referred to the campaign of lies carried on by the hand-fed Tory press. He described Bowser as a man who would stop at nothing to gain his ends, and what he is not willing to do himself, Ernest Miller, of Grand Forks is willing to accomplish. He went on to show how the Tories had practised personation at elections all over the province. In Cranbrook in 1909, when one man confessed to voting seven times for the McBride-Bowser government; in Fernie where Thomas Whelan, who was very active in the Vancouver by-election, confessed to voting twice for W. R. Ross. The Liberals had proof of twenty other cases. "Did you hear any outcry then from Bowser that these practices were corrupt and wicked and must be stopped?" asked Mr. Macdonald. The evidence in the Vancouver case showed that Sullivan and the leading Conservatives of the machine had a complete understanding and knew all about the arrangements for the bringing in of the "pluggers." Ernest Miller summed up the situation after the election by saying that "someone threw a monkey wrench into their machine."

In dealing with Scott, he said that Scott was paid for going legitimate work and never did any other kind of work for the Liberals. If Scott did any crooked work, he was paid to do so by someone outside of the Liberal party, and even if it took months or years the truth as to who paid the money would be discovered.

Mr. Macdonald concluded a most able speech by recounting the instances in which the public money had been squandered wantonly by the Bowser government. \$7,000,000 had been handed over to the P. G. E. with the utmost

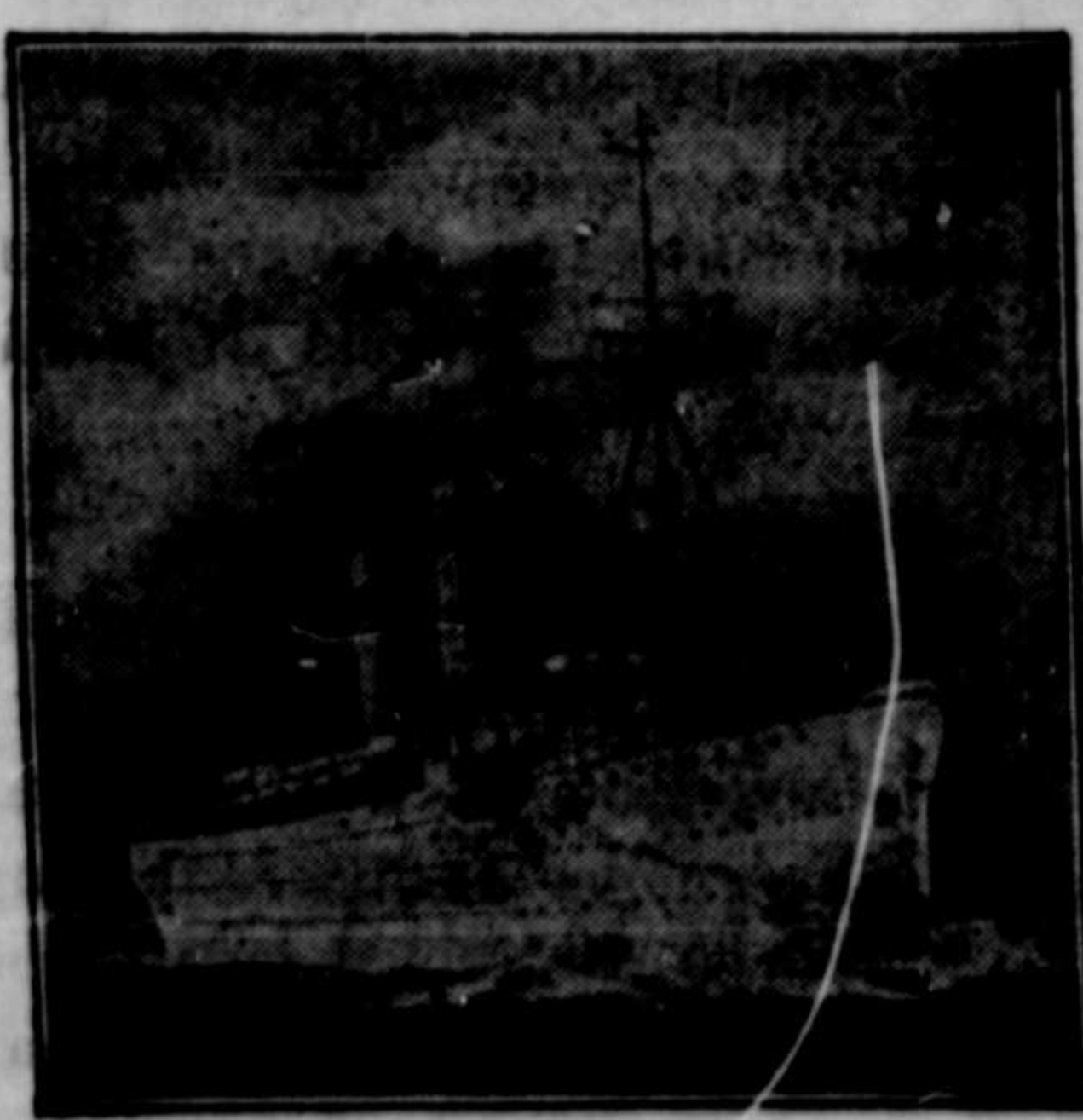
