## 200 BRITISH MERCHANTMEN LEAVE BALTIC

### AUSTRIANS DESERTING IN HUNDREDS -- GERMANS ARE CLAMORING FOR PEACE

#### BRITISH AND FRENCH STILL MAKING GAINS

Population of Enemy Countries Impressed—Austrian Prince Prays for Peace—Sinn Feiners Freed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 10.—British infantry, aided by French artillery, have carried a line of German trenches at Boise de Trones and the French have taken the village of Biaches.

On the Somme front, from July 1st to July 7th, the French captured nine thousand, five hundred prisoners; seventy-six cannon, and several hundred machine guns.

#### Berlin Admissions.

The tremendous slaughter of Austrians and Germans and the continuous Allied advances on every front, coupled with the Berlin admissions of defeat, are profoundly impressing the populations of the various enemy countries. The constant clamor for peace, following the admissions of defeat, is revealing the real situation in Austria, Hungary and Germany.

#### Praying for Peace.

Berlin, July 10.—The heir to the Austrian throne is forming a league to pray for peace.

#### Sinn Feiners Released.

London, July 10.—Twelve hundred Sinn Feiners, who have been in prison since the Irish rebellion, have been released. The remainder have been interned.

#### TWO HUNDRED BRITISH SHIPS ARE RELEASED

Naval Battle Cleared Germans From the Baltic—Canadian Prisoners Well Treated by the Swiss.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 10.—As a result of the great battle in the North Sea, the Baltic has been opened up and two hundred British merchantmen have been released from Baltic ports in which they have been lying idle since the outbreak of the war.

The vessels left Petrograd, Kronstadt and other Baltic ports and proceeded down the Baltic and passed through the Cattagat into the North Sea without the slightest interference from the German warships. One result of the release of such merchant tonnage is that freight rates, which have been abnormally high, are showing signs of falling considerably.

#### Canadians in Switzerland.

Canadian prisoners have been transferred from Germany to Switzerland and comment upon the splendid treatment which is being accorded them by the Swiss people.

#### Maritime Law.

Paris, July 10.—France has now abandoned the interpretation of maritime international law contained in the Declaration of London.

#### Waiting for Borden.

Borden's arrival is awaited at the economic conference in Paris. The campaign of the Dominions will be based upon the results of the consultation between Premier Borden of Canada and Premier Hughes of Australia.

#### COMMON SENSE IN MILITARY MATTERS

Ottawa, June 29.—What the shrewdest critics complain of is not the slackness of the government in recruiting, but the wasteful and inefficient methods it employs. Common sense and an eye to economy are the two things most needed at headquarters just now. The posthumous Kitchener tributes to Major General Sir Sam Hughes are a pale substitute for real ideas on the part of the minister of Militia. The general opinion is that if Sir Sam did less prancing and more hard work things might get along better.

It goes without saying that no Canadian government could favor compulsory service of Canadians in a war three thousand miles distant. Our assistance to the Mother Country in this great world war is a true gift of the spirit and how eager that spirit is may be seen by the measure of our help already. To coerce that spirit by compulsory service would be to wrench if not to sever the strongest tie that binds the British Empire together. It is a safe prophecy that there will never be conscription in Canada, except in defence of our own shores and then the chances are that it will not be needed. Not to put too fine a point on it, the Militia Act covers the ground already and no further legislation would be needed.

Meanwhile there is no valid reason why the government should not inaugurate a system of registration which would serve the purpose of providing a list of eligible recruits and protect workers who are needed at home from the indiscriminate importunities

of the urgers. What the recruiters need above everything else is a definite statement of those who can be approached without detriment to the industrial welfare of the country. If the five hundred thousand mark set by the Borden government is to be anything more than stage thunder for the Germans to hear, it must be arrived at in a reasonable way. The out o'works, the idlers, the young men with no responsibilities—and the woods are full of them—are the ones to be reached. The present methods reach too few of this sort and too many others whose real duty and highest usefulness is at home.

Many invidious comparisons have been made as to what this province or that province is doing in the way of recruiting. It has been said, for example, that the west is more loyal than the east because, proportionately, it has furnished many more men for the war. This is only a half truth which disappears when we consider that the west is largely made up from young men of the east whom the hazard of new fortunes took to that part of the country. As a matter of fact all the provinces are doing their duty. The fault lies in the system of recruiting, which overworks some parts of Canada and underworks others.

For example, one great recruiting city in Ontario is at present the centre for nine regiments in process of formation. If two regiments instead of nine were recruited at a time the results would work out much better. Not only would two regiments fill up more quickly but the expense of maintaining a skeleton organization for the other seven would be cut out until their turn came. As

matters stand now the best method has been chosen to kill time and keep Canadian regiments from the front as long as possible. Under this plan some regiments have been recruiting ever since the war started, others have got as far as Bermuda. When one reflects that nothing chafes an eager soldier like inaction, one can easily see what a depressing effect these stupid delays must have on recruiting.

Another discouragement is the way in which trained regiments from Canada are broken up after they reach England. At St. Julien, Festubert, Langemarck, at the bloody salient of Ypres the Canadians have earned a name for themselves and by the same token they have earned the right to keep that name for their own glory and inscribe it on their own banners. Regiments recruited in Canada should receive some assurance that they will be kept together when they reach the firing line and that chums who enlisted together will not be drafted to different parts of the field. The Canadians have shown their mettle. They need no "steading" from British battalions. They are as good soldiers as any in the world. What's more their officers lately at least, have been thoroughly well trained, as well trained

#### AUSTRIANS ARE NOW DESERTING INTO ROUMANIA

Hundreds of Soldiers Interned at Dobrudja—Austrian Armies in Bad Plight—Trans-Atlantic Sub.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, July 10.—Hundreds of fully-equipped Austrian soldiers are deserting from the army and arriving in Roumania, where they are being interned at Dobrudja. They state that the armies of Generals Palanzer and Baltin have been greatly reduced and many of the regiments are unequipped. Transylvanians are denying the soldiers food and are refusing to attend to the wounded. Anarchy is feared.

#### Russian Gains.

Petrograd, July 10.—The Russians have repulsed the enemy on the Stokhod River and have captured 12,000 prisoners and the town of Delatyn in Galicia.

Russia and Japan have now signed their agreement of absolute friendship.

#### Submarine Service.

Baltimore, July 10.—The German submarine Deutschland has crossed the Atlantic and anchored here. She carried mail and a cargo of 750 tons of chemicals and dye-stuffs, and a message from Emperor Wilhelm to President Wilson. She will carry back to Germany a cargo of nickel and crude rubber.

The vessel was consigned to Schumacher & Company. Henry Hilken, the senior member of the firm, who is an American, says that the Americans need Germany's commodities and the company has planned to make regular trans-Atlantic submarine trips.

**TORY METHODS**

In dealing with the corrupt methods and bludgeoning tactics of the Bowser machine in the Vancouver election, and since then, M. A. Macdonald did not mince matters, in his recent speech in Vancouver. Throughout this province for years, the Tories have made flagrant breaches of the elections act in every election, and have kept the voters' lists in proper shape to carry on their nefarious work. In every constituency, they have taken great care that the lists contained thousands of dead names for their own purposes. Not only have the names of men long since gone from the district been kept on the lists, but men who have actually departed this life still figure as voters.

When the Liberals in this district endeavored some time ago to have a few hundreds of dead names removed, the Tories held up their hands in horror at the idea of attempting such a thing. The idea evidently was that some of the departed voters might come to life again. The lists were kept carefully padded and loaded with the names of men long since gone from this part of the country.

When it came to dealing with the name of a Liberal who happened to be on a tour in the old country, it was an entirely different matter. A gentleman, who is a large property holder in this city, went to the old country on a visit. He corresponded with friends here regularly and signified his intention of returning to Prince Rupert, but the moment he had been away from here six months, the local Tory boss had his name removed from the list. That gentleman is now back in the city, and finds that he has no vote, though the party responsible for the removal of his name knew full well that he would return. Such is the Tory plan of action in regard to the voters' list, and from the above example one

can readily arrive at a conclusion as to which party was responsible for what happened in Vancouver. The Sullivan gang, or a similar company of crooks, has been actively at work for years for the Tories, and Ernest Miller spoke the truth when, in referring to the defeat in Vancouver, he said that "someone had thrown a monkey-wrench into the machinery." The Bowser machine is now crumpled up and is ready for the scrap heap, and its loss will not be lamented by one honest man in British Columbia.

ed at all events as the officers England is now providing for her citizen army, and should be allowed to retain their commands after reaching the front. We have yet to see the Eton boy who is good enough to supplant a husky young Canadian lieutenant who knows his book. The next time Major General Sir Sam Hughes goes to England he should discuss this matter with the War Office. It is far more important to Canada than his views on the Ypres salient or his high opinion of Colonel John Wesley Allison.

Another leak that can be stopped is the matter of double pay to M. P. colonels who are supposed to be raising regiments but who are really raising the wind. The difficulty can be solved very easily. A man is an M. P. or a colonel, according to the duty on which he is actively engaged. If his duty calls him to the House of Commons, pay him his sessional indemnity as a member of parliament, if his duty keeps him at the head of his regiment, pay him as a colonel of the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Separation allowances might also be looked into. Many poor, but proud people refuse to bleed their country by taking the separation allowances to which they are fully entitled. But all the people in Canada are not poor and proud. Quite a few of them are rich and greedy and believe in taking all that's coming to them. In one case that I know of—and it is only one of many—the mother of a Canadian officer who is in receipt of his full civil salary of \$9,000 a year while he is on duty at Shorncliffe, draws his full separation allowance and applies it to the rent of an expensive apartment which she keeps locked up while she is in England to be near her son. The Militia Department could save this country a lot of money by paying separation allowances only where separation allowances are needed to keep want from the door. People who regard the separation allowance as extra pocket money handed out by a generous country should be given to understand that they are nothing more than spongers.

Another costly abuse is—batmen. Winston Churchill drew attention to this increasing horde of non-combatants, some two hundred and fifty thousand of them employed in valeting officers when they might be better engaged in fighting. The batman



### COMMON SENSE IN MILITARY MATTERS

is an English institution. He is a relic of the old days when the British army was officered entirely by aristocrats who were accustomed to a man-servant in times of peace. As the British army is constituted today, an army of citizens, most of whose officers

have been accustomed to button their own suspenders, and lace their own shoes, the batman is an anachronism and a snobbish one at that. And if he is out of place in the British army he is much more so in our Canadian army, whose object ought to be to prove themselves good soldiers and stout democrats all through the piece. Nothing can be more ludicrous than some young sprig of a lieutenant, with a fourteen

collar and an Adam's apple that works up and down like an elevator, stalking along the street with a big, burly batman ten paces to the rear. What right has a lieutenant, who never had any more valeting before than a Greek would give his shoes for five cents—what right has he to keep a strong man out of the fighting just to comb his hair for him? A colonel may have use for a batman—because a colonel has many duties—but even a colonel would be better without one, because pulling on one's own boots is the best extension exercise in the world for improving the wind and taking down the paunch. The batman draws a fighter's pay and he ought to be allowed to do a fighter's work. When this war is over we want our Canadian officers to be good Canadians still, not poor imitations of the British peerage. Cut out the batman.—H. F. Gadsby.



## The Tale The Wagons Tell

My office window faces a street, close to the railway freight sheds.

All day long a steady stream of trucks and lorries lumber by—loaded with boxes, barrels and bales.

One truck I noticed the other afternoon was particularly interesting. No two boxes were the same, and stencilled on the end of each was the name of some well-known product—soap, tobacco, socks, breakfast food, cocoa, port, tea, chocolates, perfumery and baking powder.

Gathered there in prosaic wooden boxes were the results of thousands of hand's labor in all parts of the world.



The cocoa had been grown in Brazil, shipped to Bristol, transhipped to Montreal and finally distributed from Toronto.

The tea was gathered by swart-skinned natives of the romantic island of Ceylon; from sunny Portugal the luscious, big grapes had been gathered years ago, fermented, bottled and branded with a famous name; from Egypt had come the cotton and from South America the dyes that entered into the product finally stamped with the brand of a well-known hosiery.

There, behind that obviously prosaic truck-load of freight was the whole romance of modern commerce—the skilled production, the universal demand for food, drink and raiment, and the world-wide distribution of the things we use every day.

And then I speculated why we use these things every day, instead of some other things; and that brought me plump back to my own job of advertising.

The names of some of the boxes on the lorry were known everywhere to-day, but had been unknown a few-years ago; and I saw then more clearly than ever before that Advertising is really a great channel digger. It is like the Panama Canal. You can sail from Montreal to Vancouver now, around the Horn. You can get there, but it is going to take months. A year or so from now you will sail through the Panama Canal and chop the journey to less than half. A new channel will have been dug.

The great names in commerce to-day are those of the manufacturers who have let modern advertising steam-shovel a channel across the isthmus of distributing difficulties.

The great names in the commerce of to-morrow will be those of men who widen and dredge this channel so that the greater traffic may pass smoothly and quickly from the source of production to the homes of the consumer.
