THE CONTRAST

The Journal compares the Liberal meeting of Friday evening with that of the Conservatives, held recently. The two meetings certainly presented a marked contrast. The Bowser meeting was a thing of cold, stony silences, with no enthusiasm; the Brewster meeting was full of life and fire and optimism.
