GERMANS SURPRISED BY BRITISH CAVALRY

RUSSIANS TAKE THREE THOUSAND MORE -- VERDUN SITUATION IS CRITICAL

CAVALRY WORK BY BRITISH ON WESTERN FRONT

Germans Taken by Surprise—Heavy Bombardment on Somme Desperate German Threats in Case of Failure.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, July 17.—Heavy bombardments continue on the Somme front. The British have captured a number of prisoners and a quantity of howitzers and big guns.

Cavalry Attack.

British Headquarters, Western front, July 17.—British and Indian troops made an attack upon the German positions in Highwood and De Ville woods. The British cavalry charged the Germans, many of whom fell victims to the lances of the mounted men and several prisoners were taken. The enemy was completely dumbfounded by the unusual procedure. This is the first occasion on which the British have used cavalry in offensive warfare in the west.

Italian Front.

Rome, July 17.—Despite violent thunderstorms, there was fierce fighting on the Trentino front on Sunday, the Italians capturing important territory, including the town of Vanzì, where prisoners were taken.

German Threats.

London, July 17.—The Germans threaten to remove all able-bodied French and Belgian citizens into Germany and to devastate the whole countryside, provided they are forced to retire.

Verdun Front.

Realizing what failure in the Verdun offensive means, the Crown Prince is believed to be preparing the greatest series of storming expeditions since the bombardment commenced. The Verdun citadel is ruined and the last French defence has been damaged.

HUNS RETREAT BEFORE HEAVY RUSS ATTACK

Russians Charge in Massed Formation—3,000 Prisoners are Taken—German Generals Removed.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, July 17.—The Russians between Ostroff and Goubine launched massed formation attacks against the enemy, compelling the Germans to retreat. Three thousand prisoners were taken.

German Generals Removed.

The Kaiser, presiding at a council of war, authorized the removal of General Pflanzer and the Archduke Frederick from their commands on the eastern front. These officers were held responsible for the Austro-German defeats in Bukovina.

German Methods.

The German foreign office has instructed the Berlin Bankers' Association to consider all Italian residents as subjects of a belligerent state and to stop all payments to Italians.

Italian Destroyer Sunk.

Rome, July 17.—It is officially announced that the Italian destroyer Impetuouse was torpedoed in the Adriatic by the enemy. Most of the crew were saved.

British Vessels Sunk.

London, July 17.—The British vessels Mopha, Ecclesia and Alta were torpedoed on Sunday. The crews were saved.

Britain has formally explained to all neutral nations her reason for the abrogation of the Declaration of London.

Trouble in Spain.

Madrid, July 17.—Martial law has been declared throughout Spain on account of the railway strike situation. The government has established a military censorship on all press despatches.

Cloudburst.

Asheville, July 17.—A cloudburst in the western section of North Carolina has done ten million dollars' worth of damage. Five are dead and many injured.

Crew Rescued.

Charleston, July 17.—The entire crew of the U. S. collier Hector which was swamped on Friday, has been rescued.

Captain Hughes Dead.

Seattle, July 17.—Captain Hughes, a prominent lawyer here, is dead.

Missionary Murdered.

Tokio, July 17.—Reverend Campbell and his wife, Canadian missionaries, have been stabbed to death in their summer cottage at Karuzawa. The motive of the deed was robbery.

Deutschland a Trader.

Washington, July 17.—The State Department classifies the submarine Deutschland as a merchant vessel.

H. C. BREWSTER CONFERS WITH TERRACE CITIZENS

At Terrace on Saturday afternoon, H. C. Brewster met a citizens' committee composed of John Hepburn, president of the Conservative Association; J. T. Kirkpatrick, president of the Liberal Association; D. D. Munro, president of the Farmers' Institute; C. R. Gilbert, president of the Board of Trade, and Messrs. W. A. Myers, E. Knudson and Sanson, in a conference regarding the desired bridge at that point.

After those gentlemen had stated their case, Mr. Brewster expressed his gratification that the citizens showed such a fine public spirit in getting together for the benefit of the district, irrespective of their political affiliations. This, he said was just as it should be. The future of the district, and of the whole province, depended largely upon this "get together" spirit.

He asked them to provide him with all possible data in regard to the bridge in order that he might give the matter his fullest consideration. He felt satisfied that they had stated their case fairly, and, if the data bore out their representations, he would give every assistance in bringing the matter to a head. In the meantime, Mr. Bowser was premier, and he could assure them that the same co-operative spirit which emanated from the district would be shown by him in lending every assistance to Mr. Bowser in carrying out the project.

LIBERAL LEADERS ARE GIVEN GREAT RECEPTION AT TERRACE

M. A. MACDONALD SCORES BOWSER MACHINE—THE PLUGGERS WERE PAID WITH TORY CASH—H. C. BREWSTER EXPLAINS THE WRIT AND WHAT IT MEANS TO THE PROVINCE

The Liberal leaders held a highly successful meeting in the Progress Hall at Terrace last Saturday evening when a most enthusiastic audience of over two hundred listened attentively to the various speakers. There were many ladies present. John T. Kirkpatrick, president of the local Liberal Association, opened the meeting and called upon W. A. Myers to take the chair.

M. A. Macdonald, on rising to speak, was given a great reception, the audience cheering lustily. Going very fully into the Vancouver election charges, Mr. Macdonald stated most emphatically that Scott was paid by the Liberals to do only legitimate clerical work and never received from any Liberal source money for any other purpose. As a matter of fact, the Liberals were very short of money and had no fat election fund. The speaker said that he had no hesitation in saying that any money which Scott had used illegally had come from the Bowser machine. The whole business he described as a Bowser plot, and the witnesses had testified that they had been paid to vote for the "wet" candidate, while everyone knew that he had had a dry nurse in that election.

He stated that "plugging" was no new Tory enterprise, as they had practised it in Cranbrook, Fernie and elsewhere in the past. W. R. Ross, the political fugitive from Fernie, who had been foisted upon Prince George, could tell them of the Fernie episode.

Mr. Macdonald deplored the fact that settlers were dependent upon government work for a living, while speculators held up the land for \$20 an acre and over. (Voice, "yes, \$150"). He pointed out how only fifty per cent. of the money expended upon roads and trails was spent on work and fifty went to political purposes. (Applause, and a voice, "We know that here"). A small gang of Tory workers led by a road foreman took exception to this statement, but Mr. Macdonald silenced them by reminding the foreman that he was aware of the episode of the building of two roads between Cranbrook and the Mission, one of which was a monument to Tory methods.

The speaker went on to deal with financial matters, giving examples of the extravagant waste of the McBride-Bowser administration. His figures were followed with the closest attention and the various points were thoroughly appreciated. At the end of his speech, Mr. Macdonald was given a great ovation.

T. D. Pattullo, the Liberal candidate, was to have spoken next but had to leave the meeting as he had become unwell.

Fred. Stork, Dominion Liberal candidate for Skeena-Atlin, said

they would have many other opportunities of hearing their future member. He remarked upon the fact that there was a great wave of Liberalism sweeping across the country. Every province gave ample evidence of the fact and British Columbia would without a doubt follow the example of the others. He advised the electors to be in the procession by electing T. D. Pattullo on September 14th. He described the Liberal candidate as "one of the Pattulos of Woodstock, who have stood high in the esteem of the people of Ontario for many years," and assured them that their future member lived up to the best traditions of the family.

H. C. Brewster spoke next and like the others was given a rousing reception. He said that Mr. Bowser had said on that platform that Mr. Macdonald had overstepped the limits of good taste. "Can you believe any statement of Mr. Bowser?" he said. (Audience, "No"). The Liberal leader proceeded to go over the work of the session in detail and was followed very attentively. He showed that the small increase in the opposition had done wonders. He paid a special tribute to the splendid work done by Parker Williams. There were only four of them against thirty-five and added to the latter was Mr. Speaker Eberts, who was even more actively opposed to them than the other Conservatives.

In dealing with the investigations he recounted what had been discovered in connection with the addition to the parliament buildings, stating that the way in which this business had been handled showed an utter lack of principle on the part of the ministers of the Crown. He also dealt with the Songhees Reserve deal, in which Mr. Matson had been hand-

THE CONTRAST

The Journal compares the Liberal meeting of Friday evening with that of the Conservatives, held recently. The two meetings certainly presented a marked contrast. The Bowser meeting was a thing of cold, stony silences, with no enthusiasm; the Brewster meeting was full of life and fire and optimism. The Bowser audience was brooding sullenly over the past; the Brewster audience was looking hopefully and confidently to the future. Bowser tried to explain away the past with its McBride-Bowser political debauchery, and tried to tell of great things for the future, but the audience refused to accept either Bowser or his explanations, and could not contemplate any future for British Columbia in which Bowser figured. Friday night's audience showed most emphatically that it accepted H. C. Brewster and his followers as the men who are to lift the province out of the slough into which it has been flung by a company of political adventurers, masquerading under the name Conservative.

The Liberal meeting was not, strictly speaking, a triumph for the Liberal party but a sign of a great and glorious victory coming to the people of British Columbia. It was a heralding of the day when the chains of political slavery in this province will be rent asunder, never more to unite. It was, in a sense, a great personal triumph for H. C. Brewster, M. A. Macdonald, T. D. Pattullo, A. M. Manson, F. H. Mobley and Fred. Stork, for Mr. Stork will represent in the Dominion what the others stand for in the province, but it was an infinitely greater triumph for the freedom of thought and action for which the Liberal party stands, and has always stood.

MORE PLUGGING

The Journal accuses Mr. Brewster of being unfair in his reference to the Conservative

method of paying for votes in the last general election. Since Mr. Brewster produced the letters of Harry Price and Victor Love, giving all the details, the Journal does not seek to deny the charges, but, in its usual fashion, draws attention to a case in which it alleges that the Liberals stooped to Tory methods.

The instance is rather an unhappy one and the Journal's memory must be faulty or it would not have mentioned the Islands by-election in which "a boat load of patriots was run over from Vancouver." On that by-election, the fate of the Prior coalition government depended and Richard McBride was leading the opposition, for which side the "plugging" was done. One big "nigger" forgot his "voting" name and went up to Dick McBride and said, "Say Boss, who am I voting for?" Richard McBride was fully cognizant of the whole business.

If the Journal thinks back a little, it will also remember that "Broekie Phil," who figured prominently in the Sullivan "plugging" in the Vancouver by-election, was sentenced to eighteen months for personation on the same occasion. Evidently Dick's "plugging" supporters don't feel sore because Bowser squeezed out their old boss, for "Phil" and his friends have shown quite recently that they are still at the old game and for the same party.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Journal says that Mr. Macdonald insinuates that Gosden was in the employ of the Conservatives. It is no insinuation, but a fact. This notorious character is at the present moment in the employ of the Bowser machine.

ed \$75,000 to do with as he liked and no questions asked. "The curse of this country," declared Mr. Brewster, "is the patronage system. We cannot have a patronage system rampant and have a healthy and honest condition in politics, and I will not stop until the system is wiped out."

The Writ.

Going on to deal with the now famous writ, Mr. Brewster said that he had been accused of trying to hold up the business of the province. What he was really doing was to try and prevent that very thing happening. He hoped that the term of the legislature did not end on March 14th, but

there was grave doubt as to whether it did. Mr. Bowser admitted that, and the object of the writ was to have the question answered definitely, once and for ever. If that question were not answered by the courts, serious complications might follow. He had given Mr. Bowser every opportunity to get an answer while the legislature was in session, and he had further appealed to the Lieutenant-Governor, but all in vain. The people of the province were entitled to an answer and it was his duty to see that they got it. (Cheers). In conclusion, Mr. Brewster said, "I have covered more of this province than any minister of the Crown, and I have done it at my own expense too. I believe I know more of the potential wealth of this province and

its marvellous resources than does Mr. Bowser or any of his colleagues, and I have so much faith in its future that I have every dollar I possess in the world invested in it." On resuming his seat he was loudly cheered. The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem and three cheers for Mr. Brewster. A call for cheers for William Manson met with no response.
