# BRITISH FORCE DRIVING WEDGE INTO HUN LINES

Heavy German Losses Shown by Captured Papers-Russian Sixth Contingent is Now in France.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 48 .- The British troops on the western front are forcing a steadily deepening salient into the German lines and are taking prisoners and inflicting heavy losses on the enemy in every engagement.

Documents discovered upon an enemy officer give evidence of the tremendously heavy German casualties in this month's fighting. The British occupy fifteen hundred yards of German second line positions.

#### Kaiser in Somme.

Berlin officially reports that the Kaiser is on the Somme front directing the German military activities and visiting the hospitals, where he is distributing Iron Crosses to the wounded.

#### Russians in West.

Paris, July 18 .- The sixth Russian contingent for the western front has arrived in France, after making a journey of seventeen thousand, five hundred miles. Approximately one hundred thousand Russian troops have been landed in France since May 1st.
