## RUSSIANS THREATEN THE AUSTRIAN REAR

### GERMANS RETREAT TEN MILES IN VOLHYNIA -- BIG GERMAN PEACE CAMPAIGN

#### RUSSIANS NOW THREATEN THE AUSTRIAN REAR

Czar's Army has Crossed Carpathians into Hungary—Germans Retreat Ten Miles in Volhynia.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 20.—The Russians have crossed the Carpathians through the Jablonica Pass and have penetrated into Hungary and are threatening the Austrian mountain divisions in the rear.

In Volhynia.

Petrograd, July 20.—The Russians have compelled the Germans to retreat ten miles in Volhynia, General Kalidin's forces capturing several thousands of prisoners and immense quantities of munitions.

The Czar's armies have suddenly resumed the initiative and are advancing into the Austro-German front southeast of Kovel, thus removing all danger of crushing attacks by the enemy upon both sides of the wedge which has been driven into the enemy front.

#### LIEUT. GERALD PETERS WAS WOUNDED SEVERAL TIMES

Fred Peters, K. C., has received letters from the old country in regard to his son, Lieut. Gerald Peters, who is reported missing. It seems that Gerald took part in a charge in the desperate fighting on the western front, and was wounded in one arm, one leg and in the body, and was last seen lying in a ditch.

Our troops had to vacate the ground, but later regained it, and a search party went to look for the young officer, but he was not to be found where last seen.

#### MUNITIONERS WILL DELIVER ENOUGH SHELLS

Gallant Reply to Request for Sacrifice of Vacation—Tax of 77 per cent. on Shipping Profits.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 20.—The British munition workers have made a gallant reply to the request of the Minister of War that they sacrifice their summer vacation. The workers have unanimously notified the military and naval authorities that they may continue to expect large enough supplies of war material to maintain the offensive and to efficiently provide the fleet with all necessary ammunition and guns.

#### Enormous Credit.

Premier Asquith yesterday informed the House of Commons that it is his intention to ask for a further credit of three hundred million pounds for war purposes.

#### Tax on Shipping.

The House of Commons has decided to collect as a war-tax seventy-seven per cent. of the excess profits made by British shipping firms. This is the result of a widespread agitation in the press and in the House, on account of the enormous profits being made by shipping companies.

#### JAP'S BODY FOUND AFTER MANY MONTHS

Last September, a Japanese fisherman was drowned in the Exthall River, near Port Essington. On Tuesday, the body was taken in the fishing net of two Indians in the river. The body was in a remarkable state of preservation considering the length of time it must have been in the water. At the time of the accident, \$500 reward was offered for the recovery of the body and it is likely to fall to the Indians.

#### LIBERALS GOT GREAT RECEPTION AT ANYOX

At Anyox on Monday, the Liberal leaders, accompanied by F. H. Mobley, Liberal candidate for Atlin, and T. D. Pattullo, Liberal candidate for Prince Rupert, held two rousing meetings. The town meeting, in which the hall was packed to the doors, was presided over by Harry Andrews and was opened by T. D. Pattullo. Mr. Pattullo delivered a great fighting speech in which he trounced the Bowser government for its reckless extravagance. He said it was hard to pick out any one point for attack, as in every possible manner the Bowser machine had debauched the province.

Mr. Pattullo went on to deal with Liberal plans for the reconstruction of the whole fabric of government along sane, healthy lines, particularly in regard to land settlement, mining and fishing. He was listened to with the closest attention and all of his shafts went right home to the minds of his audience.

M. A. Macdonald dealt in trenchant fashion with the attempt of the Bowser machine to blackguard him in the Vancouver by-election. He stated most emphatically that the money which paid for the pluggers came from the friends of the machine. He riddled the financial methods of the government in merciless fashion, going through item after item of reckless expenditure in the public accounts. There was an air of suppressed enthusiasm in the meeting and the men hung upon every word.

#### BOB ROGERS TRIES TO OFFSET TORY SCANDALS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Winnipeg, July 20.—Hon. Robert Rogers, addressing five hundred delegates at a Conservative convention, declared that, under Laurier, political scandal comes first and war conditions is a secondary consideration. He stated that unpreparedness had forced Canada into a second colonial place and that the Senate's veto of the Borden Naval Bill had created an undesirable impression as to the solidarity of the Empire.

#### NEW APPOINTMENTS ON TEACHING STAFF

In considering the applications for manual training teacher, it was stated that the department requires that the teacher be qualified under the provincial regulations. It was decided to engage R. H. Shockley.

George B. Carpenter, B. A., of Fernie, who is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick, was appointed mathematical and science master in the High School.

#### PRESENT ARMS IN HOMAGE TO A BRAVE ENEMY

Germans Fight to the Bitter End at Ovillers — Dutch and Swedish Ships are Torpedoed.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 20.—The British have recaptured the Longueval-De Ville wood, which for a short time had been again held by the enemy. In the terrific fighting at Ovillers on Monday, in which only 126 living prisoners remained to be taken out of a German force of six thousand, the British presented arms to the small band as homage to the courage of the defenders of the position.

#### Dutch Ship Sunk.

Copenhagen, July 20.—The Germans have torpedoed the Dutch ship Denula and the Swedish schooner Bertha. The crews were landed at Nyborg.

#### Canadian Forces.

Ottawa, July 20.—Three hundred and fifty thousand represents Canada's present enlistment. Recruiting is moving slowly and a strenuous campaign will be necessary if the promised five hundred thousand are to be recruited.

#### SUCCESSFUL LIBERAL MEETING AT HAZELTON

(Special to The Daily News.)

Hazelton, July 20.—The Liberal leaders held a most successful meeting here last night, presided over by H. F. Glassey. The audience was most enthusiastic and cheered the speakers at every point. H. C. Brewster and M. A. Macdonald made telling speeches in which they scored the Bowser government for its wanton waste and utter disregard for law. The meeting was twice the size of that addressed by the premier and his party recently and it was evident that the visit of Mr. Brewster and Mr. Macdonald had created most intense interest in this district.

Frank Dockrill, the Conservative candidate, was unable to accept an invitation to be present and no one was there to represent him. Short speeches were made by A. M. Manson, Liberal candidate for Omineca, and T. D. Pattullo, Liberal candidate for Prince Rupert. The audience was thoroughly satisfied with all the facts presented and had no questions to ask.

Mr. Brewster's masterly exposition of the tricks resorted to by Bowser in the last session of the Legislature and since, was followed very closely and the Liberal leader went into the details regarding the writ with splendid effect.

Mr. Macdonald dealt with the financial mess into which the province has been plunged by a profligate government and also went fully into the plot to blacken his character in Vancouver. He showed how F. W. Welsh knew all about the plugging arrangements days before the election.

#### GERMAN PEACE CAMPAIGN WILL BEGIN SHORTLY

Leaders of Both Political Parties Organize Campaign—German Government Sanctions the Movement.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, July 20.—The Kaiser's general adjutant, Prince Von Wedel, formerly vice-roy in Alsace-Lorraine, has been appointed chairman of a committee of representative Conservatives and National Liberals which has been organized for the purpose of carrying on a campaign of oratory advocating an honorable peace without delay. Addresses will commence on August 1st.

The government sanctions the movement and Germany's most prominent scientists and the leaders of the industrial, commercial and agricultural affairs of the German Empire are assisting. Throughout Germany there is a strong demand for an immediate peace. The people realize that another six months of war would cripple the country industrially and commercially to an almost irretrievable extent and that the one hope of recovery from the terrible results of the past two years of war is an instant peace.

#### DR. L. W. KERGIN NOW IN MESOPOTAMIA

Dr. W. T. Kergin has received a letter from his brother, Dr. L. W. Kergin, who is now in Mesopotamia. Dr. Kergin has journeyed up the Shat-el-Arab to the junction of the Tigris and Euphrates and has visited Kut-el-Amara, which was so gallantly held for months by General Townshend and his British-Indian troops. He finds the heat intense, the natives getting over the difficulty by wearing little except a turban in many cases.

#### STRIKERS FACE HUNGER

New York, July 20.—Two hundred thousand garment workers are facing hunger as a result of a deadlock in the strike situation.

## THE WESTERN DUEL

It becomes evident that the great duel on the western front between the Anglo-French offensive in the Somme region and the German offensive against Verdun is reaching its most critical stage. For five months the Germans have tried to batter a way into Verdun. They have gained a certain amount of territory, but, in doing so, have sacrificed half a million men of a calibre which they will find it hard to replace. The terrific artillery bombardment has shattered the French defence works, but it has not broken the splendid spirit of the French soldiers and their stalwart Allies from Russia. Every inch of the way is being fought desperately and the Germans are decidedly getting much the worst of the argument in regard to losses.

The Anglo-French offensive on the Somme front is an off-set against the big drive on Verdun, while it is also part of the big general offensive, in that the positions taken are being consolidated and turned into strong Allied defences. In contrast to the Verdun struggle the Anglo-French attack has been short, sharp and effective. It has drawn German troops in many thousands from other parts of the western front and upon its success depends the relaxing of the German efforts against the much-battered French fortress of Verdun.

Even should Verdun fall, however, the Germans have lost so many men in their attacks that it cannot be considered as an enemy gain except in so far as it delays the ultimate capture of Metz and the intervening highly mineralized country from which the enemy is drawing most of his huge supplies of steel. Verdun may fall, but the result will simply be that the Germans will have at that point a salient which will ever be a source of weakness.

## NEW-BORN ZEAL

The Bowser press has de-

veloped a new-born respect for the powers of the legislature. This, however, is only a temporary sentiment which will disappear just as soon as it is convenient for Mr. Bowser again to treat some act of the House as "a scrap of paper." But where were the champions of the legislature when Mr. Bowser and Sir Richard McBride were framing the trans-action regarding the Agent-General's office? Where were they when the provisions of the act relating to the Pacific Great Eastern were being over-ridden as if they did not exist? Two vital clauses of the law, passed by the elected representatives of the people, were torn to pieces when the promoters of the Pacific Great Eastern divided \$25,000,000 of capital stock among themselves without putting up a solitary cent and when the government over-paid them \$7,000,000 of trust funds for which the people of British Columbia are liable. And what about the legislation affecting the enterprises of Mackenzie & Mann? Not one of the obligations assumed by the Canadian Northern promoters has been met, although according to Sir Thomas White, the people of British Columbia are going to be held to the financial terms of the agreements. The importance of the legislature in the eyes of Mr. Bowser and his friends is always subject to the exigencies of Bowser himself and his clients, Foley, Welch & Stewart and Mackenzie & Mann.—Victoria Times.


## MR. RALPH SMITH NOT POSING AS INDEPENDENT
