AUSTRIANS CANNOT FACE RUSSIAN GUNS

ANGLO-FRENCH ADVANCE ON EXTENDED FRONT -- RESERVES FROM VERDUN

ANGLO-FRENCH ADVANCE HAS BEEN RESUMED

Heavy Fighting on Twenty-seven Mile Front—Free Hand to Submarines and Airships.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 22.—Two hundred thousand British and French troops are engaging the Germans on a twenty-seven-mile front in the Somme region. The Allies have advanced to the third line of German defences at Foreaux wood.

The Germans occupied the British front line trenches on the Leipsic salient but were later driven out with heavy losses.

Germans Desperate.

Count Zeppelin, the aged German inventor of the airship which bears his name, in addressing a gathering of workmen at Frederickskavn, announced that the Kaiser had granted his advisors a free hand concerning the aerial and submarine attacks and preparations are progressing for the striking of vital blows at sea and from the air.

Men for Verdun.

Paris, July 22.—The French are operating desperately south of Soyeourt and are inflicting very heavy losses upon the enemy. They captured a German trench. The Germans have been obliged to rush thousands of men from the Verdun front to oppose the Allied advance.

Civilians Expelled.

Rotterdam, July 22.—The Germans have expelled civilian food rioters from conquered French and Belgian cities.

FRENCH SMASH ENEMY LINES AT PERONNE

The French have smashed the German lines north and south of Peronne after very heavy fighting. The British commander on the western front believes that the war will be decided on that front. Germany is preparing for a supreme effort. 350,000 men have been drawn from other parts to stop the Anglo-French advance.

The Russians have taken three lines of German trenches on the Riga front.

Allied warships have drawn in closer in preparation for the departure of the submarine Deutschland.

SIR HIBBERT TUPPER'S STINGING CRITICISM

In a statement made at Prince Rupert Tuesday night Mr. H. C. Brewster, Liberal leader, said that the selection of Mayor Stewart as minister of finance "is only another sign of the desperate straits to which Mr. Bowser is reduced. Having hawked the portfolio all over Victoria without finding a single member of his own following or of the Conservative party willing to accept it, he has gone outside to secure the help of a man who has never been identified as a supporter of that side in politics. This attempt to prop up the tottering fortunes of his administration must fail and I predict that his new minister of finance will have a shorter term of office than his first choice had." Mr. Brewster declared that he is satisfied the Conservatives will be beaten in the country as well as in the cities.

On the question of the appointment of Mr. F. W. Welsh to go to London to assist in taking the soldiers' vote, Sir Hibbert Tupper yesterday made the following comment:

"The provisions of the act are exceedingly unfair and place it in the power of any one instructed to carry them out to abuse the trust for party purposes without fear of detection. All the safeguards provided in the Election Act are conspicuous by their absence. The circumstances under which Mr. Welsh has been appointed to assist in taking the vote are such as to show the intention of the government was to abuse their power and manipulate this vote in their own interest by unfair means. It is all in line with the political character of the premier and of the German idea of success. In a word, instead of 'playing cricket' in the English sense, 'Kultur' is adopted. Success justifies everything. The essence of 'kultur' consists in this: The man who cheats at cards is not a cheat if he is not found out." Vancouver Province.

STARTLING PROVISIONS OF SOLDIERS' VOTE ACT

The man the premier has selected to arrange for taking this vote is F. W. Welsh, machine politician, who lately came under the spotlight of investigation by the special committee of the British Columbia legislature appointed to "investigate" the alleged plugging operations of a Seattle gang in the Vancouver by-election. He also was the subject of investigation in connection with the school board inquiry now being held by Mr. Justice Murphy at the courthouse. The appointment of this man astounded even the premier's ardent supporters in light of the unenviable publicity he has received and the fact that he is held under suspicion. Up to the time of the investigation in Victoria Mr. Welsh was a member of the Vancouver Conservative ticket, but by reason of it being proved, and admitted by him, that he had advance knowledge of the coming of the pluggers' gang, and their presence on election day, it was thought best he should retire.

Generally Criticised.
The Premier is being generally criticised for the appointment of a man of Welsh's stamp to this important trust, and unless the premier's election plenipotentiary is recalled in the meantime he will sail for the old country shortly.

By the Soldiers' Voting Act, all soldiers in British Columbia are entitled to vote wherever they may be, either in Canada, the United Kingdom, Europe or Africa. The war office, however, has decided that the soldiers at the front, for military reasons, will not be permitted to vote, but permission has been given for those in England to vote. By the act, Sir Richard McBride, as agent-general, is made a returning officer at large. Under him are to be presiding officers (of whom, presumably, Mr. Welsh will be the chief).

The most startling provisions of this act are the following:

1. These presiding officers can begin to collect the votes of the soldiers on the day after nomination, which will be August 4th, and continue from that time until election day, September 14th.
 2. In the case of the Prohibition and Woman Suffrage referendums, the voting can continue until the 31st day of December, 1916, and the returns do not have to be made until the end of the first week in February, 1917.
 3. The times and places of voting are in the discretion of the presiding officer.
 4. No scrutineers shall be present when the votes are cast.
 5. The ballot bags shall be closed and sealed by the presiding officer without the presence of any scrutineers, and shall remain in his custody until they are turned over to Sir Richard McBride.
 6. The only provision for a scrutineer is that the Opposition may have one scrutineer present, at its own expense, on the day when the bags are opened and the votes counted.

AUSTRIANS ARE COMPELLED TO RETREAT AGAIN

Russians Capture the Styr River crossings—Vienna Admits Defeats—Cannot Face Big Guns.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 22.—The Russians are advancing despite the flooding of the river Dniester and are compelling Von Linsingen's forces to retire. The Russians have captured the crossings of the Styr River and have taken sixteen hundred prisoners.

Austrian Admission.

Vienna, July 22.—The Austrians admit that they were defeated and forced to retreat in the Styr and Lipa River sections, their troops being unable to face the murderous Russian artillery pressure.

Victory Near.

Petrograd, July 22.—A press correspondent, who is with the Russian army on the eastern front, asserts that final victory is near, though the strength of the Germans is increasing on account of the contracting of the circumference of their defence line as they retreat.

Disregard Rules.

It is reported that Russia intends to disregard the rules laid down at the Hague Convention concerning treatment of enemy hospital ships on account of the fact that the Turks sunk the Red Cross ship Portugal while she was carrying wounded soldiers.

The Caucasus.

The Grand Duke's army in the Caucasus has driven the enemy from Gumushkanch.

DASTARDLY PLOT

It becomes more clear every day that the "Military Forces Voting Act" was not framed through any patriotic motive, but simply as a diabolical attempt to set at nought the will of the people of this province, under the guise of an effort on behalf of the soldiers.

Bowser ostensibly founded his act upon the Federal Bill, but he carefully left out all safeguards for the proper taking of the votes. The Bill simply bristles with opportunities for villainy and might have been drawn up by John L. Sullivan himself.

The ballot "bags" will remain open for FORTY-TWO DAYS during which time voting will go on. Sir Richard McBride will open the bags and any bag which appears to have

been opened will not be opened, but will be destroyed with the rest of the papers. In the event of a recount those bags will not be counted.

The situation is desperate and immediate action on the part of the people of this province is imperative. There is no doubt as to how the vast majority of the soldiers will vote, but there is grave doubt as to whether many of the true votes will ever be counted.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The sending of F. W. Welsh to England has caused the people of the province to make a more careful scrutiny of the Soldiers' Voting Act and what they have discovered, in conjunction with the sending of "Soapy" Welsh to England, is beyond ordinary language to express.

The man who corrupted an otherwise honest merchant, who, on oath in the Vancouver election enquiry, made a statement his landlady proved to be false; who was in league with Johnny Sullivan and the rest of the Seattle gang, and who destroyed the incriminating documents, has the welfare of this province at his mercy.

Sir Richard McBride's \$15,000 a year depends on the winning of this election for Bowser. We do not say Dick is a thief, but to hand him such an election act is to place him under a stronger temptation than any human being should be asked to face.

(Continued From Page One.) receptacles "appear to have been opened" the act provides that the returning officer shall not open these bags nor count the votes therein contained and such bags shall subsequently be destroyed unopened.

8. In the case a recount is demanded, the aforesaid unopened ballot bags are not to be counted, and as to any ballot bags previously counted if such bags have been destroyed or lost or for any other reason not forthcoming, the judge shall base his recount on the count previously made, or, in other words, the recount shall be no count at all but merely a statutory acceptance of what was previously done.

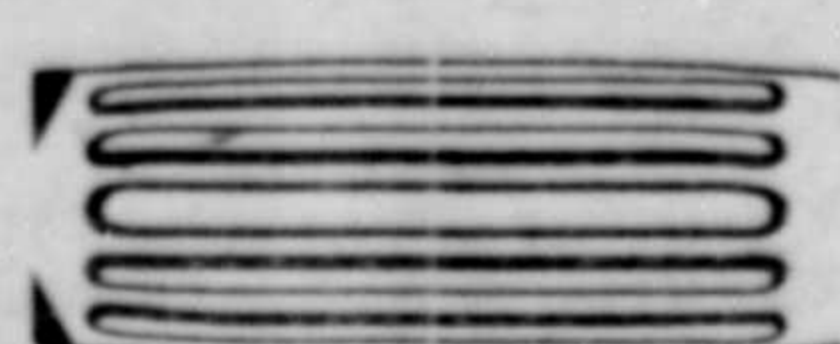

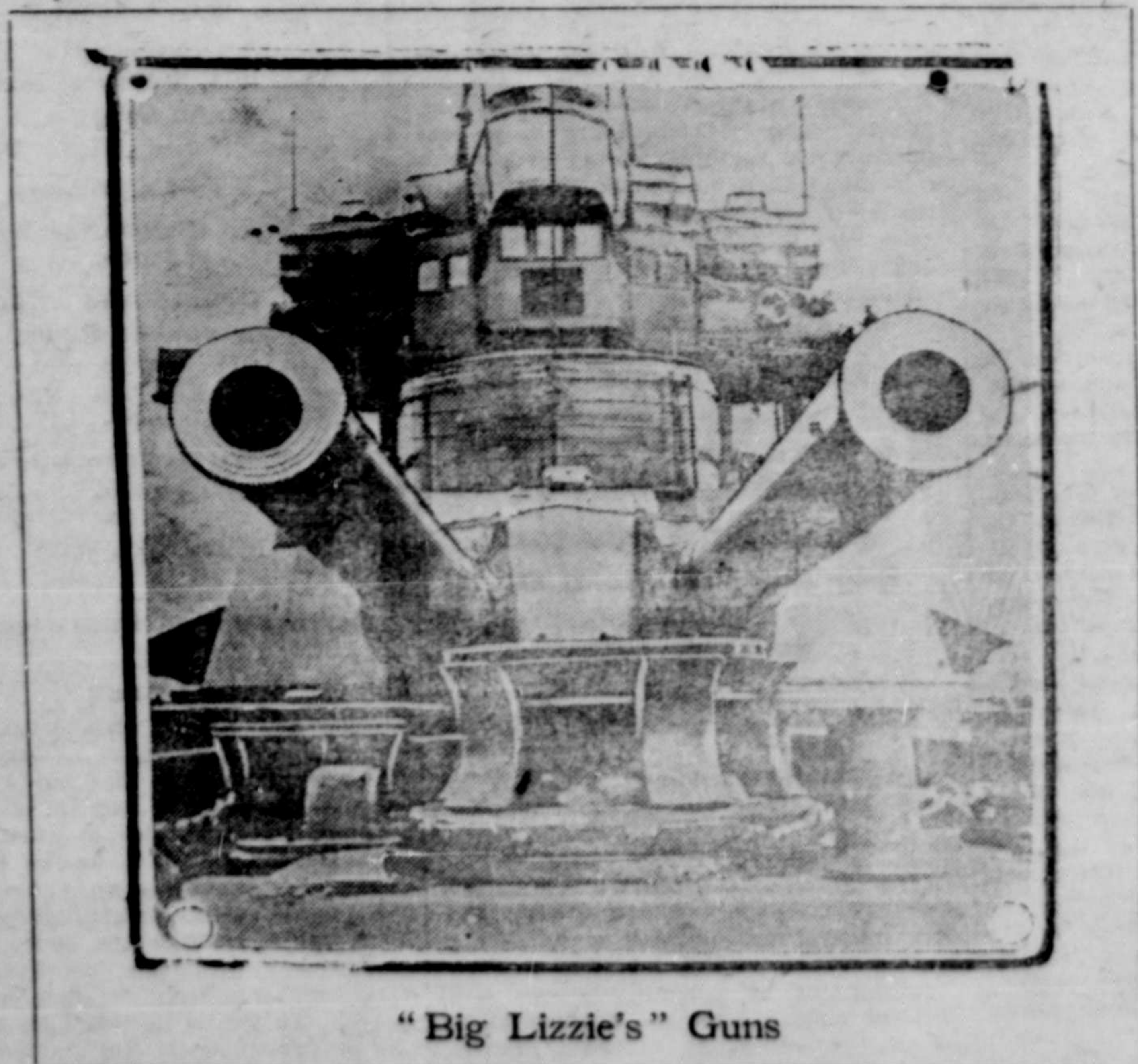

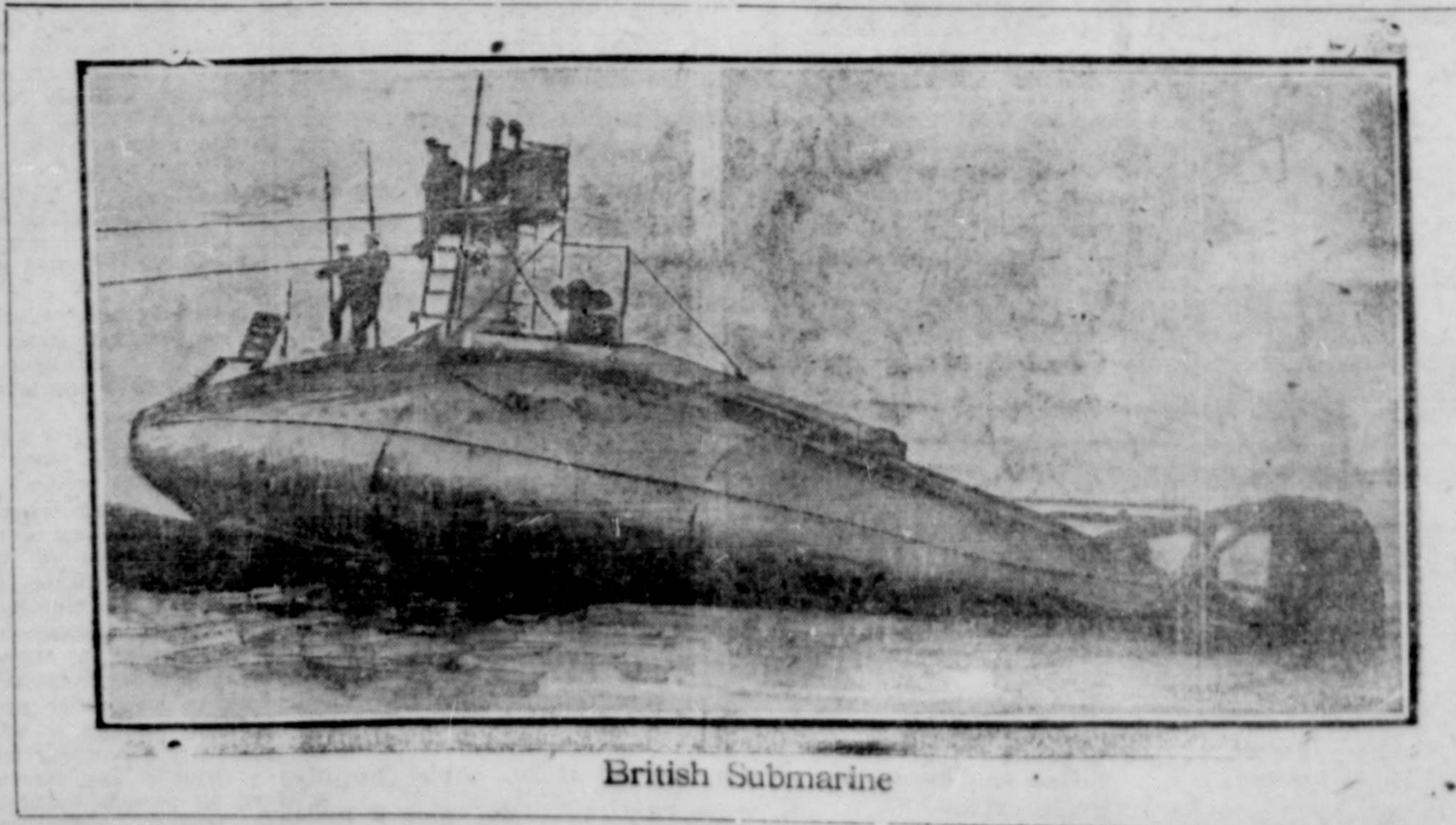
