## AUSTRALIANS TOOK GERMANS BY SURPRISE

### DEUTSCHLAND REFUSED CLEARANCE PAPERS — RUSSIANS ARE NEAR FRONTIER

#### AUSTRALIANS HAVE GERMANS DUMBFOUNDED

"Anzacs," Rushed from Ypres, Take Pozieres and Hundreds of Prisoners in Fierce Attack.

(Special to The Daily News.)

British Headquarters, Western Front, July 24.—The Australians have captured German trenches and advanced along the main street of Pozieres. They rushed the enemy to the opposite side of the town, preventing them from using their artillery. The town is now in the possession of the Australian forces and they are preparing to hold it.

They secured hundreds of prisoners. The "Anzacs" had been hurried forward from Ypres and the fierceness of their assault left the enemy dumbfounded.

#### Somme Front.

The Allies continue to make progress on the Somme front and have defeated numerous enemy assaults. Since the beginning of the great offensive on July 1st, 26,000 German prisoners have been taken and hundreds of guns.

#### Enemy Admissions.

Official announcements from Berlin and Vienna confirm the necessity of an enemy withdrawal from certain sections of the western front because of the terrific Allied assaults.

#### SLAVS WITHIN FOUR MILES OF THE FRONTIER

Austrians are Retreating in Disorder—Italians are still Gaining—Turks are Kept Busy.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 24.—The Russians are now within four miles of the Austrian frontier and are compelling the enemy to retreat in disorder.

Twelve thousand prisoners have been captured during the last two days, making a total of 26,000 since July 16th.

#### Italian Front.

Rome, July 24.—The Italians are maintaining their pressure on the Trentino front and are scoring daily successes.

#### Turks Busy.

Sinai Peninsula, July 24.—The Turks have advanced to within thirty miles of the Suez Canal and the commander of the British forces in Egypt is assigning cavalry to oppose them.

The Grand Sheriff, commanding the Arab revolutionaries, has surrounded the Turks and captured Mecca, Jeddah, Kinfuda and Taif, taking twenty-five hundred prisoners.

#### ORDERLY IRISH

Dublin, July 24.—Six thousand Nationalists were permitted to hold a public meeting on Sunday to oppose the partition of Ulster under the Lloyd George Home Rule compromise. The proceedings were marked by good feeling and there was an absence of disorder.

Indianapolis, July 24.—James Whitcomb Riley, the celebrated poet, passed away here yesterday, following an attack of paralysis.

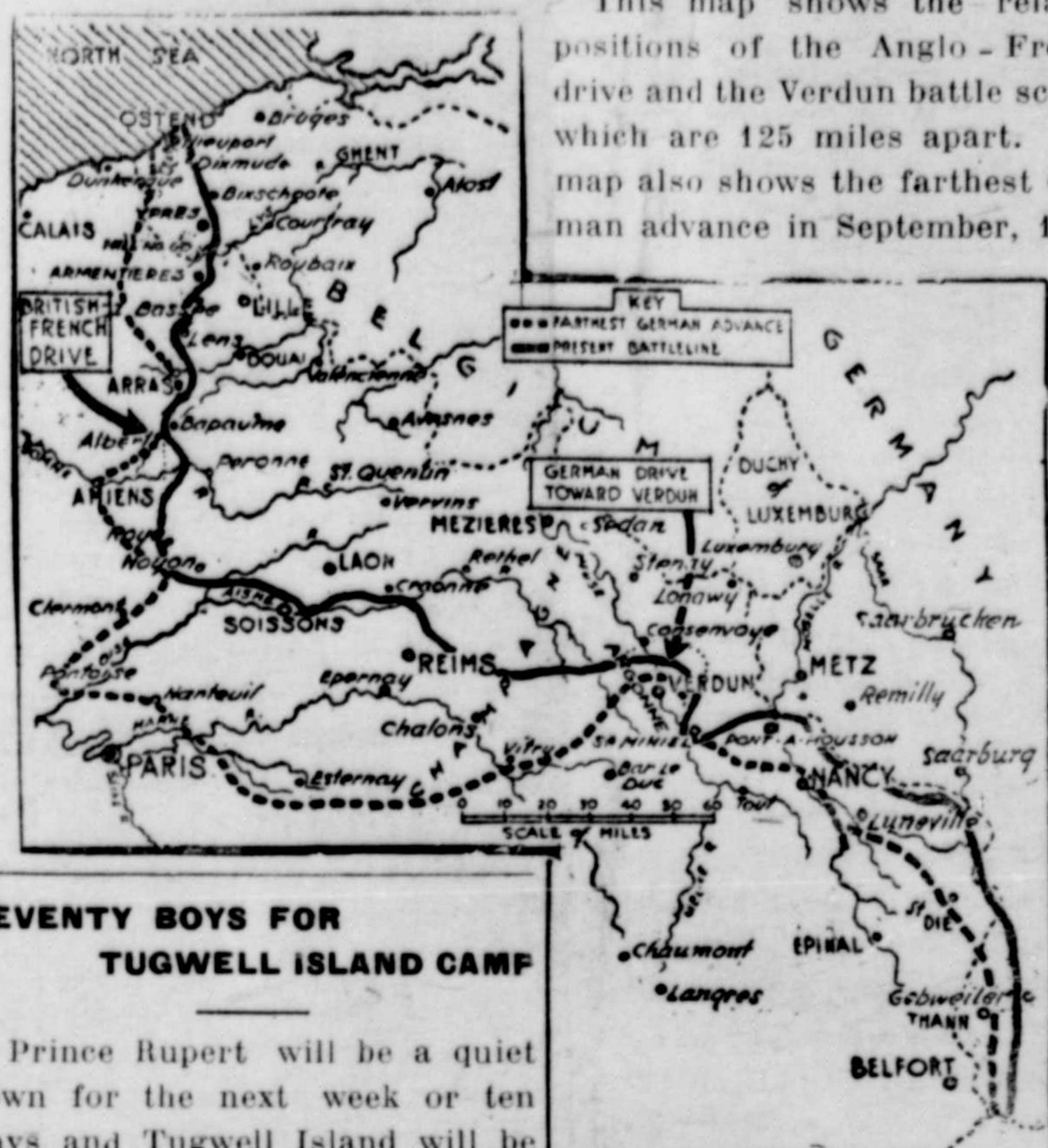

#### SEVENTY BOYS FOR TUGWELL ISLAND CAMP

The youngsters were in high spirits and cheered lustily as they left the dock for their camping ground. Launches belonging to F. H. Mobley, R. Parkin, George Frizzell and H. F. McRae have been placed at the disposal of the committee for the rest of the week.

#### NARROW ESCAPE

Walter Shaw had rather a nasty experience at the Salt Lake yesterday afternoon. He slipped off the end of the float into deep water and, being unable to swim, was in danger of drowning. Fortunately, Joe Hickey saw him sink and immediately went to his assistance. Walter is no light weight and was dragging Joe under, when Barney Quinn dived in and lent a hand while Jim McNulty dived under and raised Mr. Shaw to the surface. After a breather, Walter was none the worse, but it was a very narrow squeak, and, but for the prompt action of the swimmers, might have ended in tragedy.

#### CRICKET

#### ECONOMIC COMMISSION IS PREPARING PROGRAM

Ottawa, July 20.—Word has been issued that the Economic and Development Commission, which was appointed almost a year ago, has got busy at last and will presently evolve a program which will make Canada a land of milk and honey for the disbanded armies of Europe and other immigrants. This is good news. Better late than never. May their deliberations bear fruit. We have had previous surveys of our resources, natural and unnatural, but they have always been pigeon-holed, the idea being to soothe the public feeling by reporting, but not to do anything that would disturb the vested interests. The report on the High Cost of Living is a case in point—a mighty big book, but no moral to be carried out.

However, the Economic and Development Commission is said to be in earnest—that is to say, as earnest as the Borden Government will let it. It realizes that the great need of this country is population—that Canada must be filled with people, if this country is to reap the reward of its sacrifices, shoulder the war debt, create traffic for the nationalized railways, and one way and another realize its mortgage on the Twentieth Century. The great object of the Commission will be to devise means and contrive inducements to get people back to the land.

Naturally the first step in getting the people back to the land will be to get the land back for the people. Just how this will be done must be left to the Commission. A stiff tax on idle land would probably ease a lot of it back to the Crown. The rest could be bought at a fair price and land bonds issued by the Government, which would discharge the debt by convenient instalments and at the same time provide a sound investment for our loose money. War bonds, land bonds, railway bonds—all these are the natural means of raising the wind and the Government need not be told that the people are more than willing to lend their money on Government securities whenever they get a chance. Their experience with the domestic war loan proves that. As a matter of fact the people would rather lend directly to the Government and draw down their five per cent., interest than turn their money over to the banks at three per cent. and let the banks make the difference. It must have shocked the Borden Government to see how easily they could raise money from the people of Canada whenever the people were given a chance.

Having got the land back, the next thing the Commission will need to consider is how to get the people on it. The theory is that the returned soldier will become a farmer because he has followed an open air life in muddy trenches, shell craters, and such. This is a beautiful theory, but it will not work out in practice unless the land is made considerably more attractive to him than the

#### DEUTSCHLAND STILL REMAINS AT BALTIMORE

Submarine Refused Her Clearance Papers—Bremen a Week overdue—Britain's Reply To Wilson.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Baltimore, July 24.—It is officially stated that the German submarine Deutschland has been refused her clearance papers. She remains in port though she has been ready for sea since Friday. There are numerous reasons given for the refusal to grant her clearance but the real reason remains a secret.

#### Bremen Overdue.

The Rupert Hotel bulletin states that the Bremen, the second trans-Atlantic submarine to leave the Elbe for the United States, is now a week overdue.

#### Britain's Answer.

The answer of the British government to the complaints from the United States as to the close censorship of American mails states that Britain is willing to explain conditions but cannot discontinue the practice. The note states that specific incidents do not support the general charges made by Washington, in regard to inefficiency in handling this matter.

#### Guilty Germans.

The Hague, July 24.—An orange book just published accuses Germany of sinking the Dutch liners Tubantia and Berkelstrom.

### THE EVIDENCE

The Journal knows perfectly well that any "plugging" that may have been perpetrated in the Vancouver election was not paid for by the Liberal party. There was not a tittle of evidence in the enquiry to show that any man was employed by the Central Liberal Association to carry on any illegal work, and the moment the Liberal Association discovered that something was wrong, an investigation was demanded and conviction followed.

By their own evidence, F. W. Welsh and John L. Sullivan knew that the plugging was to take place, and the pluggers were housed over Welsh's store in Vancouver. No attempt was made by the Bowser machine to stop the plugging, though even the leaders knew exactly how many men were in the city and just exactly where they were located. Welsh received ample advance notice from John L. Sullivan as to the prospective arrival of the gang, but took care to destroy the letter and also the wireless advices.

Sullivan and Welsh were not the employees of any party worthy of the name Conservative but of a corrupt political machine which has had this province by the throat for years. Men of the stamp of Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper are thoroughly convinced that the whole scheme was an infamous plot which originated in the minds of the leaders of the gang. The Journal, for purely party reasons, may prefer to ignore any Liberal view of the affair, but it cannot afford to set aside lightly the opinion of a gentleman of the high standing of Sir Hibbert Tupper.

### THE BLACK FLAG

Commenting editorially upon the appointment of Mayor Stewart to the portfolio of Finance, the Victoria Times says, "Mr. Flumerfelt was not buried beneath an avalanche of ballots because he was per-

sonally undesirable. On the contrary, he was pre-eminently qualified for the post of finance minister, which Mr. Stewart is not in any degree. It was because he was a Bowser candidate; he was carrying the black flag of political piracy; he allowed himself to be persuaded into joining an administration whose record and methods were an offence to the nostrils of decent people all over Canada.

As a member of the Bowser government, Mr. Stewart becomes the servitor of Mackenzie & Mann; Foley, Welch & Stewart, and those numerous other corporate concessionaries far-sighted enough to retain Mr. Bowser as their solicitor. He will pay to them what Mr. Bowser orders him to pay, whether there be authority in law for it or not.

Our morning contemporary remarked that there was no doubt of the new minister's return in the election. As to that, we only have to say that one of the most certain things in this world is his overwhelming defeat. The bottom fell out of the mayor's political stock when he hoisted the black flag of Bowserism. He signed his death warrant as a public man.

### ECONOMIC COMMISSION IS PREPARING PROGRAM

(Continued From Page One.)

The Borden Government's hostility to hydro-electric light and power schemes like Sir Adam Beck's, which aim to make farm life attractive by relieving it of drudgery and providing city conveniences and facilitating sociability by the means of rapid, cheap and easy transit. Not only must the Borden Government get over its dislike to this popular plan of public ownership, but also the Hearst Government and other Governments which have shown a tendency to play into the hands of monopolies. When the Commission answers satisfactorily these two questions, "Why Does the Farmer's Son Leave Home?" and "Where Shall the Hired Man Wash His Feet?" it will have gone a long way toward solving the problem of putting the soldier on the farm and keeping him there.

Various schemes are broached to lure the disbanded soldier to the abandoned farm and anchor him there. One proposal takes the shape of indigent widows imported from England—indigent widows preferably with five or six orphans each—so that the returned soldier will not only get an indigent widow if he wants one, but a half a dozen little indigents too. The idea is that one can't be too generous in this matter of semi-ready families, besides things are always cheaper when one takes a quantity. Looking this scheme over we do not believe that it will attract the returned soldier, even when we include the warm welcome of the widow's smile and the musical laughter of the six little children, both of which items are mentioned in the prospectus. The fact is that the disabled soldier, especially if he is a Canadian, will be keen on picking his own wife and the chances are that he won't pick a widow at that. He will want to start something for himself. After the war there will perhaps be a million more women than men in this country, and a returned hero, even if he has only one arm to hug with, and one leg to walk with, will have a large range of choice among the most beautiful maidens in the world. Under such circumstances, he would be a fool to choose anything less than the best. You can take it from me that the widows unless they are young and rich, have very little chance. As for indigent widows, they won't get a look in.

The Commission will advise, no doubt, that farming be made attractive, and if they follow that train of thought to its logical conclusion, they are bound to point out that the best way to make farming attractive is to make it pay. Where the treasure is there will the heart be also. Of course, everybody knows how to make farming pay—good roads, cheap freight, co-operative marketing. The only question is would the Borden Government have the courage to carry the various suggestions out?

For instance, would it give the Northwest farmers free wheat and ruffle its friends the millers? Would it do anything to bridge the gap between hogs eight cents on the hoof and bacon thirty-seven cents in the pan?—H. F. Gadsby.
