AUSTRIANS ARE FACING EXHAUSTION -- DEUTSCHLAND STILL REMAINS IN PORT

VICTORY WITHIN A FEW MONTHS SAYS MINISTER

Lloyd George very Confident—British Ships Chase German Destroyers Back to Belgian Coast Line.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 25.—British ships have engaged six German torpedo destroyers off Schonwen Bank, compelling them to retreat to the Belgian coast in a damaged condition.

Victory Soon.

Hon. David Lloyd George, Minister for War, asserts that British resourcefulness will snatch a victory within a few months.

Bad Weather.

Paris, July 25.—The inclement state of the weather is interfering with the carrying on of the Somme offensive.

Prisoners' Condition.

Ambassador Gerard, the United States representative in Berlin, describing the frightful condition of British prisoners at Ruchleben, in Germany, states that they are interned in hay lofts above filthy stables.

French Success.

The Hotel Rupert bulletin states that the French have driven the Germans out of their trenches north of Verdun de Villers and have captured a block of houses south of Estrees.

Compulsion for Women.

Women and children in Prussia are to be compelled to labor in the harvest fields.

AUSTRIA AND HUNGARY ARE IN BAD SHAPE

Austria Faces Exhaustion—Last Reserves Called—Crowds Howl Round the Hungarian Royal Palace.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 25.—Austria is panic-stricken by the Russian advance on the eastern front. The frontier is closed to passengers in order to prevent men from fleeing the country.

Partially recovered invalids are being rushed from the hospitals to help stop the Russians, and the last reserves have been called up. The maximum number of men available is estimated at four hundred thousand. If Austria is defeated, her human resources will be utterly exhausted.

In Hungary.

Conditions in Hungary are critical and crowds surround the royal palace howling for a response to the Prime Minister's address.

In Armenia.

Petrograd, July 25.—The Grand Duke's forces in Turkish Armenia are steadily advancing on the fortified town of Erzincan.

Polish Autonomy.

The Hotel Rupert wire says that the autonomy of Poland is to be clearly defined and that Britain, Russia and France will make a statement shortly on this big question.

FIRE PROTECTION

At the city council last night, Ald. Casey said that there was need for extra fire protection on 11th Avenue. He understood that \$100 had been appropriated last year for the putting in of a hydrant at 11th and Frederick St. but that the work had not been done. The matter was referred to the board of works for report.

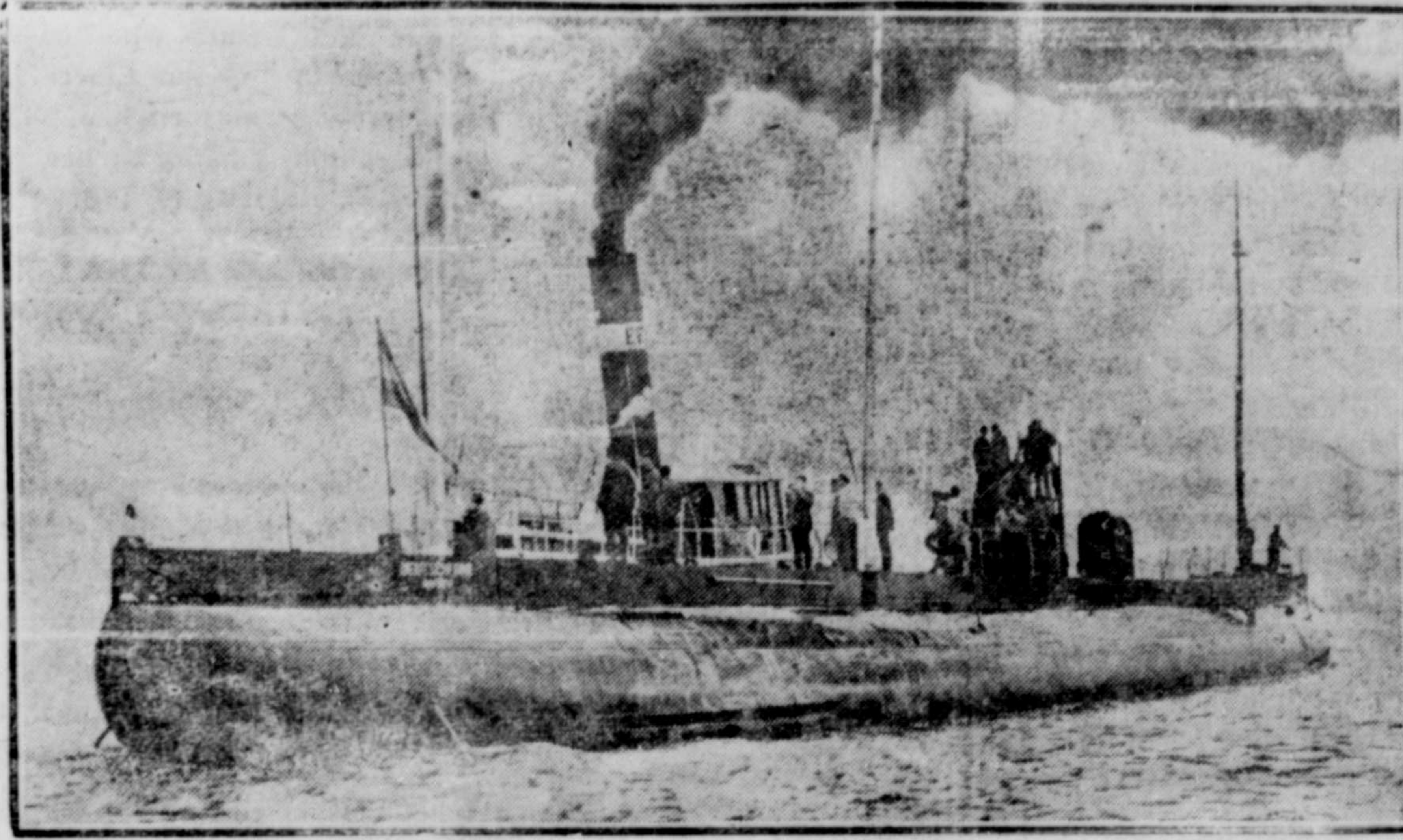

DEUTSCHLAND'S SISTER SHIP IS STILL MISSING

German-Americans Fear for the Safety of Submarine—Deutschland still Remains in Port—Danish Deal.

Norfolk, Va., July 25.—The Germans here are bitterly disappointed over the non-arrival of the German submarine Bremen, the second of the big "commercial" submarines to leave the Elbe for the United States. It is feared that she has been overtaken by disaster.

LIEUT. GERALD PETERS KILLED IN ACTION

Fred. Peters, K. C., has received official notice that his son, Lieut. Gerald Peters was killed in action on June 3rd. Lieut. Peters joined the ranks soon after the outbreak of war and did so well that he was given a commission. He had just returned to the front, after passing his examinations when he fell in the desperate fighting on the western front. He was 22 years of age and was on the staff of the Union Bank in this city. The deepest sympathy of the whole community is extended to Mr. and Mrs. Peters and family.

IRISH HOME RULE BILL WITHDRAWN

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 25.—The Irish Home Rule Bill has been withdrawn and Hon. D. Lloyd George, who framed the measure, offers to resign on account of his negotiations for a peaceful settlement having failed. A general election is probable.

Ald. George Casey has returned from Alice Arm. He reports that development work is progressing steadily though business amongst the store-keepers is quiet, the boys being out in the hills. Stillwell Brothers are just completing their aerial tramway and have a contract from the government for a hundred tons of molybdenum. As this metal is worth in the neighborhood of \$2,800 per ton, the contract amounts to a tidy sum. They are putting in a plant for concentration purposes and already have the framework up.

READ THIS "WIDE OPEN" CLAUSE OF THE ACT

Section 57, Par. 2:

"Nothing in this Act shall be construed to interfere (a) With the right of any person to import from without the Province liquor for bona fide use in his private dwelling house.

This clause provides for the uncontrolled, unrestricted, unlimited and unregulated importation of liquor from any outside point into British Columbia.

ALL SAME BOWSER

The Monetary Times, a journal which cannot be accused of having party leanings, has the following to say about the recent Conservative defeat in North Perth:

"In the North Perth constituency of Ontario this week, a Liberal candidate defeated the Conservative nominee and transformed a government majority of 1,117 into an opposition majority of 627. In a strongly Conservative province, that is an event which must have had substantial cause. The explanations of Ontario's cabinet ministers (and we write as a journal which has never entered partisan politics) have missed the vital reasons. The statement of one minister, for instance, that North Perth in some respects is an unusual riding, that conditions there are not uniform and especially the statement 'I do not regard it at all as an indication of the sentiment of the province,' are belittling the significance of the result.

"The Ontario government may easily discover the reasons which accounted for the defeat of their candidate by reading the heart of the rank and file. They are ignorant or blind to the dissatisfaction of members of their own party and of voters at large. The Ontario cabinet has become an autocratic institution in a democratic country. That is the verdict of hundreds of Conservatives who will take the strongest possible measures, as they say themselves, 'to teach the government a lesson.' The dislike of autocracy shared by the opposition and by independent voters who are becoming more numerous as years pass because of the unsatisfactory political state.

"The same argument applies to federal politics and to politics in other provinces. The political machine has been running the country, the people being generally regarded as automatic parts of the machine

to be cranked at will. While the blame for the present condition rests with the country at large, the time has come when the people are beginning to revolt. They do not like autocracy, or premiers (some without backbones, some without honesty), or bribery and corruption in high places, all of which they have had in the last few years in nauseating quantities. If politicians refuse to read the signs they will have to taste defeat at the polls. Defeat of such mistaken ideas of government is good for the country. There is much truth in the remark of the somewhat erratic W. F. Maclean, M. P. (South York), that 'the rest of Canada will vote with Perth if Mr. Hearst, Mr. Cochrane and Sir Robert Borden invite them to do so'."

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The local Tory organ, with its usual disregard for the truth, devotes a column to a careful evasion of the provisions of the "Military Voting Act."

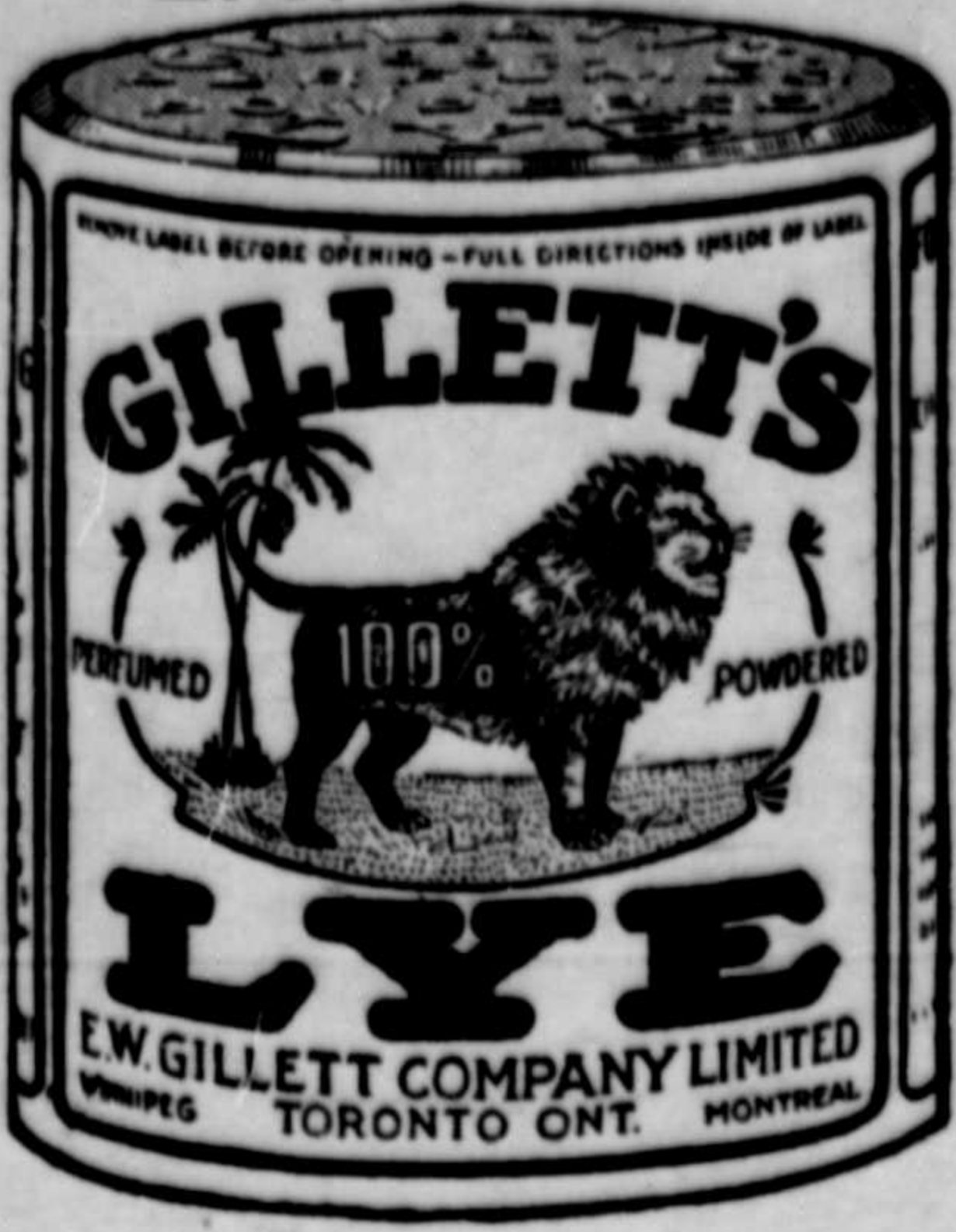
No man is more entitled to vote than the man who has offered himself to his country and that is why the Liberals are anxious that the soldiers' votes be taken honestly.

If Bowser has any intention of being honest in regard to the soldiers' vote, let him have the vote taken by British officials who are not interested in any party here, and let the votes be taken on one day, September 14th.

Just as the people of this province will decide overwhelmingly against the Bowser government, so will the soldiers who are in camp in Britain, if the vote is fairly taken. If the vote is honestly taken, under the Bowser act, it will be something approaching a miracle.

We have seen what the Bowserites can do in one day, with Liberal scrutineers present. What

will they be able to accomplish in an election lasting for forty-two days and with nothing but Bowser appointees present?

The Journal says that the Liberals have no remedy for the evils which exist in British Columbia. The first great evil is Bowserism, and when the Liberals rid the province of that incubus, the rebuilding will go on steadily and surely under the guidance of H. C. Brewster.

The Journal laments that there will be Seattle "pluggers" in the soldiers' election. The "Military Voting Act" provides for this deficiency amply, and, unless the Liberals are allowed scrutineers at the taking of the votes, full advantage will be taken of the loopholes in the act. "Soapy" Welsh is in charge of the whole business, and all he requires is his old friend John L. Sullivan and the game is on.

After the experience he had at Greenwood, Bowser will likely keep all Liberals off his platform in future. Dr. McLean turned the Bowser meeting into a Liberal demonstration, so overwhelmingly Liberal was the audience.

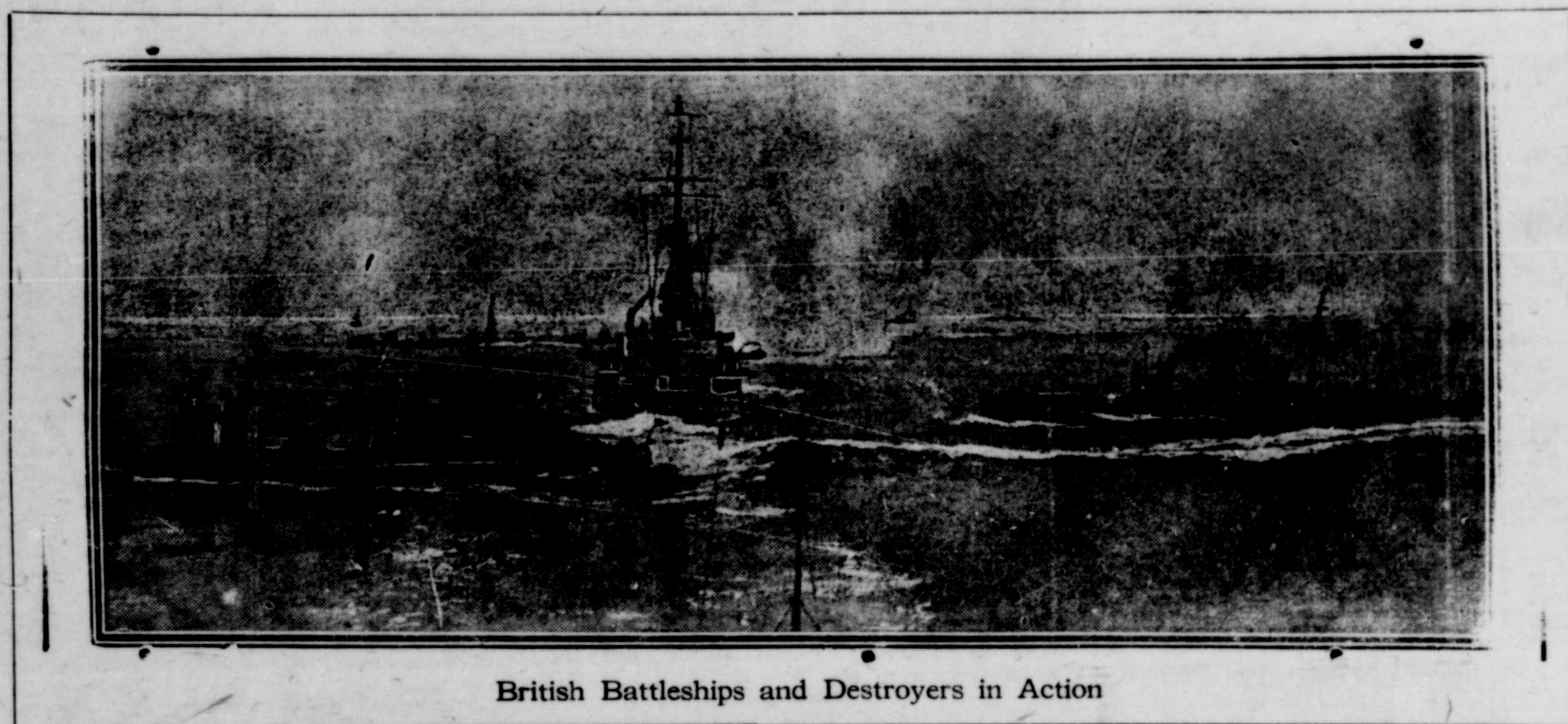

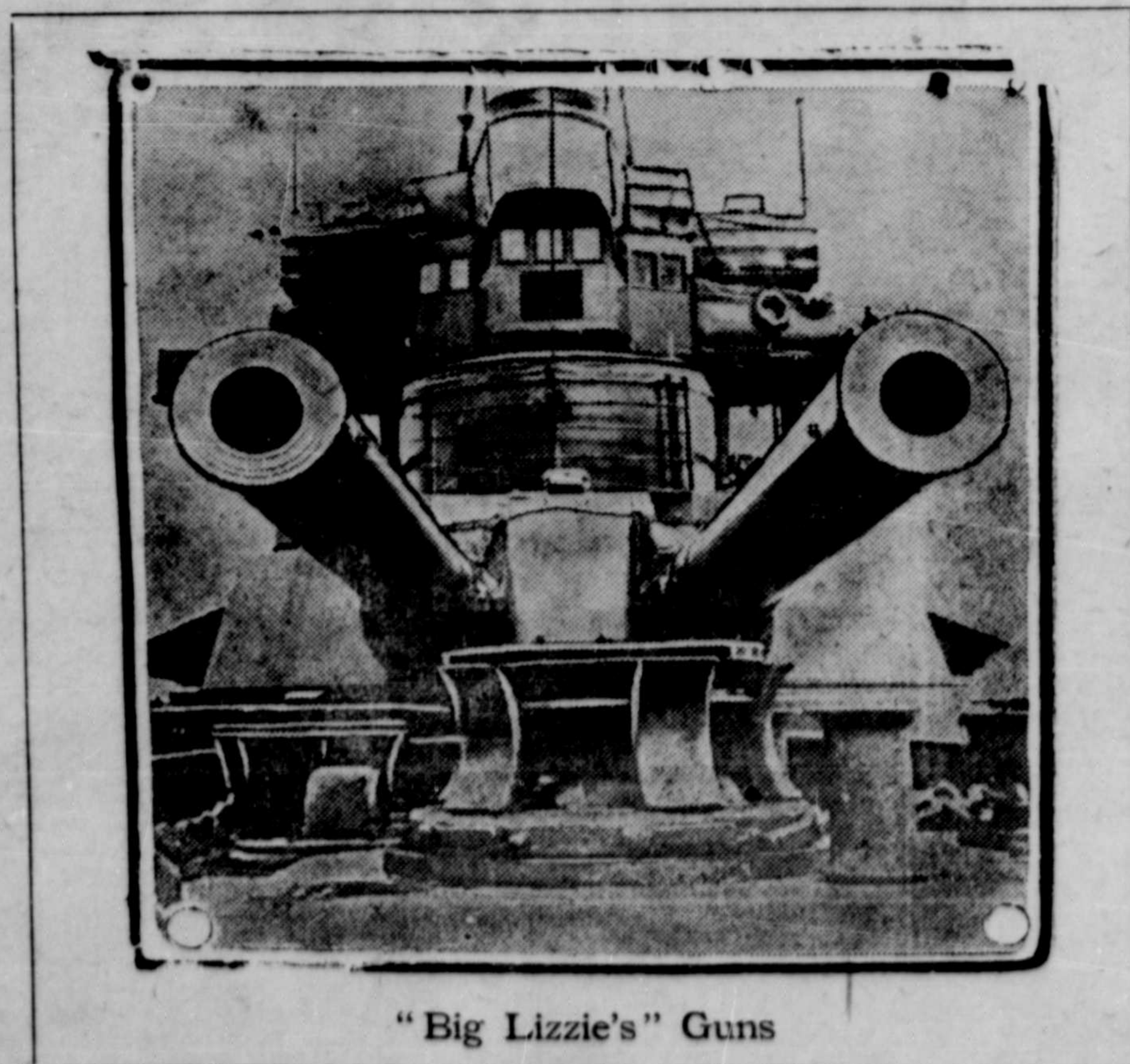
