RUSSIANS CONTROL CARPATHIAN PASSES

IRISH LEADERS AGREE ON HOME RULE -- BRITISH CRUISERS WAITING FOR SUBS.

RUSSIANS NOW HOLD PASSES INTO HUNGARY

Railroads to Budapest Controlled by Russians—Successes in Volhynia—Turks are Fleeing.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 26.—In Transylvania, the Russians have secured control of the three important railroad passes through the Carpathians, the Jablonica, Kidlibaba and Delatyn passes being in Russian hands. The railroads through those passes lead direct to Budapest, the capital of Hungary and this is a big step towards the conquering of that part of the Central Empire.

In Volhynia.

The Russians continue to advance in Volhynia and have captured another thousand prisoners.

In Armenia.

In Armenia, the Turks are fleeing before the Grand Duke's army, abandoning their guns and ammunition as they go.

Italian Advance.

The Italians report the capture of Monte Imone and a further advance in the Monte Chrisia region.

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REDMOND AND CARSON AGREE ON HOME RULE

King and Premier Confer—Both Leaders are Ready to Make Settlement—Casement Will Hang.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 26.—Premier Asquith is conferring with the King in regard to the settlement of the Irish problems, which are again looming large as a result of the withdrawal of the Lloyd George Home Rule Bill.

In spite of the strong protest by the Nationalists at Dublin, against the isolation of the five counties in Ulster, Sir Edward Carson, the leader of the Unionists, and John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, are in perfect harmony as to the working out of the problem and it is believed that an agreement will be reached which will be acceptable to both parties.

Casement to Hang.

The execution of Sir Roger Casement, who was found guilty of high treason, has been fixed for August 3rd. All efforts to save his life have been abandoned.

Sinn Feiners.

A committee is sitting at a tribunal to hear the appeal of the Sinn Fein prisoners. It is reported that the tribunal will release the majority of the two thousand prisoners.

DEVELOPMENT WORK AT FIDDLER CREEK

There arrived on the train last evening, R. L. Shaw, M. P. P. for Stettler, Alberta, and William McAdams, the well known newspaper man. "Bill," in the meantime, has laid aside the shears and the blue pencil and is devoting his energies to mining, and evidently to good purpose. Mr. Shaw, Mr. McAdams, and several other Edmonton business men are becoming largely interested in mining in the Hazelton district, their latest move being the taking over of the Fiddler Creek property, which they are proceeding to develop. A company is being incorporated, capitalized at \$125,000, to carry out the development work and engineers are already at the mine laying out plans for a road. A steam shovel is being shipped from Edmonton right away and the work will go well forward this summer.

Mr. Shaw, who is largely interested in the cattle business in Alberta, does not profess to be a mining expert, but he has had enough experience to realize that there are great mining possibilities in the hinterland of Prince Rupert. In an interview with The Daily News last evening, he expressed himself as highly pleased with the outlook in the Rocher de Boule region, and emphasized the fact that there is an entire absence of company promoting. He was glad to notice that the mining men here are much more interested in genuine development work than in selling stock. His company, which is handling the Fiddler Creek property, is a case in point, there being no stock whatever offered to the public. Both gentlemen left for the south last evening, after making arrangements with Mr. Williams, of Williams & Manson, regarding the incorporation of the company.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

The Trades and Labor Council met last evening, President S. D. Macdonald in the chair.

After the installation of officers Organizer Thompson reported that the retail clerks were now organized, with a membership of 26. He also reported that the Fish Packers Union had been organized with a membership of 28 or 30.

The committee on Oriental labor was granted a further extension of time to complete its work. A communication was received, appointing W. E. Thompson as official organizer for Prince Rupert for the A. F. of L.

The legislative committee reported that all who wanted their names on the municipal voters' list must do so in person before October 31st.

The half-holiday question was discussed. It was reported that a number of merchants were now in favor of a mid-week half-holiday instead of Saturday. After considerable discussion, the following resolution was passed:—"That the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council goes on record as using every legitimate means of assisting in the selection of Saturday afternoon as the recognized half-holiday, and that the matter be taken up with the different unions to receive their co-operation in support of those who are favoring the movement."

A communication was read from the B. C. Federation of Labor, asking that J. H. McVety be endorsed as a commissioner under the Workmen's Compensation Act. A movement is on foot to have Mat Crawford, ex-mayor of Fernie, appointed. He is endorsed by the Locomotive Engineers. The local body felt that Mr. McVety would be the better representative.

The secretary of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union reported that the strike, affecting the members of the union for some time past, had been satisfactorily settled. The men had gained practically all the concessions asked for. The important thing for Prince Rupert is that the men will receive settlement for their catches wherever sold.

MEN WANTED

Premier Bowser has toured the province, accompanied by several of his ministers and H. B. Thompson. They dropped Hon. W. R. Ross off at Prince George and Billy feels decidedly more comfortable there than he would do at Fernie, though the Prince George comfort can only be described as such by way of comparison. The people of Prince George are wondering what they have done to deserve such treatment.

H. B. Thompson, who, the chairman of the Bowser meeting here assured his audience, would be certain to support Bowser in the next Legislature, has decided that he will be a spectator of the disaster, rather than part of it. The local Tory organ assures us that Mr. Thompson decided a year ago to retire "for business reasons." Mr. Thompson, who is a very shrewd judge of public opinion, was greatly helped in his decision by the attitude of the audience in Prince Rupert and throughout the north.

William Manson remains the bodyguard of the premier, not because William feels that he is any kind of a protection to that gentleman, but because Willie likes shelter. While in the north William felt a whiff of a breeze which foretold the coming storm, and he has not yet got the circulation in his feet back to normal. According to the Journal, Nanaimo will not shelter him, though Mr. Planta is in a hopeless position, and Willie hates to face the blizzard in the north. That first breeze chilled him to the bone and he still shivers at the thought of it and of what it signified.

Prince Rupert wants no more "jelly-fish" representatives and there is not a shadow of doubt that T. D. Pattullo will be sent to Victoria along with a solid representation of real, live, fighting men from the north. Under H. C. Brewster, British Columbia will have a really representative government in

which each man must do his share and measure up to the standard of a man. The province has had a one-man government, thanks largely to the fact that there were so many men of the type of William Manson in the house, men who allowed themselves to be put just where Bowser directed. Millions have been squandered ruthlessly because the house was full of "jelly-fish" representatives instead of men. British Columbia cannot afford to squander more millions, and, if Bowser were returned to power, millions more would be squandered, as the plans are all ready now. Foley, Welch & Stewart and Mackenzie & Mann would go on their way rejoicing in their further fat construction profits, and there would be no hope of recovery. The people are awake to the fact that men are needed and they will send men.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

"Afraid of Manson," says the Journal. After hearing William's painful speech and witnessing his still more painful expression at the Bowser meeting, it can be safely left to the judgment of the people as to where the "fear" lies.

The rumor in regard to William Manson running in Nanaimo originated in Conservative circles in the south, where the Tories are in a turmoil trying to select candidates who do not look too much like Bowserites.

The thought of every member of the company was "If William Manson were only here." The tone in which this thought was uttered boded no good for our "jelly-fish" member.






