CANADIAN MOUNTED RIFLES HAVE ARRIVED

BRITISH WAR CONTRACTS SUBJECT TO CANCELLATION -- TURKS FOR GALICIA

MORE B. C. BOYS HAVE REACHED ENGLISH SOIL

Canadian Mounted Rifles Have Landed Safely—British Contracts Subject to Cancellation.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, July 27.—The censor announces the safe arrival in England of the 11th Canadian Mounted Rifles from British Columbia along with several eastern battalions.

There are many Prince Rupert boys in the Mounted Rifles and their doings at the front will be watched with the greatest interest.

Canadian Losses.

The percentage of wastage in the forty-eight Canadian regiments at present at the front is so high that it is improbable that the battalions now being organized in Canada can retain their identity on arrival at the front, as drafts of men are repeatedly needed to fill up the gaps in the existing regiments.

Hopeful Sign.

London, July 27.—All new British contracts for war material include a clause that the contract is subject to cancellation after September.

ROBLIN'S TRIAL

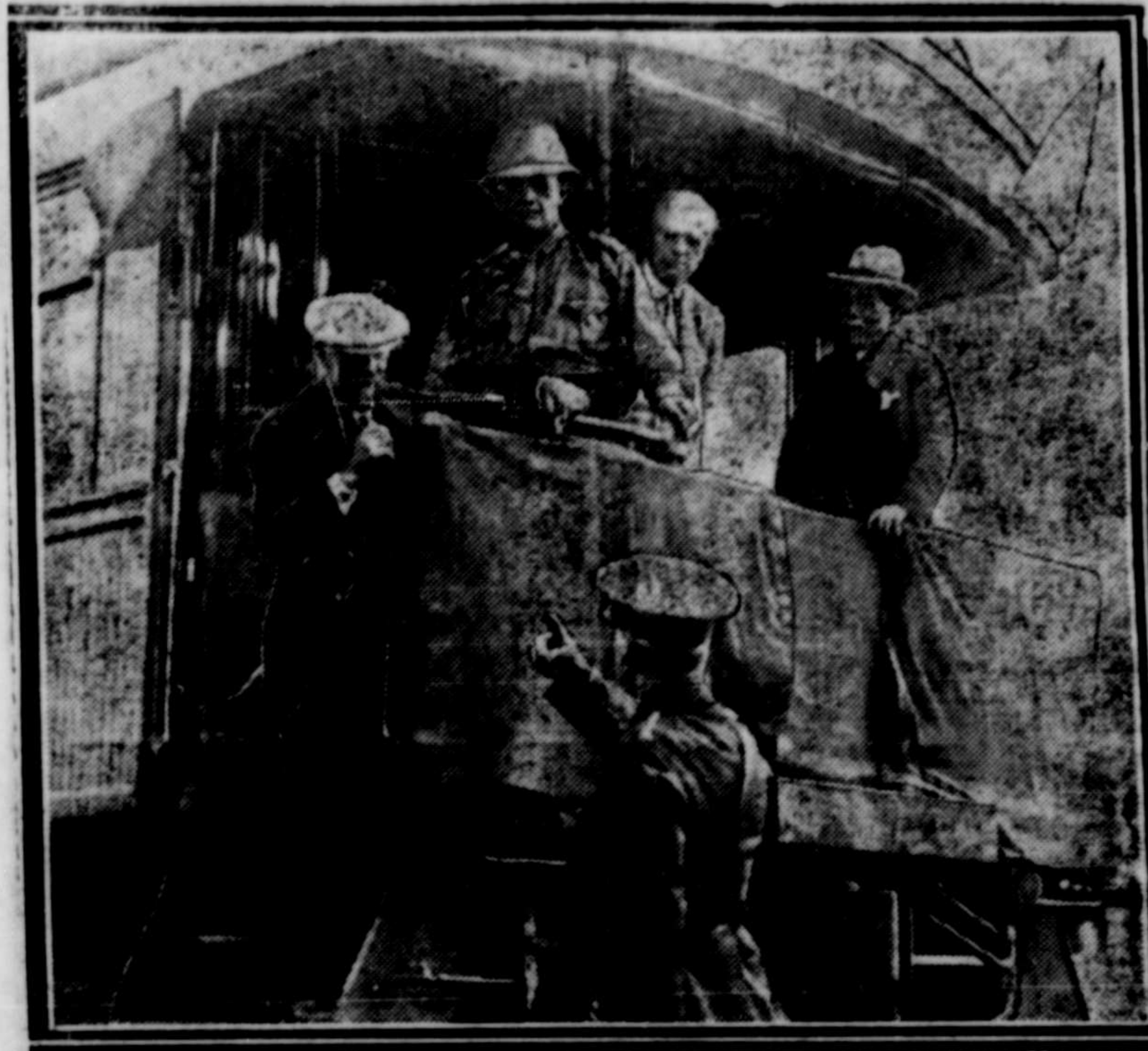

WHERE SIR SAM HUGHES GO' A VERY MIXED RECEPTION

Sir Sam at the back of his private car as he left Camp Borden after reviewing 31,000 Canadian troops, part of whom gathered around the minister of militia and hooted him as he prepared to leave. The hostile demonstration was chiefly the result of bad conditions, the men having to parade for hours in intense heat and on rough ground. The day before Sir Sam's arrival, the men became riotous and their officers lost control. Brig.-Gen. Logie appeared on the scene and was handed a list of complaints, one being that the men had not been given water bottles on the parade rehearsal. On his promising that this would be remedied, the men shouted "We don't want them. There'll be no parade tomorrow. We don't want to see Sam." At every mention of Hughes' name there was hooting and jeering, with continuous cries of "Graft."

In the picture, Sir Sam is seen conversing with his brother, Dr. J. L. Hughes. The Hon Wallace Nesbitt, Sir Sam's counsel in the fuse enquiry, is seen on the step of the car.

CANADIANS IN GERMANY ARE RECEIVING PARCELS

NO. 2 QUESTIONS FOR THE ELECTORS NO. 2 RE B. C. PROHIBITION ACT

Will It Prohibit?

READ THIS "WIDE OPEN" CLAUSE OF THE ACT
READ IT OVER AND OVER AND GET ITS MEANING.
Section 57, Par. 2:

"Nothing in this Act shall be construed to interfere (a) With the right of any person to import from without the Province liquor for bona fide use in his private dwelling house.

Does not this clause provide for the purchase of just as much liquor by citizens of British Columbia as is now the case, providing the money for the purchase is sent outside the province.

LAURIER ADVISES APPEAL TO LONDON

Ottawa, July 18.—According to a telegram received today by Sir Wilfrid Laurier from Mr. F. C. Wade, K. C., of Vancouver, the Bowser Government is planning to manipulate the soldiers' vote abroad in the coming provincial election in a most unscrupulous and arbitrary manner. Mr. Wade telegraphed to Sir Wilfrid urging that steps be taken at Ottawa, if possible, or through Ottawa to the War Office, to protect as far as possible, in behalf of the Liberal Opposition in British Columbia, against the stealing of the elections through tampering with the soldiers' ballots. Sir Wilfrid has replied advising the Liberals of British Columbia to at once send a representative to London to make representations to the War Office for an equal status with the Provincial Government agents who are now on their way overseas in arranging for the taking of the soldiers' votes.

Take Votes in Britain

Mr. Wade in his telegram says that the military forces voting act passed by the British Columbia Legislature just before dissolution, provides for the taking of the votes of soldiers from that province now overseas. The War Office has given permission to take the votes of the soldiers still in Great Britain, but has refused permission so far as the troops actually at the front are concerned. Under the British Columbia act, the agent-general of the province in London, Sir Richard McBride, has control of all the arrangements in connection with the balloting, and can appoint as many officers as he likes for holding polls. The Liberal Opposition is given the right of nominating only one scrutineer for the whole of Great Britain, and he can appear only at the counting of the ballots, and not during the voting. Sir Richard McBride is authorized to destroy packages of ballots which may appear to have been tampered with, thus preventing any future scrutiny by the courts. F. W. Welsh, president of the Conservative Association of Vancouver, and chairman of the building committee of the Vancouver School Board, who has just been required to retire because of damaging evidence brought against him in connection with the recent investigation with regard to the public funds, has been sent to England by the Bowser Government to assist Sir Richard McBride in looking after the voting.

Government Beaten in B. C.

In his telegram, Mr. Wade further says: "The Government are hopelessly beaten locally, and rely on the manipulation of the soldiers' votes to save themselves. Both the election act and the Welsh appointment are most scandalous. An examination of the act will convince you that it is to be used improperly and unjustly, and it is unfair that the soldiers should be subjected to it. A more outrageous act could not be drafted. Voting begins on August 3rd, and lasts six weeks.

TURK TROOPS TO HELP STOP THE RUSSIANS

British Advancing—Hand to Hand Fighting on Somme—Biplane Downed by German Submarine.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 27.—Turkish troops are now en route for Galicia to assist the Austro-Germans in their effort to stem the Russian advance.

Western front.

The Rupert Hotel wire says that throughout the night the British troops continued to press the Germans on the Somme front in hand to hand encounters. The Germans made a vicious counter-attack but it was repulsed and the British keep on going.

Germany has decided to call out her 1917 and 1918 classes of recruits in order to fill the gaps made by the continued attacks on Verdun and by the Anglo-French offensive.

Strong Point Gained.

Lloyd George states, in explaining the value of the work done by the Australians at Pozieres, that this point, which is now firmly in British hands, is the strongest which has to be taken until Bapaume is reached.

Biplane Downed.

A British biplane has been brought down by the guns of a German submarine north of Zeebrugge on the Belgian coast. Two officers were captured.

SUCCEEDS DEVONSHIRE

London, July 27.—The Earl of Lytton succeeds the Duke of Devonshire as Civil First Lord of the Admiralty.

PROTECTION

The local Tory organ must not yet have recovered from its recent two days' snooze, for it now seeks to show that the reason why the Liberal candidate was returned by a majority of 627 in North Perth, as against a Conservative majority of 1,117 in the last election, was because the people demanded a more pronounced type of Conservatism. Evidently the people of Ontario are very dense, or have a remarkable sense of humor, when they show their inherent Conservatism by returning a Liberal candidate by an overwhelming majority.

Of course, Ontario may be in the same condition as British Columbia, and may have a party of political bosses ruling there who are simply masquerading under the name Conservative, which title seems now to cover a multitude of political sinners. The Monetary Times, which we had the pleasure of quoting yesterday, is not a party paper, and it gave as the reason for the big turnover in North Perth the fact that Ontario is tired and sick of the Tory machine. Bowser is in exactly the same position as the Tory in North Perth.

The Journal, evidently still rubbing its eyes, gets nickel mixed up with the Times article, but the Times does not mention nickel. It is funny how the Tories always seem to get the precious metals mixed up with elections.

Of course, the Journal runs this in, in order to try and show that the Liberals are a bunch of traitors who were quite pleased with the idea of the Germans shooting down Canadians with shells made with Canadian nickel. Perhaps it is futile to point out to the Journal that there is a vast difference between the "protection" which the Liberals would undoubtedly apply to Canadian nickel, which the Germans are at present getting supplies of, and the Tory type of "protection" which

seeks to fill the pockets of such corporations as the Massey-Harris Company at the expense of the Canadian farmer. The protection which fills the pockets of the manufacturer while the farmer's wife has to chase around after eggs to help pay the interest on the machinery manufacturer's notes is the Tory type; the Liberal idea of protection is a real protection of the interests of the men who are making, and have made, Canada what it is, and seeks to prevent Canadians from being slain by German shells prepared with Canadian nickel.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

"Billy" Ross must have forgotten that he was not in Victoria when he appeared at the McBride meeting yesterday.

The Canadian Cartridge Company must be composed of real patriots. It would have been a boon for the Empire had this firm had the handling of the fuse contracts. Certainly, they do not make fuses, but in that respect they would be no worse off than Colonel Allison and they have a different idea of what to do with their profits.

Canada's shell production is still away below requirements. The fuses are evidently not coming to hand rapidly yet, John Wesley Allison had better get his coat off and get to work. He has pocketed his profits but the fuses are still in the making.

Canadian nickel is to be manufactured in Canada. This is just as it should be. The next step should be the refining of all Canadian copper in Canada.

The Tories in the south are in desperation considering the nomination of a candidate who has just returned from Saloniki. He has the big advantage of being out of touch with Bowser for some time. They had better see that he calls himself an "independent"

just to keep him clear of any of the Bowser taint.

H. C. Brewster is in favor of throwing open the civil service to our returned soldiers. This movement should have the hearty support of every Britisher worthy of the name.

PATRIOTIC ADDRESS BY FRED. PETERS, K. C.,

At the meeting of citizens in the city hall yesterday afternoon to prepare for the war anniversary demonstration on August 4, Canon Rix, seconded by W. E. Williams, moved that Fred. Peters K. C., take the chair, in the absence of Mayor McCaffery. After a short discussion as to the form the demonstration should take, the following committee was appointed, with power to add to its numbers:—Canon Rix, Chairman, Rev. J. R. Dimmick, Ald. McClymont, H. A. Harvey, Mrs. R. L. McIntosh and Mrs. Norman Mackintosh.

Canon Rix suggested that it would be most fitting if the committee invited Fred. Peters, K. C., to deliver a patriotic address on this occasion and the meeting enthusiastically endorsed the suggestion. The committee met later and decided to hold the demonstration in the Westholme Theatre on the evening of August 4th and the following program committee was appointed:—Mrs. Norman Mackintosh, Ald. McClymont and H. A. Harvey. The general committee will be made up of representatives of all the public bodies of the city.

CROWDED LIBERAL MEETING IN INTERIOR

McBride, July 26.—This town failed to receive a visit from the premier during his tour of the north, but last night it had the spectacle of his colleague, Hon. W. R. Ross, taking the platform at the Liberal meeting in a condition which was referred to by Mr. Brewster as "tending to do the Opposition cause much good." Mr. Ross had evidently been trying to keep out the rain while electioneering this afternoon along with the local road superintendent. His articulation was, to put the matter gently, not very distinct and he spoke for barely five minutes.

He asserted that John T. Scott had sworn to certain things and was at once directly contradicted by Alex. M. Manson, the Liberal candidate for Omineca. The meeting was distinctly Liberal, the sympathies of the audience being entirely with H. C. Brewster, M. Macdonald and A. M. Manson. A few members of a road gang tried to interrupt but their efforts only served to show the strength of the Liberal support in this district.

Excellent meetings were held by the Liberal leaders at Fort Faser and Vanderhoof, which, both in enthusiasm and attendance, eclipsed the Bowser meetings at those places. Mr. Brewster dealt with the land policy of the government in masterly fashion and his statements were received with enthusiasm, the majority of the audience knowing from bitter experience that his contentions were absolutely according to fact.

Mr. Ross has been talking in millions in regard to the land open to the pre-emptor and genuine settler, but the settlers know that there are tracts of thousands of acres held all around by the speculator, while habitations are few and far between. The barren mountain tops are left for the pre-emptor.

Returned Soldiers.

Dealing with the question of returned soldiers, H. C. Brewster said that the Liberals would throw the civil service open to the men who had offered themselves to their country, and would also render every assistance possible in providing soldiers with opportunities to pursue whatever avocation they were suited for. Party affiliations would have no bearing whatever on the Liberal treatment of returned soldiers. The men would be given land, if they wanted it, but the Liberal policy for their welfare did not begin and end there.

BRITAIN'S ANSWER SPLENDIDLY GIVEN

"Britain Prepared" drew a well-filled house at the Westholme Theatre last evening and that everyone was thrilled by Britain's magnificent answer to the question "Is Britain Prepared?" was evident from the way in which the audience sang the National Anthem at the close. The pictures were just exactly what is claimed for them, a complete and final answer to the question, while at the same time they provide one of the finest "movie" shows imaginable.

The first five reels dealt with the making and drilling of Kitchener's army, from the first raw recruit to the sending off to the front of a division. The final review of this division on Salisbury Plain makes one of the most striking pictures of the series, with tier upon tier of gleaming bayonets as far as the eye can see.

The viewing at close quarters of such reversions to ancient times as the catapult proved highly interesting, while the making of munitions was followed in every detail. Time after time, the audience cheered lustily at some fresh evidence of the way in which the British people buckle to their work of defeating the Hun.

The last five reels deal with the navy and undoubtedly they are the finest of the series. The building and launching of a dreadnought are shown and then you are taken out to the fleet and you visit each battleship of the line, making personal acquaintance with Sir John Jellicoe and his bull-dog on board the "Iron Duke," though Sir John is rather shy of the camera. The mine-sweepers are shown at close range in a North Sea storm; you go down in a submarine and view the fleet through the periscope; you go round the fleet in a destroyer and get splendid views of the "horns" in rough weather, with the seas dashing over their bows and finally you see every detail of the "Queen Lizzie" down to the ship's mascot. The closing scenes of this great dreadnought by moonlight are very impressive and the audience broke into a great cheer last night as a little "powder-monkey" emerged from the mouth of one of her big guns and gave the final answer, "All's Well." It is something not to be missed and ever to be remembered.

A most pleasing feature of the show was the music furnished by H. A. Harvey and P. C. Daugherty. While the audience gathered, they gave splendid renderings of "Brahm's Dance," the intermezzo from "Cavalliera Rusticana," Morrison's "Meditation" and then a great patriotic overture.
