SUBMARINE BREMEN REPORTED IN HALIFAX

RUSSIANS NOW CONTROL TURKISH ARMENIA -- MANY PRISONERS ARE TAKEN

BREMEN MAY BE SAFELY HELD IN CANADIAN PORT

Semi-Official Report that German Submarine was Captured by Cruisers—British Hold Somme Region.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, July 28.—It is semi-officially reported that the patrolling squadron of British cruisers off the coast of the United States has seized the German submarine Bremen. It is said that the vessel is now in Halifax harbor.

British Successes.

London, July 28.—British troops have now entirely captured De Ville wood, driving out the Kaiser's crack Brandenburg regiment.

By capturing Pozieres, the British forces now have complete control in the Somme region. The entire party of Bavarian troops which was defending the concrete fort against the British attacks was killed with the exception of four men.

RUSSIANS GAIN HUNDRED MILES WITHIN A WEEK

Turkish Armenia Completely Held by Grand Duke's Forces—Many Prisoners and Guns are Captured.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 28.—The Russians have advanced over one hundred miles in Turkish Armenia within a week and the capture of Erzigan allows the Grand Duke's army to obtain the benefits which an extremely fertile valley affords.

From Erzigan there is easy communication through Trebizond to the western and southern Caucasian armies and the latest success practically completes the Russian occupation of Turkish Armenia.

Hundreds of prisoners have been taken along with large quantities of munitions and eight hundred hospital beds.

Eastern Front.

The Russians on the eastern front, between the 16th and 25th of July, captured 34,000 Germans and Austrians; forty-five cannon and seventy-one machine guns.

Discussing Russian preparations for a continuance of the conflict, General Chouvaieff, Minister of War, advises the people that, although the enemy forces are perceptibly weakening, it is unreasonable to expect a termination of hostilities immediately and explains that orders will be issued calling up men ordinarily exempt from military service in order to maintain immense reserve forces.

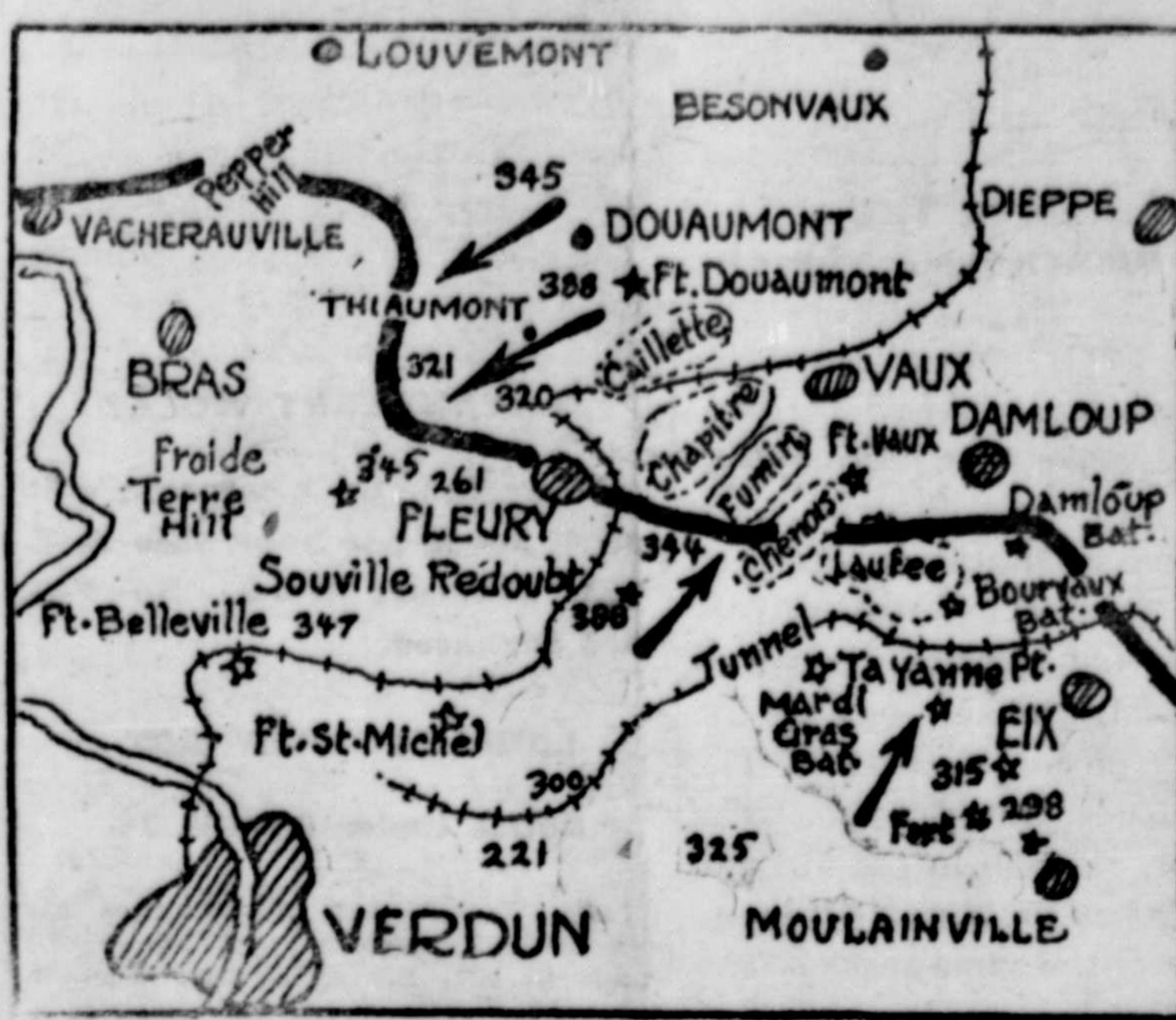
FAREWELL PRESENTATION TO JAMES M. THOMPSON

MASS MEETINGS CALLED

The following resolution in reference to the Bowser attempt to manipulate the soldiers' vote was passed by the Vancouver Liberals on Monday:—

Whereas it is evident from a perusal of the Soldiers' Voting Act that the enactment has been drawn for the express purpose of manipulating the soldiers' vote in the interest of the provincial government and in opposition to the interests of the people;

And whereas the Liberal party is strongly in favor of the fullest exercise of the franchise by those who have shown their willingness to incur every hardship and risk of life itself in defence of our common country;

And whereas nothing more sordid and contemptible could be suggested than under the guise of patriotism, while pretending to confer the franchise, a plot has been devised for robbing not only the soldiers but the public at large of their rightful representation; And whereas the malign nature of the act is demonstrated by the absence of a provision for the appointment of scrutineers to be present at the polls during the elections, the depositing of the ballots, and all the other necessary safeguards in the conduct of an honest election.

Resolved that public meetings be at once called in Vancouver and elsewhere throughout the province to demand such amendments to the act as will provide for the appointment of scrutineers and the other safeguards contained in the Soldiers' Vote Act passed by the Dominion Parliament at the instance of the Conservative government in 1915;

And to consider other amendments to the act made necessary by the action of the War Office in confining its operations to the United Kingdom, and which the government has power to adopt by order-in-council under Section 17.

MORRIS ANDERSON ENCOUNTERS A BEAR

Morris Anderson, while cruising for timber for J. R. Morgan the other day on Hawkesbury Island, Douglas Channel, had an experience which he will never forget and will carry traces of through life. Having completed his work high up on the mountain, he was coming down to the beach late in the evening. It was dark, and without the slightest warning, a bear struck him on the head and rendered him unconscious. He lay where he fell all night, and in the morning was able to crawl to the beach where he lay down, being faint from loss of blood.

Here he was discovered by a boat's crew from camp, who had gone out to look for the missing man. He was removed to camp, where it was found that, besides carrying deep claw marks on the side of the head, he had been ripped from the collar-bone to the lower ribs by Bruin, the wound being eight inches long and two inches wide.

Fortunately, Mrs. Morgan, who has had first aid training, was in camp, and was able to bind up Mr. Anderson's wounds. He was taken to the hospital at Kitimat, where he is doing nicely and is not likely to be any the worse for his terrible experience.

DRASTIC PLAN TO COUNTERACT HUN INFLUENCE

Post Advocates no Naturalization of Germans for 21 Years—India very Particular About Foreigners.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 28.—The Morning Post advocates the adoption by the government of Kitchener's proposal to forbid the naturalization and domiciling of all German subjects in the British Isles until twenty-one years following the declaration of peace, and the prevention of any German entering into partnership with a British subject or becoming a shareholder in any British enterprise.

Precautions in India.

Washington, July 28.—The State Department has been notified by the British Ambassador that non-British teachers and missionaries, including Americans, are forbidden by the government to operate in India until very stringent regulations concerning their identity and the genuineness of their purpose in entering India are observed.

BACK TO LAURIER POLICY

When the Bordenites, five years ago, performed a volte-face on the naval question they did so in order to win the Bourassa-Lavergne vote in the Province of Quebec. Many Conservatives were deceived into the belief that a contribution of three Dreadnoughts would exhaust Canada's debt to the Empire. They now know that the refusal of the Conservative Government to contribute men as well as ships was the unwritten pledge of the Borden-Bourassa alliance. If Nationalist Quebec today is less enthusiastic than other parts of Canada in the raising of recruits to aid the Allies in France, it is because Sir Robert Borden, in 1911, took up the position that Canada would contribute ships, but not men, to the British defence. The Borden naval policy served its immediate purpose. But the seed then sown has grown into the tares of passive disloyalty that now distinguishes the conduct of Borden's quondam Nationalist allies. Borden's naval policy was a lowering of the British flag in Quebec. It was dictated by political expediency and gave fresh strength and impetus to the Bourassa-Lavergne movement against Canada's participation in Britain's wars. To satisfy the Nationalists, not a single Canadian was to be called upon to serve aboard Canada's Dreadnoughts.

The political opportunism of Borden in 1911 was not even justified by military considerations. The British Admiralty has sent Captain the Hon. Rupert Guinness, M. P., to Canada to enlist men for the British navy, many of whom might now be ready and trained had the Laurier training ships not been put out of commission, and all naval recruiting stopped, to satisfy the disloyal sentiment of the Bourassa-Lavergnerump of the Borden party. Nor does the Borden naval policy meet the necessities of Imperial defence. This war has proved

beyond yea or nay the call for adequate defence of the Dominions beyond the seas. In a recent interview in Montreal, Mr. C. J. Parr, C. M. G., M. P., of New Zealand, emphasized this point:

"We feel in New Zealand that eventually there will have to be some arrangement between Canada, Australia, and New Zealand whereby we might have a navy in the Pacific, each country contributing the ships and personnel to the fleet under the common flag. Our joint interests in the great western ocean are so vitally important that we cannot afford to leave them unprotected on the seas. We are the great British nations, and will soon be wealthy enough to make the necessary material contributions to a great high sea Imperial fleet for the protection of our ever-increasing ocean commerce. We say this in no spirit of hostility to any power. We desire to dwell at peace with all men, but we shall be fools, blind to the teachings of this awful war, if we are caught unprepared to defend our priceless inheritance of British freedom."

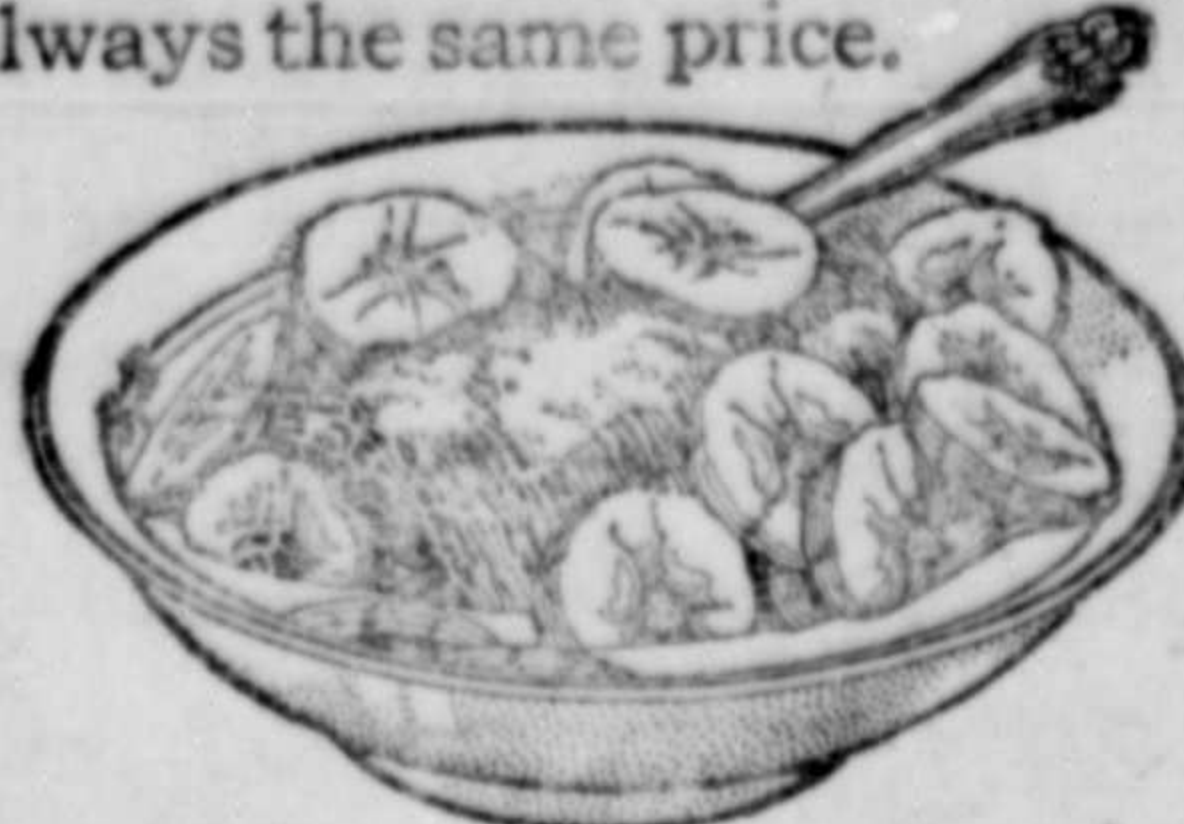
The Borden naval policy, like the Borden-Bourassa alliance, does not stand the test of time and practical experience. The path of honor and of safety for Canada and the Empire lies in the creation of national services which in some co-ordinated scheme of defence between the various Dominions will relieve Great Britain from the protection of their trade and commerce in times of war.—Toronto Globe.

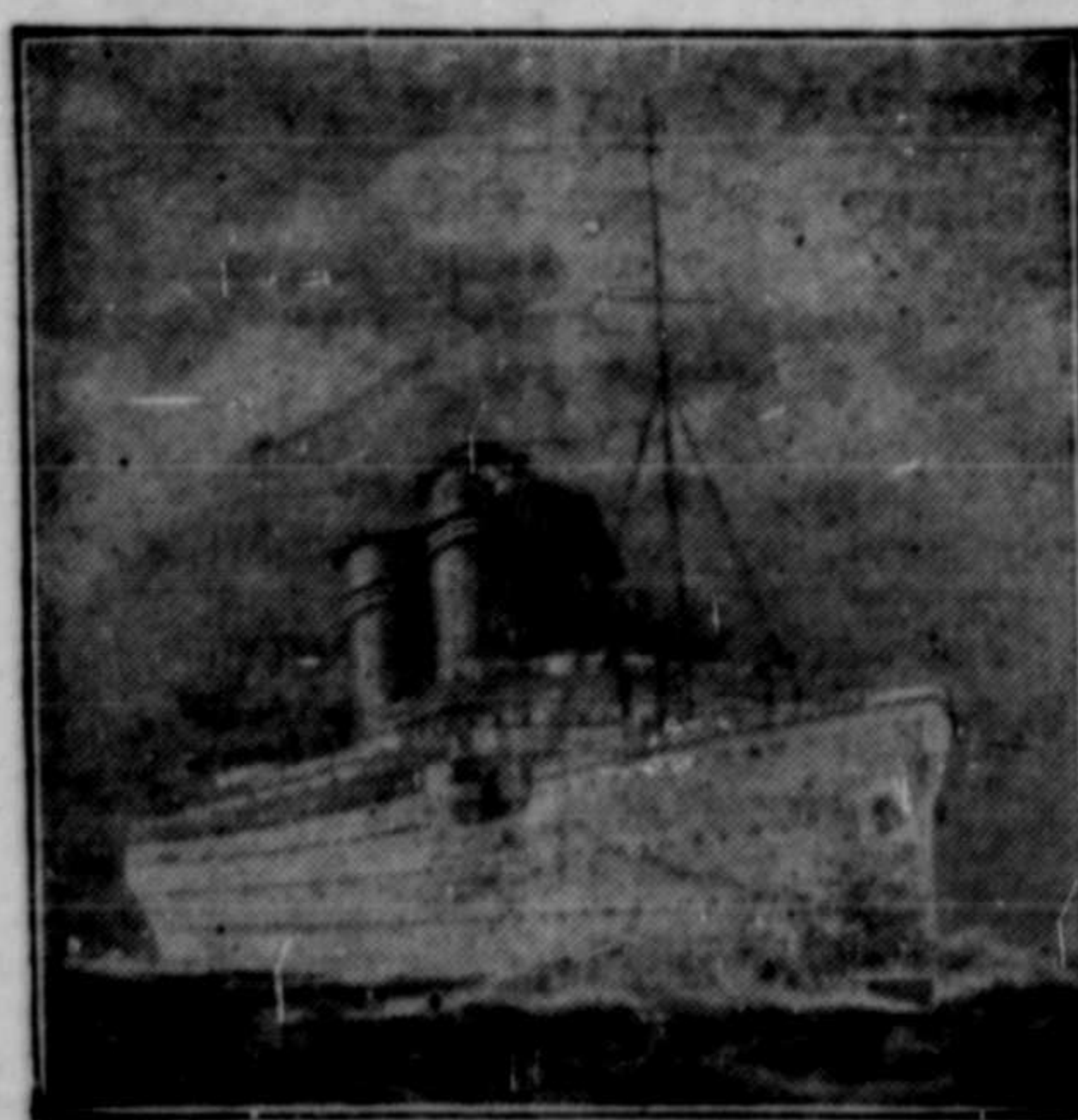

SIR THOMAS WHITE TO BECOME PREMIER?

The Toronto Evening Telegram yesterday published the following from its correspondent at Montreal:

"A big Cabinet shift at Ottawa is indicated by private information obtained from a well-informed source here.

"The information is to the effect that Sir George Perley will not return to England, but that Sir Robert Borden will succeed him as Canadian High Commissioner.

"The Premier, the story goes, is to be raised to the Peerage as a recognition of the part Canada has played in the war. Sir Thomas White is to succeed Sir Robert Borden as Premier, and a shift in Cabinet positions all along the line must necessarily result.

"It is said that Sir Robert Borden has long since tired of being pulled hither and thither by the opposing forces in the Government. He has also cherished a secret ambition to fill the high post at London, and now that the turning point of the war has been reached, he feels that he may with honor withdraw from a position for which he has felt he was never fitted and which was never to his liking.

"Premier Borden is wealthy, and has the qualifications to make him a satisfactory High Commissioner.

"But there would be interesting times at Ottawa after his departure, for the 'machine' Conservatives, whatever they may think of Sir Thomas White's business ability, have serious doubts as to the completeness of his political education."—Toronto Globe.
