RUSSIANS ARE DRIVING TOWARD LEMBERG

ZEPPELINS RAID ENGLISH COAST -- HOLLAND REFUSES TO BREAK NEUTRALITY

RUSSIANS ARE NOW DRAWING NEAR LEMBERG

Germans Flee in Disorder—Brody is Captured and Nine Thousand Prisoners—Turks In Hungary.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, July 29.—The Russians last night broke through the first line of Teutonic defences and drove the enemy from their line between the Stoneva and Bolduroka Rivers. The enemy fled in disorder towards Brody.

Following up their success, the Russians advanced on Brody, which they captured along with nine thousand prisoners and a number of guns. This success brings the Russians within a comparatively short distance of Lemberg, the most important railroad junction, Brody being about half way between Dubno and Lemberg. The Bug River is the next obstacle on this line and is practically the only defensive point which lies between the Russian army and Lemberg.

Turks in Hungary.
A Turkish army seventy thousand strong has been concentrated upon the plains of Hungary to help defend that country against the Russian invasion.

HUN AIRSHIPS MAKE RAID ON ENGLISH COAST

No Casualties—British Capture Longueval—Brussels Captain Shot—England Aroused.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 29.—Three German airships raided the east coast of England early this morning and dropped bombs in Lincolnshire and Yorkshire. There were no casualties and no damage has yet been reported. This is the first Zeppelin raid on England for twelve weeks.

British Take Longueval.

The British troops have captured Longueval, a most important point on the Somme front. This successful outcome of the desperate fighting of the past week will greatly facilitate the progress of the Anglo-French drive in the west. Losses on both sides were heavy, as the enemy put up a strenuous resistance. Violent hand-to-hand fighting continues in the vicinity of Pozieres, where the British are making further desperate efforts to continue the advance.

Captain Shot.

Captain Fryatt, of the steamship Brussels, who was accused of turning his vessel against a German submarine in March 1915, in an attempt to ram the enemy ship, has been tried by court martial and shot by the Germans. England is aroused over the incident, the press claiming that the charges against Captain Fryatt were cooked up as revenge for the recent capturing of many enemy submarines and in order to satisfy German feeling.

WEALTHY INVESTOR ARRIVED LAST NIGHT

James Carruthers, the millionaire grain buyer of Montreal and New York, arrived from the east last night on his way south. Mr. Carruthers is one of the most widely known financiers in Canada and has interests in all lines of enterprise from coast to coast. His mission to Victoria is in connection with the appeal in the Pacific Collieries case.

Mr. Carruthers is vice-president of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, the trawler James Carruthers being named after him. He is also a large stockholder in St. Lawrence and Great Lakes shipping concerns.

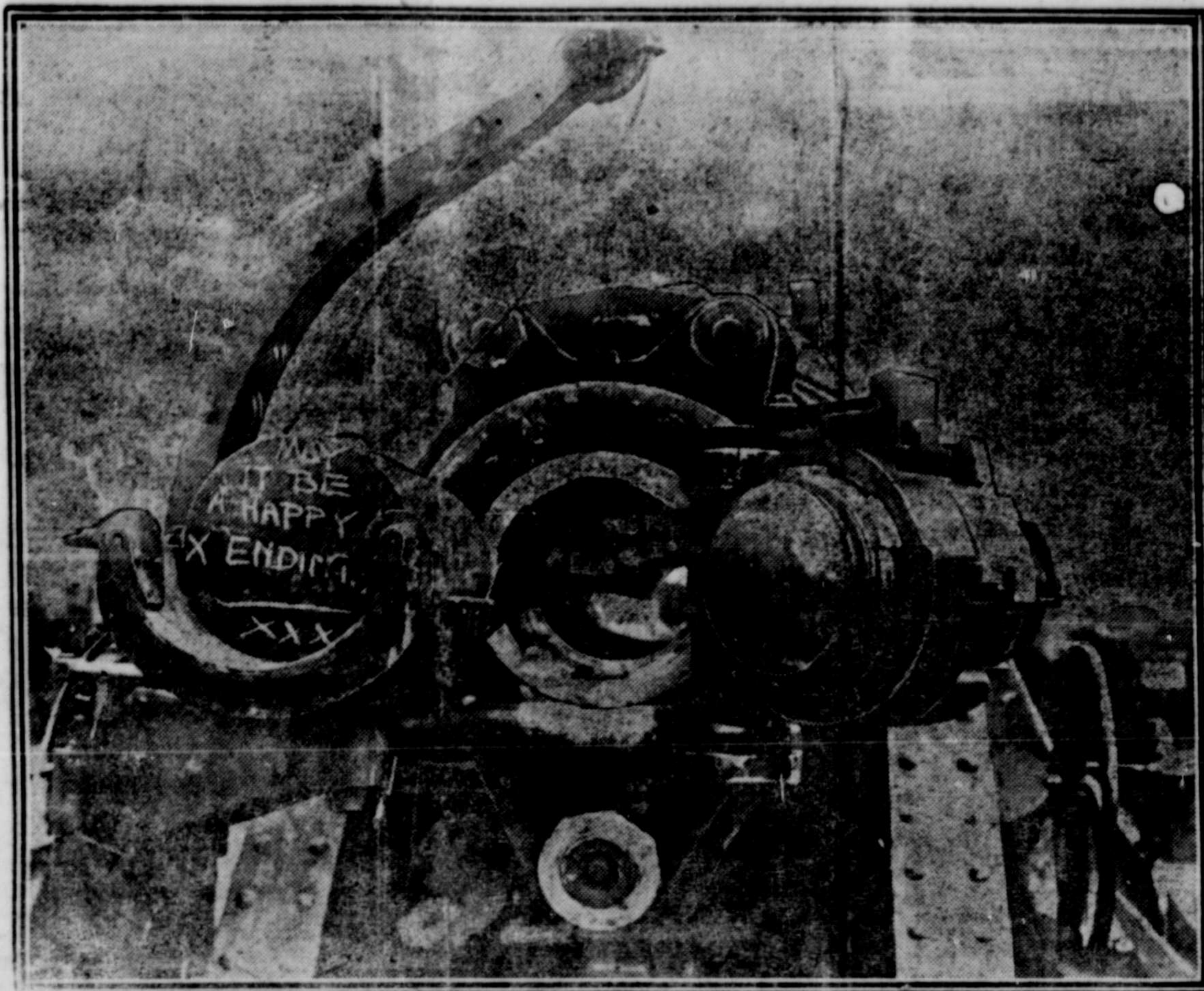

LIVELY CRITICISM AT BOWSER MEETING

Nelson, July 26.—The Opera House was well filled last night, and the speakers were well received, applause being freely distributed among all, both government and opposition representatives.

There are three candidates in Nelson, and all of them spoke last evening. Dr. W. O. Rose, the new Conservative nominee referred to himself as "presumably your next member." His remarks comprised a discussion of the government's legislative work of the past session, which, he declared, made for progress and stability of the province.

A Lively Critic.

Mr. A. M. Johnson, the Liberal candidate, spoke fluently and earnestly, and with a rapid-fire action, his apparent intention being to crowd as much criticism as he could into his allotted fifteen minutes. He succeeded very well. He declared that Premier Bowser contravened the statutes in extending the life of the Legislature this spring, and did so simply that he might get through a mass of legislation, and then go to the people and say: "This is what I've done for you."

He had plenty of time early in March, said the speaker, to test the question of the length of the life of the House had he wished. He could easily have gone to a Supreme Court judge or to the Appeal Court; but he did not want to test the question. He preferred to bring in a bill and arbitrarily lengthen the Legislature's life. If his position in the matter was right no such bill was needed.

Mr. Johnson declared that Mr. Brewster was quite justified in issuing his writ in an endeavor to obtain a fair deal for the public in the matter of P. G. E. Legislation. Not a dollar of P. G. E. stock went into the road building, he declared. It went to the contractors, he contended. The gov-

GERMANS WANT DUTCH CANALS FOR SHIPPING

Demands Refused—Serious Crisis Arises—Turk Regiment has Mutinied—Germans Claim Success.

London, July 29.—Holland has refused Germany's demands for permission to use the Dutch canals in sending boats from Germany to Belgium. A serious crisis has arisen. Since the issuing of the orange book condemning Germany for the sinking of the Tubantia, feeling against the Germans has arisen and this latest demand that Holland repudiate her treaties and break her neutrality has brought matters to a head.

Germany is in similar trouble with Switzerland, that country having refused permission for the passing of German troops through Switzerland to aid the Austrians.

Germans Claim Success.

The Germans claim a victory in a naval battle off the coast of Scotland between several German submarines and three British patrol boats. One British patrol boat was sunk.

Turks Mutiny.

Athens, July 29.—It is reported from Smyrna that a Turkish regiment refused to obey its German officers at Sevekieny and took refuge in a forest on Mount Semolion. The mutineers were pursued and the forest set on fire, and many of the mutineers were burned.

MANIPULATION

The Conservative defence of the Soldiers' Voting Act is feeble in the extreme. The Victoria Colonist, the chief of the Matson tribe, says that "the provisions of the law are ample to secure an honest vote" and that "the act will be honestly administered," but it does not attempt to go into any of the little peculiarities of the measure. It ignores entirely the fact that there is no provision made for Liberal scrutineers at any point of the vote taking, which lasts for six weeks, evidently with a sack hung up somewhere, where anyone who feels inclined to describe himself as ever having been in British Columbia may vote in any constituency he cares to choose.

The Colonist asserts that the act will be honestly administered, but it carefully ignores the fact that Fred Welsh has a great deal to do with its administration. Mr. Welsh may measure up to the Matsonian standard of honesty, but one cannot forget the ignominious part played by this gentleman in Vancouver during recent months, but, of course, the Colonist may feel that he played a perfectly honorable part, on the theory that all is fair in war and elections. Whatever the Colonist may think, it must be apparent to any ordinary mortal that a man whose conscience permits him to invite soap contractors to contribute money to the Bowser machine fund, and to add the amount to the price of the soap, is not a fit and proper person to represent the government of British Columbia in any election.

One cannot forget that this is the Welsh who was such a close friend of John L. Sullivan, and one wonders if the Colonist would have insisted that "the act will be honestly administered," had Sullivan been the Bowser agent sent over to control the soldiers' vote, instead of Welsh. The sending of a man of the stamp of Welsh not

only aroused the suspicions of all Liberals but brought forth a stinging condemnation from Sir Hibbert Tupper. Surely the Colonist does not suggest that Sir Hibbert is a "conscienceless Liberal." If Bowser wishes to convince the people of the province that he wishes to have the soldiers' vote honestly recorded, let him have the election on one day, Sept. 14, with the taking of the vote entirely in the hands of officials of the British government. If he refuses to do this, he stands condemned as a manipulator of the worst type.

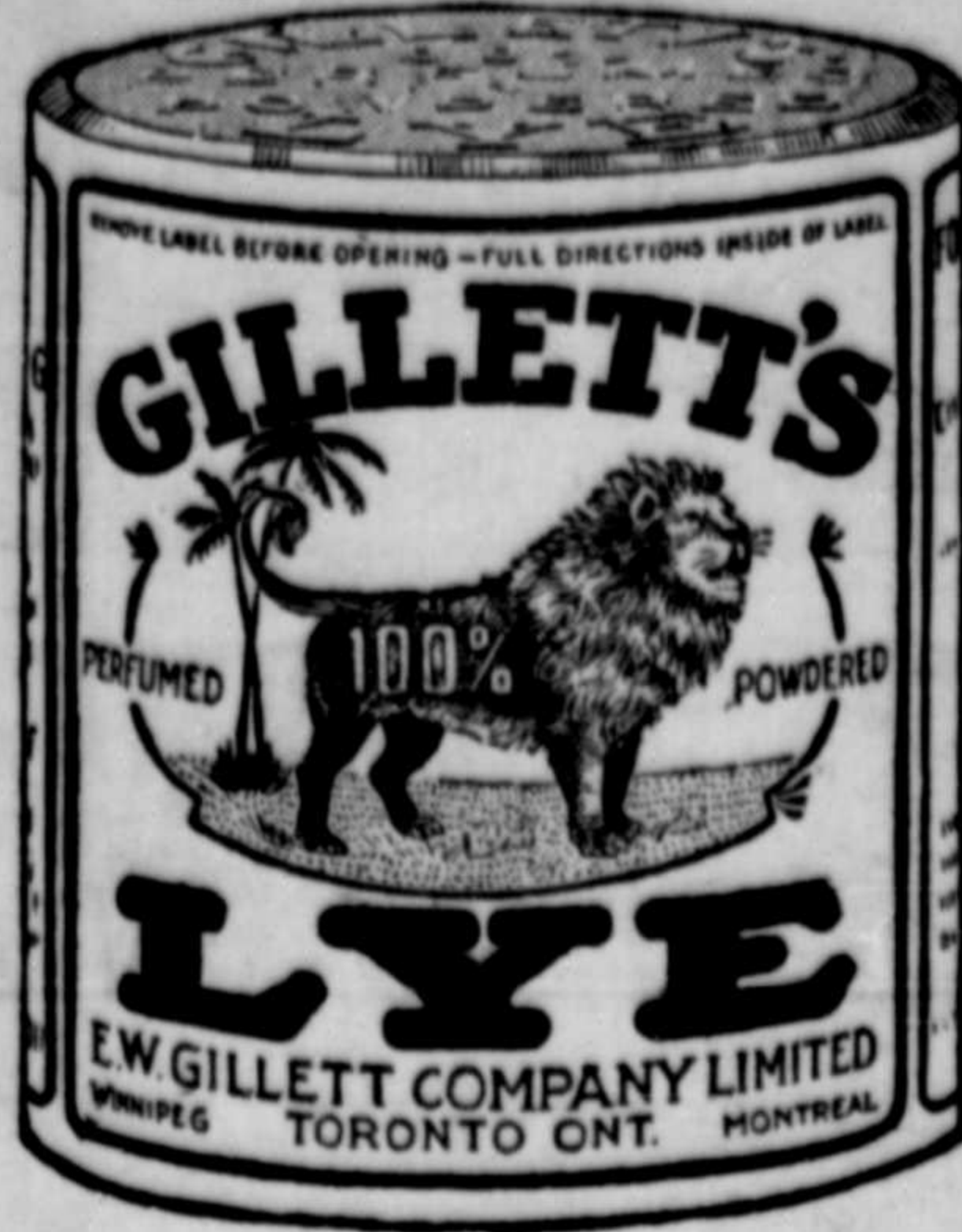

although the entire guarantee had already been dissipated, Mr. Johnson declared that the legislation by the government during the session after March 15 would have to be laid over by the Brewster writ.

"But who's afraid of the Liberals?" he added. "They'll take care of you. Mr. Brewster believes that this P. G. E. money has been filched from your pockets through government pledges of credit and the government won't find money on a gooseberry bush. Mr. Brewster thinks that the funds illegally given to the railway company should be restored."

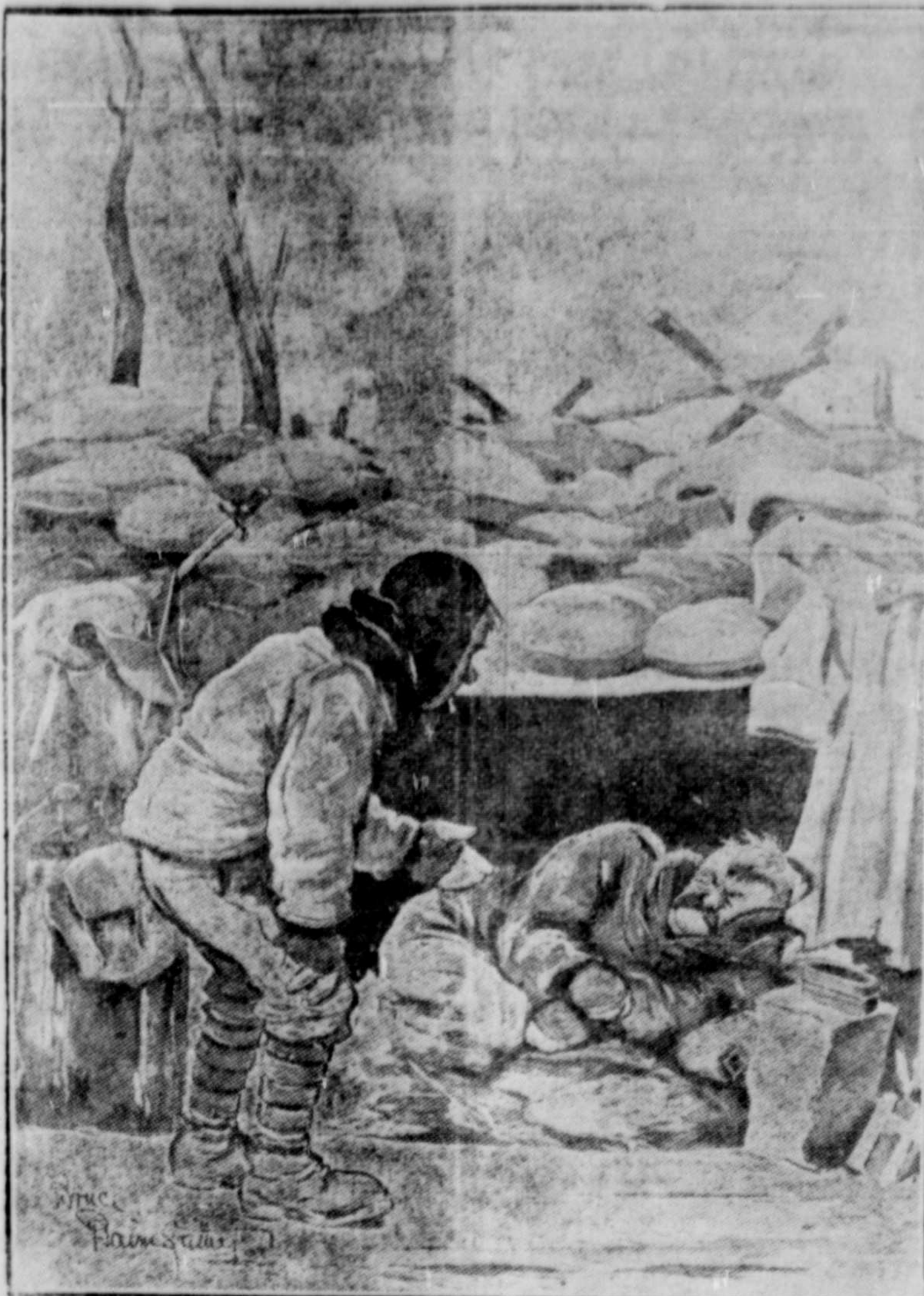
Sceptical on Mining Laws.

Mr. Johnson was sceptical about the mining legislation of the past session, declaring that the \$200,000 road grant was only a "flea bite," the appropriation should have been half a million. He expressed the view that the government should have passed an act to protect investors against fake mining propositions.

"Then the sharks under government supervision and contract will not be able to sell stock and sting you again," he said.

He complained that very little had been done in the way of road construction between Nelson, Balfour, Ymir and Bayonne Camp.

The third local candidate to speak was Mr. T. L. Bloomer, an independent Labor man, who announced himself a prohibitionist and suffragist. He was willing to admit that the Workmen's Compensation Act was a good piece of legislation, but the government passed it simply because Labor people demanded it. Mr. Bloomer deprecated the growth of partyism.

CHANNEL TUNNEL PROJECT REVIVED

London, July 26.—while the Channel tunnel project is being revived in England, the question is being earnestly discussed in France. Albert Montier, chief engineer of the Chemin De Fer Du Nord, recently lectured in favor of the international tube before the Societe des Ingenieurs Civils, in Paris.

With this tunnel, the lecturer said, the British troops and their supplies could be rapidly and economically transported under the Channel without the least fear of enemy submarines. This would liberate part of the fleet and restore to the merchant marine a great number of its units. The advantages would be incalculable.

After the war, he declared, when commercial expansion would be renewed on each side, the allies would have to be solidly united to maintain their supremacy, the tunnel would acquire prime importance.
