

## GERMANS WANT DUTCH CANALS FOR SHIPPING

Demands Refused-Serious Crisis Arises-Turk Regiment has Mutinied-Germans Claim Success.

(Courtesy Hotel Rupert.) London, July 29.—Holland has refused Germany's demands for permission to use the Dutch canals in sending boats from Germany to Belgium, A serious crisis has arisen. Since the issuing of the orange book condemning Germany for the sinking of the Tubantia, feeling against the Germans has arisen and this latest demand that Holland repudiate her treaties and break her neutrality has brought matters to a head.

Germany is in similar trouble with Switzerland, that country having refused permission for the passing of German troops through Switzerland to aid the Austrians.




