RUSSIANS PRESSING CLOSER ON LEMBERG

DEUTSCHLAND PUTS TO SEA — FIVE HUNDRED CASUALTIES IN NEW ONTARIO

LEMBERG WILL BE ISOLATED BY RUSSIANS

Brussiloff Plans to cut off Kovel and Vladimir-Volynski from Lemberg — Austrian Collapse Likely.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 2.—General Brussiloff's strategy isolates the Germans and Austrians who are holding Kovel and Vladimir-Volynski. The Russian army is pressing closer to Lemberg from Brody and it is believed that it will compel a separation of the Austro-German armies. Military observers assert that, if Brussiloff can carry out his present plans, the result will be the complete demoralization and collapse of the Austrians who, even with German assistance, cannot hope to successfully oppose such a move.

Heavy Fighting.

A severe battle is raging on the western portion of the Russian front in the vicinity of the villages of Stoyva and Smolary. The Russians have inflicted heavy losses upon the enemy and have repulsed every German advance.

T. D. Pattullo, Liberal candidate for Prince Rupert district, today filed his nomination papers with M. M. Stephens, returning officer. The proposers were W. T. Kergin and Fred Stork, the nomination being assented to by P. W. Anderson, Martin O'Reilly and F. G. Dawson.

GERMANS FAIL BEFORE FRENCH MACHINE GUNS

German Trench Captured—Fierce Attacks Repulsed—Deutschland Sails—Cruisers Waiting.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, August 2.—South of the Somme the French have captured a German trench near Estrees. The Germans last night violently bombarded the French positions at Thiaumont and reached the French trenches but were compelled to retreat in face of a terrific barrage of machine gun fire.

It is estimated that the Germans have two million men on the western front. Many of the prisoners recently captured were boys of nineteen years of age.

Deutschland Departs.

Baltimore, August 2.—The German submarine Deutschland has departed. She must pass through a cordon of eight waiting Entente men-of-war. It is impossible that she can cut underneath them on account of the shallow water off Cape Henry. She must cross a heavy sand bar at that point, which, at the best, cannot give her more than sixty fathoms of water.

East Africa.

London, August 2.—British troops in German East Africa have again assumed the offensive, while the Belgian forces are also making progress. The port of Pangania has been captured and the booty includes four thousand head of cattle.

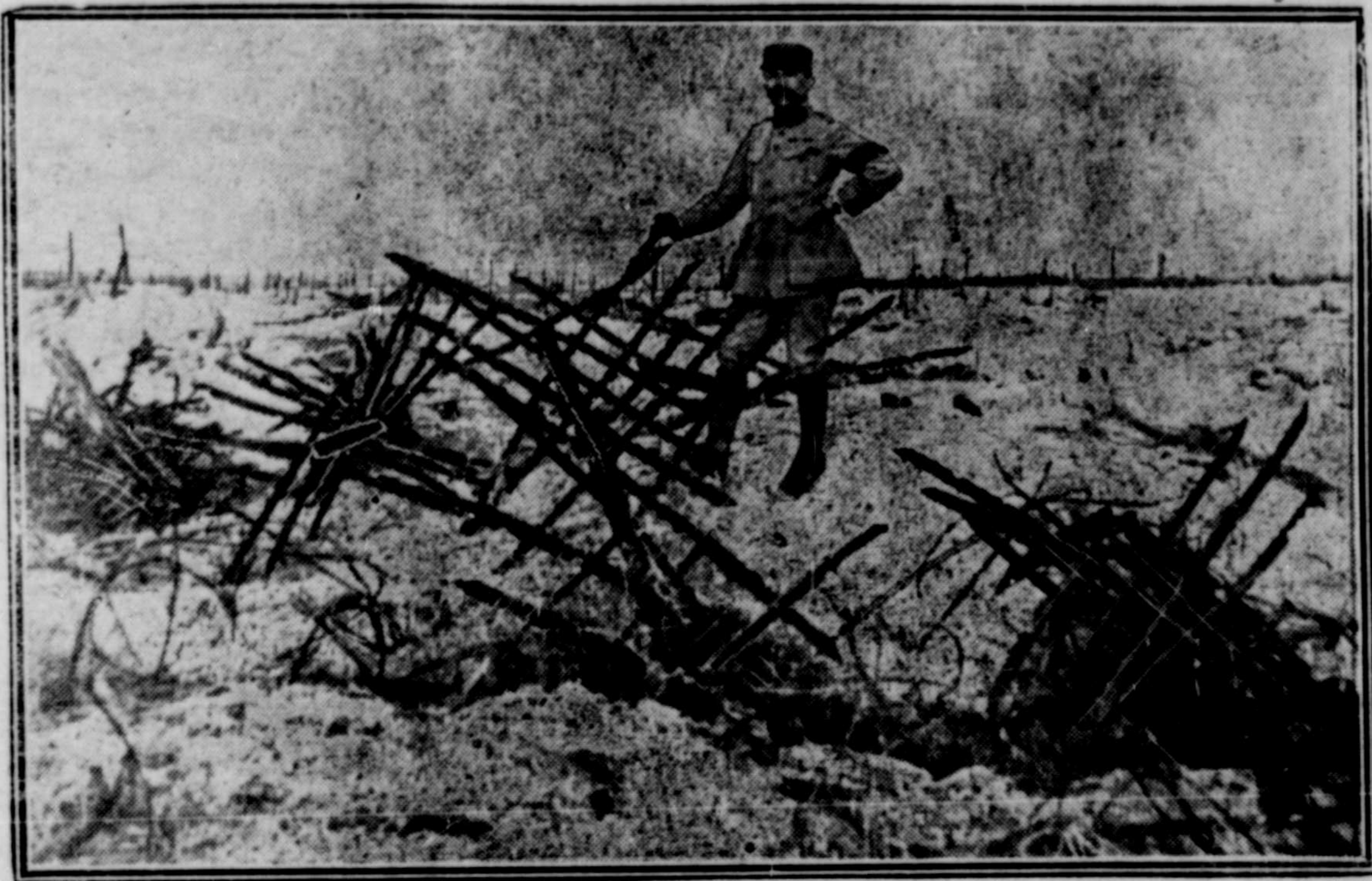

"RESOLVED: That on this, the second anniversary of the declaration of a righteous war, the citizens of Prince Rupert record their inflexible determination to continue to a victorious end the struggle in maintenance of those ideals of liberty and justice which are the common and sacred cause of the Allies."

As has been said before, the gathering is in no sense a celebration, but is simply the making of a renewal of the solemn vow taken by the citizens of the British Empire one year ago. All citizens are invited to join the parade at the city hall at 7:30 on Friday evening and to march in a body to the theatre.

A patriotic address will be delivered by Fred. Peters, K. C., and it is eminently fitting that the address on this occasion should be delivered by Mr. Peters. None in our midst has made greater sacrifices for the Empire in this war than have been made by Mr. and Mrs. Peters and their family. They have given one son; another is missing, and a third has rendered distinguished service to his King and country on the sea.

RE B. C. PROHIBITION ACT

WILL IT RESTRICT?

READ THIS "WIDE OPEN" CLAUSE OF THE ACT Section 57, Par. 2:

"Nothing in this Act shall be construed to interfere (a) With the right of any person to import from without the Province liquor for bona fide use in his private dwelling house.

Does not this clause provide for free and unrestricted importation of liquor with out (1) control by the Government, (2) Limitation as to the amount which may be ordered, (3) Restriction as to frequency of orders.

NOTE:—The prohibition legislation of Washington and Oregon allows liquor to be imported only under permits issued by the county authorities, the amount on each permit being limited to 2 qts. of spirits or 12 qts. of beer with only one permit to be issued every 20 days in Washington and every 28 days in Oregon. Despite these restrictions, Prohibitionists in both states say that the provisions for importing liquor are so broad as to make the legislation of no real value.

CAPTAIN DE MUSSEY KILLED AT VERDUN

Captain F. G. de Mussey was killed in front of Verdun on May 22nd. The sad news was conveyed to F. W. Doherty, manager of the Royal Bank, in a letter from Mrs. de Mussey. Captain de Mussey, who resided here for several years and was in partnership with H. A. Philpott, left for his native France immediately on the outbreak of the war, Mrs. de Mussey accompanying him. The captain saw much of the desperate fighting in the early stages of the war and at intervals cheery reports were received by friends in town. It will be with the greatest regret that citizens will hear of the gallant captain's death and the heartfelt sympathy of all will go out to Mrs. de Mussey in her bereavement.

DEAR PAPER MAKES SMALL NEWSPAPERS

New York, Aug. 2.—Publishers here have decided to decrease the number of pages in their morning, evening and Sunday issues in order to afford relief in the newspaper situation, through the steady advance in the price of paper and inks.

THOMAS HALL DIED AS RESULT OF FALL

Thomas Hall, a boilermaker with the G. T. P., who was admitted to the hospital yesterday afternoon suffering from a fractured skull, the result of a fall down the basement stairs at the Windsor Hotel, died during the night without having regained consciousness. Deceased was only a few weeks in town and leaves a widow and two children in Calgary. He was a member of St. George's Lodge, I. O. O. F., No. 39.

FIVE HUNDRED LIVES LOST IN TERRIBLE FIRE

Settlers Died Trying to Save Their Homes and Effects—Many Charred Bodies are Recovered.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Haileybury, Ont., August 2.—Though it is impossible to determine the exact loss of life resulting from the recent bush fires in New Ontario, it is expected that the casualties will reach five hundred. Relief parties from North Bay, Haileybury, Cobalt and Liskeard are searching for bodies and one hundred and thirty were recovered from one trench. They were badly charred and it is almost impossible to identify them. So fierce was the fire that the town of Matheson was entirely consumed in twenty minutes.

Settlers' Sacrifice.

Ottawa, August 2.—The over-anxiety of settlers to save their homes and personal effects was responsible for the exceptional number of deaths at Cochrane in the recent holocaust, according to the opinion of prominent railroad contractors who are familiar with Northern Ontario conditions.

THIRTY CARLOADS OF COPPER ARRIVED

The steamer Amur, which was recently purchased by the Griffiths Company for the Granby copper trade, arrived today from Anyox with thirty carloads of copper mat for shipment east. This precious metal has been arriving in single carloads up to the present and this will be the first occasion on which a whole train load of copper has gone east over the G. T. P.

SCOTT

The Journal seems to be immensely relieved by the fact that John T. Scott, in Seattle, has made the statement that Bowser was not the gentleman who financed him in his nefarious transactions in the Vancouver by-election. There seems to have been a deadly fear in the Tory mind as to what Scott would say. However, the outstanding fact as to who was responsible for the despicable work, which the Tories have striven in vain to foist on to the shoulders of M. A. Macdonald, remains to be discovered.

The first step in this direction is being taken by the Vancouver Liberals, just as the first step in the original investigation was taken by them. The Liberals do not wish to learn that the premier of the province was personally responsible for the crime, but they most decidedly wish to know exactly WHO was, not that they might make political capital out of such work, but that they might bring the miscreant to justice.

Bowser, by the issuing of a warrant for Scott's arrest at the time when his evidence was needed most and at a time when the scum of the Seattle jails was given exemption from any arrest, prevented Scott's appearance before the committee at Victoria. The attorney-general has been given one more opportunity to show that he is willing that justice should be done, and he cannot afford to ignore the offer, though it is couched in pretty strong language. If Bowser fails in his duty as attorney-general, as he has failed repeatedly and flagrantly in the past, he must stand condemned by his own action, or lack of it.

The Liberals will bring Scott back and they will get to the root of the matter, not in order that they may triumph over a political opponent, but that the fair name of Vancouver and of the province of British Colum-

bia may be cleared. Bowser has boasted loudly of his great regard for the fair name of the province, let him show that he has a real regard for that name. He has been content that, by allowing Scott to remain away from this country, the stigma of the whole miserable business should remain. Had Bowser known that Scott's evidence would implicate Mr. Macdonald or any other leading member of the Liberal party, Scott would have been brought back months ago. By keeping Scott out of the way, the Bowser campaign of insinuation could still be carried on with impunity, regardless of the consequences to the province. Even if Bowser does consent to the withdrawal of the warrant for Scott's arrest, he will do so, not that justice may be done, but because F. C. Wade has forced him to take action, which he should, as attorney-general, have taken long ere this.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Even at Prince George, where so much depends upon the rushing forward of the P. G. E. construction, the people are thoroughly convinced that H. C. Brewster took the only course when he issued the famous writ. The Prince George people want the P. G. E. completed, but they want it done at the least possible cost to the province and not in the haphazard, squander millions, Bowser fashion.

The logic of the News-Advertiser is past understanding. Dealing editorially with the magnificent action of the Canadian Cart-ridge Company in handing over its \$750,000 war profits to the government, it says that this action was taken as "a way of escape," as the government would have taken \$150,000 of the amount anyhow. In the Matsonian view, the cartridge company handed over \$750,000 in order to escape a tax of \$150,000. From this one may glean a faint idea of how this Matsonian organ ar-

RANKER TO GENERAL

Major-Gen. Sir William Robertson, Chief of the Imperial General Staff, Sir William began his military career as a ranker in the 16th Lancers, rising to be sergeant-major, after which he was gazetted second lieutenant in the 3rd Dragoon Guards in 1888. Most of his early campaigning was done in India and he set himself to acquire a wide knowledge of the native languages, which proved of inestimable value when he held the position of Staff Captain in the Intelligence Department at Simla from 1892 to 1896.

Sir William earned much distinction by his work with the Chitral Relief Forces and took part in the hardest of the fighting in that hill campaign, being severely wounded. In the South African war, he was one of the few officers who made a reputation and was afterward Commandant of the Staff College at Camberley, afterwards being made Director of Military Training. At the outbreak of the present war, he went to France as Quarter-master-General, and ultimately became General French's Chief of Staff, later being appointed right-hand man to Earl Kitchener at the War Office, where he is now chief military adviser. Sir William was born in the little village of Welbourn, in Lincolnshire, but his parents were Scotch and he is familiarly known in the army as "Wullie."

HOSPITALS COMMISSION AND RETURNED SOLDIERS

The Military Hospitals Commission has recommended to the Dominion government that free farms be given to all returned soldiers, the land to be within easy reach of transportation and suitable for dairying, cattle raising, poultry raising, fruit growing, etc. It is suggested that no

taxes be charged the first year and that the land be given entirely free, with a loan at a low rate of interest of an amount not exceeding \$1,350. It is also recommended that the land be partly cleared and fenced at the expense of the government and that a three months' course of training be given. All returned soldiers are to be eligible, irrespective of enlistment and length of service.

A son of a deceased or permanently disabled soldier will also be able to secure such land, as also will a widow or daughter of a deceased soldier.
