## BUSH FIRES STILL SPREADING IN ONTARIO

## MANY AIR BATTLES OVER WESTERN FRONT — FRENCH TAKE MORE PRISONERS

### SERIOUS FIRES STILL SPREAD IN NEW ONTARIO

Two More Towns Consumed—Nickel Refinery for Ontario—Ontario will take Referendum on "Dry" Term.

(Special to The Daily News.)

North Bay, Aug. 3.—The bush fires are spreading rapidly on both sides of the Temiskaming railway and the towns of McCool and Seskinika have been consumed. There are also serious conflagrations in the Morissette township and at the Miller Independent mine. The employees have been withdrawn from the mine and hundreds are seeking places of safety, fearing complete envelopment by the flames.

#### International Nickel.

Ottawa, August 3.—The International Nickel Company, of New Jersey, has secured a factory site at Port Colborne, Ontario, and is commencing immediately to construct a four million dollar refinery.

#### Ontario Prohibition.

Toronto, Aug. 3.—The Ontario government is discussing the practicability of submitting to a referendum the question of determining whether it is advisable to continue indefinitely the scheme of prohibition which becomes effective on September 14.

### CORONER'S INQUEST STANDS ADJOURNED

The remains of Thomas Hall have been removed to Hayner's Undertaking Parlors and are being prepared for shipment to Calgary. This forenoon an inquest was held before John Conway, coroner, the jury being composed of Ben Self, foreman; J. E. Morrison, T. A. Roy, W. Corley, E. E. Stilwell, and T. McMeekin. After viewing the body, the jury visited the Windsor Hotel where the accident occurred and then returned to the police office.

Dr. Eggert testified that death resulted from concussion on the brain, the base of the skull having been fractured, caused either by a heavy blow or a fall.

John Hughes, who followed deceased down the stairway, was next called, and Walter Scrymgeour were also examined. The hearing was adjourned until this afternoon.

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### 33 AEROPLANE ENCOUNTERS ON WESTERN FRONT

One German Plane Destroyed and Fourteen Damaged—French Make Gains on the Meuse—Germans also Gained.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 3.—On the Somme front yesterday there were thirty-three aeroplane encounters in which one enemy machine was destroyed and fourteen others damaged.

Attacking along a three mile front on the River Meuse, the French charged the German trenches and captured two hundred prisoners and ten machine guns.

#### German Gain.

North of the Verdun fortress, following a series of violent engagements in which they used asphyxiating gas, the Germans gained a little ground.

#### Strong Position Taken.

North of the Somme the French have captured a powerfully fortified German defence work between Hemwood and Monaco farm.

#### Casement Dies.

Sir Roger Casement was privately executed at nine this morning. Since he was condemned he embraced the Roman Catholic faith.

#### British Gains.

The Hotel Rupert bulletin says that the British have taken eleven German strongholds in the past month, taking 13,000 prisoners, while the Germans have lost 100,000 killed and wounded.

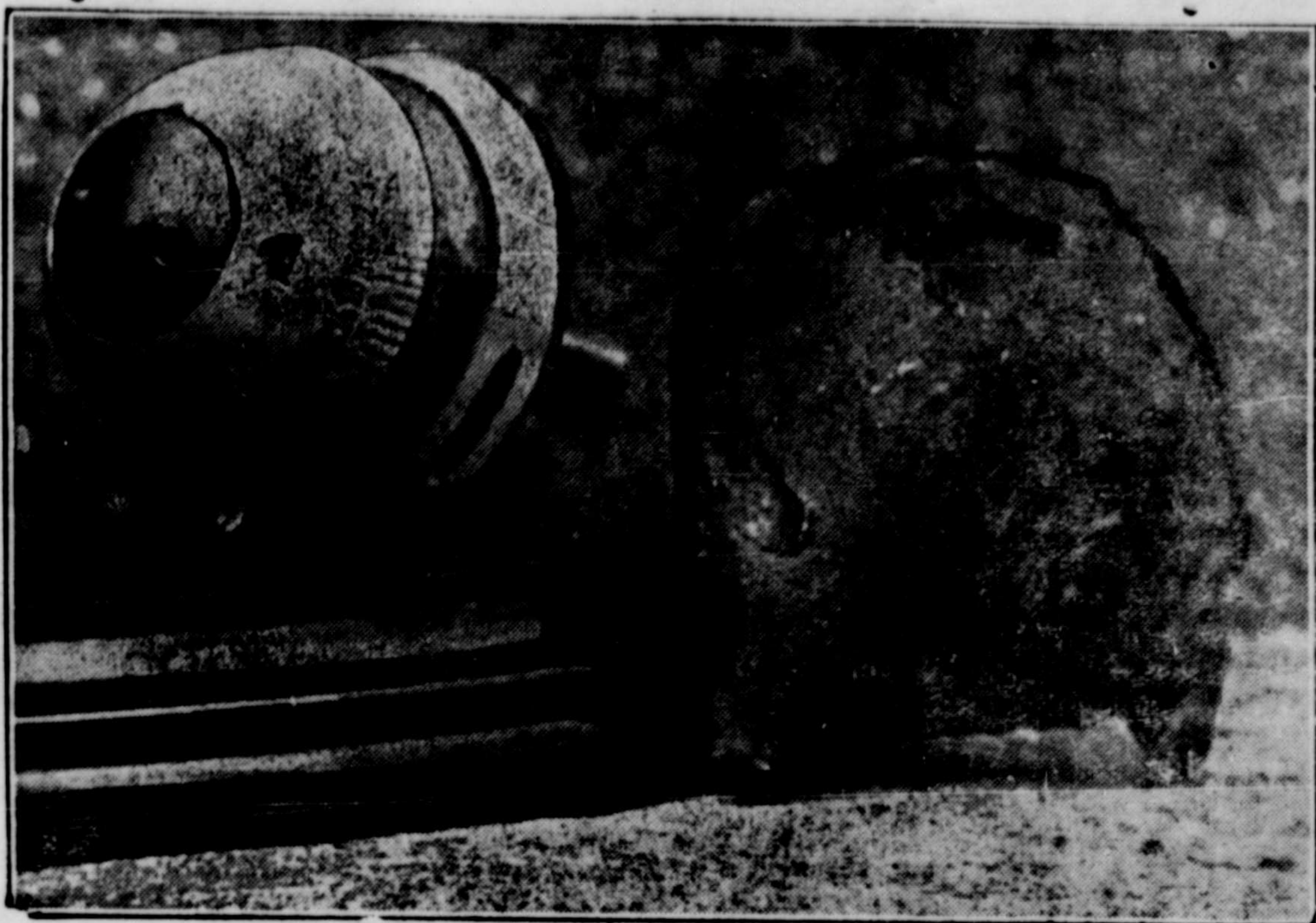

### HUDSON'S BAY WILL FIGHT PROHIBITION

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 3.—Governor Kindersley, presiding at the annual meeting of the Hudson's Bay Company, recommended a distribution of five per cent. on the ordinary shares, respecting land receipts, and fifteen per cent. accruing from the profits on other trades. Mr. Kindersley announced that it is the intention of the company to resort to legislation against the provincial governments in regard to the recent infringement of the company's chartered liquor rights through the measures of prohibition passed in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta.

### ITALIANS AND RUSSIANS ARE PROGRESSING

Comparative Quiet on Main Front—Steady Advance in Caucasus—Italians Repel Enemy Attacks.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, August 3.—There is comparative quiet on the main Russian front, the fighting being confined to artillery duels and infantry attacks by small detachments.

#### Caucasus Front.

Since the occupation of Erzingan the Russians in the Caucasus continue to hammer the Turks and are advancing gradually.

#### Italian Front.

Rome, August 3.—The Italians continue to make progress and have repulsed Austrian attacks on Monte Cimone, Monte Seluggio and Castellations.

#### Deutschland Gone.

Norfolk, Va., August 3.—The German submarine Deutschland has passed the Virginia Capes apparently unobserved. Everything indicates that she has escaped the Allied warships which were lying in wait for her.

#### Attack on Durazzo.

The Rupert Hotel bulletin says that nine Italian aeroplanes attacked Durazzo, doing great damage. One plane was brought down and captured. Two Austrian destroyers attacked the Italian port of Bisceglie, doing little damage.

### TUGWELL CAMPERS RETURNED YESTERDAY

Tugwell Island camp broke up yesterday and about seventy sunburnt, happy youngsters arrived at the government wharf yesterday afternoon. They lined up on the wharf and gave three hearty cheers for the citizens who so kindly provided launches, camping outfit, cooking utensils and supplies. They are loud in their praise of Rev. W. W. Wright, who took care of the boys while in camp, and also E. H. Maynard, who had charge of the culinary operations, which was no light job. The boys have benefitted from their ten days' open air life while they have also learned something of discipline, under happy conditions.

Hon. V. Winkler, minister of agriculture in the Manitoba government, went south yesterday. Mr. Winkler states that the crops on the prairies are in splendid condition and that all that is needed now is good harvesting conditions. He will return home via Prince Rupert.

## WAR SITUATION

While the French and the British have done a tremendous amount of dogged fighting on the western front, the Russians in the east have provided the most spectacular warfare. Early in the war they made rapid progress into Galicia and the enemy seemed unable to stop them. Then came the turning point, when the Germans sat down behind their concrete trenches in France and Flanders and sent all their reserves to the east to aid the Austrians in driving back the Slav invader. How they succeeded is well known. The Russians were far from their supply bases, their organization was incomplete and, most important of all, they did not have the guns nor the ammunition.

All winter, the bear seemed to sleep, but he was really busy laying his plans for the spring. The Grand Duke, who had proven a master in retreat, was sent to lead against the Turks and new commanders were appointed for the Russian central army, while the Czar himself took the position of commander-in-chief. Since spring came, the Russians have performed miracles. Ample supplied with Japanese guns and ammunition, they opened the most terrific bombardment of the war. Evidently satisfied that they had Russia at their mercy, and with much business to attend to elsewhere, the Germans had left the Austrians to take care of the centre. This they were entirely incapable of doing, against the fierce onslaughts of the Russians.

Today, under General Brusiloff, the Czar's army is climbing back to the position it attained early in the war, but with this great difference, it is back to stay. It is better equipped than the enemy and it is a victorious army, while the enemy is today little better than a beaten horde. If, as the latest reports state, General Brusiloff is able to cut in between the Austro-German

armies defending Kovel and Vladimir-Volynski and that which is falling back upon Lemberg, the end of serious opposition on this important front is now very clearly in sight. The fall of Lemberg should be simply a matter of days, and then on to Grodek and Przemyśl, neither of which places will now occasion the weeks of bombardment which were necessary in the first attack. With Przemyśl in Russian hands, the Dukla pass through the Carpathians will be once more open to our allies and from that point there may be very little resistance. There are seventy thousand Turks reported in Hungary to help stem the invasion, but by the time the real invasion on Hungary has begun, neither Austrian, Hungarian nor Turk will have any relish for much further fighting.

This great Russian advance is certain to have a tremendous effect upon the spirit of the German troops on the western front, if they are allowed to receive any of the reports, which is unlikely. In any case, the situation places Berlin in a desperate plight. Strong reinforcements must be sent to the eastern front and these are just as badly needed to stop the Anglo-French advance on the Somme front, where the Allies are now clear of the heavy German defence works and are driving the enemy into more open country. The big squeeze is undoubtedly on. There is not so much talk of the war being over this fall, but the real question now is not so much one of when it will end, but where it will end. Will there be any fighting on German soil? Will Germany persevere against ever growing odds, after Austria has been completely beaten? Berlin is fighting to the bitter end. The one end must be unconditional surrender by the Germans and that

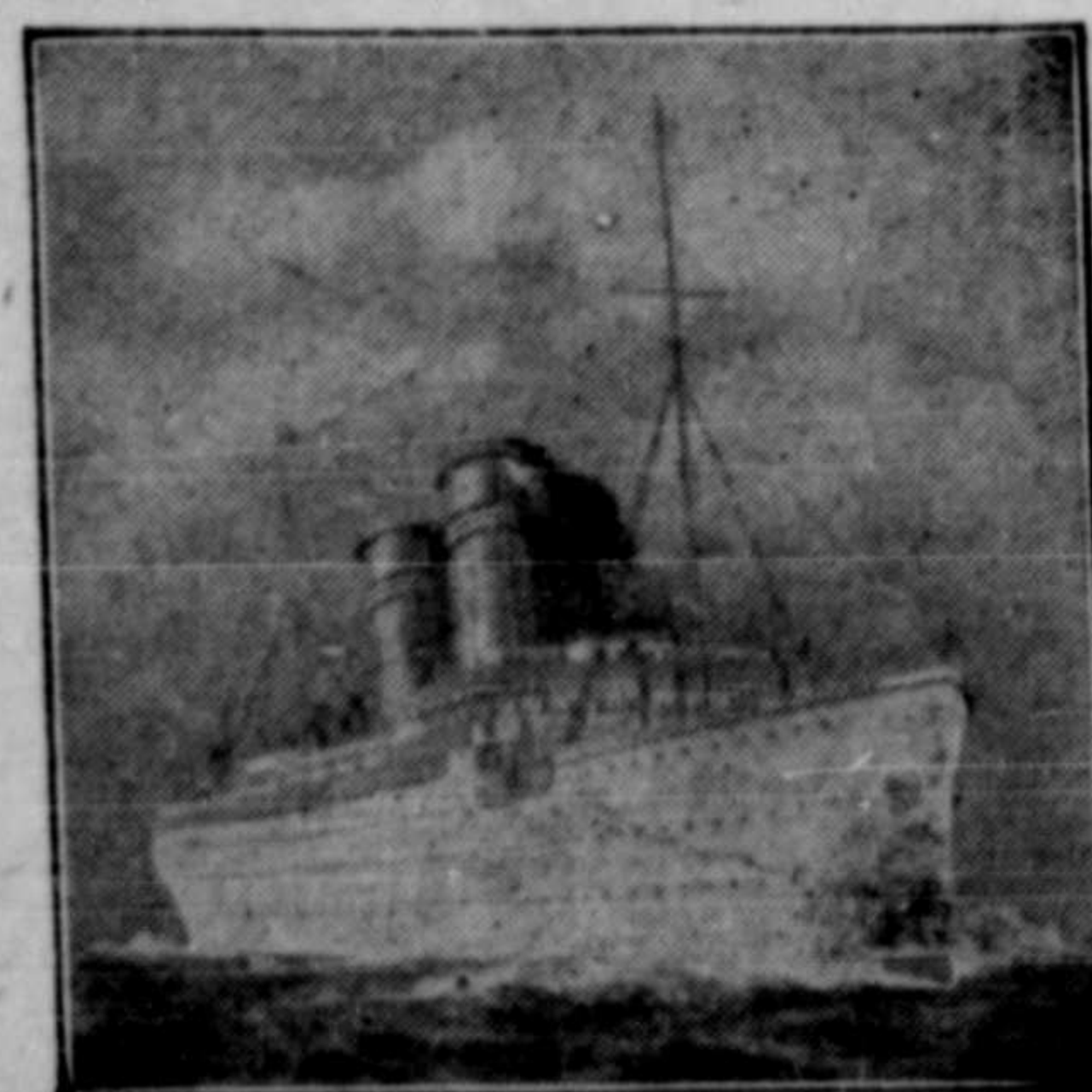
