BRITISH COMMANDERS PRAISE CANADIANS

FRENCH AND BRITISH AVIATORS VERY BUSY — FRENCH RECAPTURE FLEURY

JELICOE AND HAIG PRAISED THE CANADIANS

Commanders Say Triumph Certain for Allies—Measure to Abolish Poverty in Britain.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 5.—Admiral Sir John Jellicoe, in command of the Grand Fleet, and General Sir Douglas Haig, commanding the British forces on the western front, on the second anniversary of the war have forwarded messages of congratulation to the Canadian forces for their bravery on the field, and both leaders expressed supreme confidence in the ultimate triumph of the Allies.

To Abolish Poverty.

The parliamentary correspondent of the Daily Express reports that the government is considering measures for the abolition of preventable poverty in Great Britain. This statement explains certain passages in Premier Asquith's speech at the recent economic conference in Paris.

Sam Hughes Reviews.

German Food Conditions.

Berlin, August 5.—Germany officially declares that the food situation is quite satisfactory and that a splendid organization for the distribution of supplies and the storing of provisions enables the government to overcome the unfavorable conditions of the past year, without any serious derangement of the mode of life of the population.

ALLIED AIRMEN MAKE BIG RAIDS ON WEST FRONT

Tons of Bombs Dropped on Vital Spots in Enemy Lines—Russians will not Pay—Russians Advancing.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, August 5.—Repulsing fierce German attacks, the French have recaptured Fleury by a great bayonet charge. South of Peronne, the French have succeeded in destroying an enemy captive balloon which was a most efficient look-out for the Germans.

Air Fighting.

Thirty-four aeroplanes bombarded the German lines in the region of Verdun, dropping thirty-two bombs on Steanay station and eighty-four on Montmedy and Sedan stations and also on German bivouacs in the district of Damvillers.

British Raids.

London, August 5.—British naval aeroplanes dropped two tons of bombs on the German aerodrome and ammunition sheds at Ghent and also on an Austrian location at Meirielbeke.

Brussels Refuses.

Brussels has refused payment of the fine of five million marks imposed by the German government in consequence of the celebration held by the citizens on the Belgian National holiday.

Russians Advance.

Petrograd, Aug. 5.—The enemy is desperately attempting to prevent the Russian advance upon Kovel.

General Sakharoff's army is progressing towards Lemberg and has captured thirteen hundred Austrians.

AUTO BANDITS GET AWAY WITH BIG SUM

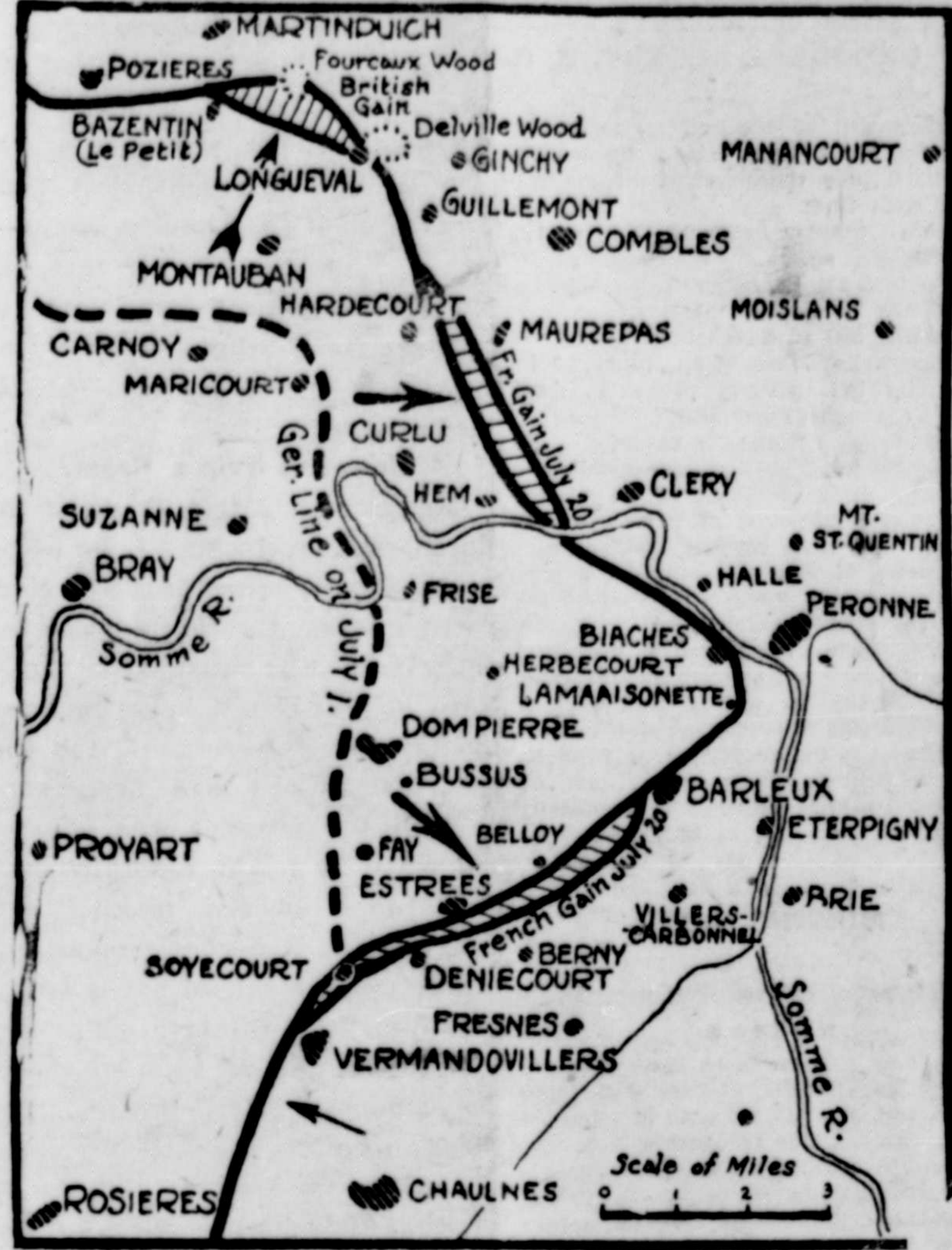

BOWSER SILENT ON WADE'S CHALLENGE

Although nearly a week has elapsed since Mr. F. C. Wade, K. C., made his sweeping challenge to Premier Bowser for the latter to accompany him to Seattle and there endeavor to induce John T. Scott to return here and tell what he knows regarding the plugging charges in the last by-election, the premier, despite his publicly professed anxiety to have this matter sifted, has shown absolutely no disposition to accept Mr. Wade's defi. Ample time has now elapsed for the premier to arrange for that trip if he had any intention of taking up Mr. Wade's challenge, and the premier's silence on the subject can only be taken as an indication that his actions belie his words on this matter of clearing up the plugging charges.

The premier was yesterday confronted with a proposal, made by Mr. William Steers, a local barrister, in the course of an interview in Victoria, Mr. Steers suggesting that the premier grant Scott immunity in the event of all he knows about the plugging charges under oath. Mr. Steers also asked that, in the event of Scott returning and giving evidence, that he be allowed to cross-examine Scott as fully as the

POWERFUL PATRIOTIC ADDRESS DELIVERED BY FRED. PETERS, K. C.

WESTHOLME THEATRE PACKED AT WAR ANNIVERSARY GATHERING LAST EVENING—"GO ON, STOP NOT" WAS TEXT OF STIRRING SPEECH—"HONOR, HONESTY AND TRUTH" BASIS OF EMPIRE

Rain interfered considerably with the patriotic parade last evening and the ladies of the Daughters of the Empire and of the Red Cross Society are to be congratulated upon the showing they made under rather unpleasant conditions. A special word of praise is also due to the cadets for their splendid bugle work while leading the procession, headed by J. R. Beatty. Fred. Peters, K. C., accompanied by our returned soldiers came next and Mayor McCaffery and the aldermen followed, with the various societies of the city next and the fire brigade bringing up the rear, with the engines decorated for the occasion.

Shortly after the doors were opened, the Westholme Theatre was filled. The building was draped with Union Jacks, Canadian, Scotch and Irish flags, while the platform carried the colors of the Allies, with a huge Canadian flag as background, while portraits of the King and Queen, the Duke of Connaught and the late Earl Kitchener occupied prominent positions, with the emblem of the I. O. D. E. in the centre. To the right of the stage stood Prince Rupert's Roll of Honor, which has grown to double its size of last year. Messrs. H. A. Harvey, Louis Amadio and H. Fletcher, of the Westholme Theatre, had spared no pains in the decorating of the theatre. While the audience gathered, an orchestra composed of P. C. Daugherty, H. A. Harvey, G. A. Woodland, James Lee and J. W. Collier rendered a selection of patriotic airs.

In opening the proceedings, Mayor McCaffery reminded the citizens that in every city and every hamlet throughout the Empire citizens were gathered together to reiterate their faith in British arms and to renew the resolution to carry the war to a successful conclusion. He shortly sketched the history of the war, showing how Britain sought to avoid conflict and how gallant little Belgium had held the foe at bay until the Allies, who were unprepared, had time to arm. "Thank God, we can point with pride tonight to the part Britain has played," said the mayor. He then traced the work accomplished by our navy, culminating in the battle of Jutland, and went on to trace the marvellous creation of Kitchener's army from a mere nothing to an army which today is second to none. He described the building up of this great army as something which the writers of history could barely do justice to. He referred feelingly to the Roll of Honor. "Were it not for those men and their like, there could be no victory for British arms," he said. "It is a revelation to us to find men whom we know as citizens, going forth to lead a

charge in fact of what they knew to be almost certain death," he continued, "and I ask you here tonight to pledge yourselves with me that the widows and children of those who have sacrificed themselves shall be cared for." He then dwelt briefly upon the great work done by the Russians in the east and the French and British in the west, the result of which must be victory. "It must be a victory that will leave no place for the piracy of nations," he concluded, "amidst ringing cheers.

In introducing Fred. Peters, K. C., the speaker of the evening, Mayor McCaffery said that he did not know of any gentleman in the province who had a better right and greater ability to deal with the subject.

Mr. Peters' Address.

Mr. Peters said that on this awful day he had nothing good to say of our enemies. The resolution to be passed that night would be passed on tens of thousands of platforms throughout the Empire and it was framed that the voice of the people, and not the voice of any government or ruler might be heard. Its message is "Go on, stop not," said the speaker.

For two years we had been fighting two nations who had been preparing for forty years. Britain has learned how to beat them, and had Britain been prepared two years before, there would have been no war. He described the Germans as cowards, not but that they were utter cowards in the treatment of prisoners and non-combatants. In support of his contention, he quoted instances of the mutilation of children; the crucifixion of Canadian soldiers; the poisoning of water pools in Africa; the sinking of the Lusitania; Zeppelin raids on defenceless towns; the looting of Belgium; the murder of Nurse Cavell, and of Captain Fryatt. He would like to see Berlin treated as Jerusalem was, and old Joshua made the judge of the Germans. The whole nation should be punished and it should start with the hanging of the Kaiser, who has been indicted for murder. He said that Berlin should be treated as the Romans treated Carthage, tearing the city down and sowing salt that nothing should grow there.

THE STRUGGLE

In spite of rumors to the contrary, the election fight in this district has resolved itself into a straight contest between William Manson and T. D. Pattullo. There were repeated rumors from the south that Mr. Manson would have much preferred to have contested Nanaimo rather than the northern constituency, and there is good reason to believe that there was ground for the reports, as it is no secret that the Conservatives at headquarters look upon the Prince Rupert contest as something even more desperate than a forlorn hope. H. B. Thompson and the other Tories who recently toured the north made up their minds weeks ago that Willie is doomed to defeat, and, at the Bowser meeting, Mr. Manson's countenance told much more clearly than words ever could, that he knew it was all over but the cheering.

The contest will not be strictly a party one, as, politically speaking, British Columbia is in the melting pot, and the old party lines have been obliterated. True Conservatives have long since awakened to the fact that what has been masquerading as Conservative in this province is a thing unworthy of such a name. One has only to read the letters and speeches of Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper to realize the kind of a struggle we are to have. All that is best in genuine Conservatism will unite with the Liberals, and the men of independent thought, to throttle forever the thing called Bowserism, which has had British Columbia by the throat, or rather by the pockets, for years past.

T. D. Pattullo is the Liberal representative, but he is much more. He stands for all that is best in politics in this part of the province and he is out determined to kill all that is worst. He will have the whole-hearted support of many men who have never cast a Liberal vote in their lives, and William

Manson will go down to sure and certain defeat, just as C. E. Tisdall and A. C. Flummerfelt did. William Manson's defeat will not be a personal defeat so much as a conquering of Bowserism, and he will go down for what he represents rather than for what he is. This province will have no more of Bowserism and therefore no more of William Manson.

With affairs financial and industrial at their lowest ebb, with a formidable load of debt and railroad obligations to be met, H. C. Brewster, as the new premier, has no enviable situation to face, but he has a stout heart and sterling character, and the re-building of British Columbia is in safe hands. With H. C. Brewster at the helm and men of the stamp of T. D. Pattullo to support him, the people of this province may look forward confidently to the future. The day of squandering millions is over and the day of real progress is at hand. Every of a JJJJJel awaiJJ flacc. . . s department in Victoria will require careful overhauling and it will be done impartially and thoroughly. A full enquiry into the P. G. E. situation will be necessary, though such an enquiry has been refused point-blank by Bowser, for obvious reasons. The day when an attorney-general can represent the people on the one side and an applicant for public funds on the other, is over. There is much to be done, and T. D. Pattullo will be able to render invaluable assistance in the doing of it.

BOWSER FROZEN OUT IN CARIBOO DISTRICT

Harper's Camp, B. C., Aug. 1.—Premier Bowser was either sadly misled or else showed the same contempt for the intelligence of his audience here as elsewhere in his remarks, which still afford material for amused and unflattering comment at his expense.

"I am the only man who can manage the affairs of British Columbia," he told the people at his meeting here in his egotistic way. "I am the only man in the Dominion of Canada who can borrow money in the markets of the world on provincial credit."

Resent Attitude.

The premier also called Mr. Brewster a lunatic. A month after he made these statements, the people are still resentful at being treated as if they had no common sense. As a matter of fact, the men in the mining camps and the settlers as a whole, are as well informed on public affairs as city electors are.

Bowser's Trip a Frost.

Mr. Bowser's trip through the north was a frost, as is being learned from place to place, notwithstanding the highly colored reports in his subsidized press. Here he would not have had any meeting if it were not for the Liberals. Word had been sent in that the premier was coming but when he got here nothing had been done toward making arrangements. Robert Campbell and others got the school house ready and John R. Williams, one of the oldest miners here, took the chair. As soon as Mr. Bowser got through he left the hall hurriedly and the other seakers also rushed what they had to say. No opportunity was given for questions. Although Mr. Williams was in the chair then, his parting words to Mr. Brewster this morning were, "my hearty good wishes for complete victory for you."

but of the people, for the people rule in this country, is 'We will stick to this war just as long as you will stick to it and we will not give up until victory comes,' said Mr. Peters. He hoped the time was not far distant when the words of the Psalmist could be applied to the Kaiser, "He made a pit and digged it and has fallen into the ditch which he made. His mischief shall return upon his own head and his violent dealing shall come down upon his own pate and all the people said Amen."

To Our Enemies.

"Our message to our enemies is, 'That we are not too proud to fight.' We are hard to make fight, but when compelled to fight when our honor is at stake, and the honor of smaller countries, which we are bound to protect, is at stake, then we are too proud to stop fighting."

To Neutral Friends.

To our neutral friends our message is, "Just for the present we do not want the interference of anybody." This was said in no spirit of "jingoism," but came straight from the heart of a man who has suffered, but suffered nobly for a just and righteous cause. He said, "This voice comes from families that are broken; from the households of vacant chairs, some never to be filled; some to be filled with cripples; some for long to remain shrouded under the anxiety breeding word 'missing'."

The Future.

Going on to deal with the future of the Empire, Mr. Peters eloquently described the tie which binds the Dominions to the Mother Land, as a "cord of sentiment." The war had proven the strength

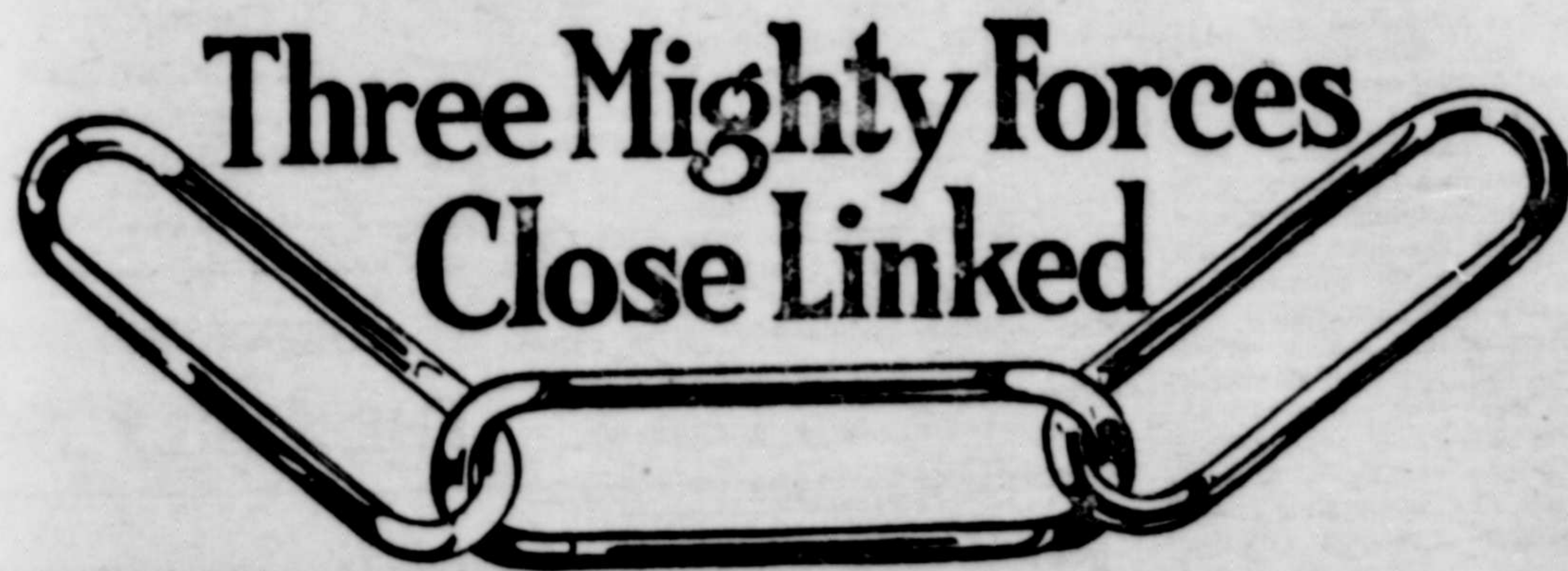
