DESTRUCTION WROUGHT BY BRITISH AIRMEN

GERMAN MUNITIONS DEPOTS EXPLODED -- TURKS DRIVEN FROM SUEZ CANAL

BRITISH AIRMEN WRECK GERMAN MUNITION DEPOT

Concussion Felt Nine Thousand Feet up—Motors, Barges and Train Were Wrecked—Hungary Wants Peace

(Special to The Daily News.)

British Headquarters, France, August 8.—The British air raid on the German ammunition depots and store houses yesterday was highly successful. Aviators nine thousand feet in the air experienced the concussion following the destruction by the British aeroplanes of the German store houses at Martinpuich. The smoke ascended to a height of eight thousand feet.

The same brigade also destroyed barges, motor trucks and a moving German freight train.

Enemy Planes Destroyed.

British aviators also bombarded the railway station at Opicina, destroying several German aeroplanes.

Hungary Wants Peace.

Count Karolevi, leading the opposition in the House of Deputies, is making a vigorous effort to force a separation of the Austrian and Hungarian armies, to enable Hungary to sue for a separate peace.

HUGHES HAS STARTED PRESIDENTIAL FIGHT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Detroit, August 8.—Charles E. Hughes, the Republican candidate for the Presidency, visited various parts of this city today and addressed forty prominent manufacturers representing a hundred thousand workers.

PROPOSED INCREASE IN MARKET COMMISSION

At the city council last night, Ald. McRae introduced a bylaw to increase the commission on goods sold at the city market from 7 1/2 per cent. to 10 per cent., the extra 2 1/2 per cent. to go to the city to cover interest on invested capital. It was moved by Ald. Nelson and seconded by Ald. Dybbavn that the bylaw be read a second time next Monday.

Ald. Casey wanted to know Ald. McRae's reasons for the change. He thought that the market was doing well and that it should be given a fair trial under the present system. He thought it unwise, particularly at the present time, to make any change which tended to increase the cost of living.

Ald. Montgomery supported the contention, Ald. McRae said that the whole matter was tentative and would be fully discussed next Monday, the Aldermen meantime having a week in which to go into the matter.

BREWSTER AND TUPPER SEND JOINT MESSAGE TO B. C. FORCES

LIBERAL LEADER AND SIR CHAS. HIBBERT TUPPER ADDRESS MANIFESTO TO CANADIAN SOLDIERS AND SAILORS EMPOWERED TO VOTE—CALL FOR CLEAN GOVERNMENT IN B. C.

Vancouver, August 5.—For the first time in Canada's history a manifesto has been sent by a political leader to Canadian soldiers and sailors serving in the defence of the Empire. And it is a Manifesto lofty in tone, simple and direct in appeal and carrying conviction in every line of the need for a clean government and able administrators to handle the many difficult problems that will arise in this province both during the continuance of the present world-strife and afterwards when peace follows the Allies' victory.

A joint message to the British Columbia forces, naval and military, in connection with the coming provincial elections, signed by Mr. H. C. Brewster, leader of the Liberal party in British Columbia, and Sir Charles Hubbert Tupper, K. C., who, although an avowed Conservative, is an apostle of clean government above all things, has been addressed to British Columbia military and naval forces empowered to vote under the "Military Forces Voting Act."

In view of the fact that from next Monday on until September 14, the British Columbia forces who are on active service, either afloat or ashore, in Canada, Bermuda, and the United Kingdom, will have the right to exercise their franchise, the appeal is a timely one. It emphasizes the fact that the coming campaign is not a fight of party but of the people against official wrong doing, and is as follows:—

"Representing as we believe the public sentiment of the province, we extend this message. To you is given the opportunity of offering your manhood in the defence of our country and the preservation of its institutions and its ideals. To us at home falls the duty of maintaining those ideals and institutions in a way worthy of your splendid sacrifices. In the performance of this duty we believe a united effort should be made by the lovers of clean government and efficient administration, both Liberals and Conservatives, to drive from office the men who are misgoverning our province. Proud as we would be to take our place beside you on the field and to offer our services and our lives in the country's cause, we are precluded by circumstances from discharging that splendid duty. May our lesser part be performed equally well. The least that we can do is to strain every effort towards the improvement of public conditions, so that we may welcome you home to a province cleansed of all that is evil, mean and sordid, and blessed with high ideals and good government. You will exercise your franchise with nothing but the most sincere desire for the welfare of British Columbia. We do not propose to discuss the issues upon which the future of the province depends, nor will we seek to influence you by promises. You have long known the record of the present government. Their tenure of office has been marked by extravagance, incompetency and wholesale corruption. A chance is now afforded to save British Columbia as you are rescuing unhappy Belgium. It is not a fight of party but of the people against official wrong-doing. It is a fight in which not only all Liberals but many Conservatives are united.

What Do Legislators Say About The B. C. Prohibition Act?

H. C. BREWSTER (Liberal Leader)
"I am surprised we are not asked to pass an Act that will actually prohibit."

"There are many features of this legislation that are not in the best interests of our people. As an example, I refer to the burden of proof which should not be on the accused in this Act, because this is a wrong and un-British principle."

MR. PARKER WILLIAMS (Socialist)
"I am willing to vote for Prohibition that will prohibit, but not for such a lop-sided, jug-handled imitation such as the present bill."
"I am surprised to hear that the Prohibitionists are satisfied with the terms of an Act which permits any man to import liquor into the Province by wholesale."

MR. H. B. THOMPSON (Conservative)
"There is nothing like Prohibition in the Bill. It will not diminish the consumption of alcoholic beverages, but will increase purchase of strong liquor."
"Its very name is counterfeit, and to the elector who may desire a real prohibitory measure, it is a 'Gold Brick' of the most pronounced type."

BRITISH HAVE DRIVEN TURKS INTO DESERT

Enemy Cleared out of Canal Zone—Turkish Women Demanding Peace—Treaty with Persia.

London, August 8.—The British have driven the Turkish force, which attacked the Suez Canal region, back into the desert for a distance of eighteen miles. The enemy has been completely cleared out of the Katia Umaishi basin.

Turkish Women Appeal.

Rome, August 8.—An unconfirmed statement is to hand that the Turkish cabinet has fallen and that Moslem women are besieging the war ministry demanding peace.

Persian Treaty.

Petrograd, August 8.—Britain and Russia have just arrived at an understanding with Persia, creating an entente which will be the means of definitely strengthening the friendly relations between the three countries.

RUSSIAN BEAR REACHING OUT FOR LEMBERG

Brussilloff Draws Steadily Nearer Goal—Italians Rendered Aid in Russian Drive—Sub. Sighted.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 8.—The Russians, under General Brussilloff, are steadily drawing nearer to Lemberg. The railway is the only remaining avenue of supplies for Von Bothmer's army and that is very liable to be cut off shortly.

It now transpires that the Italian contribution to the Russian offensive was a million rifles from the factories of Turin, shipped to Russia via Port Arthur, in Manchuria, Vladivostok, and Archangel. This supply of rifles, added to the big guns provided by the Japanese, enabled Russia to inaugurate the successful drive in Galicia.

Submarine Sighted.

Portland, Maine, Aug. 8.—Another submarine has been sighted. It is probably the Bremen, the sister ship of the Deutschland, which has been at sea for several weeks and was believed to have been captured by the Allies.

DESPERATELY CLINGING

Opportunities for political corruption of the lowest order are opened by the British Columbia Government in providing for the taking of absent soldiers' votes. The Bowser Government has been riding for a fall. To the dullest comprehension the result of an era of extravagance and fiscal debauchery must have seemed inevitable. The fruition of prodigality was only a question of time. War may have hastened the natural culmination, but had no other influence in creating the conditions from which the public are suffering. The people who have learned in the most costly school how easily and simply they have been deceived are naturally indignant. Although a change of Government will not bring back what has been wasted, it is their only resource, and it will avert all danger of similar follies during the near future. It is to avert the consequences of political escapades that the scheme of taking the votes of men under arms, with minds concentrated on other affairs, has been devised.

The desperate plight of the Government and the eagerness to cling to office give the worst possible aspect to the opportunities for corruption and juggling that have been opened. The vote will be taken by agents of the Government under conditions which make manipulation easy. The provision for scrutiny during the counting is little more than a pretence, for it will be easy to influence the voters and manipulate the votes before the stage of counting under scrutiny arrives. It is a last desperate chance of discredited politicians, and in such circumstances everyone knows what opportunity means. The opportunity has been provided.

Provision for taking the vote has been made by the British War Department. Nominations will be made in British Columbia on August 3 and elections

held on September 14, the lapse of six weeks being provided to make polling abroad on election day possible. The Act providing for military voting declares that such voting shall not continue later than the first day on which any poll is held in the Province. It must end on September 14, although it may begin any time after Aug. 3, the day on which the names of nominees must be cabled to the Agent-General in London. Counting the vote is delayed, and must take place between October 12 and 26. The result of the British part of the vote will not be known until at least four weeks after polling in the province.

These peculiar delays were provided when it was thought Government agents would be allowed to hunt for voters in Belgium, France, Italy, and other countries where they might be found. The War Department has wisely restricted the collection of votes to the United Kingdom, Bermuda and various places in Canada. Needless delay is the result of misconception regarding the possibility of canvassing the trenches, the military hospitals and other places in Europe, Asia, and Africa where voters might be found. As it is, there will be the demoralization of a six-weeks' canvass among the men in Britain. The most lamentable and discouraging feature is the opportunity for manipulation provided by a government in desperate straits, on a pretence of anxiety regarding the political rights and duties of men at the front. 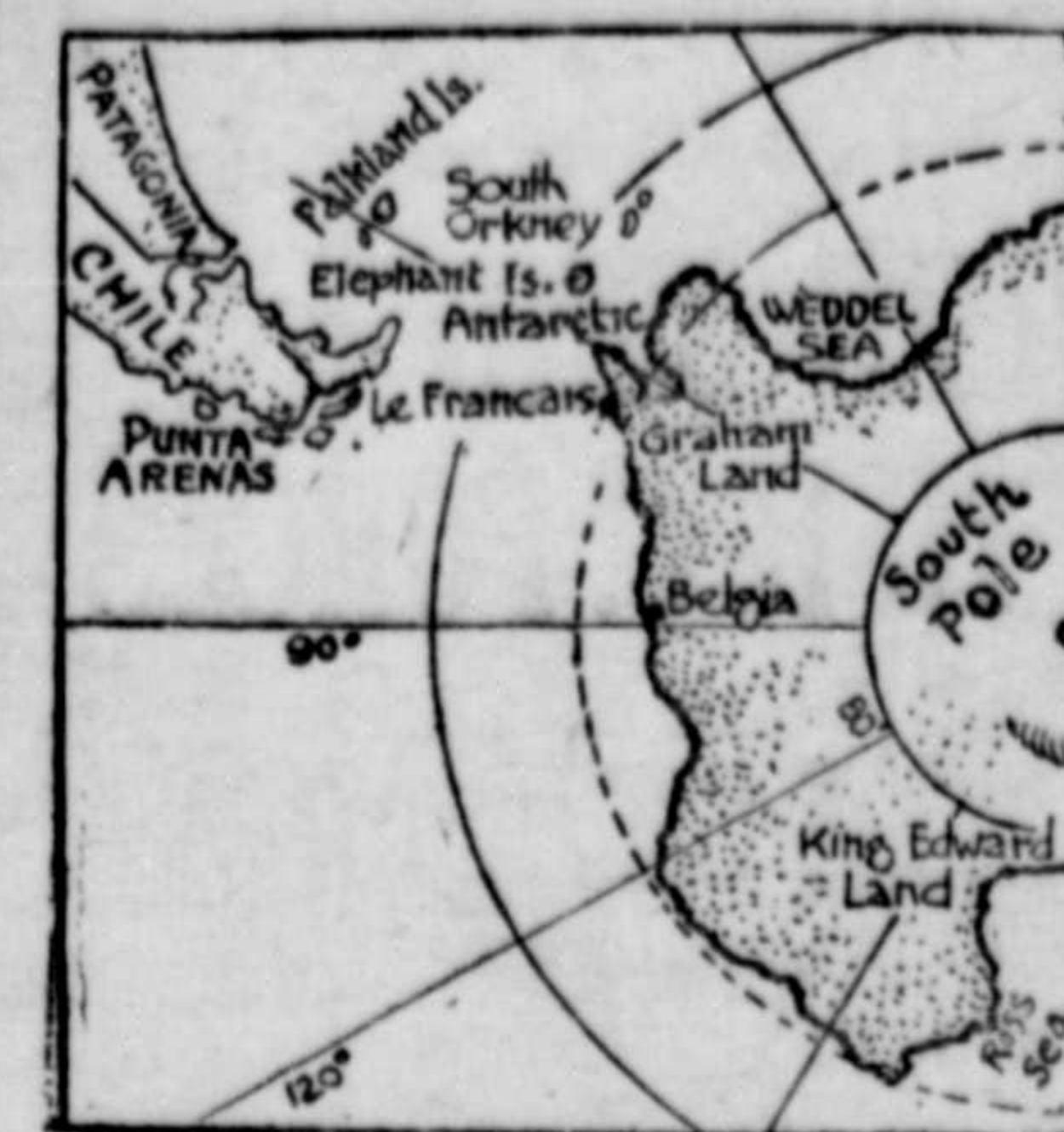

SHACKLETON BEATEN BACK

The accompanying map shows the route taken by Sir Ernest Shackleton in his effort to reach his companions on Elephant Island. Sir Ernest reached Punta Arenas some time ago and outfitted a relief expedition, with the assistance of the Uruguay government. The ship was too light for the task; low temperatures were encountered and the ship became covered with ice. Sir Ernest has been forced to return to Port Stanley, and if the weather moderates he will make another attempt to rescue his men.
