ITALIANS TAKE TEN THOUSAND PRISONERS

EVACUATION OF LEMBERG IMMINENT -- FRENCH SUCCESSES ON SOMME FRONT

AUSTRIANS ARE PREPARING TO LEAVE LEMBERG

Italians Capture Ten Thousand Austrians on Isonzo Front—Great Enthusiasm—Vienna Admits Defeat.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 9.—According to a Bucharest telegraphic exchange, a proclamation foreshadowing the surrender of Lemberg has been issued. The civilian population has been ordered to evacuate the city and the understanding is that the Austrians will later return to contest Russia's strength and to make an effort to retain the city.

10,000 Prisoners.

On the Isonzo front, immediately following the hurried transfer of Austrian troops to the Russian front, the Italians resumed their violent offensive and captured ten thousand prisoners.

The receipt of this news is creating intense enthusiasm in Entente circles on account of its being another indication of the growing power of the Allies. Vienna only admits the inability of the Austrians to withstand the terrific pressure of the Italians.

In Galicia.

Petrograd, Aug. 9.—The Russians, advancing against the Austro-Germans in Galicia, have already captured a hundred square miles of territory and now occupy eight more villages in the Dniester district.

STEADY INCREASE IN HALIBUT ARRIVALS

The following were the halibut schooners arriving overnight: Ida N., 24,000; Mabel A., 24,000; Aurora, 7,000; Niagara, 16,000; Polaris, 6,000, and San Jose, 15,000. This morning about nine o'clock the Tom & Al, one of the big Seattle schooners which has been tied up in the south for months on account of the strike, drew up to the wharf with 30,000 pounds.

The ending of the strike has made an enormous difference in the fishing business at this port and over one hundred American fishing schooners have entered here since July 1st. Prices yesterday ranged around 6½ cents and the price today will probably be about the same figure.

Daylight Saving.

Hamilton, August 9.—This city is suspending its daylight saving scheme on Sunday.

Rain Checks Fires.

North Bay, August 9.—Railway officials report that the heavy rains of the last twenty-four hours are effectively checking the bush fires which have been raging throughout New Ontario.

Synod Meets.

Edmonton, August 9. The Synod of Prince Rupert's Land is convening here today.

EQUAL PENSIONS FOR OFFICERS AND MEN

(Special to The Daily News.)

Winnipeg, August 9.—Several municipalities throughout Canada are recommending the Federal government to consider the question of equalizing the pensions of officers and privates who have served in the Canadian overseas forces. The chief argument used is that there will be no distinction between those men in civil life following the declaration of peace.

SHORTAGE OF LABOR

In view of a general shortage of labor at every point along the coast, George L. Clayton, at the Board of Trade meeting last evening, broached the question of asking the Minister of the Interior to have the embargo on the importation of labor removed, until such time as conditions had improved.

George R. Naden suggested that a committee be appointed to take the matter up with the trades unions with a view to procuring exact data, before taking any steps to have the embargo removed.

On the motion of Mr. Clayton, it was decided to have a committee go into the matter fully and report to the board.

WAL. MANSON REFUSES PUBLIC DISCUSSION

Before leaving for the Queen Charlotte Islands this morning, T. D. Pattullo was interviewed by The Daily News. He expressed regret that he would not be able to be present at the meeting to be held by Hon. William Manson on Thursday night, and said that he had called up Mr. Manson and asked him if he would make it a joint meeting, and also if he would enter into arrangements whereby they could tour the constituency together, holding joint meetings at various places throughout the electoral district. Mr. Manson replied that he would first have to consult his committee, and later telephoned that he could not enter into this agreement. He said that if Mr. Pattullo happened to be present at any of his meetings, he would give him an opportunity to speak, but, to this, Mr. Pattullo replied that it would be impossible for him to wait around, not knowing Mr. Manson's plans, and, therefore asked him if he would allow a representative to speak in case he could not be present. Mr. Manson replied that he did not intend to fool around in this way and that he intended to state his case in his own way, and would not allow any representative of Mr. Pattullo to speak at any of his meetings.

In closing the interview, Mr. Pattullo said "I regret the action taken by Mr. Manson, as I would like very much to see a series of joint meetings held throughout the district, in order to give the public the very best opportunity of hearing the issues discussed. At all of my meetings, wherever I go, I always invite any and everybody, who so desires, to come to the platform and debate the issues. The public ought to have the right of the very fullest and freest discussion and I do not think that any candidate for office should hamper the discussion of public issues in this way."

SWIMMING

SEATTLE HALIBUT MARKET STILL CLOSED

The Board of Trade met last evening when the chief matter brought up was the report of the fisheries committee, presented by George L. Clayton. Mr. Clayton stated that the matter of shipping halibut direct to Seattle by steamer from Prince Rupert was still under discussion, and there was no progress to report. Mayor McCaffery and G. A. Woodland had written to Sir Robert Borden stating the case for Prince Rupert, on July 8th and no reply had been received. The matter had been brought before the notice of Inspector Cunningham, when here recently, and he promised to go into it fully and make a recommendation to Ottawa, while Mr. Clayton reported that he had discussed the question fully with Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, while he was here last week.

It was finally decided that G. A. Woodland and the fisheries committee consider the question of sending a representative to Ottawa to place the matter before W. A. Found, Superintendent of Fisheries, and to write to the superintendent as to the next meeting of the advisory board.

FRENCH SEIZE MORE TRENCHES ON SOMME FRONT

Furious Fighting Along Meuse and in Champagne—German Plane Bombs Nancy—Attack in Balkans.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, August 9.—On the Somme front, the French have captured three and a half miles of German trenches. Furious fighting is in progress in the Champagne district and along the right bank of the Meuse. The Germans made several fierce attacks yesterday, all of which were repulsed by the French.

A German aeroplane bombed Nancy, wounding five civilians, three of whom are seriously injured.

The Balkans.

Saloniki, August 9.—The long looked-for attack on this front has begun and the French and Serbians are fiercely engaging the Bulgarians on the Greek front.

More Munitions Gone.

Koenigsberg, East Prussia, Aug. 9.—A terrific explosion of ammunition at the depot here awaiting shipment killed fifty and injured seventy-two.

Bremen Sunk?

Berne, Aug. 9.—The Berliner Tageblatt semi-officially announces that the German submarine Bremen sunk as the result of an accident to her machinery.

NO PARTY

The Journal naturally puts the best face possible upon the political situation in the province, from the Bowser standpoint. Well it knows that the Bowser regime is ended and that clean government is coming to this province at last. It continues to misrepresent the Bowser aggregation of machine politicians as the "Conservative" party, when it well knows that every Conservative worthy of that good old name is utterly disgusted with conditions in British Columbia under Bowserism. After the overwhelming defeats in Vancouver and Victoria, the local Matsonian organ claimed that Conservatives had beaten the Bowser candidates. The same thing will happen at the general election. There are many independent candidates in the field, both Liberal and Conservative, and it is a healthy sign. When the individual members of any political party have to sink beneath the dictates of any party machine, it is a sorry business.

So far as this provincial election is concerned, there should be no such thing as Grit or Tory. The old lines of demarcation have been completely wiped out, and, it is to be hoped, wiped out forever, so far as provincial politics is concerned. There should be no room for party in a province, where the only concern of a government is the handling of purely provincial affairs. A provincial government is simply an enlarged county council, and party should have no more place there than in a city council. The sole reason for the preservation of party in this province in the past has been that the Bowser machine might feed its followers. Bowser is a "pocket politician," his politics being his own and the pocket the public purse.

Whatever the Journal may say to the contrary, William Manson will admit that he has found in his tour of the province ample evidence of a great

change in public opinion. He must admit that he was not received by genuine Conservatives as a Conservative, but as a Bowser supporter. What Vancouver and Victoria think of Bowser was magnificently displayed at the by-elections, and that the cities in the south and the interior and northern districts have still the same very low opinion of this political opportunist will be still more emphatically shown on September 14th.

There is no longer any room for Bowserism in British Columbia, and his supporters must go out into outer darkness with him. The people of this province cannot afford to repeat their mistakes of the past and they will take great care that the huge mistake of allowing a man of the Bowser stamp to control the destinies of British Columbia for five minutes after September 14th, will not be made. William Manson is the velvet glove which covers the mailed fist of Bowserism, and that glove will be discarded, not so much because it is soft and pliant, but because of the Bowser grip which is inside.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Victoria Matsonian sheet claims that Tupper is opposed to Bowser out of professional jealousy. This is strange, as the two are not of the same profession. Sir Hibbert being an eminent lawyer and Bowser a professional politician, who merely works in law as a profitable adjunct.

Bowser has been forced to make a few amendments to the Military Voting Act, but even these are typically Bowserian. They are safeguarded by such clauses as "where practical." If Welsh decides that it was not practicable to notify Liberal scrutineers that voting was to take place at a given point, he need not worry.

In referring to the display of Bowserism in taking the soldiers' votes under only Bowser auspices, The Sun says "Revolutions have been caused by less serious onslaughts on the rights of a free people." The revolution against Bowserism is on now. It is bloodless, but none the less effective.

Bowser's methods are typically Prussian and they will meet with exactly the same fate as Prussianism must meet the world over. The people must and shall reign.

The Trades and Labor Council met last evening in the Carpenters' Hall, President S. D. MacDonald in the chair. W. E. Thompson, official organizer, reported that the Fish Packers' Union had a membership of 49 and that the organization work had been successfully completed.

One of the members of the legislative committee was severely criticized for the stand he had taken in endorsing the candidature of a member of one of the leading political parties. The question of sending a delegate to the Trades and Labor Congress was held over until next meeting. The congress this year meets in Toronto.

It was intimated that President McVety would visit the north in the near future. It was decided to try and have him present at the Labor Day celebration.

In regard to the action of the Retail Merchants' Association in changing the half-holiday to Wednesday, the Council resolved: "That the Trades and Labor Council go on record as still being in favor of the Saturday half-holiday, and that during the next municipal campaign that they

enter it in favor of Saturday afternoon as the day chosen for the holiday.
