RUSSIANS AND ITALIANS ARE TRIUMPHANT

MANY PRISONERS TAKEN ON BOTH FRONTS -- RUSSIANS NEARING STANISLAU

RUSSIANS ARE WITHIN RANGE OF STANISLAU

Four Hundred and Five Thousand Prisoners Taken—Bulgarians Suffer on Greek Front—Quiet on West Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Aug. 11.—Von Bothmer's forces cannot any further enjoy the protection of the flooded river Dniester, on account of the fact that General Letchitzky's rear forces have attacked the advance positions of the Austrians, who are fighting furiously in an attempt to extricate themselves from a very critical situation.

Stanislaw is now within range of the Russian big guns, and General Letchitzky's captures in the last ten days exceed fifteen thousand prisoners, bringing the grand total to Brusiloff's credit to four hundred and five thousand since the month of June.

Balkan Front.

London, August 11.—The Allied forces are continuing their bombardment of the Bulgarian positions on Lake Dorian, in Greek Macedonia, and are inflicting heavy damage on the enemy defences.

Western Front.

On the British and French fronts the situation is unchanged, inclement weather interfering with the troop movements.

Our aerial forces drove enemy machines into hostile ground and three of the British machines failed to return to their base.

THE LABOR SITUATION

To the Editor,

Dear Sir:—Having learned through the medium of the press that Mr. Geo. L. Clayton, a member of the Board of Trade, had advised the raising of the embargo on labor entering the Province, on the plea that there was a scarcity of labor in Prince Rupert, the Trades and Labor Council wish to enter a most emphatic protest against any such course being pursued: believing the same to have such a far-reaching and detrimental effect upon the best interests of the city.

It is a well known fact that many of our citizens have had to leave the city to seek employment in the camps in the surrounding district, where they are compelled to live apart from their families and home, owing to their inability to find employment in the city, and also that we have still a surplus of unemployed walking the streets.

These facts alone, we believe, are sufficient to warrant no attempt being made to raise the embargo. Another point that must not be lost sight of is the fact that many of our best citizens are today fighting the battles of our Empire on the fields of Europe and we sincerely hope that before many months have passed will be returning to our city. As wage earners and citizens it is our duty to see that the chances of employment for these men are not jeopardized by the importation of alien labor.

We are prepared to meet the Board of Trade and go into this question and give satisfactory proof that in place of a scarcity of labor, there is a scarcity of jobs.

ITALIANS ARE CELEBRATING GORIZIA'S FALL

Great Rejoicing Over Hard-Won Victory—Italians Chasing Fleeing Enemy and Taking More Prisoners.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Aug. 11.—Duke D'Aosta's army on the Isonzo front is pursuing the Austrians and inflicting terrible losses upon the fleeing enemy.

The Italians have pierced the Austrians' entrenchments to the northeast of Mont San Michele and have occupied Boschini, capturing two thousand prisoners.

In every Italian city the people are celebrating the successful culmination of General Cadorna's invasion of Gorizia, which has gone on steadily for fifteen months. The rejoicing was intensified when it became known that thousands of prisoners had been taken in excess of the number originally reported.

Prussian Losses.
Amsterdam, August 11.—The latest official Prussian casualty list gives the Prussian losses since the beginning of the war as 2,914,387 men. This is exclusive of losses in the colonies. It is not stated as to what date this list is made up.

ENJOYABLE DEBATE AT WILLIAM MANSON'S MEETING LAST NIGHT

MEETING OPENS TAMELY, BUT LIVENS UP WHEN ALEX. M. MANSON ACCEPTS AN INVITATION TO SPEAK—H. H. STEVENS HAS AWKWARD QUESTIONS TO ANSWER AND STRIKES A SNAG

William Manson's meeting in the Empress Theatre last evening was extremely quiet at the beginning, and when W. E. Fisher opened the proceedings around eight thirty there were about fifteen ladies; seventy-five gentlemen; a few boys, and a dog present. H. H. Stevens, M. P. for Vancouver, and J. E. Merryfield accompanied Mr. Manson on the platform. When William Manson rose to speak, most of the seats from the centre of the building to the front were empty, and after he had spoken ten minutes a few of the younger folks walked out. They had evidently expected a picture show and were obviously disappointed.

At the outset, Mr. Manson said that he had not been a servile supporter of the government; that the government had done its best to grapple with the varying conditions and had encouraged development. He emphasized the fact that development must depend upon the individual efforts of the people. The government had not undertaken to develop the country along Socialistic lines, and it could not take credit for any past prosperity, nor should it be blamed for the depression. There were new conditions cropping up which needed new and unusual treatment.

He apologised for the government land policy on the ground that it was difficult to know what to do with our lands. He said that there were 2,700,000 acres held by the speculator and unpaid for. The government was now taking that land back with the exception of the proportion paid for, and it was to be given to the soldiers.

He said that the shipbuilding act would help the province to "exchange its products for cash." Ten keels had been laid in the south under the act and the G. T. P. was doing its utmost to get some of the work for the drydock. In the past American competition in the lumber business had been too strong for this province, but the shipbuilding would help.

After dealing briefly with Woman Suffrage and Prohibition, on both of which subjects the government had expressed no opinion, he dwelt for a moment on the Soldiers' Voting Act, trying to show that the Opposition did not want the soldiers to vote. He also stated that the Liberals had found out only one piece of graft in the investigation. He dealt briefly with the Vancouver election scandals and said that the government would carry out its railroad obligations. He concluded with an explanation of the Agricultural Credits Act, showing that it would increase dairy farming.

H. H. Stevens, who followed,

gave a most eloquent and splendidly delivered address on the war and then expatiated upon our system of government, explaining how he had pointed out to the Americans in Philadelphia where their system fell down. He also spoke rather unkindly of two American citizens whom he had met on the boat, but they evidently deserved it. He commended Sir Robert Borden for sending the "every man, every dollar" message, remarking that this message had not been criticised by anyone. (General cheers). He also mentioned the work done by Sam Hughes at the start of the war. (No cheering).

He then came down to British Columbia and said that M. A. Macdonald had made the statement that \$4,000,000 had been passed as "one item" under the head of miscellaneous. This statement was challenged, and he changed it, leaving out the "one item" part, switching it to "the items classed as miscellaneous."

His next statement of the same sort was challenged by A. M. Manson, who asked if he would be allowed to take the platform at the close. Mr. Stevens courteously invited Mr. Manson to take the platform at once, in order that he might reply.

Alex. Manson Speaks.

A. M. Manson was given twenty minutes and made good use of the time. He pointed out that while B. C. had miscellaneous items of about \$4,000,000, Saskatchewan had only \$15,000. He said that if the public accounts were made up so that the public could understand them and given to the public, the Bowser government would not last a week. He dealt with the charge of \$2,662 for hire of a carpet, and went on to point out how William Manson and his supporters carried out their campaign at the expense of

ENJOYABLE DEBATE AT WM. MANSON'S MEETING

the people by using government boats and teams.

He pointed out that J. P. Shaw, of Kamloops, drew down \$30 per day for services on the Indian commission, while he also drew his sessional indemnity.

He asked William Manson to explain why it was that from \$9,000,000 in the treasury, in 1912, the province had sunk to \$33,000,000 in debt. He drew attention to the way in which William Manson had carefully skirted around the P. G. E. question, with its enormous profits to the contractors who had let the contracts to themselves. He showed how Bowser is trying to buy votes with a bridge here; a trail there, and another bridge somewhere else. The Workmen's Compensation Act and the Agricultural Credits Act had been brought along as electioneering work.

He showed how Mackenzie & Mann had been allowed to file for \$200 what should have cost \$14,600, and then went on to deal with the parliament buildings scandal, in which the contracts were let to the highest instead of the lowest tenderers. The Price-Love letters came in for scathing criticism, after which he pointed out how Welsh had been proven a perjurer in the Vancouver elections scandal and how the Seattle pluggers had been traced to Welsh's door, "yet this was the man sent over to look after the soldiers' vote." This was the man who had advised soap contractors to send money to the machine fund and to add it to their invoices.

He dealt at some length with the inequities of the land policy of the government, showing how there were settlers five miles apart with unpaid-for but held-up land in between. There were no schools for the children and in many cases no roads. He said that Mr. Dunsmuir, of Vancouver Island, held a crown grant on 30,000 acres near Hazelton which

had never been paid up and there were many more the same.

Stratheona Park in Victoria had cost \$256,000, \$40,000 of this to an American engineer, who drew the same salary as Sir Richard McBride, \$15,000 a year.

The Machine Boss.

He was surprised that Mr. Stevens described this government as a Conservative government. It was not a Conservative government. A thousand settlers had been starved out of this district all on account of the vicious patronage system which is conducted by my friend on the left (J. E. Merryfield—Joe nodded his head and seemed to take this as a compliment.)

He gave several instances of how men had been refused work because they would not bow to the machine boss. Bill Logan went to a job in the north, but the boss wired ahead that he was not to be given work. Gordon McLennan, one of the best bridge-men in the interior, had been treated in similar fashion. He said that Premier Brewster would do away with this iniquitous system and he would have the Liberal party and the people behind him.

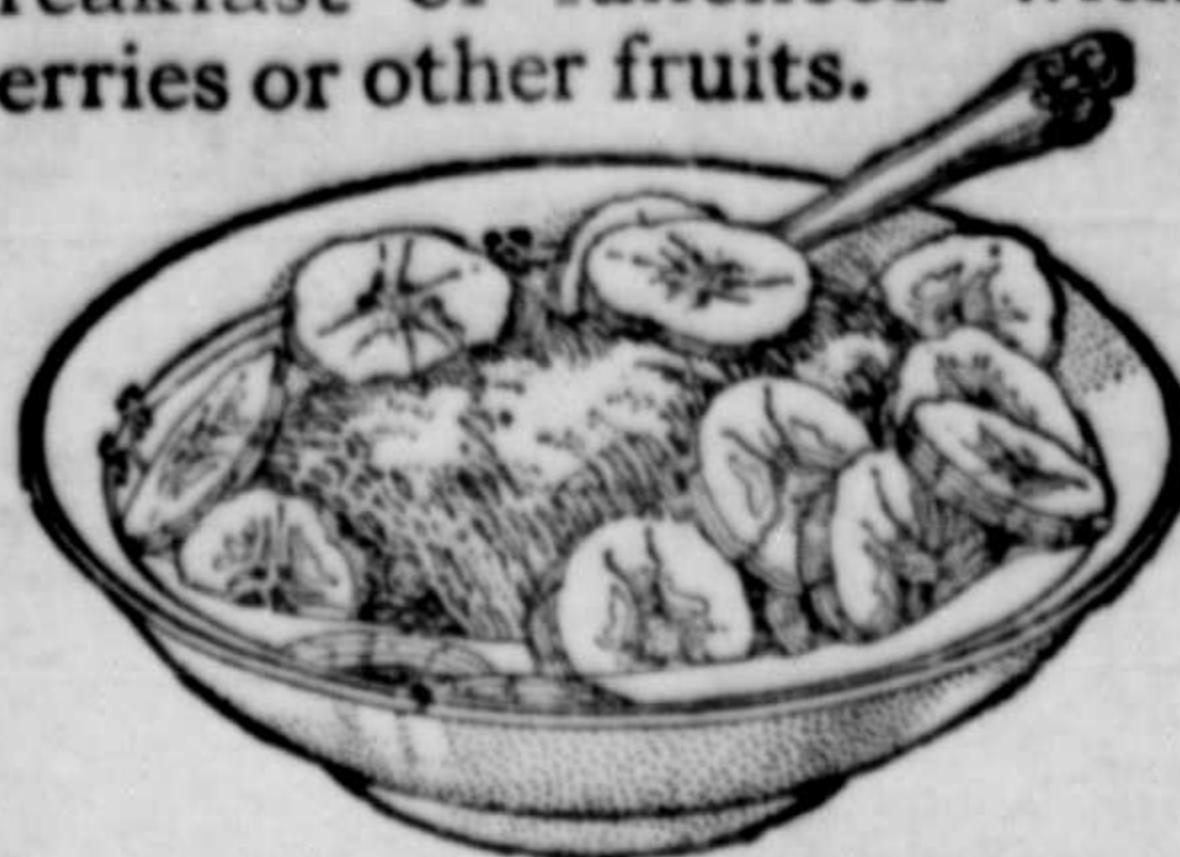
Construction.

He said that the Liberal policy was one of community settlement by which each block of land would be settled with schools, etc., so that a real farming settlement might spring up. He promised them that T. D. Pattullo would go more fully into this on a later occasion, and would be glad to meet William Manson in debate.

Steven's Reply.

H. H. Stevens stalled along in his reply by reading over chosen items from the public accounts and explaining that the \$2,662 for a carpet, included furniture. He then explained that the Bowser government was composed of human beings who were apt to err. This was in regard to Shaw's graft. George R. Naden asked him if drawing money from the province while a member was not illegal. He said that in this case it was not, as Shaw was working for the Dominion government as well. Mr. Naden then

asked if it was not the case that a special act had to be passed to cover it. (cheers). Mr. Stevens said "then that made it legal" (groans and shouts of "you can make anything legal").

He blamed the huge public debt upon the war and went on to describe some dream of making the province carry all its financing within itself. He then described Bowser as having "done wonders in political manipulation" (great laughter), after which he explained that he did not mean it that way.

The parliament buildings scandal he dismissed by saying that the lowest tenderer was an American, but he did not refer to the sub-contracts, in which lay the graft. He said that he was disgusted with the patronage system.

He then described Welsh as an ardent Tory and claimed that he had only told Pendray to contribute the money to the funds in a jovial mood, after Pendray had got the contracts. He dealt at length with the "plugging" and admitted that M. A. Macdonald had no personal part in it, further than signing the cheques for the association. He then tried to show that there is a split in the Liberal camp over the bringing back of Scott, and he had a good deal of interruption from A. M. Manson, who followed him closely and insisted upon him sticking to the evidence.

In dealing with the Soldiers'

Voting Act, he said that he "had every confidence that the vote would be taken fairly, but, if there was anything crooked, he would go with the Liberals to the bottom of the matter and fight it to a finish." He then described Wm. Manson as a "good, clean, decent representative." "Some of you may not support him because he is a supporter of Bowser, but I assure you that he will make a clean, wholesome representative." A most enjoyable and good-humored meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem and as the crowd was leaving, someone called for three cheers for William Manson, which were given.

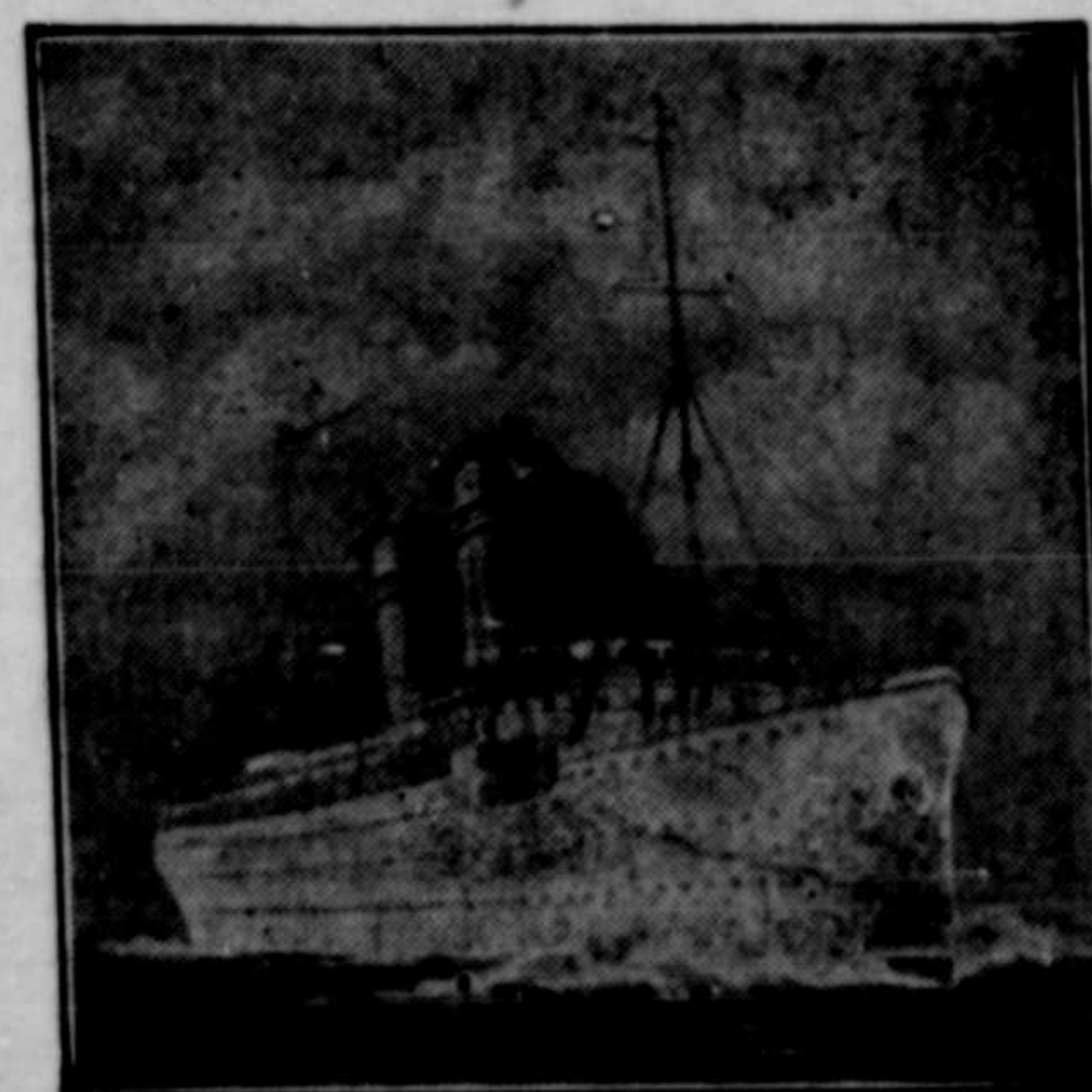

PRICE-LOVE LETTERS SHOW BOWSER METHOD

William Manson, will probably have read the following letters, but, as they throw so much light on the methods used by the Bowser machine in the south, whether in Dominion or provincial affairs, we republish them. They are known as the Price-Love letters, but they contain more about price than love, which is only natural. Victoria Conservative Club, Victoria, October 6, 1911. Re Dominion Election, Sept. 11, 1911.
