RUSSIANS PREPARE FOR LEMBERG ATTACK

AUSTRIANS APPEAL FOR MORE GERMAN TROOPS -- ITALIANS ARE STILL GAINING

RUSSIANS ARE PREPARING FOR FINAL ATTACK

Austrian Casualties Number half Million—Russians Lining up for Final Drive on Lemberg.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Aug. 15.—The Russians have captured the strongly fortified town of Tustobia and have advanced along the Sereth, Zlota, Lipa front.

Enormous Losses.

London, August 15.—A careful study of the official reports indicates that the Russians have already captured fifty-six thousand of Von Bothmer's army. Half of the entire Austro-German force has been accounted for. The lists have been carefully checked up and it is believed that since June the enemy has suffered the loss of half a million men killed and wounded.

Scherbachoff's troops are aligning with Sakharoff's and Letchitzky's armies preparatory to the inauguration of a terrific smash through the Austro-German lines to reach the Galician capital.

Austrian Appeal.

Rome, August 15.—There are renewed Austrian appeals for more German troops to defend the Galician front against the Russians. This is supposed to have been one of the subjects discussed at last week's conference at Vienna between the Emperor Franz Josef and Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg.

WATER CONNECTION

At the city council last evening an application for water connection by Captain Davies, in Section 5, Block 7, was dealt with. The finance and general committee recommended that the connection be made, provided enough connections were asked for to enable the first payment to cover ten per cent. on the investment. This was adopted.

TIMES ASSERTS WASHINGTON IS UNREASONABLE

London, Aug. 15.—The Times asserts that the American protest against the black-listing of business firms is unreasonable on account of the fact that the United States adopted similar methods to suppress the opium traffic during the Philippine war.

Premier Asquith has introduced a bill to extend the present parliament for a further period of eight months.

Danish West Indies.

Copenhagen, August 15.—The Lower House of Parliament has voted to sell the Danish West Indies to the United States provided a plebiscite, which is to be taken shortly, favors the deal.

Washington Notes.

Washington, August 15.—The third edition of an American white book containing copies of the correspondence exchanged between the United States and the European belligerents has just been issued.

RESERVE FUND BYLAW PASSED SECOND READING

The Reserve Fund Bylaw passed its second reading at the city council last night. Under this bylaw, the city establishes a fund to take care of the annual payments of principal and interest of the serial bonds. This is the first municipal fund of the kind established in the province, though it is likely, since the serial system is becoming widely popular, that the Union of B. C. Municipalities will take action to have a clause covering such a fund, incorporated in all municipal private bills covering bond sales.

The fund will be formed from unpaid local improvement taxes as they come in, and will virtually amount to a section of general fund account ear-marked for the special purpose of paying off the serial bond interest and principal.

TAXES ON PROPERTY HELD BY GOVERNMENT

The city solicitor intimated to the council last night that he finds that the municipality of Point Grey has entered into an arrangement with the government for the payment of taxes upon property held by the government. He proposed that he take up the question of taxes upon government property in Prince Rupert with a view to obtaining for Prince Rupert an arrangement similar to that made by Point Grey. This received the unanimous support of the council.

At the request of the Dominion Hospital Commission, the Ontario government has donated old Trinity College, Coburg, for the treatment of mentally disabled soldiers.

Poor Wheat Crop.

Winnipeg, Aug. 15.—The minister of agriculture announces that the Manitoba wheat harvest will be disappointing and that in several districts the crop has been ruined by rust and insect pests, especially around Morden and Clearwater, where the crop will probably be burned, as it is not worth cutting.

H. H. STEVENS REFUSED TO ANSWER QUESTIONS

Alex. M. Manson, Liberal candidate for Omineca, attended the meetings held at Hazelton, New Hazelton and Smithers by H. H. Stevens, Hon. William Manson and F. M. Pockrill, and some lively passages resulted. Mr. Stevens indulged in much flowery rhetoric, especially in dealing with the life of the prospector and the miner. His flights of oratory greatly amused the boys from the hills. When he got down to business at Hazelton he challenged the statement made by H. G. Brewster and M. A. Macdonald that only fifty cents of every dollar spent on road work in this district actually went on the roads, and insinuated that Alex. Manson meant to imply that the other fifty per cent. was wasted through the men loafing on the work.

A. M. Manson made it perfectly plain that it was not the men who wasted the public money but the government and it was the rancher, who was struggling to make ends meet, who suffered from the waste.

H. H. Stevens freely admitted that, in the notorious cattle deal, Price Ellison had done a great wrong and the only thing he could do was to resign. He sought to excuse the erring minister by stating that he is an old man with one foot in the grave.

Again, in dealing with the coal shares given to Dr. Young, Mr. Stevens admitted that this minister had committed a grave error and that there was no other course open to him but to resign. He did not in any way seek to defend either minister. Mr. Manson asked why this minister should be given such a position as chairman of the Returned Soldiers' Commission to which Mr. Stevens replied that Dr. Young is a man of culture. Mr. Manson retorted that the word should be spelled with a "K".

Cornered on the payment of \$30 per day for 365 days in the year to J. P. Shaw, of Kamloops, while this gentleman drew his sessional indemnity, Mr. Stevens did not offer any defense whatever.

A. M. Manson, at all three meetings challenged Mr. Stevens to answer certain questions in regard to the Vancouver "plugging" but these Mr. Stevens absolutely refused to answer, while he professed to know nothing of the Price-Love letters, which showed plainly how votes were purchased to return Mr. Stevens in 1911. The letters have been freely published for a year, but Mr. Stevens knew nothing of them. Mr. Manson asked why Bowser had not instituted criminal proceedings against Love and Price, but Mr. Stevens made no reply.

NO ANSWER

The local Bowser organ makes a very feeble attempt to get over the fact that the sailors on the Rainbow were asked to vote in the election without being furnished with the necessary information as to what the various candidates represented. There are nineteen candidates in Vancouver, several of whom are independent, and it was impossible that the boys of the Rainbow could have been aware of the exact standing of those men. Of course, all of them would be aware that Bowser stands for Bowserism, and that Dr. McGuire will stand for anything, while Tisdall stood for the worst licking any candidate has received in Vancouver for many a day, still it is strange that the Bowser organ should describe the giving of necessary information to electors as "vicious".

Of course, it is a well known fact that the Bowserites are strongly opposed to the giving of information, so much so indeed that H. H. Stevens, who was brought up from below to help out William Manson, refused to answer questions put by A. M. Manson at Hazelton and Smithers the other evening. Mr. Stevens appeared to be candid in his condemnation of Price-Elision and Dr. Young, but he fought shy of any reply to a few searching questions on the "plugging" affair, while he could not explain why Fred Welsh had been sent so hurriedly to England to "take care of" the soldiers' vote. So scared are the Bowserites of the public obtaining information that William Manson has been instructed by his committee to evade a joint meeting with T. D. Pattullo.

In connection with the taking of the vote on the Rainbow, it is interesting to learn that Harry Price was there. Harry says he was there because it was an "historic occasion." Harry has figured prominently on many historic occasions,

notably on the occasion of the buying of the liquor for the Victoria "blind-pig"; in the paying of fares of voters on the same occasion, and in connection with the historic Price-Love letters in connection with the general election in 1911. The price fixed for votes on that occasion was \$10 and Harry thought he was never to have peace again so many paid voters bombarded him for their "price."

It was extremely fitting that Mr. Price should have been present at the taking of the vote on the Rainbow, and it would be a fitting wind-up to the political career of this gentleman were he sent to join Welsh in England, with John L. Sullivan to make a third in the party, though Vancouver Bowserites state that they cannot afford to spare both Welsh and Sullivan out of the country at the same time. Well, things might have been worse in the Rainbow affair—Harry Price might have had John L. Sullivan along with him.

MARKET CHARGES REMAIN AS BEFORE

Ald. McRae introduced for its second reading at the council last night, an amendment to the city market bylaw, making the commission on produce sold, 10% instead of 7 1/2% as at present, the extra 2 1/2% to go to the city to cover costs.

Speaking to the bylaw, Ald. McRae pointed out that the market is now on a firm basis. He quoted the sales per month since Frank Clapp became manager. They were: Feb., \$787; March, \$713; April, \$725; May, \$1,378; June, \$1,459, and July, \$2,141, a total of 7,206, giving the manager an average salary of about \$90.

The market cost the city \$34.30 per month and he felt that the additional 2 1/2% would cover this outlay and place the market on its own feet, which he thought was the proper thing.

Ald. Casey thought that the city was entitled to give the market free water, light and phone and the remaining expense amounted to only \$201.84 per year, which amount he considered the city can well afford in such a good cause. He moved that the bylaw be rejected.

Ald. Montgomery, in seconding this, congratulated Ald. McRae upon the good work he had done in connection with the market. He agreed with the principle of the market standing on its feet, but at the same time, he felt that it was still at an experimental stage and was doing well, therefore, it should be allowed to go along on the present basis.

Ald. McRae said that the market is past the experimental stage and is now an assured success, the credit for which he gave to Frank Clapp, the market clerk. He urged that the putting of the concern on a paying instead of a losing basis was the next step.

Ald. Nelson, in congratulating Ald. McRae upon the success of the market, said that he felt that the commission should remain as it is.

Ald. McClymont, while agreeing with the principle of the market meeting all its own costs, thought that the matter should stand over for three months, by which time there would be more data to go upon.

Mayor McCaffery said he had given the matter some thought. Last February they had debated the question of commission and had decided upon 7 1/2% as a fair margin. He believed that the market should be run along business lines, and it was gratifying to find that it is doing so well, but he believed that the present basis should be continued until the end of the year. The matter was dropped.

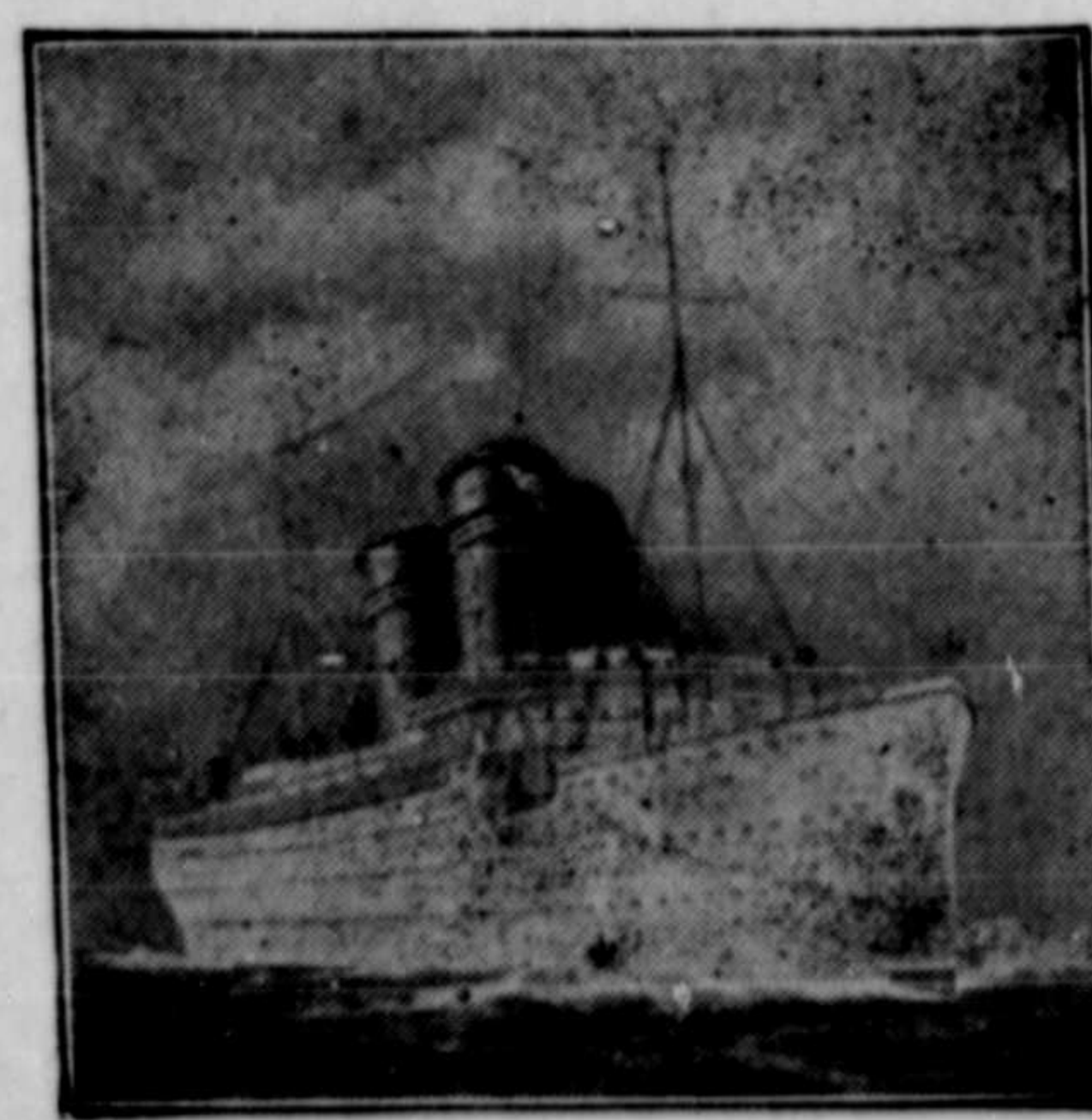

Kenny McRae, one of the crew of the fishing steamer Roman, had to be taken care of by the police last night. He became insane shortly after the vessel left Steveston for the halibut banks and was handed over to the authorities when the steamer made this port.

BOWSER DIRECTOR OF WALLACE SHIPYARDS

It seems to be very easy for some men to fall afoul of the criminal law, without "criminal intent." Premier Bowser has done it again. During the last session of the legislature, when he was charged with giving to the Pacific Great Eastern railway company some millions of dollars contrary to law, he admitted the charge, but said no "criminal intent" was shown. It now turns out that at the time the Wallace Shipyards, Ltd., were given the contract of building ships in connection with the government ship-building policy, Hon. Mr. Bowser was a director of the company. There is a clause of the criminal code which says that officers of the government are not to take commissions, nor participate, etc. in government work. However, there was no criminal intent on Hon. Mr. Bowser's part, surely. Anyway, it turns out that the matter has been brought to his attention and he has resigned from the board of directors.

It is reported that the premier declared when advised of the delicate position his place on the board of directors put him in, that he had entirely forgotten about being a director of the company, it was incorporated in the offices of Bowser, Reid & Wallbridge, and, as sometimes is customary, when companies are being incorporated, their lawyer takes a required one share, or such a matter, to complete the provisional board of directors, etc. This is where Mr. Bowser had no "criminal intent" again.—Sun.
