NINETY THOUSAND CANADIANS UNDER FIRE

ITALIANS APPROACHING TRIESTE--TOLMINO ABLAZE--AUSTRIANS ARE FLEEING

NEW DIVISION OF CANADIANS ON FIRING LINE

Ninety Thousand Canadians are Now Fighting—King George Presents Decorations—Nurse Honored.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, August 16.—The fourth Canadian Division, under command of General David Watson, of Quebec, has arrived in France, making ninety thousand available Canadian troops on the immediate fighting line. General Odium, of Vancouver, is in charge of one brigade.

Canadians Decorated.
London, Aug. 16.—His Majesty King George has just returned from a week's visit to the western front, during which he presented military decorations to several Canadians.

On his return, Nurse Ethel Holmes, of the Canadian Red Cross, was presented with the Royal Red Cross, at Buckingham Palace, for distinguished service at the front.

Italian Agreement.
It is officially announced that a complete understanding has been arrived at between the British and Italian ministers on every question which came up for discussion at the recent conference at Pallanza.

Spanish Steamer Sunk.
Madrid, Aug. 16.—The Spanish steamer Pagasarri has been sunk by a submarine.

AUSTRIANS ARE DISPERSED BY RUSSIAN GUNS

Galicia Swarms with Victorious Russians—Berlin Admits British Advance—Wilhelm goes East.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, Aug. 16.—The western banks of the rivers of Galicia are swarming with victorious Russians. The gateway to the Carpathians has been captured and the Austrians are dispersing rapidly. The enemy cannot face the intense shelling from the Russian big guns.

Berlin Admits Defeat.
Berlin, Aug. 16.—The Kaiser has gone to the eastern front, where the Austrians are clamoring for reinforcements. It is officially admitted that the British forces have occupied the first line of German trenches from Thiepval to Pozieres.

War Bonds.
New York, August 16.—A British movement has been inaugurated and an advertising campaign started with a view to encouraging overseas Britons to invest in the recently issued five per cent. exchequer bonds.

FAMILY STRICKEN WITH PTOMAINE POISONING

A wire reached town last evening from Skidegate stating that Mrs. T. Sipes and the members of her family had been stricken with ptomaine poisoning, resulting from the eating of canned salmon. Advice was sent by wire and about midnight, Dr. J. P. Cade left for Skidegate on the Walronde, kindly placed at his disposal by George B. Hull. This morning, word reached town that Mrs. Sipes and one child had died, and that the others are in grave danger.

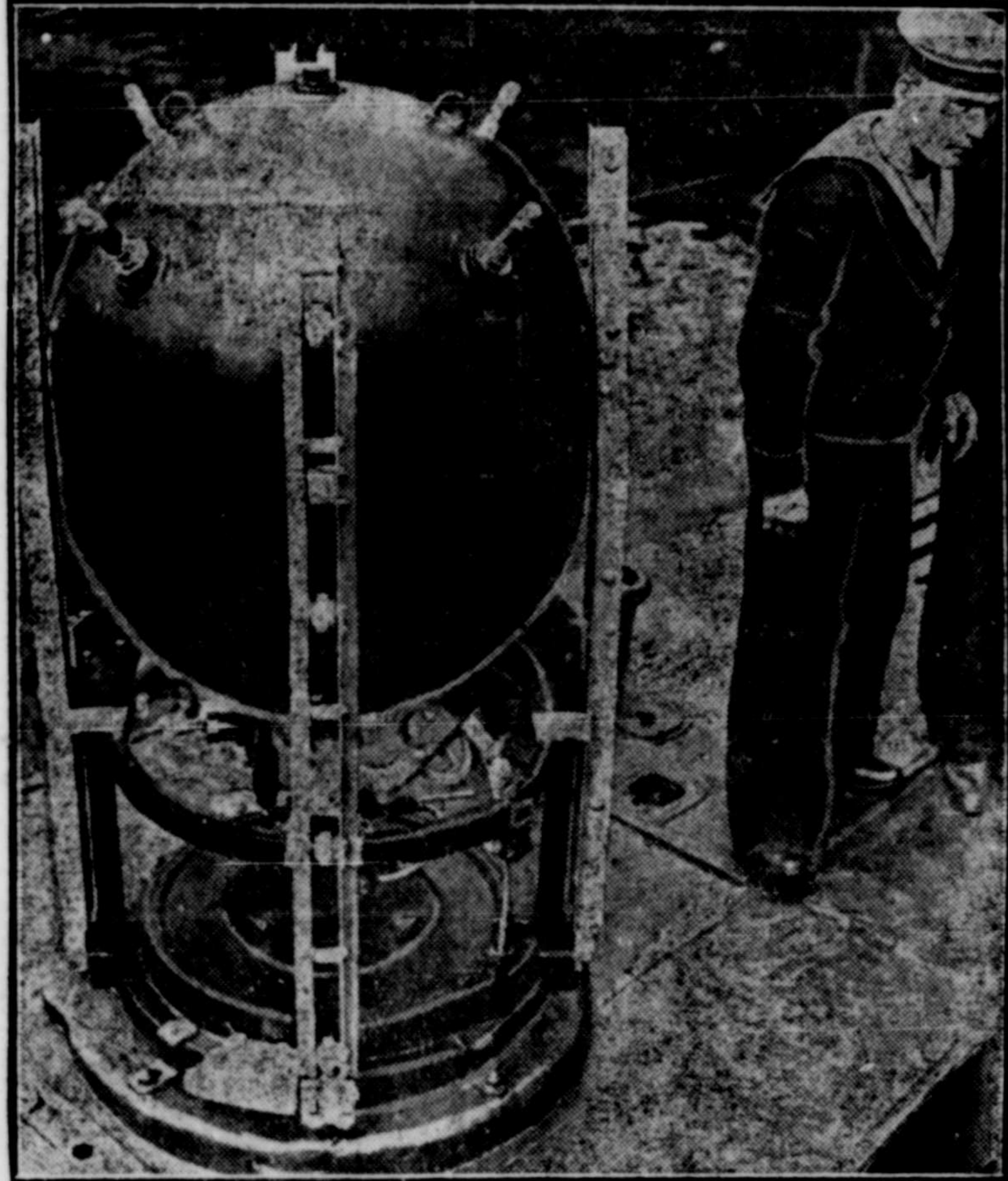
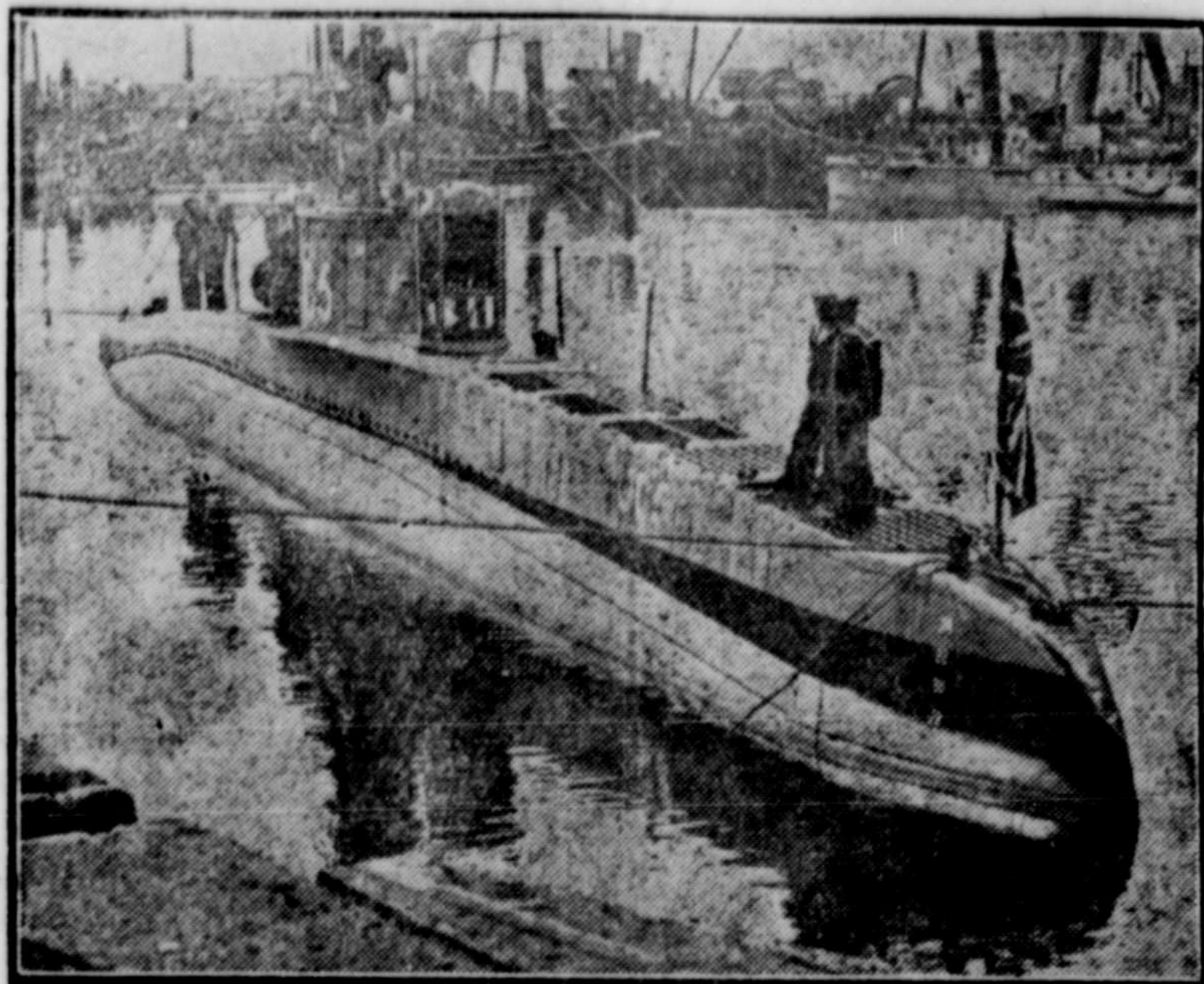
Later.

ITALIANS NOW WITHIN REACH OF TRIESTE CITY

Austrian Fleet Sails—Tolmino in Flames and Liable to Fall any Moment—Battle-ship Sunk.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Rome, August 16.—The Italians are vigorously pursuing the Austrians on the Carso Plateau and the advance guards are now within thirteen miles of Trieste, the important Austrian seaport and naval base in the Adriatic. The Austrian fleet, which was lying in Trieste harbor, has sailed for an unknown destination.

Unofficial Report.
Paris, August 16.—An unofficial report from Switzerland states that the Italians have entered the suburbs of Tolmino and that the Austrians are now evacuating the city, which is now burning as a result of the Italian bombardment. The fall of Tolmino is expected momentarily.

Dreadnought Sunk.
An explosion has occurred on the Italian dreadnought Leonardo da Vinci, while lying in the harbor of Taranto, following a fire which originated in the kitchen. It is believed that it will be possible to refloat and repair the vessel. Three hundred of her crew were drowned.

FISHERMAN DROWNED OFF DOMINION CANNERY

John Hrafudal Johnson, a fisherman of 67 years of age, was drowned in the Skeena yesterday near Dominion Cannery. It seems that he was out fishing in a small skiff, and, while paying out the net, found his boat drifting too far out. Reaching to handle the sail, he got his foot entangled in the net and went overboard, the net dragging him down. The body was recovered and brought to town last night and placed in the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers. Interment will take place tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock to Fairview Cemetery.

WILSON STANDS FIRM FOR EIGHT HOUR DAY PLAN

Railroad Men Agree to Wilson's Proposals—President Will now Confer with Magnates—Hughes a Fighter.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, Aug. 16.—President Wilson yesterday placed a proposal before the leaders of the Railwaymen's Unions, with a view to averting the strike which has been threatening for some time. The men agreed to the terms proposed and the President will now call in the money kings and railroad presidents to discuss those proposals. It is expected that the employers will be satisfied with Wilson's terms, which the men have already agreed to. President Wilson stands firm for the principle of an eight hour day.

Hughes Would Fight.
Tacoma, August 16.—"I would fight for the rights of the United States," said Charles E. Hughes, the Republican standard bearer at a meeting here last night. He also told his audience that he would not shrink from his obvious duty and declared that protection of American citizens abroad should be effected at any cost.

NOT REPRESENTED

Point Grey is in a similar situation to Prince Rupert, in that the provincial government sold a good many lots there, and many of the purchasers have defaulted in their payments and also in paying their taxes.

Prince Rupert is in the same position as Point Grey. Many lots in which the government holds an equity, have arrears of taxes against them, but the government in the past has refused to do anything towards paying those taxes, yet Point Grey has received just exactly what Prince Rupert has been refused.

This is just another example of the sort of representation this city has had in Victoria. William Manson sat in the house while the agreement with Point Grey was entered into, yet he never raised his voice to ask for a similar arrangement for this city.

Imagine T. D. Pattullo letting such an opportunity slip. Had T. D. Pattullo been on the opposition benches, instead of on the government side, as was William Manson, he would have raised the question so strongly that Bowser would have been forced to do something or suffer the consequences.

As was very neatly pointed out recently, William Manson's qualities are entirely of the negative order. He is known only for what he doesn't do. He is of the "harmless" type, whose qualities are summed up and crystallized in one great 0.

City Solicitor Peters is now entering into a discussion with Victoria on this question and is making the demands of Prince Rupert clear, namely, that this city wants the same treatment at the hands of the government as has been meted out to Point Grey.

TESTING OF PIPELINE DISCUSSED BY COUNCIL

The testing of the governor at the hydro-electric plant came up for discussion at the city council on Monday night, when Ald. Montgomery asked what was being done in connection with the proposal of the Canadian General Electric Company in the matter.

It seems that Supt. Kennedy wrote to the company proposing that its Mr. Dryer, who is at present in the city, should apply a graduated series of tests, working up to the maximum pressure. The company replied that a test would be carried out by Mr. Dryer in accordance with the terms of the contract and that unless the test was made by Mr. Dryer the company would accept no responsibility.

Ald. Montgomery reminded the council of the accidents which had happened in the past and which had cost the city a lot of money, and wanted to know if Mr. Kennedy was satisfied with the proposal of the company.

Superintendent Kennedy said that he would like to see the test carried out in the way he proposed as it would obviate any danger of strain or breakage to the pipe-line. If the maximum pressure were applied at once, there might be trouble and this he wanted to avoid, hence his suggestion of a gradual test. The matter was left to Mayor McCaffery, City Solicitor Peters and Superintendent Kennedy.
