AUSTRIANS DRIVEN TO MOUNTAIN DEFILES

HUNGARIAN RAILROADS IN RUSSIAN HANDS -- IMPORTANT GAINS ON SOMME

AUSTRIANS ARE SHELTERING IN CARPATHIANS

Russians Continue to Advance—Enemy Leaves Railroad and Takes to Defiles of the Carpathians.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 17.—The Russians are keeping up a continuous advance and are pressing the Austrians into the narrowest defiles of the Carpathian Mountains, compelling the enemy to relinquish positions affecting railway communications into Hungary.

Japan Assists.

Japan is assisting considerably in keeping the huge Russian armies supplied. Besides supplying big guns and ammunition in large quantities for the Galician offensive and for the carrying on of the Caucasian campaign, Japan is increasing her industrial output tremendously and is already furnishing the Russians with immense quantities of clothing, shoes, etc.

Balkan Front.

The Allies are developing their offensive from Saloniki and are now hammering the Bulgarians along a hundred-mile Serbo-Greek front.

FIVE DEATHS FROM PTOMAIN POISONING

Today's reports from Port Clements state that five of the Sipes family are dead from ptomaine poisoning. The dead are, Mrs. Sipes, Senr., Mrs. Sipes, Junr., and three children. The infant was not affected by the poisoning.

Dr. J. P. Cade arrived at Port Clements yesterday afternoon, but could do nothing to save the life of the third child, which lingered until this morning, when it also passed away. The father, who was on his way to Nelson when disaster overtook his family, is on board the Prince George on his return home.

The coroner's jury this morning brought in a verdict of accidental death from ptomaine poisoning, through eating decomposed fish. The occurrence has cast the deepest gloom over the Islands community, and the deepest sympathy is felt for the stricken father whose home has been shattered at one cruel blow.

CONSCRIPTION NOT REQUIRED SAYS CABINET

Recruiting Plans Revised—Canadians from Ypres to Somme—Duke of Connaught Reviews Troops.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Aug. 17.—The cabinet has passed an order-in-council providing for a revision of the recruiting method in Canada. The unanimous opinion of the cabinet is that conscription or any system of national registration is unnecessary.

Canadians for Somme.

Canadian troops have been transferred from the blood-soaked Ypres salient to the Somme front to assist in the great Anglo-French offensive.

Valcartier Review.

Valcartier, August 17.—H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught yesterday reviewed sixteen thousand troops at Valcartier Camp.

Manitoba Premier.

Vancouver, Aug. 17.—Premier Norris, of Manitoba, arrived here yesterday. He refused all interviews and is proceeding to Victoria today.

Exhibition.

There was an attendance of twenty thousand at the Vancouver Exhibition yesterday.

Requa, of San Francisco, took the time to go up-river to inspect some prospects. Mr. Requa is associated with Colonel Jackling, a multimillionaire mining man, who is largely interested in the Alaska-Juneau, Utah Copper, Ray Consolidated, Butte Superior, Arizona and Gold Roads Mines.

Mr. Requa was accompanied here by his wife and family, and the party has gone on to Juneau. He was favorably impressed with the outlook in this district, and, if the property examined opens up as it promises, Mr. Requa will not hesitate to use some of the capital at his command in extensive development work here.

STICK TO BRITISH TRADITIONS

It has been by sticking closely to the traditions and principles for which our forefathers contended that the British subject may today boast of being the freest subject of any nation.

CROOKED GOVERNMENT PASSED CROOKED ACT

Winnipeg, Aug. 14.—An edition of the B. C. Military Forces Voting Act appeared in the Manitoba Free Press on Saturday, the article concluding in these terms:

"The law is far more objectionable than the somewhat similar act passed two sessions ago by the Dominion Parliament. It has all the dangerous possibilities of the Dominion Act and none of its safeguards. Manipulation of the soldiers' ballots will be possible, under the Dominion Act, but it is an operation that will be attended by a considerable measure of risk, whereas the British Columbia measure makes it practicable and safe to manipulate the soldiers' ballots in any manner called for by the political difficulties of the party which has charge of the machinery for collecting the vote.

"If this vote were being taken under the auspices of a once notorious government now fallen from power—which for a time held supreme control in a province not a thousand miles from here, it would be very easy to predict what would happen. There would be in the ballot boxes, at the conclusion of voting, a ballot for every provincial elector in the British Isles—and possibly for many who were not there. If a soldier did not exercise his right, the parties in charge would see that his ballot was duly marked, while in the case of the soldier who marked his ballot not in the manner desired by the powers that be, it would be deemed necessary in the interests of good government to replace his ballot by one marked properly.

"Under the extraordinary provisions governing the counting, the soldiers' votes would be held in reserve to be applied where they would do most good. Thus, in a constituency where the party candidate, upon the home vote, was defeated by, say, fifty votes, there would be drawn from the reservoir in London sixty votes that would right the balance. By a judicious manipulation of the ballots in this manner, candidates slaughtered at the general election could be brought to life and again given seats in the legislature. In short, by a fraudulent

PRISONERS AND TRENCHES OURS ON SOMME FRONT

Important Advance made by the Allies—Germany Rushing Troops to Defence of Trieste.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, August 17.—The weather having cleared on the Somme front, the British and French have resumed their offensive and have captured German trenches and a considerable number of prisoners. The Anglo-French have made important advancement north of Pozieres.

King George and President Poincare held a conference on the Somme front, during His Majesty's recent visit to France.

Italian Front.

Rome, August 17.—It is reported that Germany is rushing reinforcements to render assistance to the Austrians in the defence of Trieste against the Italian advance.

Peace Rumors.

It is officially reported that Bulgarian and Turkish diplomats are at Berne, in Switzerland, negotiating with representatives of the Entente Allies for a separate peace.

WILSON TO APPOINT RAILROAD COMMISSION

Washington, Aug. 17.—President Wilson is submitting his proposals for the prevention of a national railway strike, to the employers and will later appoint a commission to investigate the grievances of the men.

British-American Treaty.

The United States and Great Britain have completed a treaty for the protection of insect-destrorying birds on each side of the Canadian boundary.

Another Strike.

New York, Aug. 17.—A strike of the employees on the elevated, surface and sub-way routes of Greater New York is threatened. Organizer Fitzgerald, of the Amalgamated Association of Railwaymen, charges President Shonts with interference with and violation of agreements.

D. B. Seringeour, representing the Mainland Fire Underwriters' Association, is in the city on an inspection tour. Yesterday, in company with the mayor, a trial run of the city fire brigade was satisfactorily made.

Mr. Seringeour is a brother of Walter Seringeour, of this city who recently enlisted for overseas service. The brothers had not met for several years until they did so here.

AUSTRALIA TO OUST GERMAN MINE OWNERS

Smelting Industry of Commonwealth for the British—Reparation will be Demanded for Murder of Fryatt.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 17.—Britain has made arrangements for the purchase of immense quantities of metals in Australia and is ensuring the transfer of the Australian smelting industry from German to British possession.

Australia is one of the most richly mineralized countries in the world, and for years past the smelting industry in this part of the Empire has been largely in German hands, the famous Broken Hill Mines and other valuable properties being run by German capital. The new movement is largely the result of representations made by Australia to the mother country, the Australians being anxious that Germans shall never again obtain control of such a valuable industry.

Will Demand Reparation.

Premier Asquith has announced that Britain is determined that she will never resume diplomatic relations with Germany, following the declaration of peace, until complete reparation has been made for the murder of Captain Fryatt.

SIXTEEN HALIBUT SCHOONERS ARRIVE

The wharf alongside the warehouses of the Atlin, Pacific and Booth Fisheries this morning looked real businesslike, there being no fewer than sixteen halibut schooners tied up, with about 188,000 pounds of fish between them. The fares were: M. T. 3, 10,000 pounds; Grayling, 11,000; Venus, 22,000; Alvilda, 6,000; Wilson, 25,000; Elizabeth, 13,000; Malola, 25,000; Spencer, 12,000; Flamingo, 12,000; Rolph, 18,000; Doreen, 5,000; Merrymaid, 4,000; Soya, 4,000; Unity, 8,000; Maud, 8,000 and Caydeon, 5,000.

Bidding opened at 6½ this forenoon but no sales had been made by eleven o'clock. Several of the above schooners have not been in Prince Rupert for months, owing to the strike of the American fishermen. There are plenty of cars and the fish packers are busier now than they have ever been.

Some of the fishermen complain of a shortage of good bait, owing to the failure of the herring season and all are satisfied that if they were allowed to take a few humpback salmon it would help out the halibut fishing to a large extent.

BOWSERIAN EXCUSES

When M. A. Macdonald administered such a trouncing to C. E. Tisdall in the Vancouver by-election in February, the Bowserites claimed that the result was due to the fact that so many thousands of Conservatives voted for the Liberal candidate. The local Bowser organ gave that as the only reason, in fact it claimed the return of Mr. Macdonald as a victory for the Conservatives. It was. It was a Conservative victory over Bowserism, and just such another victory will be scored throughout the province on September 14th.

C. E. Tisdall, however, attributed his defeat in February to the fact that he was poorly supported on the platform. The poor man could not expect strong platform support since his speakers had to try to defend Bowser's action in allowing the Dominion Trust Company to break the law of the Dominion in order that it might grab the hard-earned savings of Vancouver's workmen, while they also had to explain why Joe Matson had been presented with \$75,000, \$35,000 of which he handed over to the News-Advertiser and the Colonist.

Bowser's excuse for the debacle was that his machine organization had fallen down, evidently having taken it for granted that Bowser's candidature could not be defeated.

All these Bowserian reasons have been set aside in a wild effort to stem the tide of disaster, in fact, the Bowser campaign resembles pretty much the desperate Austrian efforts to escape from the Italians and to stop the Russians at the same time. The latest Bowser argument is that 5,000 "pluggers" elected M. A. Macdonald in the by-election.

When this joke has been thoroughly assimilated, the Bowser press might tell us how many "pluggers" were responsible for the overwhelming majority given to H. C. Brewster

over A. C. Flumerfelt. In both cities, there was an extraordinarily heavy poll, the reason being that, at the previous election, many thousands of electors were quite content to let things slide, as they had such glorious dreams of real estate wealth. Today, the people of the province are awake to real conditions, and are experiencing no illusions. They know that this province has been looted, from stem to stern and from keel to truck, as a sailor would say, and they are out to elect an honest, decent government, with H. C. Brewster at its head.

The Bowser party is issuing pamphlets which seek to show that nothing was discovered in the public accounts enquiry. The people of the province read the evidence and have arrived at their own conclusions on this score, so that the Bowser pamphlets will be of no more effect than the reports of the hand-picked committee were. Bowser stands condemned of having handed over millions illegally to the P. G. E.; of having acted as agent for that company while it was trying to secure public funds, in a way contrary to their agreement; of having allowed special legislation to go through to favor the Dominion Trust and to the ruin of many hard-working people of this province, and of a host of other actions unworthy of a premier; an attorney-general, or a public man. Bowser will be driven out of public life in this province, and his rubber stamps and "jelly-fish" politicians will go with him.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

A prominent Manitoba Conservative was in the city the other day, and in discussing the political situation here, was asked if, as a Conservative, he would not vote against Bowser. He replied, "In politics I have always been a Conservative, but I have always

tried to be honest in all my transactions."

The Bowserites seek to excuse the Parliament Buildings scandal on the ground that contractor McDonald lost money on the deal. Harry Price, in awarding the sub-contracts, saw that his friends did not take the contracts at too low prices.

The Bowser excuse for reducing the Mackenzie & Mann registration fees from \$14,000 to \$200 was that the company was in difficulties and the bond-holders were in England, while similar treatment had been meted out to the Salvation Army. The City of Prince Rupert could do with a whole lot of the same kind of treatment at the hands of the government, but there is no sign of its coming.

According to the hired Bowser press, H. C. Brewster is out to put the province of British Columbia out of business, just for the fun of the thing. Any sane man knows that H. C. Brewster's plans are carefully laid for the remodeling of the whole system at Victoria and the putting of the province on a sound basis, financially and industrially. His first duty is to tear Bowserism up by the roots, and this he will do, with the assistance of the people.

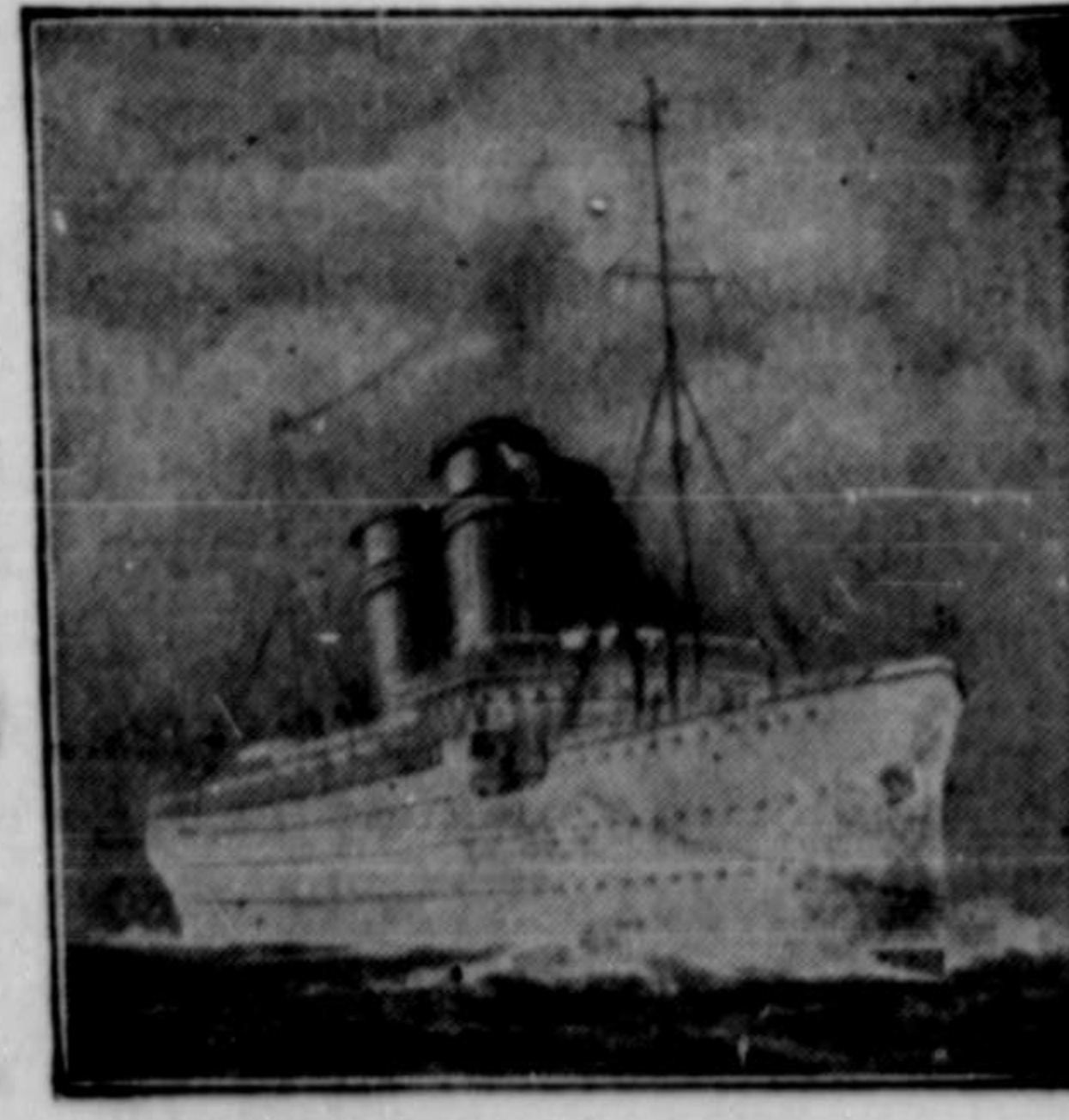

To the Editor,

When such a powerful and well organized body as the liquor trade spends vast sums of money in advertising in order to retain a most profitable monopoly, there must be something very alarming to them about the Prohibition Act which will be submitted to the people of this province on Sept. 14th. No more convincing proof of the efficacy of this act could be given than this.

The great posters proclaiming that there is nothing in this act which will deprive the individual of his right to purchase liquor is an argument in its favor with men of moderation.

The licensed bar with its treating system and the sale of liquor stimulated by the greed of gain on the part of a huge monopoly has had a fair trial and has been found wanting. Everywhere I go in this province I hear the same remark—"The liquor men have brought this on themselves." The people of the province are thoroughly convinced that a change is necessary. Whatever defects there may be in the Prohibition Act it will at least open the way for a better order of things. Never again should we allow the private gain of the few to control the liquor trade of the country and dominate provincial politics. The right to drink a glass of beer is not the main issue in the coming contest. We refuse to be shut up to the alternative—absolute Prohibition or the present system. Every vote cast for the Prohibition Act on Sept. 14th is a blow against the tyranny of a devastating monopoly which we have endured too long. We have nothing to say against the men in the trade. We condemn the system. It may have served its purpose as a step to better things, but it must be changed before we are enslaved. This is a fight for freedom.

use of ballots purporting to represent the soldiers' votes, the will of the people could be overridden and the machine government kept in power in contempt of the desires of the electors. This is how the government which we have in mind would have put this act to work.

"The Bowser Government has been popularly credited with a marked similarity to this defunct government of odorous memory, and the audacity it has shown in placing this law on the statute book and employing it in the way it proposes to do, is conclusive proof that it is precisely the kind of government that it is credited with being. The law, upon its face, is crooked. It could only have been thought of or enacted by politicians who, in their electoral methods are crooked. It will be operated in keeping with the spirit which inspired the legislation. The intention undoubtedly is, by the manipulation of these ballots to save the Bowser government from the condemnation which it will receive from the bona fide electors of British Columbia on September 14.

The experience, however, of Manitoba is encouraging in showing that even the most reckless government can only withstand public opinion for a brief period. The crash is sure to come, and the longer it is delayed beyond its natural time, the greater the debacle."
