### VON MACKENZEN TAKES SUPREME COMMAND--HEAVY AUSTRO-GERMAN LOSSES

#### ALLIED GAINS ALONG ENTIRE SOMME FRONT

"Peace at Any Price" Literature Confiscated—Berlin Wants Wheat—Armenians are Starving.

British Headquarters, France, August 19.—The Allies last night attacked along the entire line from Ancre to the Somme. The British captured German positions in the region of Ginchy and at Guillemont, while the French advanced at Maurepas.

The French offensive on the Verdun front continues and Berlin admits that our Allies have made gains at Fleury.

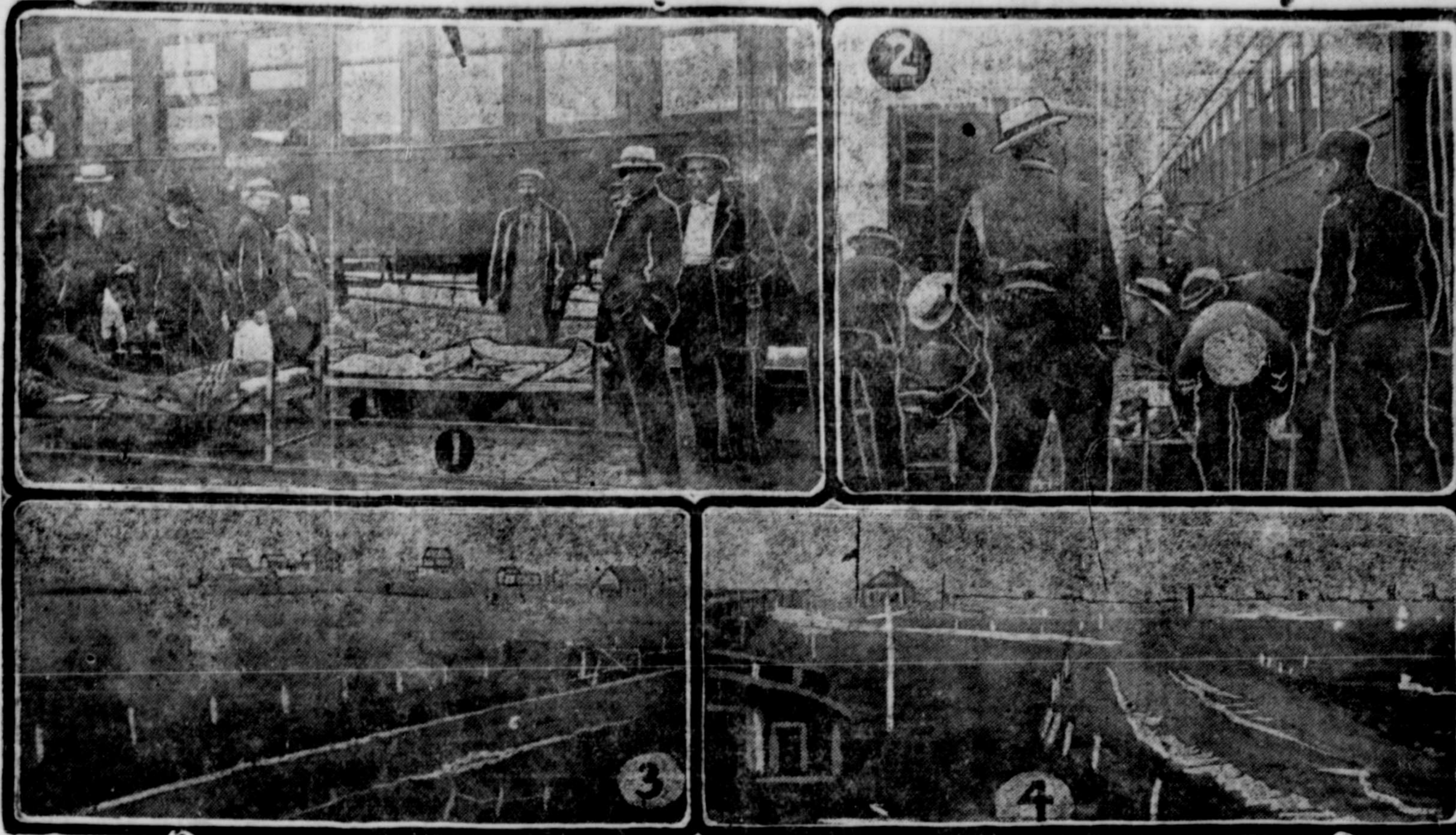
**Berlin Wants Wheat.**  
London, Aug. 19.—Berlin agents are at Budapest negotiating for the assignment to Germany of the surplus of the Hungarian wheat crop.

**Peace Literature.**  
Rotterdam, Aug. 19.—The German authorities are confiscating enormous quantities of literature which is being circulated among the laboring classes advocating peace at any price.

**Starving Armenians.**  
Boston, Aug. 19.—Thousands of Armenians are starving on account of the refusal of the Turkish government to supply them with bread. An official investigation proved that frantic parents had killed and eaten their children.

#### WOMAN SUFFRAGE COMING IN BRITAIN

London, Aug. 19.—The women of Great Britain will probably be permitted to vote before the next general election. Since the outbreak of the war the question of woman suffrage has been placed upon an entirely different basis. The frantic efforts of the suffragists to gain their end have ceased and the women of Britain are entirely devoted to the great duty of assisting in the prosecution of the war.

#### BOWSER MACHINE ON ELECTION BUSINESS

Agassiz, August 15.—The electioneering of wheelbarrows, picks and shovels, road foremen, bridge foremen, fire wardens, etc., etc., is the principal move of the Bowser patronage system in the Yale district at present. In and around Agassiz one road is being built and several repaired. The subsidy for these roads in some instances was made two years ago, but nothing was done.

#### No Votes Were Needed.

Bridges which should have been built four and five years ago are being promised. In fact the principal road built in this district during A. Lucas' regime was built from his own ranch to the railroad. This road was not needed and looks like a playground for wildcats and cougar, and it is a safe statement that not 20 tons of produce passes over this road each year, nevertheless it was built with the people's money and other roads were neglected. Lucas will hit a wave of indignation votes of September 14 that will make him a political "has been."

#### CONSUL-GENERAL FOR SWEDEN HERE

David Bergstrom, Ph. D., Consul-General for Sweden in Canada, arrived from Montreal last evening. Mr. Bergstrom, who is on his way to the Yukon, will spend a few days in town. He was met at the train by Mayor McCaffery and a number of the representatives of Sweden in this city, and today is being shown over the city, including a visit to the drydock and cold storage plant.

The object of Mr. Bergstrom's visit to the northwest is to gather information which may lead to the establishment of more direct trade between Canada and Sweden. He is greatly impressed with the possibilities of development in the west, and feels that the Canadian wheat and flour which is at present shipped to Sweden through the United States should go direct from this country.

#### B. C. SOLDIERS WILL RETURN LIBERALS

A Montreal correspondent sends the following to The Sun: "The manifesto issued to the people of British Columbia, signed by Mr. Brewster and Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, has created something of a sensation here. I enclose the Montreal Gazette's comment on the same." The Gazette comment enclosed reads as follows:

"Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper has signed with Mr. H. C. Brewster, leader of the Liberal opposition in the British Columbia legislature, an appeal to the soldier voters, but in which all voters are included, to use their votes to defeat the Bowser government. Long ago Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper and Sir Richard McBride, though nominally of the same party, ceased to be political friends. The conditions then created are evidently continuing in the case of Sir Richard McBride's successor in the premiership. The situation may have its effect on the election of a new legislature next month, the result of which may now be considered doubtful."

Our correspondent adds: "A friend of mine just returned from England says that the Liberals will poll nine-tenths of the British Columbia votes in the camps in England. He tells me that the feeling against the Tories is such that there is almost open mutiny in the various camps. Favoritism, graft, etc., are rampant and the soldiers are waiting for the opportunity to show what they think of Sam Hughes and the Tory party generally."

#### VON MACKENZEN TAKES COMMAND OF GERMAN ARMY

All Available Guns and men to be Rushed to Somme—Terrible Losses of Enemy on Eastern Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, Aug. 19.—Field Marshal Von Mackenzen is now in supreme command of Germany's armies with the exception of the Crown Prince's forces at Verdun. He has ordered all reserves in the training camps and all available artillery to be rushed to the Somme front in an effort to stop the Anglo-French offensive.

#### Russian Front.

Petrograd, Aug. 19.—The Austro-Germans have again suffered terrible losses in an unsuccessful attempt to oppose the Russian armies in Galicia.

The Russian military critic Gablonsky estimates that the Austrian losses for June and July amount to eight hundred and thirty thousand, in killed, wounded and prisoners.

**RECRUITING**

It is satisfactory to learn that Ottawa is revising Canadian recruiting methods and that an effort will be made to bring some sort of system where overlapping has been the general rule. The greatest cause of overlapping has been the fact that far too many battalions were being raised in the same districts at the same time. In Winnipeg, at one time, there were ten battalions, each many hundreds under strength though they had been recruiting for over a year and each with agents covering the same field.

The cause of this trouble was of course the enormous number of commissioned officers, with political influence, who had to be attached somewhere. Battalions were created in order to provide positions for the enormous array of majors and colonels which existed, and the result was that each battalion was in bitter competition with its neighbors for recruits. Had a few battalions been recruited at a time, the men would have proceeded overseas in a matter of weeks, instead of having to wait around for months, and in some cases for over a year, before being sent abroad. The quicker movement across to England would have stimulated recruiting and less difficulty would have been experienced in bringing battalions up to strength.

It is to be hoped that the only qualification for the post of director of recruiting will be experience and ability and that such positions will be given entirely to returned soldiers, who are bound to be much more effective recruiting agents than civilians who have never seen service. Gone about in a methodical way, recruiting will cost much less, and will give much better results.

**SOLDIERS' VOTING**

That the Bowser method of taking the soldiers' vote has caused a good deal of comment

in Britain is evident from the fact that questions have been asked regarding it in the House of Commons, and that a request has been made for a report as to machinery employed in the election.

It is to be hoped that the members of the House are provided with copies of the Soldiers' Voting Act. That is all they require, in order to be enlightened as to the machinery employed. The scheme outlined in the original act is so utterly foreign to British ideas of justice that it will cause some further comment.

If the members are familiar with the activities of "Soapy" Welsh, in regard to the Vancouver school board contracts, they will be further enlightened as to the possibilities of the act, when it is interpreted and administered by an energetic disciple of Bowser. Bowser methods are unheard of in British politics and it will be hard for the average British member to conceive of such a thing as manipulation, but, unfortunately for Canada, the history of the McBride-Bowser administration and of the lately deceased Roblin government is fairly well known in London, and, in the light of history, the many loopholes and kinks in the act will be only too apparent.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

The Allied artillery must be simply wiping out the German trenches on the Somme front. There will be news of another big advance one of these days.

President Wilson seems to be in a fair way towards settling the railwaymen's difficulties. If he is able to get over the trouble which has been brewing for months, he will have accomplished something much more worth doing than going to war.

British Columbia is producing copper at the rate of \$20,000,000 per annum. This must be some-



thing that Bowser, and Comany have overlooked.

The Bowser meeting at Fort Steele the other evening, like the majority of Bowser meetings throughout the province, became a Liberal demonstration in which Bowser came in for some severe heckling and finally lost his temper.

The presence of R. F. Green on the Bowser platform at Fort Steele was responsible for the beginning of the interruption. "Bob" came in for a severe grilling from the audience, which insisted on asking many awkward questions in regard to Mr. Green's various political dealings of the past.

**BRITISH COLUMBIA PRESS ASSOCIATION**

Vancouver, Aug. 19.—The formation of a British Columbia division of the Press Association was completed at a meeting of coast publishers at the exhibition grounds yesterday. Mr. Sutherland, of the Nelson News was elected president; Mr. Simpson, of the Kamloops Sentinel, first vice-president; Mr. Savage, of the Cowichan Leader, second vice-president, and Mr. Burd, of the Vancouver Province, secretary-treasurer.

**KELLY WILL APPEAL TO SUPREME COURT**

Winnipeg, Aug. 19.—Contractor Kelly has been denied a new trial before the court of appeal and now intends to apply to the supreme court. It is improbable that the crown will move for sentence until the conclusion of the trial of the ex-ministers.

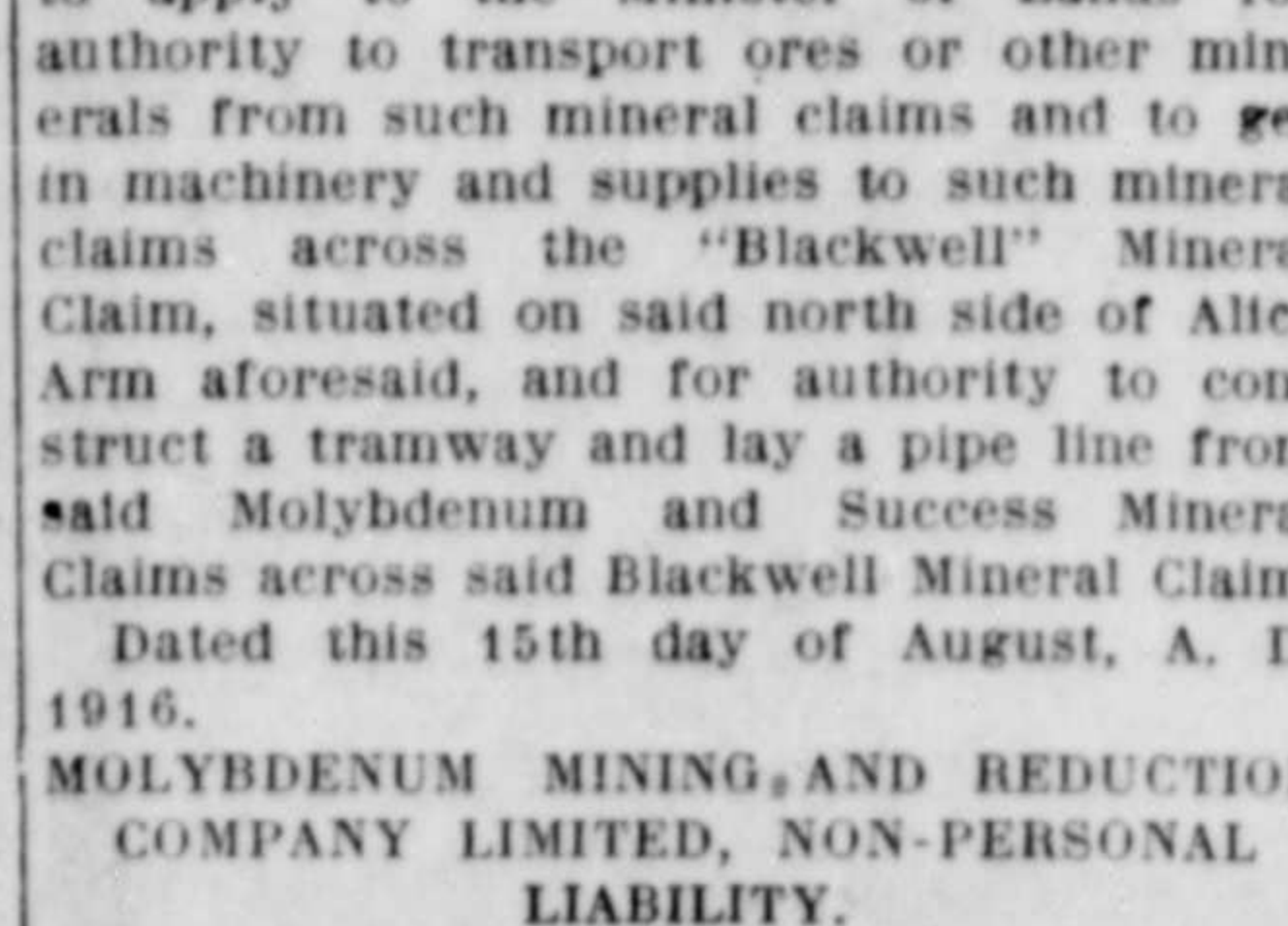
**FAREWELL DANCE**
