HUNDREDS OF GERMANS SURRENDER IN WEST

RUSSIANS ARE ADVANCING THROUGH CARPATHIANS -- PORTUGAL IS PREPARING

"COMRADES, WE SURRENDER," IS GERMANS' CRY

Impossible to Face Terrific Allied Fire—Hundreds of Germans Marching in—Roumania Is Ready.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 22.—German prisoners taken north of Pozieres in the Thiepval region announce that human beings cannot stand against the terrible fire of the Allied big guns. Germany's expectations of victory are completely shattered and hundreds of German soldiers are marching into British territory exclaiming, "Comrades, we surrender."

The general situation on the western front is unchanged, the French and British being busy consolidating the ground gained over the weekend. The Allied troops now occupy commanding positions on the road to Bapaume.

Roumanian Rumors.

Rumors, which are undoubtedly correct, are freely circulating regarding Roumania's intention of joining the Entente Allies. Mobilization is well under way and the army in training now exceeds half a million men.

Toronto, Aug. 22.—Mr. Dewart, the Liberal candidate in the by-election here yesterday, was returned by a majority of 643. RUSSIANS ARE MARCHING INTO CARPATHIANS

Fierce Fighting on Stokhod and at Pinsk—Russians Entering into Hungary—Spain Preparing.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Aug. 22.—There is fierce fighting raging along the Stokhod River, while the Russians are also menacing the German salient at Pinsk. On the Stokhod River the Russians are steadily gaining, with Kovel as their immediate objective.

The Russians are advancing into Hungary through two of the passes of the Carpathians. The Austrians have made several counter attacks against the invading columns, but each has been repulsed.

Spain Prepares.

Madrid, Aug. 22.—The Spanish military re-organization bill, which is now before parliament, provides for a peace strength of one hundred and eighty thousand men.

SHIPPING MEN ARE VISITING THE ISLANDS

C. Gardner Johnson, of Vancouver, one of the best known shipping men on the coast, was in town yesterday, accompanied by Mrs. Johnson. He is in the north chiefly in connection with matters affecting pilotage.

Accompanied by E. H. Beazley, manager for the Union Steamship Company in Vancouver, and J. H. Barnsley, the local manager, Mr. Johnson left for the Queen Charlotte Islands on the Prince John last evening, to inspect the harbors of the Islands.

FIRE PROTECTION

In these he found too much oil and gasoline lying around, and recommended that steps be taken to enforce the law in this respect. Soldier Accidentally Shot.



RAILWAY EXECUTIVES OPPOSED TO WILSON

Washington, August 22.—The railway executives are opposed to President Wilson's proposals for the prevention of the threatened general railway strike. The chief difficulty is over the President's endorsement of the eight-hour day, which the railway managers insist is not feasible. The managers have convened to prepare their answer to Wilson.

The general opinion is that the railway managers will accept Wilson's proposals, if the President stands firm. The railroad magnates do not want a strike which would tie up the whole country, but are anxious to make a settlement on the best terms possible.

CAMP BORDEN STILL CAUSING BIG TROUBLE

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—Camp Borden, which represents another million of the people's money thrown to the birds, continues to be the government's nightmare. Things there are getting no better fast. Cheer up, the worst is yet to come.

Sir Sam's impulsiveness in hustling thirty-two thousand soldiers into a half-finished camp so that he could hold a review for the moving pictures, is causing the Militia Department, the Headquarters Staff and the Camp Borden authorities a great deal of trouble.

A well defined rumor is afloat that Brigadier General Logie is to be "promoted" overseas; a sort of Irish promotion. If Brigadier General Logie is thus "promoted" to a position of splendid idleness in England, it will be because somebody has to act as goat for Sir Sam's mistakes.

Of course, Sir Sam is not responsible for the fervent heat of July and August, a heat which burned up all previous records, but he is responsible for his own vanity which causes him to crowd an army into the hottest spot he could find in the hottest months in forty-five years.

Camp Borden is no more acceptable to the soldiers now than it was a month ago, when the first riot took place. First riot? Has there been another then? Yes. It occurred not long ago and was a very nasty affair. The Camp Borden correspondents were persuaded or censored out of saying anything about it, and when it did filter through to the newspaper offices, considerations of public policy held it up there. However, such is the fact. Two riots in two months—that's going some, eh?

At present Camp Borden is getting along on something less than half strength. There are not enough men there to go through the big brigade movements, which was one of the alleged objects in shifting the men there from the other smaller camps. There are seventeen hundred men absent without leave, and a provost marshal has been appointed to locate them and round them up. He has about as practical a job as might be sweeping up all the leaves that fall in Ontario next autumn. There are some seven thousand men absent on leave and these seven thousand absent on leave represent another part of the price discipline pays for Sir Sam's folly.

Leave is an easy thing to get at Camp Borden. The soldiers openly boast that all they have to do is ask for it. Many soldiers will be found who claim to have had three day week-end leaves for three weeks running. The spirit of discontent must be soothed some way and the easiest plan is to let the men go visiting. Overstayed leaves are treated leniently. Almost any excuse for coming back late will be accepted and excuses that are too thin to

GREAT ALLIED CAMPAIGN ON BALKAN FRONT

Italians Sending Forces to Join Saloniki Army—Portugal Preparing to Join the Allies.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Aug. 22.—Italian forces are reported to be linking up with the seven hundred thousand French, British and Serbian reinforcements which are being sent to Saloniki following the inauguration of hostilities.

The fact that such a large number of reinforcements are being sent to the Balkan front indicates that the Allies are embarking upon a campaign of the most extensive proportions.

Portugal Also.

Preparation for Portugal's active participation in the war on the side of the Allies is being made and a Franco-British mission is leaving shortly to co-operate with the Portuguese authorities. It will be remembered that Portugal issued mobilization orders last March and it is a well known fact that, since that time, the Portuguese army has been in training for the campaign.

FIFTEEN HALIBUT SCHOONERS ARRIVE

Every day seems to be halibut arrival day along the waterfront now, and, last night and this morning, usually recognized as a quiet time after the rush of the weekend, fifteen schooners arrived with about 250,000 pounds between them. They were the Treo, 6,000; Aurora, 13,000; Agnes B, 14,000; Seymour, 35,000; Constitution, 30,000; Corona, 50,000; Tom & Al, 20,000; Presto, 15,000; Dip, 3,000; Urano, 10,000; Trio, 18,000; Doratt, 20,000; Tide, 1,500; Royal, 6,000, and the Pharoan, 5,000. Prices ranged from 6 1/2 to 6 3/4.

THAT WRIT

The Bowser press, in order to cover up the many misdeeds of the Bowser administration, is devoting most of its attention to proclaiming that the Brewster writ was issued in order to tie up the legislation of the past session.

Evidently, the Bowserites admit that the legislation was passed illegally, as, if it were passed in perfect order, the Brewster writ cannot possibly set it aside. If the legislation is legal, a thousand writs would not make it illegal, and, if it is illegal, all the protestations of Bowser and his satellites will not make it legal, nor prevent any individual in the province from contesting any part of it.

As everyone knows, the Brewster writ was issued for the purpose of obtaining for the people of this province an accounting of the funds spent by the Pacific Great Eastern Railway. This was demanded on the floor of the Legislature, but of course Bowser with his steam-roller flattened out the request in the usual fashion. An accurate accounting of the millions squandered on the P. G. E. was the last thing the government desired.

H. C. Brewster is asking for the aid of the courts to recover for the people of this province the monies which have been misapplied by the government, and misspent by the railway company. The details as to how this company put none of their own money into the railroad, but built it entirely at public expense, are familiar to all. The contractors let to themselves the construction work at prices which even the notorious Mackenzie-Mann outfit dared not attempt.

The only Bowser answer is that Brewster is tying up the affairs of the province. If the arresting of piracy of the public purse is tying up the affairs of the province, then Brewster is guilty, and he ought to be proud of it. If the demanding

of an accounting from Foley, Welch & Stewart is tying up the affairs of the province, they ought to have been tied up long ago. What Brewster is trying to tie up is the string at the mouth of the public purse. The money of this province has flowed out like water into the dams of the railroad construction firms of Mackenzie & Mann and Foley, Welch & Stewart and the flow must be stopped if the province is not to bleed to death.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

In a wild endeavor to grab all the support possible, the Bowser press is already claiming credit for the government because this province will ship \$20,000,000 worth of copper this year. The war had nothing whatever to do with it, oh no.

H. H. Stevens is telling the press in Vancouver how flourishing the north is and that things are looking well for the government. Mr. Stevens must not have noticed that 30,000-acre tract of idle Dunsmuir land near Hazelton, nor the hundreds of thousands of acres elsewhere which are tied up by the speculator, and which the Soldiers' Homestead Act will fail to touch.

Visitors from Telkwa and the Omineca country generally are emphatic in their statements that A. M. Manson will be returned with a large majority. "It is not so much that we want a Liberal member," said one rancher, "but we are all sick and tired of Bowser and are ready to give a Liberal government a chance."

All the meetings, speeches and political pamphlets ever put together will have very little effect upon the result of the election on September 14th. What is going to send Bowser down to defeat is the personal experiences of the average man in this province during the past few years. When a man has had painful personal experience of the maladministration



CAMP BORDEN STILL CAUSING BIG TROUBLE

(Continued From Page One.)

hold water are penalized by a trifling dockage of pay.

The harvest furloughs are another great joke. Harvest furlough is another name for two weeks summer holidays with pay. City bred soldiers who never saw a reaper and binder in their lives and who don't even want to see one, obtain furloughs with ease and despatch. All the big cities in Ontario within a radius of one hundred and fifty miles of Camp Borden are thronged with harvest furloughers, harvesting a good time and giving their stomachs a chance after the bad grub at Camp Borden. Toronto has perhaps two thousand harvest furloughers in her midst. There may be harvest furloughers in the country where harvests are supposed to flourish, but if so they have taken cover well or they can't be seen on account of their khaki which is the same color as the ripening fields.

However, one can't blame the harvest furloughers for getting away from the heat at Camp Borden, also from the sand flies, which conduct daily manoeuvres there, and the mosquitoes who find the electric light service so handy in their tent to tent inspection, and the black flies, who come charging in from the swamps, and the chiggers and—well Camp Borden has every biting bug known to modern science and they are all on the job.

Lately the battalion commanders have invented certain alleviations, and now many companies may be seen drilling almost as nature made them. At least they are lightly clad, about as much as the Soldiers Three had on when they took Lungtungpeg—

that is to say, not enough to dust a flute. This makes Camp Borden a rather awkward place for ladies to visit, unless they are used to these more than Palm Beach effects. If the Camp Borden summer costume goes with the soldiers to Flanders, it will certainly startle the Germans. After all it's only getting back to first principles. Our ancestors, the ancient Britons, fought that way, only slightly staining their bodies with wood to preserve as Bernard Shaw says, their respectability.

These are some of the ways in which a hot-as-hades hole like Camp Borden upsets military etiquette and undermines discipline. Camp Borden also hurts recruiting.

"What!" exclaims the husky lad, when the sergeant with ribbons on his cap approaches him, "enlist now and be sent to that fag end of creation."

The rumor persists that Major General Lessard may be made commandant at Camp Borden. It sounds almost too good to be true. What Camp Borden needs, if General Logie is sent overseas, is another strong man, and Major General Lessard is that man. There is no better, braver, brainier soldier in Canada and one has only to look at his record in South Africa to know that. That Sir Sam is "down on him" only goes to prove that he is a good general and not an office Napoleon like some of his favorites.

Henri Bourassa and his Nationalist accomplices have done much to discourage recruiting in Quebec. But General Lessard's treatment by Sir Ham Hughes is a practical case of invidious discrimination against a French-Canadian which does not tend to help enlistments either.—H. F. Gadsby.


