## BULGARIANS YIELDING ON SALONIKI FRONT

### FANTASTIC GERMAN PRESS REPORTS -- THE PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS SQUABBLE

#### BALKAN DRIVE ADVANCING ON VARDAR VALLEY

Soldiers of Seven Nations Opposed to Bulgarians—Somme Offensive Relieved Verdun Pressure.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Aug. 23.—Soldiers of seven nations are fighting on the Saloniki front. The Bulgarians have been forced back on the wings and the Allies have advanced in the centre in the direction of the Vardar Valley. Unconfirmed despatches state that additional Italian forces have arrived at Saloniki.

#### Unchanged.

On the other British, French, Russian and Italian fronts the situation remains unchanged except for minor engagements.

#### Verdun Relieved.

Hon. D. Lloyd George states that the great Anglo-French offensive on the Somme front has relieved the pressure upon Verdun and that the French have been ably assisted by the Russians in defeating the German attempts to carry this point.

#### 35 Zeppelins Gone.

It was announced in the House of Commons yesterday that the Entente Allies have accounted for thirty-five Zeppelins since the commencement of the German raids on the British coast.

#### ITEMS OF DESTRUCTION

Max Nordau estimates that pensions of all belligerent nations will require at least \$800,000,000 per annum. Yearly earnings of productive laborers now fighting, taken at an average of \$200, represents a total loss of \$10,000,000,000. Destruction in Belgium due to war is placed at \$1,600,000,000, in France in the war zone at \$2,800,000,000, and \$2,800,000,000 in the Russian, Galician and Balkan theatres of war, or a total of \$7,200,000,000.—Exchange.

#### LIBERALS ARE OBJECTING TO ROGERS' PLAN

Heated Discussion Over Rebuilding of House of Parliament at Ottawa—Bob Rogers very Busy.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, August 23.—There is a heated discussion in committee respecting the tearing down of the Parliament Building wall, valued at two million dollars, and it is rumored that the Liberal members, who are in a minority on the committee, will resign. Hon. Robert Rogers maintains that the architects are to blame.

The original intention of the committee was to rebuild the Parliament Buildings, using the old wall which was still solid. The total cost of the rebuilding was to be about four millions, but, without consulting the Liberal members on the building committee, Hon. Robert Rogers arranged for a complete new building at an indefinite cost, the contractors getting 8 per cent. on the cost, with a liberal allowance for depreciation on their plant. The old wall which was discarded in the new Rogers scheme was so strong that the contractors had to blast it with dynamite.

#### RAILWAY PRESIDENTS DRAFTING ANSWER

Washington, Aug. 23.—Sixty railroad presidents are drafting an answer to President Wilson's proposals for the prevention of a strike.

The army appropriation bill has been repassed and the president has given evidence of his intention to veto the immigration bill.

Montreal, August 23.—Three more employees of the munition works at Drummondville have succumbed to injuries received at the recent fire.

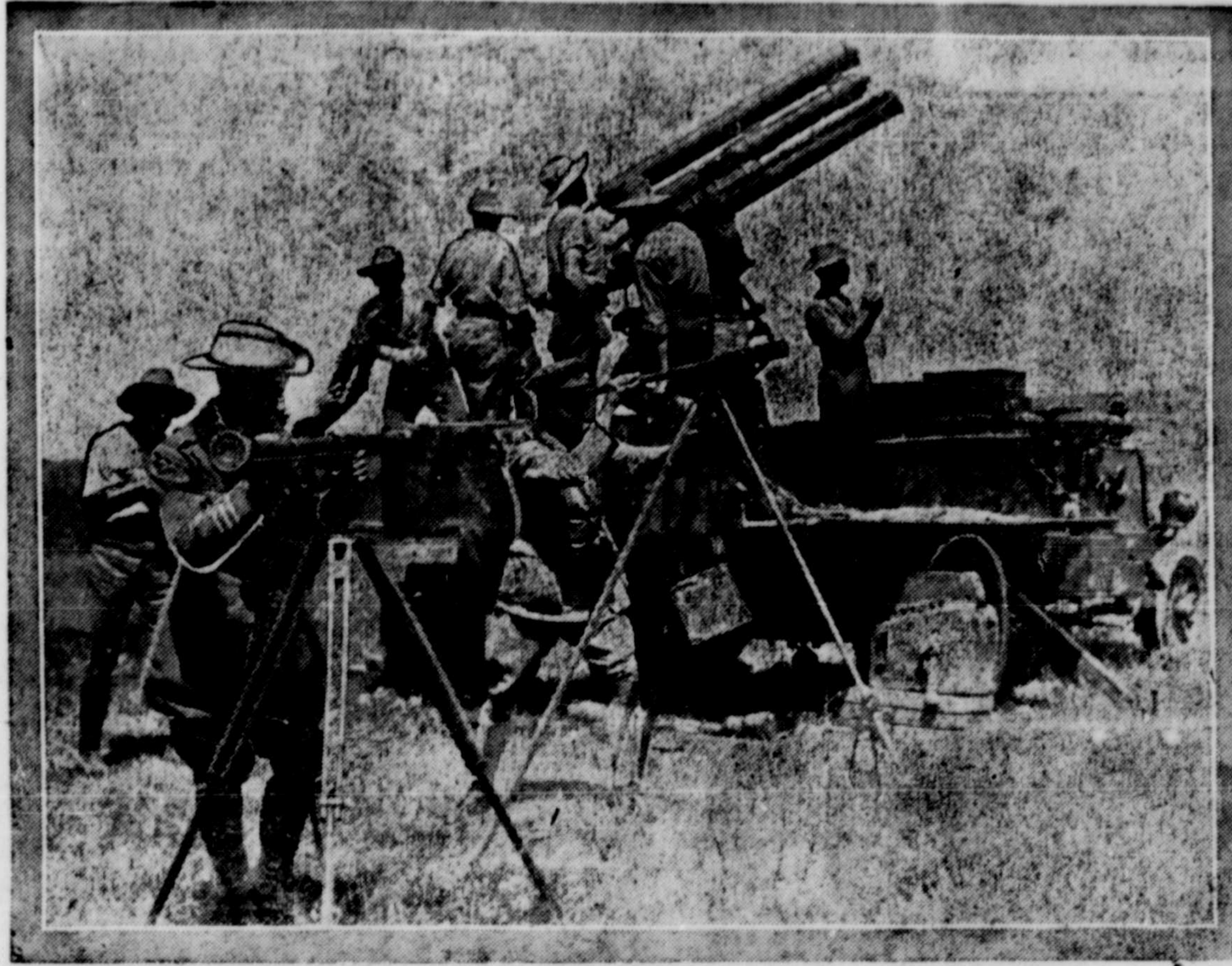
#### Municipal Convention.

#### LIEUT. A. W. M'KNIGHT KILLED IN ACTION

Word reached town last evening that Lieut. A. W. McKnight, son of Robert McKnight, registrar for North Grey, Ontario, has been killed in action. Lieut. McKnight was well known to many in Prince Rupert, as he was formerly with Ritchie & Agnew as an engineer. He was a brilliant graduate of the Royal Military College, Kingston, and, before coming to Prince Rupert, was engaged on hydro work near Kenora. After leaving this city, he became town engineer at Port Moody.

On the outbreak of the war he joined an Engineers' Corps and was soon sent to the front. On November 5th, he was severely wounded by shrapnel and was sent home to Canada. Returning to England in April, he was given a military instructorship, but, at his own request, was sent again to the front. Just before he was killed he carried a wounded sergeant off the field under fire. The gallant young officer was only 27 years of age and has another brother in France.

#### LEGATE CREEK MINES ARE SHOWING UP WELL

Mining development is this district is proceeding quietly but steadily. The men interested are saying little but that important development is taking place is shown by the fact that W. P. Lynch, who visited the Royal Group on Legate Creek recently, has taken a third interest in this property from "Bud" Corley and James Reid for \$30,000.

Mr. Corley left this morning for Legate with ten men to carry out further development work. Samples taken from the property assay from \$200 to \$300 per ton and the "Royal" promises to be a winner.

Another Legate property which is showing up splendidly is that purchased by Price & Aikens from Whitmore and Orr last winter. This spring, the government built a road part of the way in and the company carried a trail to the mine. Three hundred tons of ore was taken out by eight men this spring, without using a stick of powder and this ore is now being packed out to the railroad. It shows a very high percentage of copper.

#### Frisco Group.

The Frisco Group, which was purchased by William Tuttle and Dan Sutherland from Whitmore & Orr, is also showing big values and a gang of men has been at work there since August 3rd. There is a big vein of rich copper and silver and the ore is now being packed out over a six-mile trail to the track. Mr. Sutherland reports that they expect to have a car of ore for shipment to Granby by the end of this month.

The Halliday Group, in the same district is also being developed, a tunnel being driven there now. There is a 7-foot vein showing an average value of \$63 to the ton. This property is owned by Price & Aikens.

#### GERMAN PRESS AND CANADIAN INDEPENDENCE

Fantastic Statements for Neutral Consumption—Serious Fire at Yorkshire Powder Magazine.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 23.—German papers just to hand announce that Canada and Ireland have proclaimed their independence and that the general opinion prevailing throughout the Dominion is that the Germans were victorious in the Jutland battle.

The above is typical of several additional misleading statements issued by the German press bureau for the benefit of neutrals.

#### Explosion in Yorkshire

There has been an explosion in Yorkshire as the result of a fire outside of the magazine of an ammunition works. The adjacent buildings, rolling stock and railway sidings were virtually destroyed. Several firemen were killed through the bursting of the boiler of a fire engine.

#### TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

There was a large attendance of delegates at the Trades and Labor Council meeting last night when President S. D. Macdonald took the chair. Credentials were received from D. Millen and A. Watchman, delegates from the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union.

The Labor Day committee reported that arrangements for the annual celebration were proceeding well and that citizens are contributing liberally to the funds.

The question of having Mayor McCaffery present in his official capacity was voted down, because of the stand he has taken on a number of labor questions. It was also decided not to invite a labor speaker from outside points to address the gathering until a

TREASURER TO SIGN ALL REQUISITIONS

The city council Monday night passed the second reading of a bylaw requiring all items of expenditure to have the signature of the city treasurer.

Ald. Casey thought that this was placing too much in the hands of one man and described it as approaching a monarchy.

The mayor explained that it was not a matter of delegating any new power but simply the placing of an added responsibility. It was done in all bigger cities and he thought it essential that the man who was thoroughly conversant with the expenditures under the various departmental appropriations was the proper party to carry that responsibility.

Ald. Casey wanted to know if, after the committee had approved of any expenditure, the treasurer would have the power to veto it.

Ald. Nelson said that Ald. Casey had got a wrong idea as to the bylaw. The idea was simply to have someone in the city hall accept responsibility for each item of expenditure.

Ald. Casey said that the finance committee had charge of such matters and that last year it had not been found necessary to have any such measure.

The mayor said that Ald. Casey did not seem to understand the bylaw. It did not interfere with the authority of the council, nor did the fact that the last council did not follow this plan have any bearing on the subject. It was a method followed by most cities and was found to be very effective. The bylaw carried.

Casey's nomination was not carried out when the labor interests of that district were favorable to him. The correspondence also stated that W. X. Macdonald, the Conservative candidate in Atlin, had sought to give the impression that he had the endorsement of Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council. The secretary was instructed to inform the correspondent that such was not the case, as the Trades and Labor Council refused to endorse any candidate affiliated with either political party.

Correspondence from Alice Arm, enclosing a considerable sum of money to support a candidate in Atlin, was also received. The money was returned with a letter of thanks.

The council went on record as endorsing the Woman Suffrage movement. It was decided to send a delegate to Toronto to be present at the Canadian Congress to be held in that city shortly.
