BRITISH HAVE CAPTURED THIEPVAL RIDGE

GERMANS LAUNCH SUPER-ZEPPELIN -- RUSSIANS ARE PRESSING THE ENEMY BACK

RUSSIAN BEAR PRESSING THE GERMANS BACK

Enemy May be Compelled to Retire Along Entire Front—No Peace Offers to Britain.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Aug. 24.—The tremendous pressure which is being brought to bear upon the enemy on the eastern front will probably compel the Germans to retire along the entire three hundred miles of the Russian front.

No Peace Offers.

London, Aug. 24.—Lord Robert Cecil announced in the House of Commons yesterday that no peace overtures had been made by Germany to Great Britain.

House Adjourns.

Parliament stands adjourned until October 10th, the woman suffrage and registration reform questions having been shelved in the meantime.

Deutschland Arrives.

Berlin, Aug. 24.—The submarine Deutschland arrived at the mouth of the River Weser on August 23rd. Bremerhaven, Germany's most important naval base, is near the mouth of the Weser.

NEW BRUNSWICK GRITS DEMAND AN ELECTION

St. John, N. B., Aug. 24.—The Liberals in the Legislature request that an election be held in order to fill the vacant seats. The government has a narrow majority and is avoiding the holding of by-elections in order to escape defeat.

GERMANS HAVE ZEPPELINS AS BIG AS LINERS

Super-Zeppelins of Enormous Size Is Germany's Latest Move—Westfalen was Damaged.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 24.—Germany has launched super-Zeppelins of gigantic size for the carrying on of attacks upon the British coast. The new type has a gas capacity of two million cubic feet; is seven hundred and eighty feet in length; has an eighty-foot beam, and a maximum speed of eighty miles an hour.

The super-Zeppelin has a cruising speed of thirty-five miles an hour and will be able to ascend to a height of seventeen thousand feet. Besides carrying machine guns, it will be able to stow away five tons of bombs and will carry a crew of thirty-five men.

German Admission.

Germany admits that the super-dreadnought Westfalen was damaged in the North Sea fight.

KELLY REFUSED TO PRODUCE ACCOUNTS

Winnipeg, Aug. 24.—Contractor Kelly has been taken to the provincial jail from the Assize Court. He refused to obey the judge's order that he produce documents, books and accounts in connection with the construction of the Parliament Buildings, which would have an important bearing on the trial of Sir Rodmond Roblin and his ex-ministers.

BUILDING COLLAPSES

New York, August 24.—Six are missing; one is dead; several are dying, and dozens have been injured through the collapse of a five storey brick tenement which was under construction in the Bronx district.

DANISH COALITION SCHEME HAS FAILED

Copenhagen, Aug. 24.—Negotiations for the formation of a coalition government have been unsuccessful. Denmark is having great difficulty in financing, as most of her indebtedness has been carried by Germany. There was a sharp division on the question of selling the Danish West Indies to the United States in order to help out the situation and it was hoped that, by forming a coalition, some basis of financing acceptable to both sides might be arrived at, but the scheme has meantime fallen through.

FRENCH CREDIT

New York, Aug. 24.—The completion of negotiations for the extension of the second commercial credit to France is announced. The amount of the credit is twenty-five millions.

SHORTAGE OF ICE AND CARS FOR HALIBUT

The halibut packing houses here are suffering from the big rush of business and this morning, with the exception of the Booth Company, which carries its own ice supply and uses its own cars, were without ice and refrigerator cars. Fortunately, the arrivals were light, there being but three schooners, the Pere Gynt with 15,000 pounds, the Orient with 10,000 and the Lillian S. with 12,000 pounds.

The Atlin Fisheries had to send their schooner Zora to Ketchikan yesterday with 25,000 pounds owing to the ice shortage, the Cold Storage Company not being able to produce ice fast enough to meet the demand. The City of Seattle should have been in this morning with a supply from Ketchikan, but has been delayed.

There are fifty-nine refrigerator cars between here and St. Paul, all bound west. There will be about seven cars on this afternoon's train which should help out the situation.

PRINCE RUPERT BOY HAD EXCITING TIME

James Murphy, who was formerly employed on the drydock construction here and who went to Galveston, Texas, to work for C. N. Crowell on a similar plant there, arrived in Prince Rupert on Tuesday evening after having spent some months of adventure which would furnish material for a thrilling story.

On May 18th, Jim joined the power schooner Lillian B. bound from Galveston to Vera Cruz. Out in the Gulf of Mexico they struck bad weather and, after being about 250 miles out, were driven back to within nine miles of their starting point. The weather abating, they set out again down the Gulf only to strike the tail end of the terrible hurricane which caused so much loss of life in that region. In all, they drifted about the Gulf for six weeks and then ran short of gasoline. Finally the schooner was driven on the beach two miles from Tampico, Mexico, after being two days without water. The ship struck at 9:30 at night and they clung to the masts until next morning when they managed to make shore safely.

Landing on Mexican soil, their real troubles began, the chief being a guard of Mexican customs officers who kept them locked up without food or water for four days. At the end of that time, they were allowed a little more freedom but no food. On the beach they found the ship's medicine chest which carried a bottle of chloroform, and this they smuggled into the guardroom. Not being versed in the use of anaesthetics, they applied a liberal dose to the Mexican guards and these gentlemen soon lost all interest in their surroundings and the boys did not worry whether they ever woke up.

Starving of hunger, they broke for a boarding house of the Standard Oil Company, which was manned only by Chinamen, and there they made up for lost meals. Meantime, the guards came to and called the assistance of a company of about thirty Mexican soldiers and then a serious fight began. The sailors had revolvers and had stolen the rifles of their guards, while the Mexicans were all armed with rifles, which they did not hesitate to use. The boys

BRITISH HAVE CAPTURED THE THIEPVAL RIDGE

Toughest Position on the Somme Front Fallen—Germans will Make Trieste Second Verdun.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Aug. 24.—After several days of desperate fighting, the British have captured the Thiepval ridge to the north of Pozieres. This elevation is the toughest portion of the German defensive on the Somme front, and this success should be the beginning of a more rapid advance in this region.

Artillery Fighting.

Paris, August 24.—North and south of the river Somme the artillery fighting is particularly severe.

Second Verdun.

With the Italians commanding the situation on the plateau before Trieste, the Germans are showing evidence of their determination to make the Austrian seaport a second Verdun. The enemy is busy preparing strong defence works against the Italian attacks.

The Italians have carried strong Austrian positions at Tolfano and are continuing to advance in the Dolomites and Travenanzes district and other sections of this front.

EIGHT HOUR DAY IS THE VITAL QUESTION

Washington, Aug. 24.—President Wilson has resumed his conference with the railroad executives and the prevailing opinion is that the prevention of a general strike depends upon the observance of an eight hour day.

FOREST FIRES RAGING ON SAGUENAY RIVER

Quebec, Aug. 24.—Forest fires are raging along the Saguenay river and it is feared that several villages have been destroyed. Navigation on the river is impossible owing to the dense clouds of smoke.

WASTE

Short of any defence against the Brewster charges of ruthless waste and extravagance, the Bowser machine press charges the coming premier of British Columbia with preaching "blue ruin." One glance at the public accounts of this province is enough to convince any man who knows the debit side of an account from the credit that this province is in a morass of debt from which it will take many years to climb out. The public accounts are not presented to the people in any very clear form, but the total expenditure and revenue cannot be hidden.

This province is carrying a debt of over thirty millions of dollars and, judging from the estimates brought down by the Bowser administration in the last Legislature, this amount might continue to grow indefinitely so far as they were concerned. Had this huge debt been incurred in building up revenue producing works there would be little cause for alarm, but, when one remembers that millions of it was incurred simply to keep the Bowser machine in charge of the public purse, there is ample reason for Mr. Brewster's timely warning.

Ten thousand dollars per mile has been spent on alleged roads in the Queen Charlotte Islands, yet the islands have no roads worthy of the name. Roads without beginning and without end have been built in all parts of the province to appease the cravings for expenditure on the part of Bowser followers. Huge sums were spent upon Strathcona Park and yet the public have no access to the heart of this wilderness. The Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company have been practically invited to help themselves to anything they see lying around in the way of finances, without any check having been kept on the way they spent the public money. At the present moment money

is being squandered in the most profligate fashion in order to try once more to play the confidence trick of buying the voter with his own money.

In excusing the waste of a few years ago, Bowser truthfully says that the province got the kind of government it asked for, but he is hugely mistaken in his belief that the people will again ask for that kind of government. These are days of retrenchment and curtailed expenditure and the people will again get the kind of government they ask for, but it is a very different kind of government, asked for by a people in a very different frame of mind. The delirium of real estate speculation is over, and this province has no more use for a real estate government. Nothing but the wreck remains, and a time of rebuilding is due. The rebuilding will be done by H. C. Brewster with a sane, sober government behind him. It will take long to wipe out the errors of the McBride-Bowser regime, and incidentally to pay its debts, but those debts will be paid and the province will get away to a new start and a real start on the road to real prosperity.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

W. X. Macdonald, the Bowser candidate for Atlin, tried to show that he had the endorsement of the Trades and Labor Council, but he did not make it stick. Following the same plan in this city, the names of several prominent labor men were put on William Manson's committee without asking the consent of those gentlemen.

John P. McConnell is trying hard to apologise for Bowserism. He ignores the notorious Pooley incident in Esquimalt and contents himself by saying that Bowser is not cowardly. Nothing could be more cowardly than Pooley's threat against the livelihood of four working men be-

cause they happened to be Liberals, yet Bowser has never repudiated Pooley's action.

If the soldiers are not informed as to the names of the Liberal candidates, they are aware of the names of the Bowserites, so it works out all right in the long run.

The Bowser press does not attempt to deny that millions have been handed over to the P. G. E. illegally. Their one reply is that Brewster should not have objected, as, by doing so in the only manner possible, since Bowser refused all enquiry, the affairs of the province would be tied up. The Bowser press knows perfectly well that the affairs of the province will go on just as usual and that Brewster's action will be amply vindicated on September 14th.

ducked behind the sand dunes and made for Tampico, two miles away, keeping up a running fight until darkness set in. In the fight, they lost one man killed, and the others were all wounded more or less. Jim Murphy was fortunate to escape with a grazed arm.

Arriving at Tampico, they were held up for three weeks from lack of funds. The shipowners sent them cheques which were useless as the banks would not honor them and, in any case, the sailors did not want Mexican money worth about one cent on the dollar. Finally they got on board of an oil steamer bound for Rio De Janeiro and from there they made Havana, from which port they reached Tampa, Florida.

Jim then hit the trail north for Minneapolis, then to Winnipeg and home to Prince Rupert where things are not so exciting but a trifle safer. He carries a roll of Mexican money, a passport signed by a Mexican general and Mayor Gaspar de la Garza as mementoes of his visit to Mexico.

He describes the state of Mexico as terrible, starving refugees reaching the coast from the interior daily. He is firmly convinced that it will be a great country once it gets stable government and he would not hesitate to go down there again when things become a little more settled.

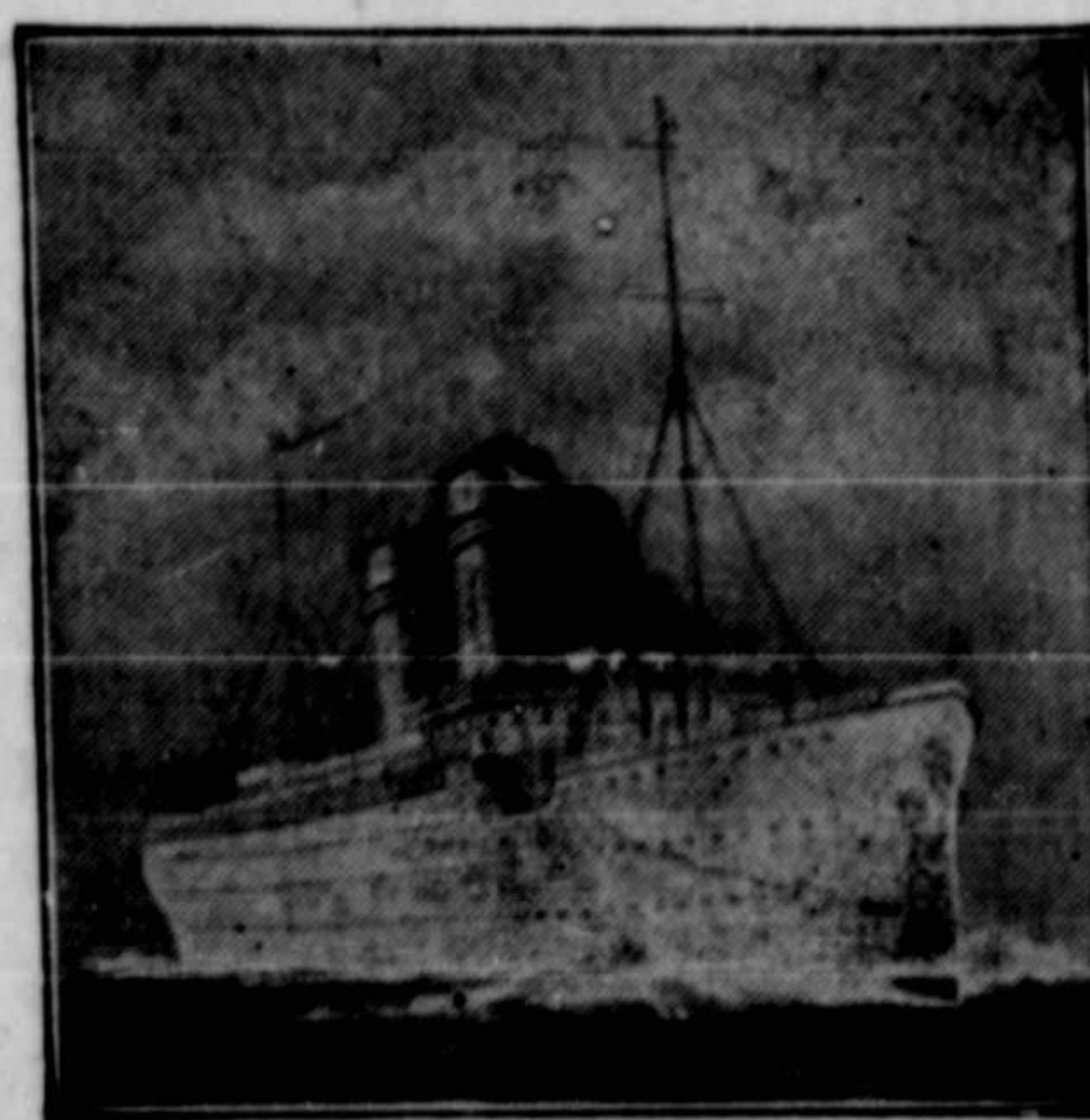

In the Letter Box

To the Editor,

Bishop Stringer, of the Yukon spent a few hours with me this morning on his way back from Edmonton and Calgary, where he has been staying a few days. All the time he was in Alberta he only saw two drunken men and they had just come from British Columbia.

The officer commanding the North West Mounted Police in Alberta gave the Bishop permission to quote him as saying that the Prohibition Act had had the effect of lessening to an extraordinary degree the work of the police force.

The Lieut.-Governor of Alberta travelling north on the same ship with the Bishop also expressed his opinion that the Act was working in his province most satisfactorily.

A distinguished traveller whom I met on the train last week told me that all the way through Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta none who were any the worse for intoxicating liquor had been seen until British Columbia was reached.

A leading economist of the United States here a few days ago told me that he has had moving pictures taken of a town in New Mexico where there are no schools and no churches, but a licensed saloon for every fifteen people. These pictures show the thriftlessness, the poverty, and the degradation of the place. He has also had moving pictures taken of a town on the Canadian prairies under the Prohibition act. These pictures show the economy, the industry and the prosperity of the place. Not a word is said as these two sets of pictures are shown, but the contrast converts thousands to the cause of economic thrift set free from the bondage of the liquor trade with its wasteful expenditure.
