ALLIED GRIP ON SOMME FRONT IS TIGHTENING UP

Clery Surrounded by the French—Sam Hughes in Paris—Sweden and Britain Have Difference.

A departure from the usual round will be a fishermen's contest, including the setting and baiting of halibut gear. The boat which does the work in the shortest time will receive a substantial prize. This should be of great interest in showing how halibut are caught. A smoker will be held in the evening and a raffle will be held.

BOWSER DEFEAT IS ASSURED IN NORTH

HEAVY LOSSES FROM RECENT BUSH FIRES

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Aug. 25.—The Conservation Commission announces that an area of six hundred and fifty thousand acres was burned in the recent bush fires in Ontario; that timber to the value of six millions was destroyed and three hundred lives were lost in Northern Ontario.

Rain Stops Fires.
Cobalt, Aug. 2.—Rain is extinguishing the smouldering bush fires. Twelve persons are dead and Harley, Hudson and Diamond have been destroyed.

BUSTED PROSPECTOR GROUP LOOKS WELL

Charles P. Richardson returned this morning to Kitselas to resume work on the new showing on the Busted Prospector Group, on Kitselas mountain. Recently, Mr. Richardson and his partner, Mr. Lowrie, have stripped a 36-foot width of ore about a thousand feet above timber line, at an altitude of 4,450 feet. It is early yet to say much about the values in the new showing but the partners are greatly encouraged and are pushing ahead with development work, as they feel satisfied that the new showing with the old will produce a paying property. The claims are only a mile and half from the railroad.

RECORD SHIPMENT OF NORTHERN FURS

The largest shipment of furs ever brought to Prince Rupert was disposed of yesterday by Mrs. W. Hyland, of Telegraph Creek. The consignment was made up of beaver, mink, bear, wolf, wolverine, red fox, cross fox, martin, lynx, fisher and six very fine silver fox. The furs were opened up in a store in the Hays Building and made a splendid showing. They were bought in by H. Raskin, the well known buyer for the Edmonton Hide & Fur Company, and by Mr. Jacobson, of Jacobson, Goldberg Company, of Vancouver. The total value of the consignment was in the neighborhood of \$12,000. This is the second lot of furs brought south from Telegraph Creek this season.

Seattle Labor Proves the Pudding

Seattle, Aug. 14.—A mass meeting of Seattle citizens which filled the arena Sunday afternoon expressed with a unanimous standing vote approval of the Washington Prohibition law and of the work of Mayor Hiram C. Gill and Chief of Police Charles Beckingham in enforcing the law.

Governor Ernest Lister stated emphatically that the state was better off under Prohibition. He urged the defeat of the initiative bills which will be submitted to the voters in the November election, one of which would permit the manufacture and sale of beer within the state, while the other would allow the sale of liquor in hotels.

Mayor Gill announced his intention to continue by every means within his power to enforce the law. James A. Duncan, secretary of the Central Labor Council, stated that the Council and the labor unions were behind the officials, not only in the enforcement of the Prohibition law, but every other law. He cited statements from various unions attesting the increase in business which had come since the state went dry.

RUSSIAN ARMY MOBILIZED ON BALKAN FRONT

Russians Concentrated Along the Danube Ready to Invade Bulgaria—Greeks are Enlisting.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, August 25.—Eighty thousand Russians are reported to be on the Balkan front. The Czar's forces are concentrating on the Roumanian frontier along the Russian bank of the river Danube for the purpose of invading Bulgaria. The passage of the Russian army through Roumania will be looked upon as an act of war by the latter country against the Central Powers and it is not unlikely that Roumania may strike a blow for the Allies along with the Russians.

Greeks Enlisting.
Athens, Aug. 25.—Many Greeks are hastening to Saloniki to volunteer to fight for the Entente Allies against the Bulgarians.

Serbians Retire.
Sofia, Aug. 25.—The Bulgarians have advanced on the Macedonia front and have compelled the Serbians to retire. The population of Florina have fled in the direction of Sorovich.

BOB MCINTOSH WAS PROMOTED ON FIELD

Bob McIntosh, who left here as a private in the 48th Battalion, has been promoted sergeant on the field for distinguished service in the recent severe fighting on the western front. The boys of the 48th are mostly merged in the 3rd Canadian Pioneers and have been right in the thick of it for the past few weeks.

Bob McIntosh has evidently gone at military work wholeheartedly, as he did everything in civil life, and it would not be surprising to learn of his being given a commission on the field.

FISHING LEGISLATION

The Pacific Fisherman devotes four and a half pages to arguments in favor of the passing of legislation prohibiting the shipping of fish to the United States through Canada, except in bond from an American port. One of the chief complaints made is that, while Canadian fish is allowed to enter the United States duty free, American fish does not enjoy the same privilege in Canada. On this point, practically every man in Prince Rupert will agree with the Seattle fishing concerns, American fish should be admitted free of duty into Canada, and, had the reciprocity program of 1911 been endorsed, there would have been no difficulty today over the halibut question.

Had the reciprocity program been carried out, there would have been no necessity for the framing of the order-in-council which has caused so much controversy between the two nations. We would have had free bait and free fish, and the fishing trade would have taken the line of least resistance and Prince Rupert would be profiting by its geographical position naturally, instead of under an order-in-council which threatens to stir up international complications.

There is a great deal of truth in many of the statements made by the fishing firms to the south, and naturally they view the matter only from their own standpoint. One important factor in the situation is that the fishermen who formerly traded to Seattle are so thoroughly satisfied with their treatment here, and with the prices obtained, that they would not welcome a return to the old Seattle days. The entrance of Prince Rupert into the halibut business completely altered the whole situation for the fishermen and they are no longer at the mercy of the corporations in

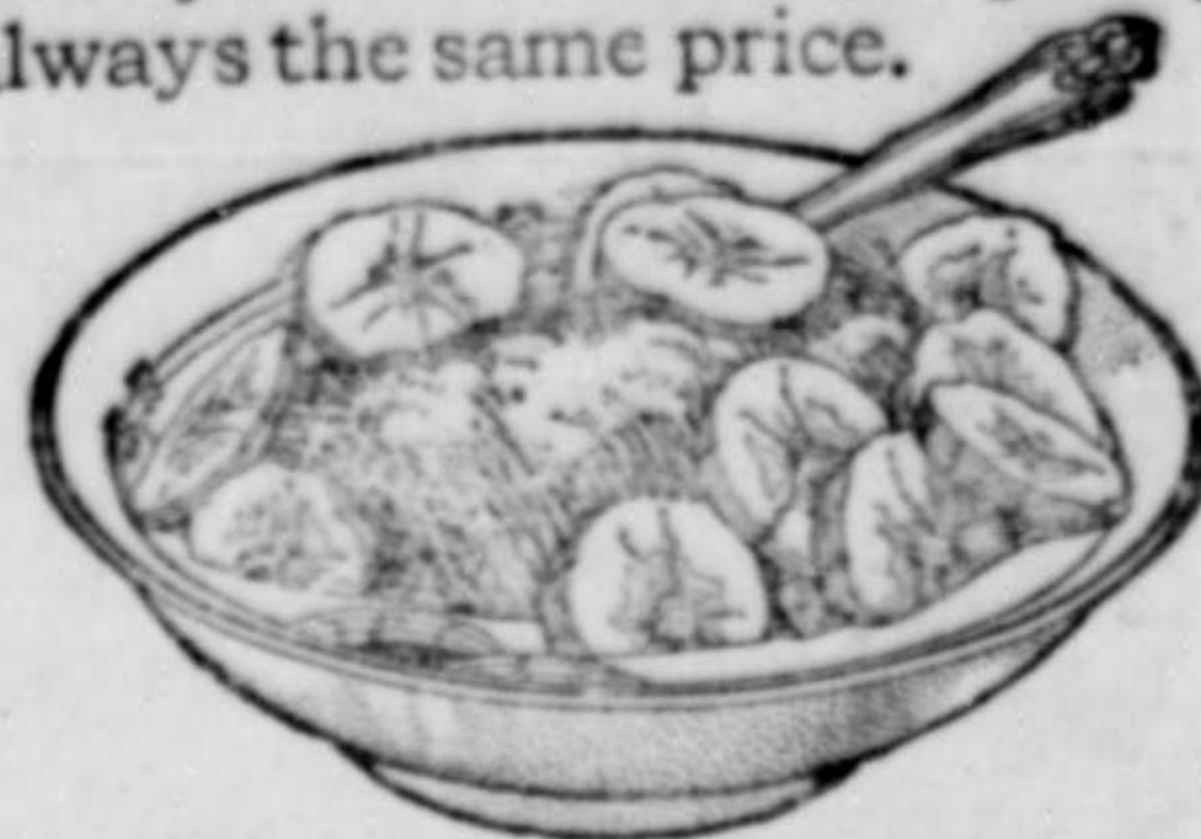
the south, as they were formerly.

The argument is used that the American consumer is paying 300 per cent more for his halibut and that this article is becoming a luxury. Surely if the price has advanced to such an extent the Seattle firms should be able to jump in and make much more money than they ever did. It is hard, however, to conceive of any such huge advance, since the quantity of fish shipped to the States is just as large as ever; express rates are the same, and, though the price paid to the fishermen may be a little more, it does not warrant any big jump in retail prices.

The whole situation is economic. Prince Rupert is the natural shipping point for the harvest of the northern Pacific and Canada cannot be blamed for freeing the trade with the American fishermen from some of its ridiculous encumbrances. In the very nature of things, the American consumer will pay less for his fish when it is shipped by the shorter route than he would if it was forced into an American port and then transhipped. If the American proposal goes through, it may be to the advantage of the big fishing corporation, but it cannot be to the advantage of the fishermen nor the consumer.

The question of shipping halibut in bond by steamer from Prince Rupert is also raised. On this point also the citizens of Prince Rupert will at once agree with the traders in the south. The writer of the article errs when he describes the present situation in this respect as being due to a new reading of the order-in-council. It is the result of the bringing into force of an old order-in-council which was framed for Vancouver years ago. The order-in-council of 1915 should annul the older one, so far as Prince Rupert is concerned, and halibut should

be shipped direct by steamer in bond. The city council and board of trade of this city are doing their utmost at the present moment to bring this about, and, with the co-operation of the American firms to the south, may be able to achieve the desired result at an early date.

LOCAL BOYS LEAVE ON FISHING EXPEDITION

The good ship "Didem," Capt. George Wally, cleared for the Naas last evening. Bob Frizzell sailed as chief engineer and Fred Anderson as scout, mate and crew. Nothing short of three hundred fish a day will satisfy them and they hope to return in about ten days with big stakes.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Bowser election literature carries a boast that the government "compelled the P. G. E. to complete its line." Handing out a few more millions is not completing a line, nor is there any guarantee that the line will be completed when those millions have gone the way of the others.

Bowser claims that he passed special acts to promote farming. The first essential of farming is land and Bowser still shows no sign of opening up for farming the hundreds of thousands of acres held by the speculator in the north.

Perhaps the best joke in the Bowser election literature is the claim the "after-the-war" colonization has been provided for. Do you remember the reply of Hon. W. R. Ross to the Scandinavians who wished to form a colony here? It was to the effect that the government was not a colonization bureau.

Mr. Ross made the above reply simply because he had no land left on which to place the colonists. They were farmers and not speculators.

Bowser claims to have passed the "most advanced Workmen's Compensation Act in the world." He could also describe it as the most retarded act of the kind in the Dominion. On two occasions, years ago, he and his machine tossed just such an act into the waste-paper basket, solely because it was framed by the Liberal Opposition.

Bowser also claims that he has "prevented election frauds." It is to be sincerely hoped that he has, though the sending of F. W. Welsh to "take care of" the soldiers' vote was not very reassuring.

HALIBUT INDUSTRY LOST TO SEATTLE

The current issue of the Pacific Fisherman gives four and a half pages of free advertising to Prince Rupert in the shape of arguments to be placed before the Senate at Washington giving reasons why halibut for American consumption should be shipped in bond from American ports instead of being packed and shipped from Prince Rupert as at present.

The article states that Seattle has lost fifty per cent. of its fishing industry to Prince Rupert during the past twelve months and that several freezing and storage plants are idle and others are on part time. "The entire industry must meet the same fate, making valueless the American investment if present conditions are continued."

The article goes on to say that Canada's methods have increased the cost of fish to the American consumer by over 300 per cent. Objection is also taken to the fact that while Canadian fish is allowed free entry into the United States, American fish is not allowed entry into Canada free of duty.

It also states that American firms using the government wharf are under disadvantages in charges for wharfage on ice, boxes, etc., while the space rented is at the disposal of others when not being used by the companies.

It describes the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage plant as a "government plant" and objects to a subsidized plant being in open competition with the private American buyers.

There are many reasons given for the transference of the halibut industry from Puget Sound to Prince Rupert, all of which are more or less to the point, but the

chief is the admission that halibut became scarce on Puget Sound and plentiful in Prince Rupert. Much of the article is taken up with charges against the Canadian government of trying to capture the halibut industry by stealth to the everlasting detriment of the American firms and the industry generally on the other side. The situation is viewed entirely from the standpoint of the fishing companies. It would be interesting to have an article written by one of the American fishermen who find that they are well treated in Prince Rupert and that by trading here they make more trips in a given time and, therefore, more money.
