KAISER HAS DISMISSED VON FALKENHAYN

VON HINDENBURG TAKES COMMAND--RUMANIAN MOVE COSTS GERMANY DEAR

HINDENBURG SUPERSEDES FALKENHAYN

Chief of German General Staff is Dismissed—Iron Crosses Galore—Britain Wants Leather.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Berlin, Aug. 30.—The Kaiser has appointed Field Marshal Von Hindenburg as Chief of the General Staff in succession to General Von Falkenhayn, who has been dismissed.

Von Hindenburg was responsible for the breaking up of the first great Russian offensive and for the driving of the Russian forces back on the eastern front. During the winter, he held the Riga front, but was recently superseded by the Archduke Frederick.

Von Falkenhayn succeeded Von Kluck, and has had control of the western front for over a year, with the exception of the attack on Verdun which was left in the hands of the Crown Prince and his staff.

Iron Crosses.

Copenhagen, August 30.—The Kiel Zeitung announces that, since the commencement of hostilities, Germany has distributed four hundred and thirty thousand Iron Crosses.

Canadian Leather Wanted.

London, Aug. 30.—Great Britain, under the Defense of the Realm Act, is requiring that all Canada's available leather supply be shipped to Britain and none of it to foreign countries.

U. S. CRUISER MEMPHIS LOST IN WEST INDIES

(Special to The Daily News.)

Santa Domingo, West Indies, August 30.—The United States armored cruiser Memphis struck a rock and grounded in the outer harbor and is expected to become a total loss. It is believed that a percentage of her crew of nine hundred and ninety perished.

The Toronto Globe of August 24th says editorially "It would be a crime, the ghastliest and most murderous crime of the war, no matter what the excuse or what the cause, were General Sir Sam Hughes given a real command of living soldiers in a genuine engagement anywhere on the war's battlefield."

"The thing—even the thought of such a thing—suggested in yesterday's despatches from Ottawa, is so monstrous that the man in the street would scout offhand the suggestion were it not for the fear that, judging from the experiences of the past two years, the thing might be true. And if true, then God have mercy on the officers and men doomed to service in that command.

"His limelight posturings in Canada, in England, and in France are Canada's humiliation; but, facing a German charge, limelight for General Hughes would be the blackness of darkness for his men condemned 'to do and die.'

If the Prime Minister has no other way by which the country can be rid of Sir Sam Hughes, let the Canadians at home endure the affliction to its worst rather than imperil the lives of Canadians at the front by an army command as the price of his resignation."

REPUBLICANS WOULD BRING WAR, SAYS REID

T. D. PATTULLO GIVEN SPLENDID RECEPTION

Since leaving here on Monday T. D. Pattullo, the Liberal candidate for this district, has held meetings at Kitwanga, Lorne Creek, Dorreen and Pacific and at each place was accorded a splendid reception. STRIKE SITUATION BECOMES CRITICAL

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, August 30.—The executive of the railroad men announces that a general railway strike will become effective at seven o'clock on the morning of Labor Day unless the demand of the men for an eight-hour day is granted.

Serious Situation.

New York, Aug. 30.—Provided the railway strike becomes effective, seven million residents of this city would face starvation in a fortnight. If the operation of food trains were suspended, the situation would rapidly become very serious. The milk supply would be consumed in twenty-four hours; the available flour supply would last only one week; meat would give out in ten days, and general groceries would be used up in three weeks.

Railroad Embargo.

Chicago, August 30.—Several western railways have placed an embargo on all perishable freight to become effective on September sixth.

HEAVY DEATH CLAIMS

London, Ont., Aug. 30.—The Ancient Order of United Workmen, on account of the settlement of three quarters of a million dollars in death claims, has revised its policy of valuations, transferring the financial burden to members exceeding twenty years standing.

CANADIAN SOLDIERS DON'T LIKE SIR SAM

Toronto, Aug. 26.—The Toronto Star (Liberal) prints a special cable from its London correspondent today regarding the alleged attitude of the troops towards the minister of militia who has just returned to London from a visit to the Canadians in France. The despatch says:

"A shrewd and experienced observer who has unusual facilities for ascertaining the views of the Canadian troops here, declares that if there were a federal election tomorrow with the soldiers voting, nine out of ten of them would vote against Sir Sam Hughes. My own experience at the front recently supports this contention. The feeling throughout the army is strongly against Sir Sam. Officers and men alike have come to me praising articles published in Canadian papers criticizing him.

"The criticism here rests on several counts. There is much complaint about the wasteful equipment which was supplied to the men in Canada only to be scrapped as soon as they arrive here. It is felt, too, that too many men closely associated with Sir Sam, or related to him, have been given high commands, while conversely, men of opposite political views have been kept back for no apparent reason. The main resentment arises, however, from General Hughes' attempted inter-

RUMANIAN MOVE IS BITTER BLOW TO THE GERMANS

Germany will Lose Immense Quantities of Supplies—Bulgaria's Fate—Greeks made Big Mistake.

(Special to The Daily News)

London, Aug. 30.—Roumania's decision to enter the war on the side of the Allies has caused consternation in Germany and the countries of her allies. The Roumanian move means to Germany the sacrifice of the receipt of tremendous quantities of supplies and the necessity of extending her lines of defence.

Germany had arranged for the taking over of the entire wheat surplus in Roumania and for supplies of rolling stock, hides, etc.

Austrian monitors have bombarded the Roumanian coast towns of Verciorova, Turnu, Severin and Giurgevo.

Bulgaria's Fate.

Paris, Aug. 30.—The feeling is prevalent that Bulgaria will cease to exist as a state after the war.

Greek Mistake.

Athens, Aug. 30.—Fifty thousand Greeks, realizing the mistake made by the government and King Constantine in showing sympathy with the cause of Germany and Austria, paraded in front of the residence of ex-premier Venizelos, who has firmly favored the Allies, imploring him to give assistance to the people and to urge the King to join the Entente Allies in the war.

BANKRUPTCY

"British Columbia Forever" says that McBride and Bowser "raised this province from the slough of bankruptcy" to the proud position of having the finest financial record of any province of Canada. This gentleman must have been studying the public accounts of British Columbia with this marvellously contorted volume held upside down. If he turns the volume right end up, he will discover that, in four years, McBride and Bowser turned a surplus of nine millions into a deficit of \$33,000,000, and if he goes a little more closely into its pages he will find that the province stands behind \$80,000,000 worth of railroad bonds on railroads which show no sign of earning a cent for many years to come, and on which the province will have to meet the interest, as they have already had to do to the extent of \$413,000 on the P. G. E. bonds.

In comparing the finances of the various provinces, the Journal's correspondent would do well to ponder the Canada Year Book. There he will find that in each province, except British Columbia, the annual expenditure rarely amounts to the total receipts and that, even in Manitoba, there is a very close relationship between the totals. In British Columbia, however, the expenditure bears not the slightest relationship to the revenue. For the past four years it has been a case of spending all that could be borrowed regardless of the consequences, with the result that the province is today \$33,000,000 "in the hole." The correspondent asks "What financier in Canada would dare bring down estimates, with the expenditure some four millions greater than the estimated revenue?" The only answer is that no financier in Canada or anywhere else would ever dream of trusting to luck in any such

way. Such a measure is not financing but simply the wild gambling of a man who knows nothing of finance. Just because one year it so happened that luck was with them, the government have persisted in such crazy methods each year since the lucky stab, with the result that the receipts have not come up to expectations by several millions a year. If any business had been run as this province has been in the past four years, it would today be wiped out of existence and its creditors accepting a meagre composition.

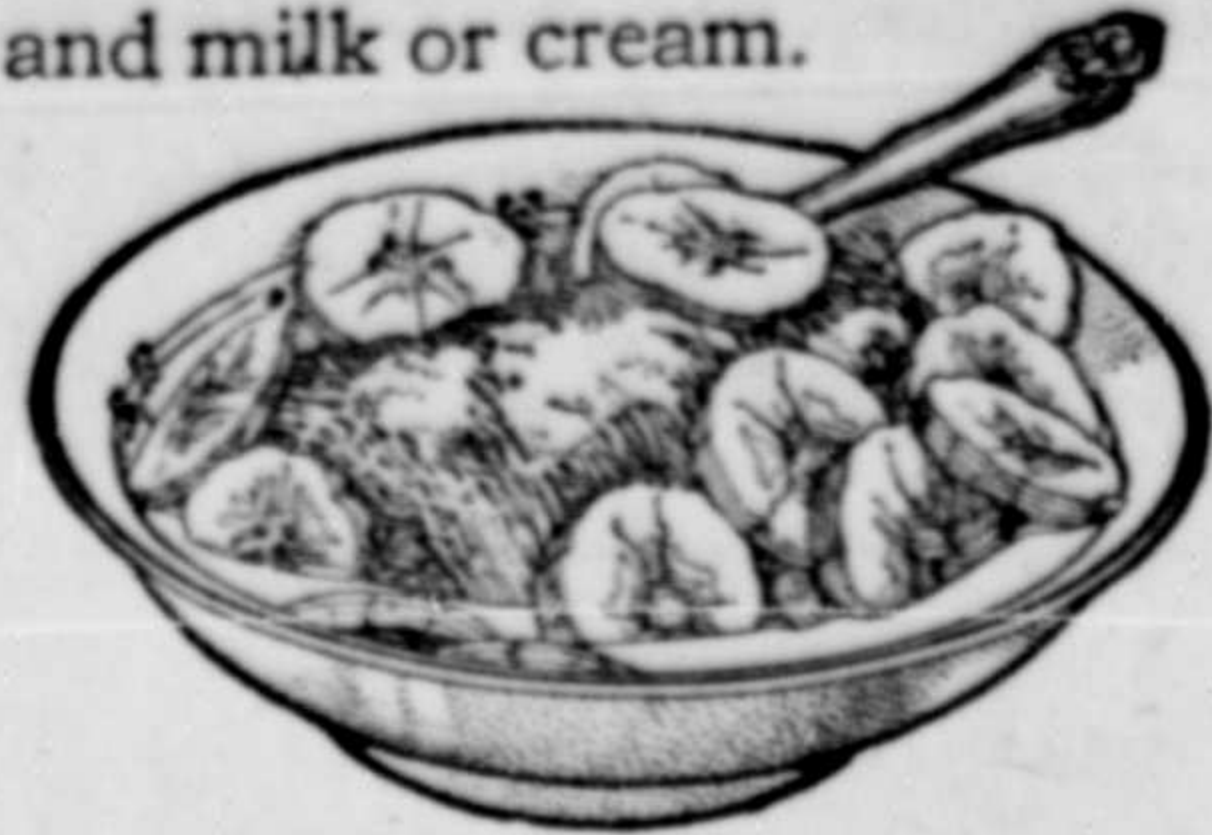
The correspondent winds up a gloriously mixed up appeal with "Better to suffer the ills we have than fly to others we know not of." If this misquotation from the world's greatest dramatist means anything, it means that "British Columbia Forever" is quite content to allow Bowser to act as legal adviser for the people while his firm acts for the spenders of the people's money; that he is quite content to allow the speculator to retain his grasp on the lands of the north; that he is quite content to hand over millions to the P. G. E. whenever Pat Welsh feels a trifle hungry or thirsty; that he does not want community settlement; in short, that he does not care a straw what happens to this province so long as the Bowser gang is allowed to grab its fill. His non-deplume should have been "Bowserism Forever."

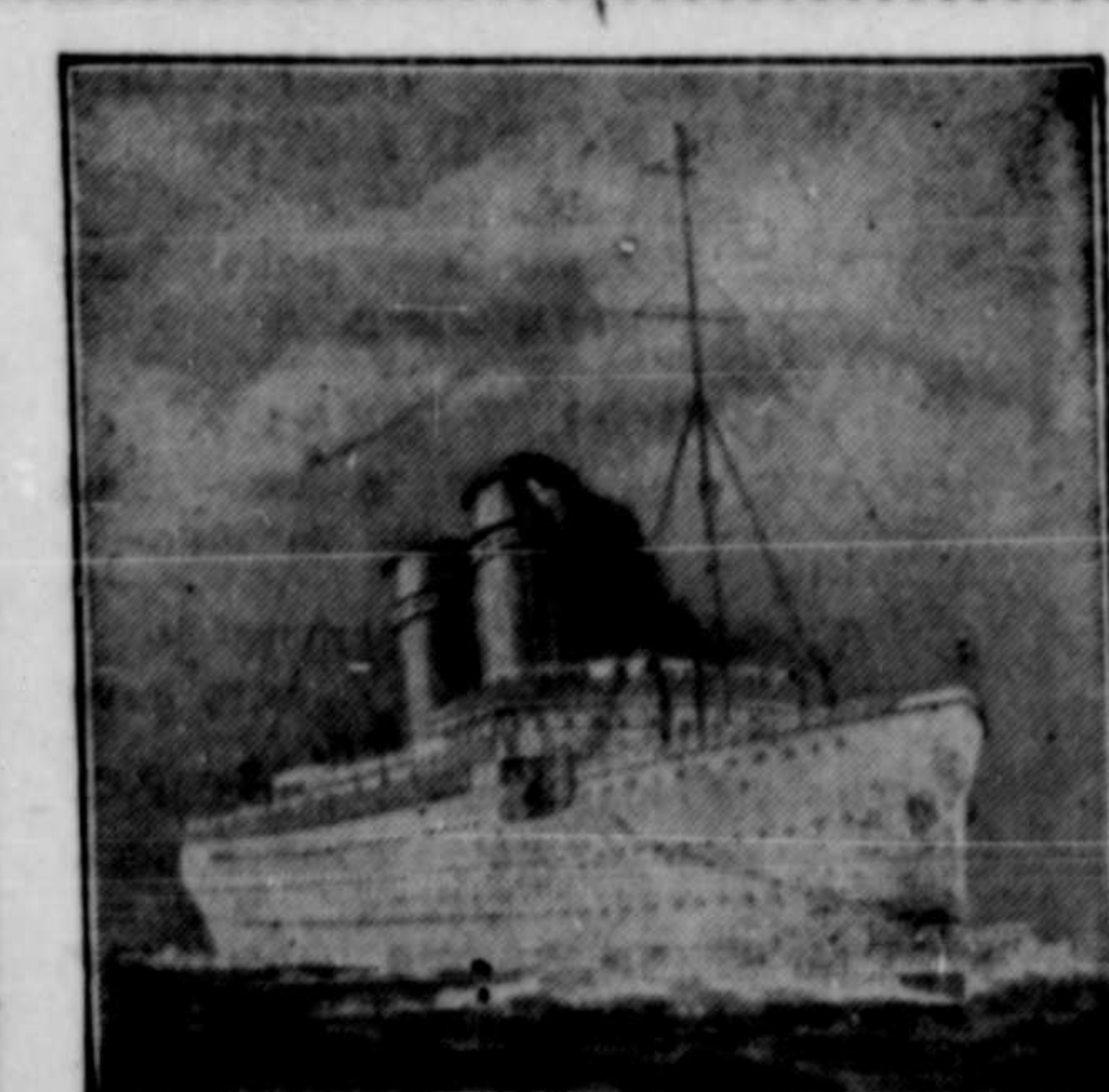

To the Editor,
 If it be asked what has caused such a wave of sentiment in favor of Prohibition to sweep over the country, I reply—the example of Russia in contrast with our apparent helplessness.

Aldermen have been known to cringe like slaves before this power and vote as told.

Business men have been known to sign petitions against their will because of this power and the big club held over their heads.

This is the logical result of the license system and a huge monopoly. British Columbia is the last stronghold of the liquor trade in Canada. The united efforts of the whole liquor interests from the Atlantic to the Pacific are being concentrated upon this

demonstrations like that at Camp Borden, Ont., declaring these are injurious to discipline and im-

possible to excuse.

"The soldiers frankly are sick of politics in army affairs. They feel that the issues are too vitally important for this and they ask that the whole matter of military control, administration and equipment should be taken wholly out of the hands of politicians and placed under an expert non-partisan board; that ministers should be debarred from bringing pressure, direct or indirect, upon commanding officers to recommend men for promotion or appointments; that appointments should be made irrespective of political affiliations and that ministerial commands to army commanders or their subordinates should cease."

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE LECTURE LAST NIGHT

The Westholme Theatre was well filled last evening when Prof. Hermann S. Hering, C. S. B., delivered his lecture on "The Science of Christian Healing." Aid. Nelson introduced the lecturer.

At the outset, Prof. Hering stated that Christ Jesus the divine healer, has for all time set the standard of perfect healing before humanity and that the gospels record many instances of the healing of physical disease by Jesus Christ and his disciples. The lecturer said that it was no longer necessary to dwell on the fact that healing can be accomplished by Christian Science as it had been clearly demonstrated on very many occasions.

He went on to state that the belief that matter is substance is simply a belief and not a fact. Matter, reduced to an atom, can again be subdivided into electrons proving that matter is simply force or energy, matter therefore being of a mental nature. He went on to show that, with neither substance nor life in matter or material phenomena, our existence is not material but mental and that truth and life can only be conceived of metaphysically.

Assuming that the healing principle and law are mental, the lecturer went on to explain that Mind is infinite, and that Mind and its ideas constitute all being. He pointed out that Christian Science shows that the so-called mind which includes belief in evil, matter and disease, is not real Mind but a false concept of mind, or the mortal mind, which includes all that is sick, sinning and discordant. The conceptions of the mortal mind have neither place, location, nor power; all that is finite being unreal, all that is real being infinite.

The lecturer emphasized the fact that Christian Science healing is not brought about through hypnotism, will-power, or mental suggestion in any form, the only healing power being divine Truth, which dispels all error and its effects.

In concluding a very able lecture, which was perhaps a little too scientific for the average audience, Prof. Hering paid great tribute to the work which had been done for humanity by Mrs. Eddy, the discoverer of Christian Science.
