RUMANIANS ARE MARCHING ON HUNGARY

AUSTRIANS MAY ABANDON TRANSYLVANIA -- GREEK KING FLEES TO LARISSA

RUMANIANS AND RUSSIANS HAVE JOINED FORCES

Enemy Obligated to Shorten Line and Abandon Sections of Transylvania—Rumanians for Hungary.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Aug. 31.—Turkey has declared war on Roumania, according to a Reuter despatch just to hand.

A Bucharest despatch announces that the Rumanians are operating in conjunction with the Russians and have captured the principal Carpathian passes and have held them for the past twelve hours.

The Rumanians are marching uninterruptedly on Hungarian territory.

Berlin Report.

Berlin, August 31.—Austrian army correspondents intimate that the Central Powers are considering the shortening of their front by abandoning certain sections in Transylvania.

The entrance of Roumania into the war and the rapid movement of Roumanian troops along the Hungarian border has completely altered the military situation on this front and it is impossible for the Austro-Germans to hold the extensive line over which their forces are spread. It is hoped that by shortening the line, the Rumanians will be prevented from getting behind the Austrians.

RED CROSS SALE

On Friday first the Red Cross Society resumes its weekly sales in the rooms on Sixth Street, after having given those sales over to the Prisoners Aid Committee for the past three months. On Friday, the sale will be conducted by Mrs. William Manson and Mrs. T. C. Birnie and it is hoped that ladies will bring along ample supplies of home cooking.

Thanksgiving.

Ottawa, Aug. 31.—An order-in-council has been passed fixing Thanksgiving Day for Monday, October 9th.

Michel Explosion.

Michel, B. C., August 31.—The jury is unable to determine the origin of the recent fatal mine explosion.

The entry of female labor into British shipbuilding yards appears to have brought with it a problem: What will be done with the women when the men want their jobs again?

SHIPYARDS BUZY

GREEK KING HAS PROBABLY FLED TO THE BORDER

Rumor that German Soldiers took Him to Larissa—Greek Army May be Remobilized—Quiet on Somme.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, August 31.—A British press representative at Saloniki reports that rumors are current that the Greek King has fled from Athens to Larissa under the protection of three hundred German soldiers. Larissa is in the north of Greece, and right on the Bulgarian border.

Greek Army.

Paris, August 31.—The remobilization of the Greek army is under consideration, which is taken as a sign that the followers of Venizelos are in the ascendant and that the wishes of the Greek people will be carried out.

An Athens correspondent has telegraphed that the Bulgarians have seized the city of Drama in northeastern Greece.

Western Front.

The operations on the Somme front have been confined to minor engagements, inclement weather interfering with the carrying on of warfare on any large scale.

SCHOOL TRUSTEES ADJUST DISTRICTS

The school board met again last evening to consider the redistribution of scholars in the various schools. It was found that it would not be feasible to open two rooms at Seal Cove as it would mean a complete readjustment and it was finally decided to provide a class for the smaller children by opening a class for junior and senior second, drawing pupils from the district east of Donald Street, while all the second class scholars residing on this side of Donald will still attend King Edward school, the scholars on the east side still having the option of going to the King Edward.

With regard to King Edward and Borden Street scholars, it was decided to draw a line across the city at Lotbiniere, Tatlow, Agnew Place and 4th Street. Those on the east side of this line will attend King Edward School and those on the west will go to Borden Street.

Principal Murray will take a small junior fourth class at Borden Street in order to cater to the children living in that district and Miss Macdonald at Seal Cove will take any second reader pupils from east of Donald.

TWO GIRLS DROWNED

A very sad drowning fatality occurred on Tuesday night near Inverness cannery, when two girls, believed to be daughters of Mrs. Wesley, of Port Simpson, lost their lives. Dragging parties have so far been unsuccessful in recovering the bodies, which may have been carried a considerable distance by the tide.

HALIBUT INDUSTRY TIED UP BY STRIKE

There were about fifteen halibut schooners in overnight with 200,000 pounds of halibut, but no buying has been done and the industry is tied up in the meantime owing to the railway strike situation in the United States. The Great Northern has notified the G. T. P. that it will not accept shipments of perishable freight for across the line which will not reach destination before September 2nd.

The company managers have buying orders on hand, but it is out of the question to risk making shipments so long as the railroad situation remains critical.

OOTSA LAKE HAS A BIG MINING FUTURE

John Michelsen, a rancher who has been in the Ootsa Lake country for about seven years, is spending a few days in town. He is thoroughly convinced that Ootsa Lake has a great future as a mixed farming country and is particularly adapted to stock raising.

Mr. Michelsen, who with his partner, W. H. Harrison, discovered the Cariboo Group of claims, believes that there is also a big mining future in store for Ootsa. The Cariboo claims are rich in zinc and all that is needed is the necessary means of transportation for the ore.

COMMISSION COMING

The Dominion's Royal Commission, which leaves Montreal on September 4th and will spend a few days in the Cobalt and Sudbury districts, afterwards proceeding to the prairies, is expected to arrive in Prince Rupert on the evening of September 15th, leaving for Victoria on Sunday, the 17th.

BOWSER PAMPHLET REPUDIATED BY SHAW

The Bowser machine is flooding the province with pamphlets which bear no publisher's name nor printer's mark, setting forth Bowser statements in regard to the Vancouver by-election. The statements are false and even the evidence has been contorted to meet the occasion.

J. P. Shaw, of Kamloops, the gentleman who earned \$30 per day for 365 days in the year, besides drawing his sessional indemnity, was challenged by Mr. Anderson, his opponent, in regard to the falsity of the pamphlet. Mr. Anderson said "As there is not a note of who is responsible for this booklet, not even the printer's name, will you, Mr. Shaw, accept the responsibility for the truth of the matter contained in this pamphlet?"

Mr. Shaw hesitated and finally said: "NO, I CANNOT."

STRIKE CLOUD LOOMS LARGER IN THE STATES

Wilson Trying to Prevent Strike—Trainmen Say Satisfactory Settlement is Only Solution.

Washington, Aug. 31.—President Wilson is making every effort to persuade the railway brotherhoods either to rescind their strike order or to postpone the taking of any drastic action in the meantime.

President Lee, representing the trainmen, states that no power on earth, excepting satisfactory settlement, can prevent a strike.

New York, Aug. 31.—Provided the railway strike becomes effective, and lasts for two weeks, the newspapers of this city will be obliged to suspend publication on account of a shortage of paper.

Quebec Strike.

Quebec, August 31.—The street railway employees have gone on strike. The company is willing to grant the men the increase in wages, but refuse to recognize the union.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Evidently afraid of the consequences, the Bowser government did not pass a Woman's Suffrage Bill, but has submitted the matter to the electors in the form of a referendum to be voted upon at the forthcoming election, so that the male section of the province has now to decide whether the ladies should be permitted the right to vote. That the extension of the franchise to the ladies will make for cleaner, better government in this province requires no proof, and the Liberals definitely stated long ago that, when returned to power, they would pass a measure of Women's Suffrage.

If a majority vote in favor of the bill is cast on September 14th, the ladies will be allowed to vote after March 1st, 1917, and it is to be hoped that the men of British Columbia will see to it that the right is granted by a very large majority. If the ladies are capable of exercising the franchise in municipal affairs, and they have proven everywhere that they are, there is no reason in the world why they should not be allowed a voice in the affairs of the province, and ultimately in the Dominion.

We have lady members of our school board and they are eminently capable and show that they have a thorough grasp of the various problems which come before them. Since the war broke out, the ladies of this province, and of the Dominion, have shown splendid powers of organization and executive ability and there is no reason to doubt that they will bring the same powers to bear on the ruling of the country.

The granting of the vote to women will do much towards nullifying the civil service vote, which should never have been allowed to be a factor in elections in Canada. The fact that a man is a servant of the government should debar him from any interest in politics

as it is grossly unfair to the country and to the civil servant that he should be asked to vote for or against the man or government which placed him in his position. H. C. Brewster's declaration that he will remove the civil service entirely from the realm of politics will do much towards clearing up a situation which is ridiculous.

The granting of the vote to ladies will provide a much larger number of independent voters, and independent voters are the life blood of any country or province. The loyalty of a man to his party, through good report or ill, is something to be admired, as all loyalty is, for itself alone, but, in the interests of good government, it is absolutely essential that the majority of the people should be ready to vote entirely for the welfare of the province instead of the welfare of any political party. Party lines are being wiped out in this province today, and the granting of the vote to women will still further increase the untrammelled vote which invariably kills a government which has failed in its duty.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The dismissal of General Von Falkenhayn is the most important happening of the past year. Where Von Falkenhayn has failed, it is not possible that Von Hindenburg can succeed. The superiority of the Allies is not due to bad German leadership but to the better guns and troops of the British and French.

The railroad presidents claim that to accede to the men's request for an eight-hour day would cost the companies \$100,000,000 annually. It is not liable to cost the companies a nickel as they will promptly take measures to make certain that the consumer pays the extra cost, if there is any.

STRANGER TO THE TRUTH

Salmon Arm, B. C., Aug. 27.

Another lie of the Premier's, which can only be described as a deliberate falsehood, was nailed by Frederick W. Anderson, Liberal candidate in Kamloops riding at the big meeting held in the Agricultural hall yesterday afternoon. While in this and the adjoining riding of North Okanagan, Mr. Bowser denied that he ever had any interest in the Wallace Shipyards. Speaking at Ennderby, the Premier said, as reported in his own press:

"As a matter of fact I am not a director of the Wallace Shipyards and I have never had any financial interest in the concern whatever."

Mr. Anderson produced a copy of the last annual statutory statement filed by the Wallace Shipyards, Limited, showing W. J. Bowser, barrister, as a shareholder in the company and as one of its three directors. A member of the audience remarked, "Oh, we don't believe a word Bowser says now."

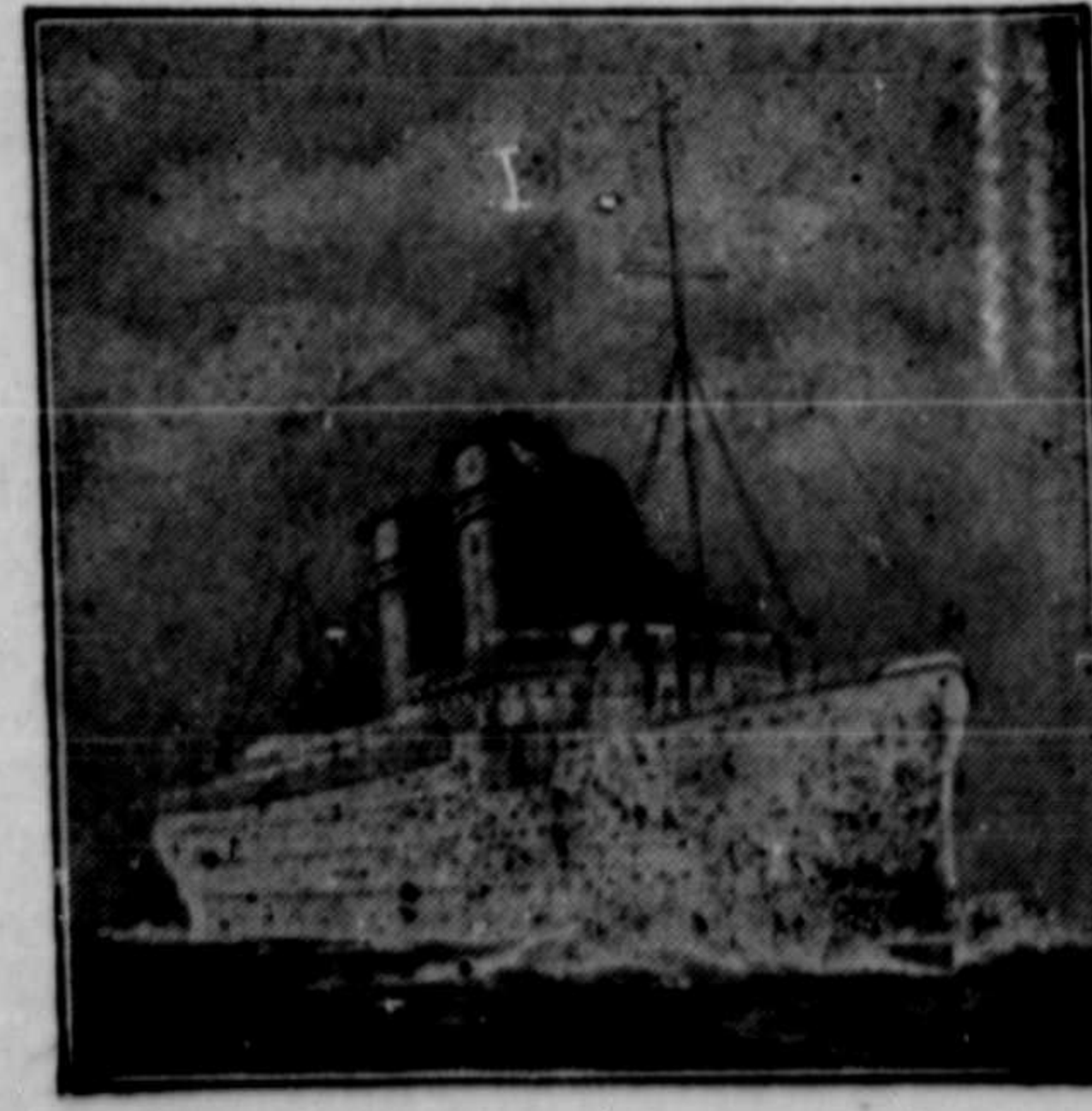

CANADIAN OFFICIALS GO TO WASHINGTON

Ottawa, Aug. 28.—Sir Joseph Pope, under secretary of state for external affairs, has left for Washington where, in company with W. A. Fould, superintendent of fisheries, will confer with the Washington authorities regarding the legislation now pending in connection with the fisheries of the Pacific coast.

The proposed amendment to the revenue bill by which it is intended to prohibit the shipment of fish in bond through Canada to the United States unless from Atlantic states ports strikes directly at Prince Rupert, which is now the centre of the halibut trade, and contemplates, it is stated, the development of an American port on the "Pan-handle."

Complaints from Seattle are said to be responsible. The legislation was introduced as an amendment to the revenue bill in the United States senate, but has not yet passed.

Sir Joseph Pope will make representations to the United States authorities and will present Canada's views on the subject.
