RUMANIANS HAVE TAKEN BULGARIAN CITY

AUSTRIANS ARE FORCED TO RETREAT -- CONSCRIPTION COMING IN AUSTRALIA

RUSTCHUK HAS FALLEN BEFORE THE RUMANIANS

Important Bulgarian Border town Occupied—Rapid Development in Greek Situation—Rumania Dry.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Bucharest, Sept. 1.—The Rumanians now occupy the Bulgarian city of Rustchuk. Rustchuk is on the northern boundary of Bulgaria and has a population of thirty-five thousand. It is situated on the main line of railroad communication to Varna, on the Black Sea.

Greek Situation.

There are rapid developments in the diplomatic situation in Athens and it appears that King Constantine is ready to abandon his policy of neutrality. All absent staff officers have been recalled for active service, but there are no indications, as to whether the King will yield to the wishes of the people and call upon Venizelos to form a new government.

Romania Dry.

The sale and consumption of alcoholic liquors throughout Rumania has been forbidden.

VANCOUVER EX-MAYOR HAS NARROW ESCAPE

Vancouver, Sept. 1.—Ex-Mayor Douglas had a very narrow escape from drowning at English Bay yesterday, when he became ill while swimming. Mr. Douglas' condition is now critical, pneumonia having set in.

AUSTRIANS ARE FORCED BACK BY THE RUMANIANS

Enemy Retreat to Second Lines of Defence—Ominous Quiet on Other Fronts—British Casualties.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 1.—The Rumanian army, which has linked up with the Russians against the Austro-Hungarians, has compelled the enemy in Transylvania to retreat to their second line of defences.

It is reported that Russian warships have arrived at the Rumanian port of Constanza.

No Change.

At Verdun; on the Somme front; in the Carpathians, and on the Carso plateau, the military situations are not materially changed. The fighting is confined to minor engagements, while the Allies are consolidating the ground gained in the recent fighting and preparing for further attacks.

British Casualties.

The British casualties for the month of August amount to 4,711 officers and 123,234 men, the large majority of whom are wounded.

PRINCESS MAQUINNA WAS SLIGHTLY DAMAGED

On her last trip south the Princess Maquinna struck a rock off Bowen Island. The vessel got clear of the rock and made Vancouver with slight damage to her forefoot. She has been withdrawn from the service for one week in order that she may undergo a thorough examination at the shipyards. The Maquinna was fortunately the only one of the fog-bound vessels to meet with an accident.

The Princess Alice, with the veteran Captain McLeod in command, encountered very thick fog and anchored off Alert Bay until the weather cleared before tackling Seymour Narrows.

The Prince George, which was delayed on her Alaskan trip, was twelve hours late in making Vancouver.

Mrs. T. C. Duncan and Master Duncan were amongst the arrivals from the south on the Prince George.

IMPORTANT LAWSUIT AT TUESDAY'S SITTING

The most important case before the Supreme Court, which opens here on Tuesday, Mr. Justice Murphy presiding, is that of the Westholme Lumber Company vs. G. T. P. Railway Company. The action arises out of the filling in of Cameron Bay for a railway crossing, and the sum claimed by the plaintiffs is about \$200,000.

The action has been dragging along for several years in one form or another. The company claims damages for interference with its plans in the carrying on of its business at Cameron Bay owing to the making of the fill.

The Westholme Company is represented by A. Carss, locally, and E. C. Mayers, of Bodwell, Lawson & Lane. L. W. Patmore appears for the G. T. P., along with E. P. Davis, K. G., the eminent counsel of Vancouver, and H. H. Hansard, general solicitor for the company.

RAILROAD MEN WOULD FAVOR GIVING TIME

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Sept. 1.—President Wilson has urged Congress to pass legislation dealing with the difficulties of the railroad employees, before Saturday evening.

The four leaders of the brotherhood of railway employees believe that, if a vote of the men were taken, the majority would be in favor of delaying the strike, provided they are given time to express their wishes.

Canadian Situation.

Winnipeg, Sept. 1.—The movement of flour, fruit, fish and live stock from Canada to the United States has practically ceased on account of the impending railway strike, the American companies refusing to accept consignments of such perishable freight for delivery after Sunday.

AMERICAN HALIBUT SHIPMENTS CEASE

The halibut arrivals this morning were the Margalice with 5,000 pounds; the Tide with 6,000, and the Rosesport with 8,000. Of the fifteen schooners in yesterday, two left for Ketchikan and the others sold their fares to the Cold Storage Company.

The halibut situation arising out of the threatened strike is very serious and word was received from Seattle this morning that the Express Companies are accepting no shipments which will reach their destination after midnight on Sunday. The opinion in Seattle seems to be that a general railroad strike is inevitable.

There were three cars of halibut on the train for the east this morning. Two of these were for the Canadian trade in the east and the other was made up of small local shipments.

London, Sept. 1.—Premier Hughes, of the Australian Commonwealth, declares that voluntaryism in Australia has failed. He intends to give it another thirty days' trial and, unless a sufficient number of single recruits are obtainable within that time, he will submit a referendum on Compulsory Service to the people.

RAILROAD TROUBLE

The threatened strike of the railway men throughout the United States is being brought closely home to Prince Rupert, since there are fifteen halibut schooners tied up at our wharves unable to sell their fares as the railway companies in the south will not accept perishable freight until the strike is over.

From Washington reports, it seems that neither side will give in and that war is inevitable, for a strike is war always, and, like all other warfare, is unprofitable to both sides. It goes without saying that the railway men of America are not determined to tie up the entire traffic of half the railroad mileage in the world simply for the fun of the thing, or for a mere whim, and it is also apparent that the railroad magnates are not going to allow any such disastrous tie up if they can possibly avoid it.

In spite of all the threats, it is unlikely that there will be a general strike and, if there is, it is still more unlikely that it will last for more than two days. The great difference seems to be over the question of an eight-hour day and the railroad managers and presidents might as well give in on this point now as a few days after a strike has been on and feelings have been ruffled. If a railroad man puts in eight hours of trying work in a day he has done a full day's work and this truth applies equally to most lines of business. It is an economic fact which there is no gainsaying that no man can work for months at a stretch on long hours and gives of his best steadily, while the man who labors for such long hours is simply reducing the years of his usefulness.

The great contention of the railway companies is that, if they yield to the demand, it will add \$100,000,000 annually to their cost of operation. In

the long run, they will take very good care that it does no such thing, and that the consumer of the freight carried pays the price. \$100,000,000 looks a huge sum when it is reckoned as an added cost to operating expenses of any line of business, but when this sum is spread over the entire population of the United States, it will amount only to about \$1 a year to each inhabitant. Surely the people of the United States would be willing to sacrifice that small sum annually in order that the tens of thousands of railroad men might be allowed to work under better conditions. The statement that the companies would bear the cost is a fallacy. As a matter of fact, the men themselves would pay their share of the extra cost in increased freight charges on every ounce of food they eat, and the benefit which will accrue to the men is well worth the price. The probability is that the magnates are simply trying to see how far the men will really go, and, if this is so, the men are quite justified in "going the whole hog."

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The little man from Seattle says "indebtedness is a justifiable asset." If he hands on this statement to the Minister of Finance, now that we have such a gentleman, he will no doubt be greatly encouraged.

What Joe Martin did has nothing whatever to do with the present situation in this province. Joe is not the issue. The one issue is Bowser and Bowserism.

The latest joke is that Bowser is to get credit for the mining development at Granby, Surf Inlet, Alice Arm and Rocher De Boule. Bowser has an enormously high opinion of his powers, but he would hardly take credit for depositing copper on Rocher De Boule.

THE UNHARMED CRUCIFIX

One small township I especially remember (writes Charles Iggesden in "Out There," the impressions of a visit to the front under War Office auspices), ruthless destruction was everywhere. The only room left in a once large residence was the battalion headquarters.

The church of this French town was also in utter ruin. Only the front of the tower was left, the steeple had fallen on the parapet and, smashed the sides of it; the entire roof was gone; three out of the four walls remained standing; all the stained glass had been shattered into splinters and strewed the rank grass growing at the foundations of the masonry. Heaped up rubbish of stonework, brickwork and plaster strewed the floor of the church, in which broken seats, altar and pulpit were mixed up. The stone mullions of the windows were smashed; two large shells had penetrated the east wall and scattered altar, rood loft, pulpit and many another emblem of worship in their mad career. The churchyard outside had been churned up by shells. Scarcely a tombstone remained standing, and all around were pieces of coffins.

Here in this out-of-the-way village the sacred sign of Christianity was visible, untouched, a large wooden cross with a colored figure of our Savior, arms outstretched. It was almost the only thing in that old picturesque French churchyard left standing, and, strangely enough, there was no sign that a single bullet or even a bit of shrapnel had struck the wooden figure.—Exchange.
