growth in recent years, it is not of modern origin, but goes back into the centuries in the older countries of Europe.

In nearly every country in Europe, as far back as the sixteenth century, each trade had its guild and each tradesman had to show that he was possessed of certain qualifications before he was admitted. into his guild or union, as it! would be called today. For instance, in Scotland in the sixteenth century, the making of "grand-father" clocks was quite an art, and, before a clock-maker was allowed admittance to the guild, he had to prove to a committee that he was capable of making a standard clock. The same thing applied to masons, carpenters and men working in all other lines of industry and each guild had its particular privileges. The church, which was the ruling factor in those days, took an active part in the work of the various guilds and in each church there were separate sections set apart for the members of the various guilds, and woe betide the member who was absent from his place for insufficient cause. When a man left one town for another, he took with him his discharge papers from his guild and had to present them to the leaders in the town to which he journeyed. If he had a bad record in any way he was promptly turned out of the town.
