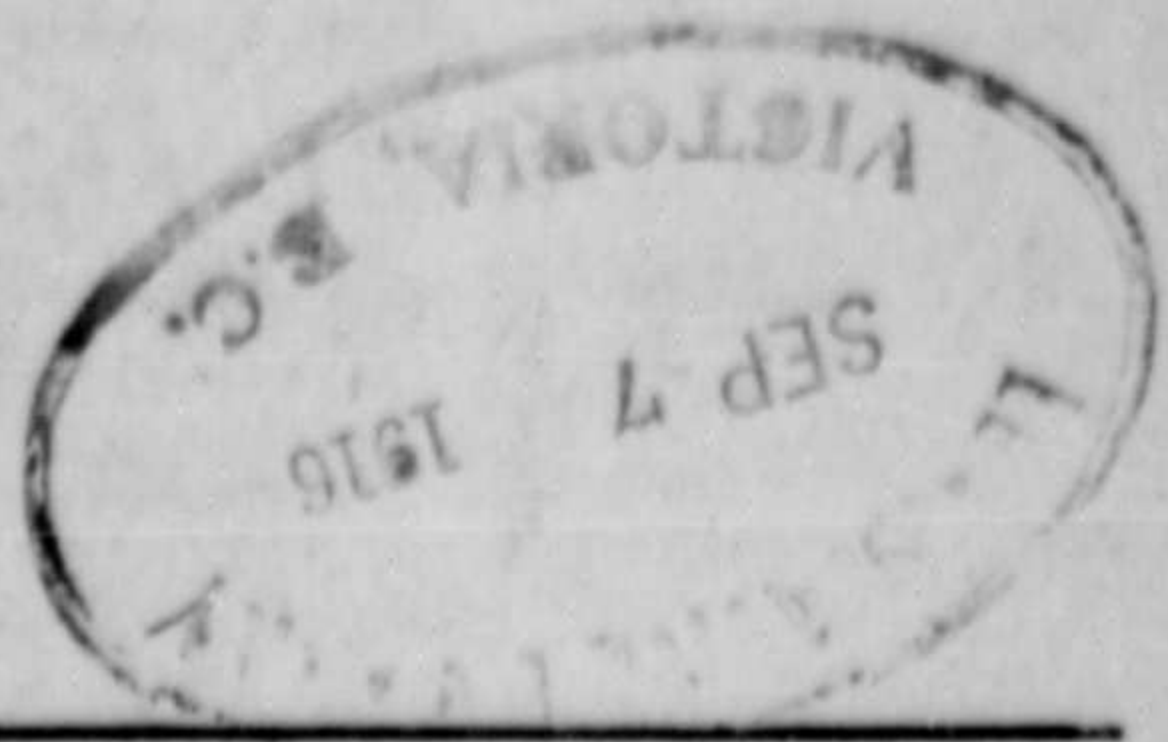

## KING CONSTANTINE OF GREECE ABDICATES

### AUSTRIANS ADMIT RUMANIAN GAINS -- ALLIES BRING DOWN FOUR AIRSHIPS

#### CONSTANTINE SURRENDERS GREEK THRONE

Venizelos will be Leader—Elections Postponed—Greece May Join Allies—Warships off Piraeus.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 2.—The British official press representative at Saloniki has telegraphed that King Constantine of Greece has abdicated.

Ex-Premier Venizelos, the Liberal leader, is now recognized as the power behind the throne. The general elections have been postponed for a fortnight and it is believed that Greece is preparing to join the Entente Allies.

There is a prevailing opinion that the Allies are tired of the equivocations of the Greek King and his ministers and may proceed to take possession of the Greek ports.

#### Fleet at Piraeus.

Athens, Sept. 2.—An Entente fleet of twenty-three warships and seven transports laden with troops has arrived off Piraeus and it is anticipated that the Allies will proceed to land a force at this important Greek port.

#### FOUR AIRSHIPS BROUGHT DOWN ON WEST FRONT

Fifty Prisoners Captured—Russians Capturing Thousands More—Italians Gain in Albania.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Sept. 2.—Comparative quiet still reigns on the Somme front, but there is greatly increased air activity. The Allies have shot down four German airships, capturing fifty prisoners from the crews.

#### Russian Front.

Petrograd, Sept. 2.—An official statement in regard to Thursday's fighting on the eastern front says the Russians captured fifteen thousand, seven hundred and ninety prisoners and fifty-five machine guns.

#### Italians in Albania.

Rome, Sept. 2.—The Italians have commenced a new offensive in southern Albania and have occupied Tepeleni.

#### Bulgarians Fail.

Athens, Sept. 2.—The Bulgarians have failed in their attempt to capture Gornitchova and are evacuating Serovitz, on the Serbian front near Florina.

#### DOMINIONS COMMISSION

At the Board of Trade meeting last night, the question of preparing data for the consideration of the Royal Dominions Commission, when they arrive here on September 15th, accompanied by Sir George E. Foster, was discussed. It was decided that the Trade and Commerce Committee, with representatives from the Fisheries Committee and other members of the board, meet the commission here to place before it information in regard to the development of trade and industry here. It was intimated that Captain McCroskie had already provided information in regard to the harbor, which was the immediate concern of the commission, while the matter of trade development after the war would be taken up with Sir George E. Foster, who is specially interesting himself in this subject.

#### TRADE DEVELOPMENT

The Board of Trade has been asked to provide Sir George E. Foster with information in regard to the development of trade with Australia and New Zealand and with the United Kingdom, through the Panama Canal, and also to provide data in regard to the agricultural and fisheries development of this district. This information is wanted in connection with a proposed scheme of trade development throughout the Empire after the war. The trade and commerce and fisheries committees will take the matter up.

#### EIGHT-HOUR DAY BILL PASSED AT WASHINGTON

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Sept. 2.—The Adamson Eight-Hour Day Bill has been passed by an overwhelming majority and the Senate has agreed to take the final vote on the measure before six o'clock tonight.

The leaders of the brotherhoods of railwaymen regard the measure as satisfactory and believe that it will make for the settlement of their troubles.

President Wilson yesterday signed the Child Labor Bill, a measure which will prohibit the employment of children under a certain age in factories.

#### DUKE LAYS PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS CORNER STONE

Ottawa, Sept. 2.—H. R. H. the duke of Connaught laid the corner stone of the new Parliament Buildings here yesterday in the presence of the Duchess of Connaught Princess Patricia, Premier Borden and the Lieutenants-Governor of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

#### FORTY-ONE LOST WHEN MEMPHIS FOUNDERED

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Sept. 2.—Forty-one members of the crew of the United States armored cruiser Memphis lost their lives when the vessel foundered outside the harbor of Santa Domingo, in the West Indies, three days ago. The cruiser will become a total wreck.

#### FREIGHT RATES

At the Board of Trade meeting last night, a letter from the Imperial Tobacco Company was read dealing with the question of revised classification of freight, by which mixed cars of different classification would not be accepted as carload lots and various other changes were suggested which would materially increase freight rates. The Board of Railway Commissioners will receive statements of complaint against the proposed changes during the next three months. The matter was referred to the Freight Rates Committee for report.

#### PEOPLE ARE UNITED TO DEFEAT BOWSERISM

Vancouver, August 29.—Completing a most successful tour of the province, Mr. H. C. Brewster, Liberal leader, and Mr. M. A. Macdonald, his able lieutenant, returned last night and were welcomed at the depot by Mr. John Oliver and delegations from the Vancouver City Liberal Association and the Women's Liberal Association. The committee of men numbered Mr. Charles E. Campbell, president of the association; Mr. S. C. Rowe, campaign manager; Dr. J. W. McIntosh, and others. The committee of ladies comprised Mrs. S. J. Rowe, Mrs. J. W. deB. Farris and Mrs. Stanley Brown. Mayor George E. Hanes, candidate of the party in North Vancouver, represented that city.

Both Mr. Brewster and Mr. Macdonald were looking very fit, and browed by the sun and the strenuous trip which took them into every corner of the province. They held seventy-three meetings and addressed several thousand persons.

Both last night expressed their entire confidence in the outcome of the election on Sept 14 and the success of the Liberals. The people everywhere complained of conditions which were the result of thirteen years of Bowser rule, and voiced their determination to overthrow the government. From the hearty receptions which met them everywhere and the expressed disposition that there must be a house cleaning, the Liberal leader feels assured of success even in former government strongholds.

#### PETROSENY AND KRONSTADT TO THE RUMANIANS

Austrians Admit Rumanian Gains—Two Cities and Rich Coal Fields Captured—Hungary will Quit.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 2.—Despatches from Austrian headquarters admit that the Rumanians are rapidly advancing in Transylvania and have already captured, in addition to the important border town of Kronstadt, the great industrial centre of Petroseny, including the Tarlunge Valley, in which are the richest coal fields in Transylvania.

#### Hungary had Enough.

Rome, Sept. 2.—The peace movement in Hungary, which has been growing steadily, has received an added impetus from the entrance of Rumania into the war and the invasion of Transylvania is having a tremendous effect upon Hungarian public opinion. Hungary is now ready to separate from Austria and to sue for individual peace, according to affirmed statements from authoritative Italian circles.

LABOR DAY

Monday is Labor Day throughout the United States and Canada, when the citizens on this continent will join with the millions of men belonging to the various labor organizations in celebrating the one day of the year which is truly theirs.

In nearly every country in Europe, as far back as the sixteenth century, each trade had its guild and each tradesman had to show that he was possessed of certain qualifications before he was admitted into his guild or union, as it would be called today.

When a man left one town for another, he took with him his discharge papers from his guild and had to present them to the leaders in the town to which he journeyed.

Today, men are not so harsh to an erring brother as they were in those days, and a member of a union, who has gone wrong, is more likely to find a spirit of brotherhood

which welcomes him to a strange town and does its utmost to help him to retrieve the past.

The tremendous industrial development which has followed the introduction of machinery has changed the situation considerably and, in recent years, the formation of large combinations of capital has entirely changed the conditions which tradesmen have to cope with.

Organized labor has had to fight, and sometimes fight bitterly, for its rights, but, all along the line it has steadily advanced until today it is one of the greatest forces in our civilization.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Bowserites are doing their utmost to divert public attention from the real issue in the election. It is not a question of Man-



son, or Pattullo, or Conservatism, or Liberalism, but a question as to whether the people of this province will stand for Bowserism.

The local Bowser organ is very much perturbed because Joe Merryfield has been classed with Harry Price and John L. Sullivan. We make no apology to the latter gentlemen for the classification. All three are doing, and have for years been doing, the same class of work.

Unable to offer any excuse for the fact that the province is \$33,000,000 in the hole, the Bowser press is going to depend upon garbled accounts of the evidence in the "plugging" scandal.

Fred. Welsh was proven guilty of procuring funds for the Bowser machine out of soap contractors tendering on Vancouver school board work.

We will be told that the war caused the Dominion Trust smash, and that it was entirely due to the European situation that the P. G. E. got away with many more millions than it had any right to do.

## PEOPLE ARE UNITED TO DEFEAT BOWSERISM

(Continued From Page One.)

"If Premier Bowser has a safe seat in the province of British Columbia I would like to know what particular one he thinks it is," said Mr. Brewster to a Sun representative last evening on his arrival. "My colleague and I have visited practically every constituency in the interior, north and south, and we know of none that the government can rely on winning. Even in those that have in the past been considered solidly Conservative we now find every indication of a Liberal support almost as solid.

### Sentiment Against Government.

"Everywhere there is a sentiment of the most deep-rooted character against the government. It has been forming and intensifying during the last few years, and is today unassailable by any arguments the government can advance, material or otherwise. It is spread generally among the electors and is not confined to any one class of people nor to any one portion of the province. Conservatives, Liberals, Labor men and Socialists; farmers, artisans, merchants and professional men; all are united in the one aim of sweeping the Bowser government out of power and its members out of public life. The situation reminds one of nothing so forcibly as of the great public movements which history records, moving irresistibly on to an emphatic assertion of the truth that the people are sovereign, and that no government which arrogates power to itself can long survive.

"At every place we visited, whether we had time for a meeting or not, we found the people eager to see and hear us. They are looking to the Liberal party

for relief from conditions which in the northern portions of the province especially, are proving intolerable and are seriously hampering development. Apart from their natural desire to hear what we had to say, the electors had a particular wish to have the truth told them on many points touched on by Mr. Bowser while he was touring. As I have already stated more than once in the course of the last two months it is difficult to imagine that a public man in the position of premier of a great province would stoop to playing fast and loose with the truth, to deliberate misrepresentation and distortion, as Mr. Bowser has done."
