## ALLIES VICTORIOUS ON THE WESTERN FRONT

### THOUSANDS OF PRISONERS TAKEN EAST AND WEST — ALLIES CONTROL GREECE

#### AUSTRIANS AND ROUMANIANS IN GREAT BATTLE

Roumanians Capture Ostroba and Other Points—Russians are Making Big Drive on Lemberg.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Paris, Sept. 5.—A great battle between the Austrians and the Roumanians has been raging for the past forty-eight hours at Orsova and the enemy has now evacuated this most important stronghold.

Counter attacks by the Germans and Bulgarians were repulsed and the Roumanians captured the towns of Borszek and Zekeli in Transylvania.

##### Russian Front.

Petrograd, Sept. 5.—The Russians have renewed their great drive on Lemberg in an endeavor to pierce the heart of the Austrian crown land before the winter sets in to retard operations.

The Russians have crossed the Thenivka River and have seized an Austro-German position, taking 2,724 prisoners. Between last Thursday and Sunday, General Brussiloff's army captured 19,400 prisoners.

##### Seaplane Raid.

Berlin, Sept. 5.—It is officially reported that German seaplanes raided the harbor works and oil reservoirs at Constanza, Roumania, and also dropped bombs on Russian warships lying off this port.

#### FIVE THOUSAND GERMANS TAKEN ON SOMME FRONT

Great Anglo-French Offensive is Resumed—Germans Being Pushed Steadily Back.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 5.—The great Anglo-French offensive on the Somme front has been resumed with renewed vigor and there is a fierce battle raging along both banks of the river. The French made important gains in the Picardy region on Sunday, taking two strong German positions and a substantial portion of the German line.

Le Forest and Clercy were occupied by the French and, following up this success, our Allies captured Soyecourt and a portion of Vermagnovillers, taking over five thousand prisoners.

##### British Advance.

The British are sweeping forward and have captured one town and the suburbs of another, and there is desperate fighting along almost the entire western front, with the Germans being pushed steadily back.

In fierce fighting in De Ville wood, the British accounted for eight thousand of the German 108th division.

##### WELSH DEFEATS WHITE IN TWENTY-ROUND BOUT

Colorado Springs, Sept. 5.—Welsh defeated White in a twenty round contest here yesterday. A portion of the grandstand bleachers collapsed and a hundred persons were injured.

##### Kilbane Won.

Cedar Point, Sept. 5.—Kilbane defeated Chancy in three rounds.

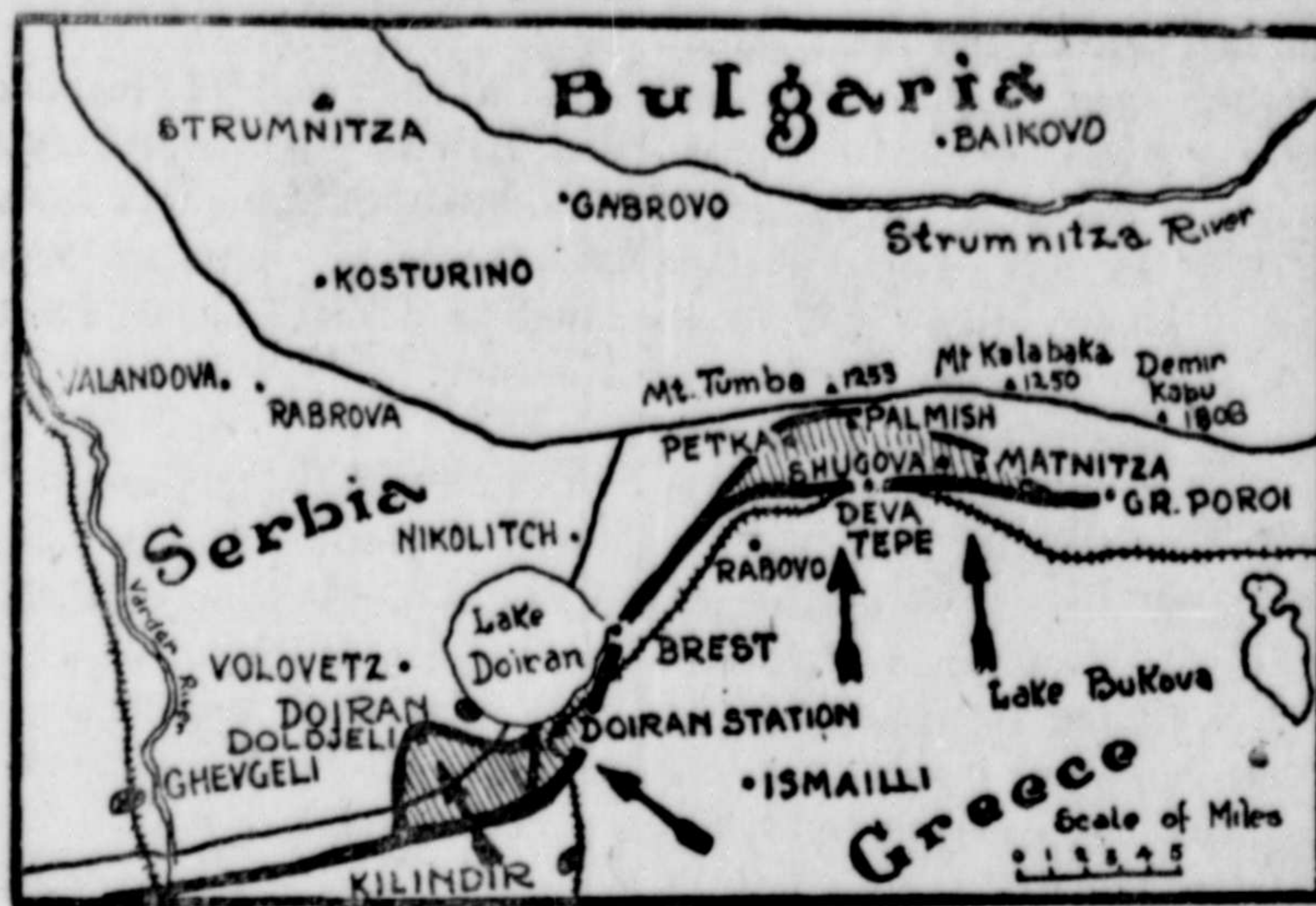
##### RETURNED SOLDIERS' DANCE

The dance given by the Returned Soldiers' Club in the Railwaymen's Hall last evening was one of the most successful ever held in the city. The hall was beautifully decorated with Union Jacks and Canadian flags, while Prince Rupert's Roll of Honor occupied a prominent position on the platform, and our boys who have returned from the front were there in uniform.

##### MANITOBA CASE

The accompanying map shows where the Allied troops have entered Serbia and have begun to drive out the invaders. They have taken four villages west of Lake Doiran and have advanced two miles in northern Greece.

#### HOKUTO MARU WAS 52 DAYS ON VOYAGE

The Japanese brigantine Hokuto Maru made port on Saturday evening, after having been 52 days on the voyage from Kobe. The captain expected to make the trip in 35 days and made good time until he approached this coast, when he encountered fogs and calm. He was obliged to beat around Dixon's Entrance and Brown Passage for nine days, before he spoke a halibut schooner which brought in word of him.

Captain Sumii, who is on this coast for the first time, is highly delighted with our harbor and hopes to make other trips across the Pacific, if trade warrants it. The Hokuto has been chartered by K. Ota to take a cargo of salted salmon from Jedway to Japan and will leave for the Islands in a day or two. The brigantine is of 260 tons; has a 99 1/2 foot keel and is 120 feet long. She carries a crew of eighteen besides her captain, and was built at Osaka three years ago. She is a stout little vessel, and is built of teak. Her interior fittings are of the neatest description and everything is spotlessly clean.

The captain, who speaks a little English, is a remarkably intelligent officer and has a wonderful gift of describing things to a westerner. He explained to The Daily News yesterday that one of the great dangers of such a long voyage is sickness, resulting from lack of variety of food. The chief item in a Japanese menu is rice and a long continued diet of this article is apt to bring on berri berri, a disease which has been fought by sailing ship crews the world over. Captain Sumii says that he found that a mixture of one per cent. of oatmeal in the rice given to the crew proved effective in warding off this danger and in keeping his men in good health. They are a remarkably healthy, happy crew. When visited yesterday they were sitting around a charcoal brazier, placed in a bed of Kamchatka gravel, toasting biscuits and making tea. They received their visitors with big smiles.

##### Former M. P. Dead.

Hanover, Sept. 5.—Mr. Miller, former Member of Parliament for South Grey, is dead, following an operation.

#### LABOR DAY SMOKER WAS LARGELY ATTENDED

The Labor Day smoker in the Empress Theatre last night was as usual, a thoroughly enjoyable function. In the absence of President S. D. Macdonald, W. E. Thompson occupied the chair. There was not quite such a large attendance as last year but there was lots of enthusiasm. Mr. Thompson, in introducing Ald. George Casey, the speaker of the evening, emphasized the fact that Labor Day, besides being a day for sports and the enjoyment of out of doors life, had a great educational value, as it gave them an opportunity to review the past and learn its lessons. He drew attention to the fact that Grover Cleveland, who gave them the holiday, had, in the same term of office, turned the Federal troops upon strikers, showing where his sympathies lay.

In speaking of the local labor unions, he pointed out that the Fish Packers, Carworkers, and Retail Clerks had each formed strong organizations since last year. He appealed to business men to take a broader view of organized labor and asked all who are not members of unions to recognize the value of and help along the work of organized labor.

#### GREEKS THROW HUN INFLUENCE TO THE WINDS

Allied Demands Acceded to and Zaimis Supports Venizelos—Piraeus in Allied Hands.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 5.—The iron hand of the Allies has been firmly clamped on Greece and the government has acceded to the Allied demand for the entire control of the postal and telegraphic communications, only a few wireless stations remaining in Greek hands.

A landing party has been placed in charge of the Greek port of Piraeus and the Entente warships are within gunshot of Athens. The presence of the British and French fleet has simplified the situation and Premier Zaimis realizes that he has lost control of the country and has promised to support the Venizelos party. Even the opponents of Venizelos are rapidly throwing their influence against the Germans.

##### East Africa.

Dar-Es-Salaam, the chief town in German East Africa, has been surrendered to the British Expeditionary Force.

##### London Air Raid.

London, Sept. 5.—Two were killed and thirteen injured in a Zeppelin raid on the suburbs on Sunday night. One Zeppelin was destroyed by fire, its crew being burned to death.

##### FREIGHT RATES

Vancouver, Sept. 5.—Judge Rensberg, of the Seattle Harbor Commission, advocates that the government should take over the control of ocean freight rates, similar to the arrangement in regard to railroad transportation.

## DIVERSION

In trying to bolster up a situation which they already know to be hopeless, the Bowserites are resorting to the most ridiculous statements in order to divert public attention away from the real issue of the election. Realizing that their charges of "plugging" in connection with the defeat of G. E. Tisdall in Vancouver are of no avail unless they can account for the landslide in Victoria, they now state that "800 voted in Victoria at that election who were not entitled to vote." They do not attempt to say that there was any "plugging" in Victoria, though they are probably aware that Harry Price and his team-mate, Victor Love, were at their usual game, which was very clearly shown up in the notorious Price-Love letters.

It would be interesting if the Bowser press was to explain exactly which men voted in Victoria who had no right to vote. It might also state as to whether these gentlemen were supplied with some of the whisky which Harry Price was good enough to purchase for the election day "blind-pig," and whether any of them were the men whose fares were paid to Victoria by the same Harry Price. Harry was supposed to have retired from the political arena after his fifty cents a ton coal graft was laid bare, but he admitted that he had paid the fares of a large number of men, simply out of the goodness of his heart, bless him.

The by-elections were the most unfortunate thing which Bowser could ever have devised and even the "plugging" bomb went off too soon to be of any service. The scheme was to keep the whole nefarious plot until a few days before the election and then to spring it on the public. Fortunately, the Liberals became aware that there had been irregularities

and immediately set an enquiry afoot, with the result that one man was sent to jail, and, but for the protection of Bowser, several others should have accompanied him.

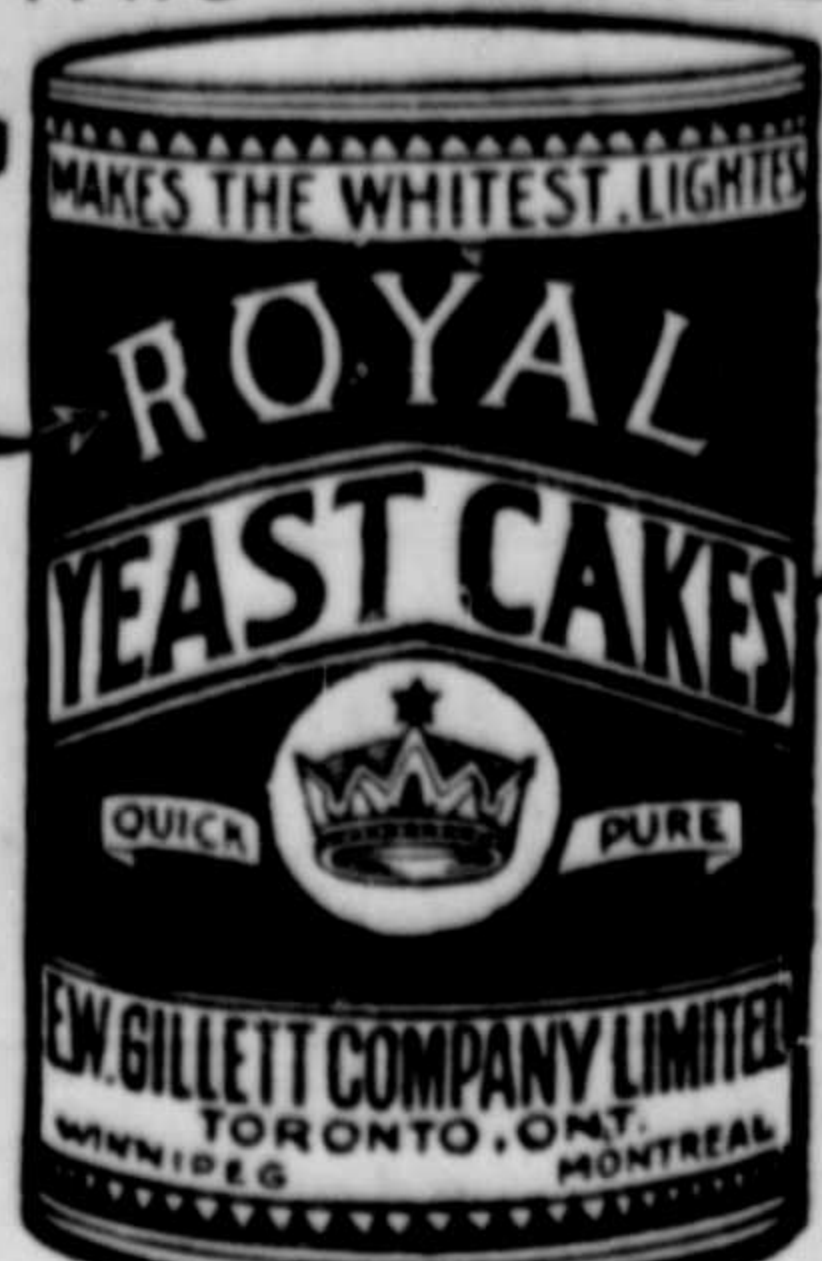
The Vancouver bomb having fizzled out in the most tantalizing way imaginable, and Harry Price having been proven by the evidence to have been guilty of his usual tactics, there was nothing left to be done but to scare up another story near election time. Of course, there will be other stories hatched yet. Just before polling day, we may expect the usual canard in the shape of a forged telegram, though that game has been played out in Victoria, or some wild fantastic tale that Mr. Pattullo meant to import thousands of voters from Manchuria or the North Pole by aeroplane. Anything will do so long as it is black enough. However, the people are now wide awake to the calibre of the men who have made this province and its finances and resources their dice and they may spring any kind of a tale they care. The notorious game is up and the people of British Columbia are in no mood to be fooled on this occasion.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

It may be taken for granted that Hon. William Manson and T. D. Pattullo are both decent respectable gentlemen. The question before the electors is not what they are but what they represent. William Manson stands for Bowserism and has shown that he will stand for anything Boss Bowser may try to put over, while T. D. Pattullo would not for a moment submit to any such man.

The first duty of the Brewster government will be to cut down the expenditure until it bears some relationship to the revenue of the province. Manitoba had the same duty to preform and did

it thoroughly and Brewster will be equally successful.

With the cost of keeping up the Bowser political machine eliminated, the finances of British Columbia will be brought down to a firm basis by H. C. Brewster.

Even the Vancouver School Board will carry on its business at reduced cost when the Bowser government is defeated, as contractors will not find it necessary to contribute sums to any political machine.

## HIGHLY INTERESTING FISHING COMPETITION

As was anticipated, the halibut fishing contest in the harbor proved one of the most interesting and educative items in the Labor Day sports. About six o'clock, the schooner Volunteer dropped four dories, each having a crew of two, and at a signal, a float was dropped and the race was on. One man rowed while the other paid out the line. Paying out 800 yards of line meant travelling best part of the way across the harbor; rowing back to the starting buoy and hauling in, across the bay again.

From the buoy, there is fifty fathoms of line; then three hundred fathoms of ground line, and fifty fathoms of buoy line at the other end. Hauling in this great length of line is no easy work, even without fish on, and, in a heavy sea and with a load of halibut, some of them weighing well over a hundred pounds, it must be tremendously hard work. In the competition, each boat caught fish of some kind, though they did not want them. The Hanson brothers, off the P. Doreen, caught a wolf fish, a denizen of the deep which is very rare, even in the deep sea. Mr. Lipsett is having it placed on ice and displayed at Frizzell's Meat Market.

The winners of the first prize were E. Hanson and W. Doucette, their time being 35 minutes. The others had the second and third prizes divided between them, as there was some difficulty because of the fact that one of the crews had not made their line fast to the anchor.

The public is much indebted to Harry Lipsett, of Lipsett, Cunningham, for the staging of this most interesting and instructive competition and to the firm for their handsome prize of \$50, \$20 of which went to the winners and \$30 was divided between the other three crews. Mr. Lipsett will prepare something bigger and still more interesting for next year, when he hopes to arrange a competition on a larger scale.

his one regret was that the gathering could not be held in the open air where the children and wives of labor men might learn more of the work which had been done.

He dealt chiefly with the railroad situation in the United States, congratulating President Wilson that he had taken a stand for labor when he could so easily have done as Grover Cleveland did. He emphasized the fact that President Wilson had acted in this matter entirely of his own volition and had not allowed his will to be sunk before that of the capitalist. He had the option of passing the legislation asked for by the railroad men or of turning the troops on them, and, to his everlasting credit, he had done the righteous and just thing. He contrasted his action with that of Grover Cleveland in 1894, when he was confronted with a similar situation and Cleveland failed and resorted to force.

A most enjoyable musical program was rendered, in which the Majestic orchestra lent able assistance and W. V. Davies gave splendid service at the piano.
