## FRENCH AND BRITISH GRADUALLY GAINING

### SIX THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED AND FIFTY PRISONERS -- RUSSIANS ADVANCING

#### RUSSIANS ARE ADVANCING ON ENTIRE FRONT

Fierce Fighting from Pripet Marshes to Volhynia—Russians Landed in Roumania.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Sept. 6.—There is violent fighting along the entire Russian front from the Pripet Marshes to Volhynia, through Galicia and also in the passes of the Carpathian Mountains, where the Russians continue to advance towards the Hungarian plains. The enemy is putting up a stout resistance but the Russians are determined to make their way into Hungarian and Austrian territory before the snow flies.

#### Roumanian Front.

Rome, Sept. 6.—Russian transports have landed a large contingent of troops at Constanza, the Roumanian Black Sea port, to reinforce the Roumanian garrison. On the Dohrudja frontier the Roumanians are resisting the attacks of the Germans and Bulgarians.

#### Italian Front.

The Italians have captured several commanding Austrian positions, including Punta del Forane at the head of the Rio Felizon Valley.

The Austrians have dropped bombs on Venice but no damage was done.

#### BRITISH WORKMEN AND STATE OWNED RAILWAYS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Birmingham, Sept. 6.—The Trades Union Congress, representing two million and a half workmen, which met here yesterday, has demanded that the government take over all the railways in Great Britain. The government has controlled the operation of the railways since the outbreak of the war and the Trades Unionists are decidedly of the opinion that the same conditions should prevail after the war.

#### WASHINGTON STRIKES AT BRITISH BLACKLIST

Washington, Sept. 6.—The United States new revenue bill, which is now before Congress, strikes hard at the British blacklist and aims at preventing the clearance of British vessels from American ports.

The preliminaries to the hearing of the case of the Westholme Lumber Company vs. the G. T. P. Railway Company were gone through before Judge Murphy in the Supreme Court yesterday. The following is the jury:—Wm. Denholm (foreman); Harry W. Birch, James Hampton, Harry Atkins, George Hill, A. W. McLean, M. H. Large, and Angelo Astori, E. C. Mayers, of Bodwell, Lawson & Lane, appeared for the plaintiffs, and E. P. Davis, K. C., H. H. Hansard and L. W. Patmore for the defendants. The jury spent the afternoon visiting the ground covered by the action and the hearing is proceeding today and is likely to last all week.

#### ADMIRALTY REQUIRES STILL MORE WORKMEN

Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty, after making a tour of the Clyde shipbuilding and munition industries, in commenting upon the splendid services rendered to the nation by the workmen of Great Britain, explained on behalf of the Admiralty that a considerable number of additional workers were required at the various plants.

#### PAPERMAKERS WANT SMALLER NEWSPAPERS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Port Frances, Ont., Sept. 6.—President Bachus, of the Port Frances Pulp and Paper Company, at a convention arranged on behalf of the Western Canadian publishers, urged the decrease of reading matter in newspapers on account of the alarming scarcity and high price of newsprint. The price is steadily increasing owing to the scarcity of material and various other causes.

#### AMERICAN FINANCIER HERE LAST EVENING

Mr. Leadbetter, vice-president of the company which is operating at Ocean Falls, passed through the city last evening on his way from New York. Mr. Leadbetter will pay a visit to Ocean Falls on his way home to Portland, Oregon.

He states that the company expects to have its new plant in operation early in the new year and look forward to big developments. There is a large amount of capital invested there and they will make a big effort to produce adequate returns.

This is the first occasion on which Mr. Leadbetter has travelled over the G. T. P. and he was greatly impressed with the scenery and with the road. He thought Prince Rupert had one of the finest harbors in the world and all that was needed was a start in the trans-Pacific trade, to make the harbor one of the busiest on the B. C. coast. On the way east, he met R. P. Trimble, with whom he discussed the mining possibilities of the interior. He recognizes that there is a big field for capital in mining here and that some day soon there will be great developments.

#### FIRE PROTECTION

In response to an application by the School Board for an increased water supply for fire protection at Borden Street school, the city council last night decided to make the necessary alterations. Supt. Kennedy reported that the cost would be small.

#### FIERCE FIGHT RAGING ALONG SOMME RIVER

French and British Advancing on Extended Front—Many Prisoners Taken—Votes in the Trenches.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 6.—Fierce fighting continues along a twenty-five mile front on both sides of the Somme River. The French and British are gradually advancing and are maintaining their gains, each point taken being consolidated. The Allies have captured several villages and six thousand five hundred and fifty prisoners since Sunday.

#### Voting in Trenches.

The military authorities are permitting the collection of the votes of British Columbia soldiers at the front and Sir Richard McBride is arranging that scrutineers and returning officers proceed to France without delay.

THE ISSUE

It is not necessary that British Columbia have a Liberal government; it is not necessary that British Columbia should have a Conservative government, but it is absolutely essential that this province should have clean government. The issue before the electors on September 14th is not whether somebody's father, grandfather or great-grandfather voted Conservative; or whether William Manson is a highly respectable citizen; or whether the News-Advertiser libelled Fred Wade, but—ARE THE PEOPLE OF THE PROVINCE TO BE SADDLED FOR FIVE YEARS MORE WITH BOWSER.

In the city of Victoria, thinking Conservatives some time ago formed themselves into an association with the avowed object of smashing Bowserism, and, in every part of the province, thinking Conservatives are working their hardest with the same end in view. Those gentlemen are not thirsting for office; they are not looking for personal gain, which is the only reason any Bowserite can conceive of why a man should support any party, but are out with a firm determination that British Columbia must, and shall, have clean government.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper is the most prominent of the many thousands of Conservatives who have allied themselves on this occasion with the Liberal party. They are not allied with the Liberal party because it is the Liberal party, but because they recognize in H. C. Brewster a leader who is clean, straightforward and upright; a leader who will smash anything that looks like corruption that may show its head within his government.

The curse of this province, as it was of Manitoba, is the patronage system, H. C. Brewster has given his word that this pernicious system must be wiped out, and Mr. Brewster has proven that he is a man

of his word, who fears neither friend nor foe. Sir Hibbert Tupper says, "I believe Mr. Brewster stands above any statesman of Canada in having the courage of his convictions and in declaring frankly that he is opposed to patronage. It is not only unique—it is grand."

"On the other hand, Mr. Bowser makes a deliberate appeal to the roadmasters and to the contractors and the rest of the hungry horde feeding at the public trough. 'If I go out, you go,' he says. Doesn't that smack a little of soap?" asked Sir Hibbert recently in Vancouver.

Bowserism has kept the settler in the north dependent upon the government, for its own nefarious ends. The feudal land system of the government has so tied up development that the settler is isolated from his fellows and from the markets and, therefore, is unable to make any progress. The Bowser machine does not worry about his lack of progress because it prefers to keep him feeding out of the Bowser hand, so that he will always want to keep that hand doing the feeding. Under a community system of settlement, with the speculator eliminated, the settler will very soon be so busy working for himself that he will not worry about a few days work for the government, and, under Brewster, when government work does come along, a man will not have to tie himself to the chariot wheels of any political Nero in order to get his just share, if he wants it. The day of the hand-fed elector is over and the day of political freedom is at hand, and that freedom will come, not because there will be a Liberal government in power, but because the people have risen in their wrath and demanded that the old iniquitous system must end. A sane Conservative government would have abolished it long ago but what has been

masquerading as Conservative has been the hydra-headed monster of Bowserism.

If after a fair trial some defect in the working of the Act is found we can quickly remedy this, once we are free from the tyranny of a powerful monopoly.

The British Columbia Act is based upon the Manitoba Act and is almost the same as the Alberta Act which are now both in force.

The Lieut.-Governor of Alberta says the Act in his province is working "most satisfactorily."

The Lieut.-Governor of Manitoba says the Act in his province is "an unqualified success."

The British Columbia Act will be as successful in lessening crime and promoting prosperity if we only try it.
