SEATTLE LEGISLATION PASSED BY CONGRESS YESTERDAY IN THE REVENUE BILL

MACHINE GUNS AND MEN TAKEN ON WEST FRONT

Made by French and British-German Submarine Destroyed by Aviators off Zeebrugge.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 7 .- Severe fighting continues on the Somme front near Ginchy, where the British have captured prisoners and machine guns.

Four British aeroplanes drove off a hostile patrol of thirteen airships, which were making for the British lines.

French Front.

Paris, Sept. 7 .- South of the Somme the French are keeping up a terrific offensive and have carried several German trenches and have advanced to the outskirts of Chaulnes, along the railway towards Roye. The French have again captured a large number of prisoners.

Submarine Destroyed.

Amsterdam, Sept. 7 .- British airmen are reported to have destroyed a German submarine off the entrance to Zeebrugge harbor on the Belgian coast.




