## WASHINGTON RUINS RUPERT FISHING TRADE

### SEATTLE LEGISLATION PASSED BY CONGRESS YESTERDAY IN THE REVENUE BILL

#### MACHINE GUNS AND MEN TAKEN ON WEST FRONT

Captures Made by French and British—German Submarine Destroyed by Aviators off Zeebrugge.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 7.—Severe fighting continues on the Somme front near Ginchy, where the British have captured prisoners and machine guns.

Four British aeroplanes drove off a hostile patrol of thirteen airships, which were making for the British lines.

#### French Front.

Paris, Sept. 7.—South of the Somme the French are keeping up a terrific offensive and have carried several German trenches and have advanced to the outskirts of Chaumes, along the railway towards Roye. The French have again captured a large number of prisoners.

#### Submarine Destroyed.

Amsterdam, Sept. 7.—British airmen are reported to have destroyed a German submarine off the entrance to Zeebrugge harbor on the Belgian coast.

#### Bohemia with Allies.

Paris, Sept. 7.—Bohemia is leaning strongly in favor of the Entente Allies and a special legion of troops from that kingdom has been enrolled in the French army.

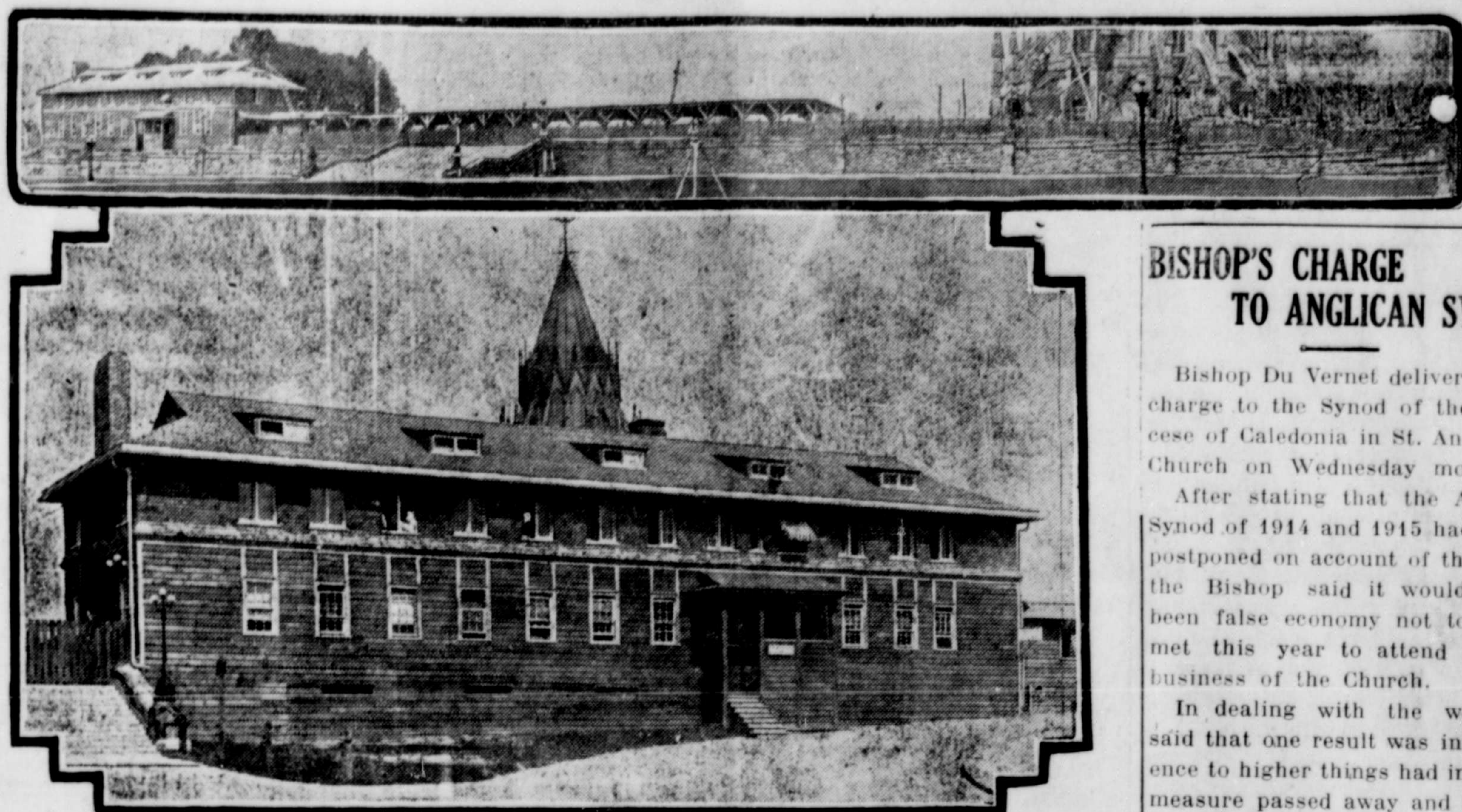

**THE "CHATEAU LYALL" AND SCENES ON PARLIAMENT HILL, OTTAWA.**—This elaborate office building is erected on the site of Canada's two million dollar scrap heap at Ottawa. The contractor for the Parliament Buildings will not only get the benefit of it while the work is on but will collect 8 per cent. profit on it from the country. The upper picture gives a skyline view from the east to west, showing the Chateau Lyall. Just to the right of the clump of trees formerly stood the undamaged and new west wing which had to be levelled by dynamite. The barbed wire fence prevents a view of the site as it now is. At a recent meeting of the Parliamentary Committee the Conservative members blamed the architects for the destruction of the two million dollars' worth of sound walls.

Not only is the contractor to get 8 per cent on the whole cost of the work, but he is to be allowed 20 per cent per annum depreciation on his plant.

#### NORTH VANCOUVER MAN LOST ENTIRE FAMILY

Vancouver, Sept. 7.—Mr. Bos-unworth, of North Vancouver, on the day following the burial of his infant, witnessed the recovery of the lifeless bodies of his other two children from English Bay. The father is broken-hearted at the wiping out of his family of little children in so short a time.

#### WASHINGTON DELIVERS BODY BLOW TO PRINCE RUPERT TRADE

CONGRESS PASSED REVENUE BILL YESTERDAY PROHIBITING PRINCE RUPERT PACKED FISH FROM ENTERING THE UNITED STATES—WILL BE EFFECTIVE IN NINETY DAYS

Word reached town this morning from Washington that the United States Revenue Bill, including the new fishing legislation, was passed by Congress yesterday, but has not yet been signed by President Wilson. The legislation becomes effective in ninety days after the signing of the bill by the president.

The clause which puts the American halibut industry out of business so far as Prince Rupert is concerned, reads as follows: "On and after ninety days from the passage of this Act, no fresh or frozen halibut or salmon from the North Pacific and its tributary waters shall be admitted into the United States through a foreign country, except the same shall be in bond from an American port."

It will be remembered that this legislation was presented to Congress as a separate bill, but Sir Cecil Spring Rice, the British Ambassador to Washington, notified the president that Great Britain would consider the passage of the bill as an "unfriendly act," and the matter was promptly dropped.

The Seattle fishing interests then set to work and had the measure attached to a revenue bill, so that the legislation could not be killed without killing the whole revenue measure. The passage of this legislation puts

Prince Rupert entirely out of the United States fishing business and is a severe blow to this port.

#### INTERESTING CASE IN THE SUPREME COURT

The case of the Westholme Lumber Company vs. the G. T. P. Railway Company was resumed before Judge Murphy in the Supreme Court yesterday.

The first witness called was J. Y. Rochester who testified that he had leased lots on Cameron Cove. At the time of the sale of the lease it was promised that the cove would remain open to the sea.

Sol Cameron, president of the Westholme Lumber Co., described the organization of the company and how he came here in 1908 and picked out Cameron Cove as the most suitable place to land material for his contracting work. He took steps to see that access from the cove to the sea would not be cut off.

Just before the auction of the leases, C. D. Rand was asked as to this point and gave assurance that there would certainly be access to the cove from the sea. On this assurance, witness purchased lots 11, 12 and 14 and started to work.

Mitchell Albert, manager of the Westholme Lumber Co., was next called. He said that he took

#### BISHOP'S CHARGE TO ANGLICAN SYNOD

Bishop Du Vernet delivered his charge to the Synod of the Diocese of Caledonia in St. Andrew's Church on Wednesday morning.

After stating that the Annual Synod of 1914 and 1915 had been postponed on account of the war, the Bishop said it would have been false economy not to have met this year to attend to the business of the Church.

In dealing with the war, he said that one result was indifference to higher things had in some measure passed away and that a regenerating force had been evoked in our national life. He said that if the organized Church fails at such a crisis it may be left behind in the onward march. He said that, from the rank and file of non-church going people may emerge a new type of Christianity, true to the Spirit of Christ but discarding much that the Churches have over-emphasized.

The Bishop made reference to the revised Prayer Book and also dwelt upon the difficult work which would fall upon the clergymen of this Diocese after the war. He made feeling reference to the removal by death of Rev. Wm. Hogan and Rev. R. W. Gurd, two faithful laborers for many years.

Three new churches have been opened since the war began and land has been obtained for a building in the Pouce Coupe country and a clergyman has been secured.

In referring to the impending election, he said that he believed that the people would make the legislation against the bar effective and that, if the women were given the vote, it would lead to a better order of things.

In view of the awful waste of wealth and men from the war, he urged upon the people the necessity for economy and production. He said that there is not enough

#### RUMANIANS AND RUSSIANS ARE STILL GAINING

Russians Capture Strong Positions and Many Prisoners—Rumanians Driving Enemy Before Them.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 7.—The Russians have captured strongly fortified Austrian positions and have captured forty-five hundred prisoners between the Zlota Lipa and Dniester rivers.

#### Rumanians Gaining.

Geneva, Sept. 7.—The Austrians and Hungarians are continuing to retire along the Moldavia river before the Rumanian forces.

#### German Loan Fails.

London, Sept. 7.—Reports from Berlin indicate that the last German loan is a failure and that the time limit will probably be extended until October 15th in order to secure enough subscriptions.

#### Zeppelin Crew Buried.

The crew of the Zeppelin which was destroyed in the last raid on London were interred yesterday at Potters Bar with military honors. The London papers declare that the nation's moral sense has been outraged by the conferring of this honor upon men who dropped bombs on a defenceless city and the Express asks if the authorities would give a military funeral to the person who sank the Lusitania.

#### STRIKES DECLARED IN NEW YORK INDUSTRIES

New York, Sept. 7.—A strike has been declared by the Union employees on the Subway, Elevated and Interborough Rapid Transit Company lines. The company hopes that, with adequate police protection, they will be able to guarantee a service over their routes.

Three thousand grocery clerks have gone on strike, demanding shorter hours, increased wages and a percentage of the receipts of the stores in which they work.

## ALL SAME BOWSER

The Monetary Times, a paper which cannot be accused of being partisan in politics, has the following to say in regard to the result of the South-West Toronto election, and the remarks are peculiarly applicable to the present situation in British Columbia.

"In the South-West Toronto constituency of Ontario this week a Liberal candidate defeated a Conservative nominee and transformed a government majority of 4,000 into an opposition majority of 643. The event in a strongly Conservative province leads the Monetary Times, which has never taken a part in partisan politics, to repeat what was stated in these columns after a similar event in the North Perth constituency of Ontario.

The Ontario government may easily discover the reasons which accounted for the defeat of their candidate by reading the heart of the rank and file. They are ignorant or blind to the dissatisfaction of members of their own party and of voters at large. The Ontario cabinet has become a bureaucratic institution in a democratic country. That is the verdict of hundreds of Conservatives who will take the strongest possible measures, as they say themselves, 'to teach the government a lesson.' The dislike of bureaucracy is shared by the opposition and by independent voters who are becoming more numerous as years pass because of the unsatisfactory political state.

The same argument applies to federal politics and to politics in other provinces. The political machine has been running the country, and the people being generally regarded as automatic parts of the machine to be cranked at will. While the blame for the present condition rests with the country at large, the time has come when the people are beginning to revolt. They do

not like bureaucracy, or premiers (some without backbone, some without honesty), or bribery and corruption in high places, all of which they have had in the last few years in nauseating quantities. If politicians refuse to read the signs they will have to taste defeat at the polls. Defeat of such mistaken ideas of government is good for the country."

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Publishers throughout the country are finding the price of newsprint steadily increasing. The Daily News does not intend to reduce its size, but subscribers can help out the situation considerably by keeping their subscriptions paid up.

Knowing well that M. A. MacDonald had nothing whatever to do with the "plugging," the Journal now refers to him as "Donald, the plugger." This is typically Bowserian and will be taken at its true value.

In referring to the Liberals, the Journal says, "Anything to be opposite is the policy of that party." Does the Journal expect self-respecting Liberals to favor the Bowser slavery system; the ruining of thousands by the Dominion Trust Company; the payment of \$80,000 to Hamilton Read; the payment of \$75,000 to Joe Matson; the handing over of millions illegally to the P. G. E.; the sinking of the province under an \$80,000,000 railroad indebtedness, and the taking away of the livelihood of workmen because they refuse to support a corrupt government.

Hon. William Manson failed to get for Prince Rupert what he helped get for Point Grey. The Brewster government will have the privilege of helping Prince Rupert out of the difficulties into which it was plunged by the late speculative government.

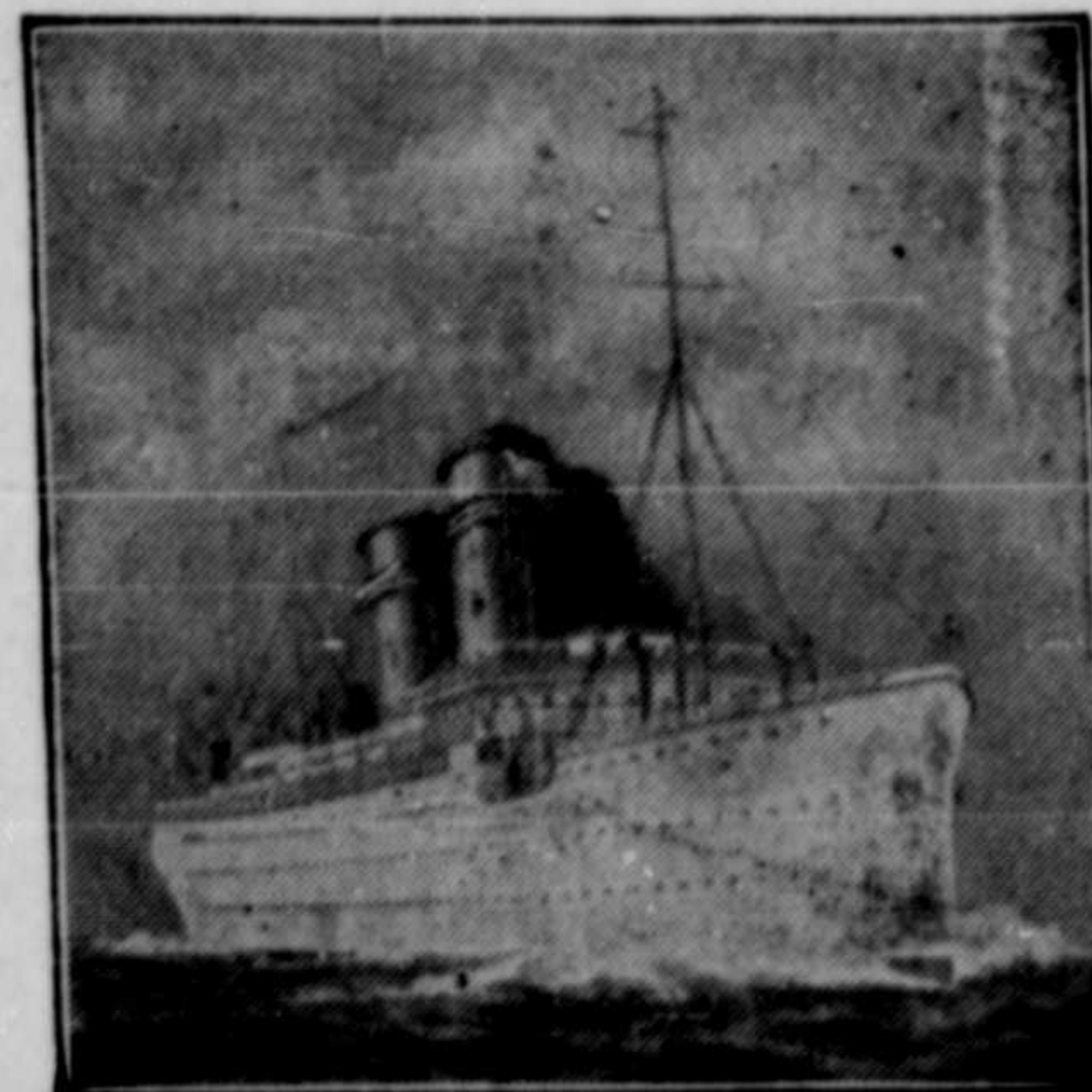

over the management of the  
business in January, 1910, and  
that a few months after that, the  
railway company made a fill  
across the opening of the cove  
which made it impossible for his  
company to land scows of lum-  
ber for piling on the lots owned  
by the company on the cove.

He gave figures of their ship-  
ments of lumber from 1910 to  
the present, showing how much  
of it had been brought in from  
the south by scow and how much  
by steamer. His contention was  
that they were forced to bring  
the bulk of their stock in small  
quantities by steamer, at largely  
increased rates, because they  
were unable to handle scowloads  
owing to the fact that they had  
not access to the cove. He ex-  
plained that handling lumber at  
the wharf on the waterfront cost  
from \$1.25 to \$1.75 per thousand  
more than handling in the cove  
would have done.

Cross examined by E. P. Davis,  
K. C., Mr. Albert stated that they  
had tried to make a settlement  
with the company without going  
to court. Mr. Davis asked why  
he stated now that the extra cost  
of handling was \$1.25 to \$1.75,  
whereas he stated in his examina-  
tion for discovery that it cost  
\$1.00 extra. Mr. Albert replied  
that he wanted to make the  
charge as reasonable as possible.

Mr. Davis wanted to know why  
the company stated their claim  
to the company in 1913 at \$27,000  
and in 1915 at \$157,000 and now  
at \$190,000. Mr. Albert said that  
the claim had been based upon  
reasonable figures and that his  
books showed the whole state of  
affairs. Mr. Davis had some  
difficulty in getting the witness  
to understand his questions. The  
case will be resumed today.
