Prince Rupert is breathing freely again. Yesterday morning the fish-packing houses received wires from below stating that the revenue bill, which included the Northern Pacific fishing legislation, had been passed. This was passed on to the press and the public.

Yesterday afternoon another wire reached the city stating that the revenue bill had been passed but the amendment covering the Northern Pacific fishing had been cut out. The measure was opposed by the Chicago retail fish firms and the British Ambassador had brought his influence to bear, backed up by officials from Ottawa. Full details are not yet to hand, but, in any case, the halibut trade will remain here still.



The matter was brought before the Board of Trade and it was thought that \$10,000 would handle the transaction and the members offered to put through. He put up \$500 along with some others and in a few minutes they had the \$10,000. \$5,000 more was needed and he put up \$750. William Manson did not put up a cent, though he now found fault with the men who did. Had this not been done, the franchise would have gone to an outsider.

Mr. Pattullo then read from an editorial of The Journal of Dec. 24th, 1912, which stated that a number of citizens, including T. D. Pattullo saved the telephone franchise for the city by putting up their own money, and they did not get a cent of interest from the city for the use of it. "Now you know that the Journal is reliable," said the speaker amidst! laughter.


