Robert Rogers.

Retrenchment.

Ottawa, Sept. 13.—In view of the enormous debt which is being carried by Canada on account of the war, it is reported that the government is considering retrenchment and will probably suspend the Welland Canal and Parliament Buildings reconstruction.

Financier Dead.

Toronto, Sept. 13.—Manager Alexander, of the London Guarantee and Accident Insurance Co., is dead of heart failure.

Soldiers' Voting.

London, Sept. 13.—The British Columbia soldiers are voting in London, Bramshott, Shorncliffe and all convalescent institutions and hospitals. Balloting is continuing on the firing line until Thursday. It is doubtful if the total vote can be secured, as many of the Canadians are engaged in the Somme offensive.

To the Electors

To the Electors of the City of Prince Rupert,

Tomorrow is election day. I have been a resident of this city since the town started and I can think of no single benefit that the government has been to this city, while, on the contrary, I can see where it has done the city a great deal of harm.

The government's attitude towards Prince Rupert is well illustrated by Bowser's own statement, namely, that the Pacific Great Eastern was deliberately projected for the express purpose of diverting the traffic of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Prince George to Vancouver. Directly after Bowser had made this statement, my opponent assured the electors of Vancouver that the Pacific Great Eastern must be completed immediately.

The government of this province has been crooked, corrupt and inefficient and my opponent has been a party to it and cannot escape responsibility, while at the same time he has never had the courage to stand up for the rights of this city and northern British Columbia.

I want you, the electors, to give me a chance to help to bring about a betterment of conditions. I could not do worse than my opponent has done and I think that I can do better.

If you elect me as your representative, I pledge you that I will use my every endeavor to bring about good government for the general welfare of the province and will see to it to the best of my ability that the city of Prince Rupert and northern B. C. are fairly and properly treated. I think that the people of Prince Rupert know me well enough to believe that I do not lack the courage to stand up and fight for what I believe to be right. The weak always go under and we have had enough of weakness. Drydock Secret Out

The secret of the inactivity of the drydock is out at last. The government at Ottawa did not want it to be leased. Miles Cotton had all his financial arrangements made for the starting up of shipbuilding at Prince Rupert, but the government intervened. William Manson boasts about the aid to shipbuilding passed by the Bowser administration but that aid was evidently to be confined to the companies in the south, in one of which Bowser was a director. What is the use of aid to shipbuilding to Prince Rupert if Prince Rupert is debarred by the government from having any shipbuilding?

President Chamberlin is mentioned as being in agreement with the premier in not permitting this company to lease the drydock, but Mr. Chamberlin long ago made it very clear that it was his earnest desire that work should proceed at the earliest possible moment. Would Mr. Chamberlin have sent the company's solicitor, H. H. Hansard, to Prince Rupert with Mr. Cotton on a wild goose chase? Would Mr. Chamberlin have carried on negotiations with several firms over a period of many months, had he thought that the drydock should not be leased? Would he have had Mr. Cotton working steadily for three months arranging the incorporation of a company to take a lease of the dock, had he known that the dock would not be leased?

Mayor McCaffery is asked to communicate with Sir Robert Borden, Hon. Robert Rogers and H. S. Clements in his efforts to have work proceed. Those are the gentlemen responsible for the fact that the drydock is asleep while every shipyard on the continent is working feverishly. The Borden government is alone responsible for the fact that Prince Rupert is looked upon as a still-born. The government excuse is that we must await the result of the investigation of the railway commission. How many years will that take?

By the time that commission has reached a decision, the rush of shipbuilding will be over, the yards of Europe will be free of their war pressure and Prince Rupert will have lost its opportunity to get away to a big start in what should be its staple industry. This city is of so little significance that the government did not think it worth while to make arrangements by which the government could take over the plant of the company in a given time, provided the commission decide on government ownership. There was no necessity to tie up the plant for a long term of years in a lease to one company. The whole affair is typical of the treatment Prince Rupert has received at the hands of the Borden administration, and the first blow for Prince Rupert must be struck at the provincial polls tomorrow. Prince Rupert has everything to gain and certainly nothing to lose by voting solidly for T. D. Pattullo tomorrow. This city has been backed off the map and it is up to the citizens to see that it is put back there and in larger, bolder type than ever before. Citizens, it is up to you.

FRENCH TAKE ANOTHER SLICE OF GERMAN LINE

Fifteen Hundred Prisoners Taken in Thirty Minutes—Steamers Sunk—Hungary Very Indignant.

Paris, Sept. 13.—On the Somme front the French continue their victorious career and have captured three and three quarter miles of the German front line besides taking other trenches. In thirty minutes the French captured fifteen hundred prisoners.

Hungary Indignant.

There is intense indignation throughout Hungary on account of the failure of the government to provide adequate protection against the Rumanian invasion.

THE DAY

Tomorrow, as free citizens of British Columbia, you are called upon to pass judgment upon the Bowser government, through its local representative. You know, to your personal cost, the history of this administration. You know that it permitted a bogus trust company, by illegal legislation, to filch from the poor man his hard-earned savings; you know that it passed special legislation in order to make legal some of its most flagrant abuses of the power you vested in it. You know that it has threatened the homes of your wives and children, because you dared to object to its nefarious schemes. You know that, in spite of the fact that Price Ellison helped stock his farm at your expense, the premier and your local member thought so little of the gravity of the offence that they supported him on his platform as a representative "of the people" at this election. You know that Bowser himself admitted that he illegally handed over \$7,000,000 to Pat Welch for the construction of the P. G. E., and that gentleman had squandered millions already by letting the contract to himself at fabulous prices. You know that this province has been run by a corrupt machine; you have had ample evidence of this right in this city. You know that the machine has carried on a scheme of intimidation under which the average man could not call his soul his own. You know that Contractor McDonald proved clearly that the Victoria wing of the machine, run by a vote buyer called Harry Price, deliberately let contracts to the highest bidders and made false returns in order to deceive you. You know that the Bowser machine has carried on widespread plugging operations in every election in this province and that Harry Price and Victor Love bought votes at \$10 each in 1911 and also

paid the fares of the pluggers. You know that there was no effort made to prosecute those men, as they were part of the machine. In short, you are thoroughly aware that this province has been run by the most corrupt methods of any province in Canada, not excepting Manitoba under Roblin. You have studied the record of government extravagance and have seen how expenditure in ten years has been increased 600 per cent., at your expense. You know where much of that money went. You know the inside history of all our alleged road building. You know that the supporters of the machine got your money and that you had to struggle to make a living to support them at the same time. You know, in spite of the perversion of the facts by Bowser, that you must pay your share of the \$80,000,000 of railroad indebtedness, and that Bowser's chief desire for a further lease of power is that he may carry through further big deals to the great gain of Bowser, Reid & Wallbridge, and to the detriment of the province. Knowing these things, can you honestly record a vote for William Manson? Do you not realize that a vote for William Manson is a vote for the machine and the railroad magnate and a vote against yourself and British Columbia. Do you realize what another five years of Bowserism would mean to the province as a whole? It would mean five years of political debauchery such as the world has never seen. It would mean that British Columbia would descend into depths of debt from which there would be no recovery. It would mean an unlimited rein to the greed of the railroad construction profiteer, whose one aim is to fill his pockets at the expense of the public. In short, it would mean disaster for you and yours. Given clean government, there is a great future before

this province, but the wreckage of the past must be cleared away. The barnacles must be scraped thoroughly from the ship of state. There must be a complete overhauling and the whole workings of the province placed upon a solid basis. Patronage must be wiped out, and wiped out forever. The day of the machine is over, and the day of freedom is at hand. The land must be given back to the people; the penalties against the man who carries on our fishing must be removed, and encouragement and assistance given instead. The soil which is lying dormant must be made to produce crops, and the man who holds land for any other purpose than production must have his land taken away, by making it unprofitable for him to hold it. The small mining man must be assisted and the large corporation must have its present enormous powers curtailed. In short, British Columbia must enter upon an era of renovation and up-building, and that must begin at the very foundations. All the legislation of the late government is as a plaster applied to a cancer. It does not get to the root of the matter, but merely seeks to hide the hideous growth which Bowserism had fostered.

Tomorrow, your vote will have the effect of one of the bristles of a broom; a broom which will sweep this province clear of all that has made it a byword throughout the Dominion. Once swept clean, the new government, led by H. C. Brewster, a man who has been tried in the fire of public life for years and has come out pure gold, will set to work to build up an entirely new fabric of government, upon a broad, sane basis. To the new government, you will be neither Liberal nor Conservative; Socialist nor Labor, but simply men and British Columbians, each with equal rights; each with his share in the government of the province, and each determined that his creed will be "Each for all, and all for each."

MINING JOTTINGS FROM ALICE ARM DISTRICT

Several promising prospects have been struck in the Alice Arm district recently, one being a ten-foot ledge showing in two assays 80 ozs. and 100 ozs. of silver to the ton. This property is situated about a mile from the Dolly Varden mine and was discovered by Ed. Pickett.

Don Cameron, who discovered the Wolf claim, which is under option to the Dolly Varden Company, has also made a promising strike right above the Wolf claim.

Archie McPhail has also found some good float about 700 feet above the townsite. No assays have been reported yet but there is a quartz ledge that looks good.

Prof. Gwillim, who is at present in Alice Arm district, has paid a visit to the molybdenite property which is to produce a big quantity of this valuable metal for the government just as soon as machinery can be installed. He has also visited a big low-grade molybdenite deposit which has been discovered on Lime creek. There is an enormous granite dyke in this claim which shows molybdenite over a width of up to a thousand feet. This property is owned by Joe Wells, Miles Macdonald and Billy McLean.
