## CANADIANS ADVANCE MILE ON SOMME FRONT

### ITALIANS ARE GAINING -- BRITISH SUCCESS AT THIEPVAL -- GREAT AIR BATTLES

#### CANADIAN BOYS GAINED MILE IN BIG OFFENSIVE

Prisoners and Guns Taken—The Trenches Filled with German Dead—Big Air Battles—British Successes.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 16.—The Canadians advanced nearly a mile in the Somme offensive and captured a number of prisoners and guns. They discovered the German trenches filled with dead as a result of the bombardment preceding the infantry attack.

##### Air Battles.

British airmen yesterday, in addition to bombing German aerodromes, railway stations and troop trains, destroyed a German balloon and thirteen aeroplanes, besides damaging nine.

Four British machines are missing, as a result of the great raid.

French aviators also inflicted severe damage to property and succeeded in destroying hostile machines.

##### British Gains.

The British have torn open the enemy defences at Thiepval and in a terrific battle the German losses were very heavy. Three villages have been captured and the British now occupy all the high ground around Pozieres and have captured a German redoubt which was regarded to be impregnable.

#### FRANK MOBLEY HAS A MAJORITY OF 38

There is little doubt that Frank H. Mobley is safe in Atlin. The figures given in The Journal this morning are not correct, according to the returns to hand. Last night, the Liberal candidate had a majority of 31 and this morning, he was given seven votes to his opponent's nothing at Englemer Mine, so that his majority should be 38.

The private car Natalie, in which the commissioners are travelling, is marked Denver and Salt Lake. The car was recently purchased by Sir William Mackenzie from the American company and has not yet been repainted.

#### M. A. MACDONALD AN EASY FIRST IN VANCOUVER

Bowser 182 Behind Last Liberal—Prohibition and Woman Suffrage Carried Heavily—Tupper's Work.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Sept. 16.—Thirty-seven Liberals have been elected, with nine Conservatives and one Socialist.

M. A. Macdonald headed the poll in Vancouver with 7,126 votes and P. Donnelly got sixth place with 5,645. W. J. Bowser headed the Conservative list with 5,463, being 182 behind the last Liberal. It is expected in Conservative circles that the soldiers' vote will elect Bowser.

##### Tupper Effective.

At every place at which Sir Hibbert Tupper spoke, the Liberals were victorious. The old

line Conservatives followed his lead against Bowser's autocratic domination and corruption.

##### Brewster's Remarks.

H. C. Brewster, who will be British Columbia's new premier, claims that the victory is a protest from all parties against corrupt administration.

##### Soldiers' Voting.

The soldiers are still voting at certain places at the front. It is expected that there will be twenty thousand soldiers' votes polled. The result of this voting may alter some constituencies, but it will not alter the general result.

##### Prohibition.

Prohibition is leading by 7,500 and is still gaining. The prohibition leaders are confident that the soldiers will increase the majority and the "wets" practically concede defeat. The act will come into force on July 1st of next year.

##### Woman Suffrage.

Woman Suffrage carried by an enormous majority throughout the province.

T. D. Pattullo is receiving many telegrams of congratulation from all over the east.

#### GENERAL STRIKE MAY DEVELOP ON MONDAY

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, Sept. 16.—The Central Federated employees, who are closely affiliated with the operation of the traction lines, decided last night that they would strike on Monday unless the traction companies agreed to recognize the union. Many other organizations are ascertaining the sentiment in regard to a general sympathetic strike.

#### DOMINION ROYAL COMMISSION HERE

The Rt. Hon. Sir George E. Foster, Sir Edgar Bowring, Mr. William Lorimer, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Tatlow, with Mr. Harding, secretary, and Mr. Bridgman, clerk, arrived from the east on the private car Natalie, last night. The gentlemen from the Dominions Royal Commission which is gathering information regarding our harbors, trade possibilities, etc. This afternoon they will visit the drydock, cold storage plant, cannery, etc.

Sir George, who is one of the greatest orators of the Dominion, will address a meeting in the Empress Theatre this evening on "Industrial and Trade Development After the War." Sir George has travelled extensively and speaks from a ripe experience of the world's trade and his address should be the finest thing of the kind ever heard in this city.

Interviewed by The Daily News last evening, he had many questions to ask in regard to fishing, mining and the development of the farming lands of the north. He is satisfied that the hinterland of Prince Rupert will be able to provide produce for this city and district, but for big development, Prince Rupert must depend upon fishing, mining and whatever transport trade may arise from our proximity to the East.

In discussing the result of the provincial election, Sir George remarked that he feared that the Liberals had too large a majority and that a stronger opposition would have made for more strength in the government. The party will leave for the south on Sunday evening.

#### GERMANS AND BULGARS RETREATING ALL ALONG

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 16.—The Allied drive in the Balkans is now in full swing and the Germans and Bulgarians have been driven back all along the line. On the right wing the Serbians did magnificent work, driving the Bulgarians back upon Florine, about seventeen miles south of Monastir.

King Constantine of Greece says that the Greek nation will be ready to join the Entente Allies when an advantageous moment arrives.

##### Prince Killed.

Berlin, Sept. 16.—It is officially announced that Prince Frederick William of Hesse has been killed in the fighting on the Balkan front.

##### REMARKABLE FACT

#### ITALIANS ARE MAKING DRIVE UPON TRIESTE

Great Rejoicing Throughout Italy—Austrian Trenches Taken—Stormy Scenes in Hungary.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Rome, Sept. 16.—There is intense rejoicing and great celebrations throughout Italy following the announcement that the Italians have commenced their drive in the direction of Trieste, the great Austrian port which has been their chief objective.

Austrian entrenchments have been captured east of Vallone and over twenty-one hundred prisoners.

##### Stormy Scenes in Hungary.

Budapest, Sept. 16.—Stormy scenes were enacted in the Hungarian parliament yesterday when the speaker ordered a temporary adjournment in order to silence Count Apponij, who is opposed to any change in the military leadership and insisted that the foreign policy; military situation and food supply were questions which demanded preference in discussion in the house.

##### German Methods.

Havre, Sept. 16.—The Belgian Minister of Finance has confirmed the seizure of fifty-seven million francs from the Belgian National Bank by the German military administration in Brussels.

#### MAIL CENSORSHIP IS STRICTLY HONEST

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 16.—Rt. Hon. D. Lloyd George has stated to the associated press that there appears to be a deliberate campaign on the part of German agents in the United States to create doubt regarding the good faith of His Majesty's government regarding the use of information obtained through the mail censorship. The minister added that full protection was given to all honest business.

##### COMMISSION MEETS

Sir George E. Foster and the other members of the Dominions Royal Commission met the Board of Trade in the city hall this forenoon when evidence was taken in regard to the possibilities of harbor extension at Prince Rupert. W. H. Tobey, of the G. T. P. engineering staff, was the first witness called. Mr. Tobey produced extensive plans of the harbor, showing soundings, etc. There was a fair attendance of citizens at the meeting.

## THE DRYDOCK

Mayor McCaffery is doing his utmost to get action at the drydock, but it becomes more apparent every day that there is a very husky colored gentleman somewhere, and that the powers at Ottawa are doing their little best to keep him hidden from the public gaze.

Mr. Cotton stated positively that Sir Robert Borden and Hon. Robert Rogers had arranged with President Chamberlain that the dock would not be leased pending the decision of the Railway Commission. Meantime, the mayor has wired to both gentlemen and has received replies which are delightfully diplomatic but very unsatisfactory. Both ministers carefully evade any mention of the Railway Commission and each tries to place the whole matter upon the shoulders of the Grand Trunk Pacific. As the railway company is, and has been for several years, entirely at the mercy of Ottawa, it is more than likely that the president of the company is not a free agent in the matter, and is pretty much in the position of doing as he is directed without a murmur.

Hon. Robert Rogers says that "up to the present" the company has never said that it will lease the drydock to Mr. Cotton and his associates. This may be a diplomatic truth, or something much worse. The company sent its solicitor here with Mr. Cotton; it allowed Mr. Cotton to go ahead and make all his arrangements, even to arranging for the financing of his scheme, and this would be an exceedingly strange proceeding if the company had not led Mr. Cotton to believe that he could have a lease of the dock. We also have the statement of several of the officials of the company that it was their desire to lease the dock. Mr. Rogers says that the company "have the say as to whether or not they will lease the dock." Mr. Rogers knows

very well that this is not the truth, if it is a fact that he and the premier want the Railway Commission's decision before accepting the drydock as completed. The situation here is much too serious for the people to stand for this sort of diplomatic quibbling and the sooner Ottawa realizes its responsibility in this and in other matters pertaining to Prince Rupert the better for all concerned.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Probably no man in town derived more fun from the election than Arthur Little, while he also provided a lot of amusement for others. His election "bulletins" were funny in the extreme, while his blackboard yesterday attracted more attention than the war bulletins.

The Liberals were naturally jubilant over the result of the election and there was an ear-splitting demonstration in the Liberal rooms when it became known that Bowser had gone down to defeat.

The Liberals could hardly be blamed for holding a parade on Thursday night. Thirteen years is a long time to fight for victory. Some of the more boisterous of the paraders evidently thought that the Conservative committee rooms required fumigating for they marched right in carrying torches, walked round the table and out again.

It will be a splendid thing for Prince Rupert and for the province generally if each citizen forgets all about provincial politics now until a few weeks before the next election.

In T. D. Pattullo, Prince Rupert has a representative who will go far in the councils of the province. He is young; has great ability, and abundant energy, besides a thorough working knowledge of the needs of the north.



## HON. ROBT. ROGERS AND THE DRYDOCK SITUATION

The following are the telegrams exchanged between Mayor McCaffery and Hon. Robert Rogers in regard to the drydock. It is interesting to note that the Minister of Public Works entirely ignores the statement that the government is opposed to granting a lease pending the finding of the railway commission.

Prince Rupert, Sept. 12, 1916.  
Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of Public Works, Ottawa.

Mr. Cotton, a well known contractor, had made arrangements to lease the Prince Rupert drydock, which would have been a most advantageous thing for the city. The completion of this arrangement is, however, held up on account of some question between the Canadian government and the Grand Trunk Pacific. I appeal to you to do all possible to have the arrangement with Cotton consummated. I have wired the premier, and the fol-

lowing is a copy of the wire sent: Information from Cotton received that he is prepared to go ahead with Prince Rupert drydock. He cannot on account of some question between Canadian government and Grand Trunk Pacific. Bitter disappointment is felt by citizens. We appeal to you to reconsider your decision that lease cannot be granted pending report of commission. It seems a shame to leave such a magnificent property idle, especially having regard to the fact that the prosperity of Prince Rupert is being so greatly retarded. You will confer a great favor by reconsidering this matter, and wiring me result.



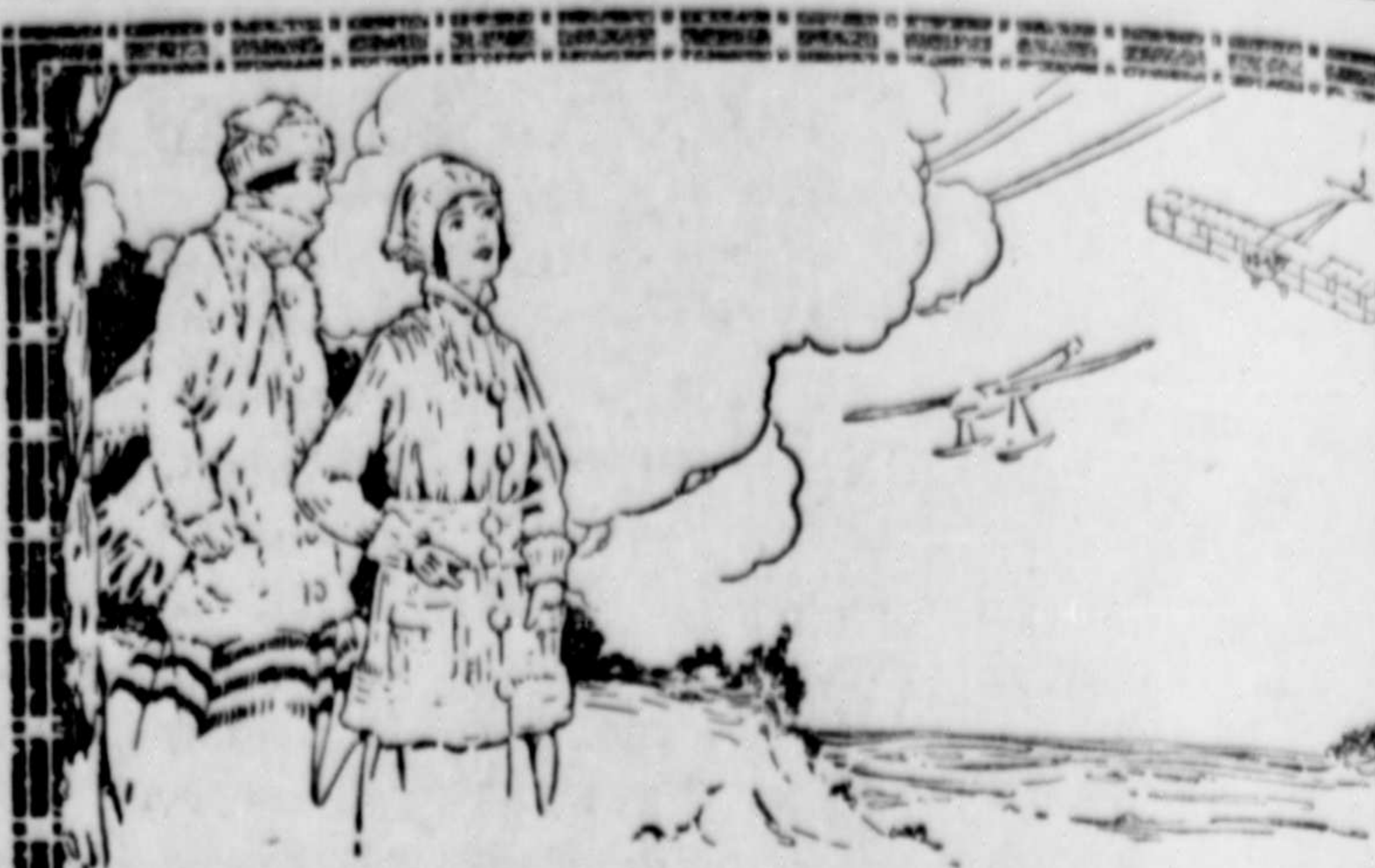
