GREAT ALLIED SUCCESSES ON SOMME FRONT

GERMANS PARALYZED -- RUSSIANS MAKING FOR LEMBERG -- ITALIANS GAINING

ARMED MOTORS STRIKE TERROR INTO GERMANS

Important Gains on the Somme Front—British Innovation is Winner—Many Huns Surrendered.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 18.—The British and French forces on the Somme front on Saturday and Sunday captured four miles of German trenches, taking four thousand prisoners. The British were also successful in capturing the famous Danube trench near Thiepval. This trench is a mile long and had proved one of the greatest obstacles to the British advance.

This is the biggest step forward yet made on the Somme front, as it gives the British and French command of all the higher country. Now that the stronger defences have been taken, the progress of the Allies should be more rapid.

GERMANS PARALYZED.

The Germans are completely paralyzed by the latest British development on the Somme front, in the shape of new armored motor cars which are described as travelling land forts, so heavily are they armed and so thorough is the protection afforded to the gunners and driver. This innovation has demoralized the German infantry, and all who survived the motor car attack have surrendered.

BULGARS LOST FIVE THOUSAND IN THREE HOURS

Great Allied Offensive in Balkans in Progress—Kavala Bombarded—Another Greek Premier.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 18.—The Allied offensive in the Balkans is developing rapidly and in the first clash at Dobrudja, which lasted only three hours, the Bulgarians lost five thousand men.

Kavala Bombarded.

The Greek port of Kavala, which was surrendered to the Bulgarians and Turks by the Greeks, is now being bombarded by the Entente fleet.

New Greek Premier.

Athens, Sept. 18.—Premier Kalogeropoulos, a prominent lawyer, is reported to be favorable to Greece entering the war on the side of the Entente Allies. He has assumed power with service in the new cabinet conferred upon the Entente ministers.

German General Dead.

Amsterdam, Sept. 18.—General Gaedeke, the Commander-in-Chief of the German forces in Upper Alsace, is dead.

PROVINCE PLACES PATTULLO IN CABINET

The Vancouver Province of Friday makes a forecast of the probable Brewster cabinet. M. A. Macdonald is looked upon as the new Attorney-General; Ralph Smith is mentioned as Minister of Mines; Dr. King is likely to be Provincial Secretary, and "Honest" John Oliver as Minister of Agriculture.

This leaves the portfolios of Lands and Forests and Public Works to be filled. The Province says "One of these is said to be almost certain to go to T. Dufferin Pattullo, the member-elect for Prince Rupert. Mr. Pattullo is a member of a well known Woodstock family which have supplied generations of newspaper men and politicians to public life in Ontario."

THE NAME PATTULLO

A number of voters and others in this constituency have the impression, judging from his name, that our member of the provincial Parliament is an Italian, or is at least of Italian extraction. This is not the case. The name is purely Scottish and is well known and represented in the county of Forfar.

Originally the name was Pattulloch. One branch of the family dropped the final two letters and spelt the name phonetically, while the other branch of the family dropped the initial two letters of the name and is now represented by the well known Scottish family of Tulloch.—W. D.

SPLENDID ADDRESS BY SIR GEORGE E. FOSTER

The Empress Theatre was packed on Saturday evening to hear Sir George E. Foster deliver an address on the war and its after effects. G. A. Woodland, vice-president of the Board of Trade presided.

At the outset, Sir George said that he had heard rumors of rain and wind at Prince Rupert and had taken the precaution to arm himself with a double raincoat and a double-barrelled umbrella, but he had experienced nothing but sunshine since he arrived here while the air was like champagne. He had also heard rumors of political turmoil. He advised the new government to consider its position soberly, and to get the period of celebration over quickly, as a province which had a change of government, prohibition and woman suffrage thrust upon it all at once was at a critical stage in its history.

Going on to deal with the war, he said that the whole world had been disappointed, as it had been generally believed that, at this advanced day, a world's war was deemed an impossibility. After outlining the history of the early days of the war, which had found Britain unprepared on land but ready at sea, he described the wonderful work which had been done in raising an army of five million men, mostly by voluntary enlistment. He then went on to describe the work of the French and British on the Somme front, as witnessed by himself recently, and also told of the great change which had come over the eastern front now that the Russians were armed and provided with sufficient big guns. He said that in the early stages the Russians had only 700,000 rifles and the rest of the men had to take the guns from their dead comrades to continue the battle.

One of the most striking passages in a splendid speech was that in which Sir George told of the spirit which filled the French

RUSSIANS AND ITALIANS ARE STILL GAINING

Drive on Lemberg Resumed with Success—the Italians are Making for Trieste—Tabora Taken.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, Sept. 18.—The Russians, under General Brussiloff, have resumed their offensive in the direction of Lemberg and are likely to capture this Teuton stronghold before winter sets in. The Germans have been dislodged from several important positions and three thousand prisoners and twenty guns have been captured.

Italian Front.

Rome, Sept. 18.—The Italians are steadily advancing towards Trieste and are now storming the Austrian entrenchments. Eight hundred prisoners were captured in the fighting over the weekend.

German East Africa.

London, Sept. 18.—Following a spell of terrific fighting the Belgians in German East Africa have captured Tabora, the principal German fortress in this region.

DOMINION ROYAL COMMISSION LEAVES

Sir George E. Foster, Sir Edgar Bowring, Mr. William Lorimer, and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Tatlow left for Vancouver and Victoria this morning. The party will, after hearing evidence in the southern cities, proceed east over the C. P. R. Mr. Lorimer, who is mineralogist of the party, expects to visit Trail. It was one of his regrets in connection with his visit here that he was not able to make a trip to Granby and Surf Inlet.

Mr. Lorimer, in an interview with The Daily News, deplored the fact that all the big mining development here is in the hands of American capitalists. He believes that if British capitalists could see the great possibilities of this north country they would come along with capital.

Mr. Joseph Tatlow, who is largely interested in railroads in Ireland, was greatly impressed with the Grand Trunk Pacific line through the mountains and enjoyed his visit to the coast thoroughly. Sir Edgar Bowring who has been connected with fishing development in Newfoundland for many years, was most keenly interested in the halibut and salmon industries.

LIEUT. DOLLING KILLED

It will be learned with the deepest regret on the part of all citizens that Lieut. Dolling, who was stationed here for some time with the Irish Fusiliers, has been killed. This gallant officer was severely wounded some time ago and was presented with the Military Cross, for valor on the field. He was killed on August 21st on the western front by an exploding shell.

MORGENBLADET SAYS BLOCKADE IS TIGHTENING

Germans in Norway and Sweden are Warned—Prince Albert Invalided Home—Famous Doctor Dead.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, Sept. 18.—The Norwegian newspaper Morgenbladet has issued a warning to all Teutons in Norway and Sweden that the French and British have filled up the last gap in the ring around Germany and that the blockade will now tighten.

Prince Albert Invalided.

London, Sept. 18.—Prince Albert, of Britain, the second son of King George, has been invalided home from his ship, in the North Sea to undergo an operation for an abdominal abscess. This is the second operation the young prince has undergone since the outbreak of the war.

Sir Thomas Bruton Dead.

Sir Thomas Bruton, consulting physician at St. Bartholomew's Hospital in London, is dead.

THE WAR

The Somme offensive goes along steadily, with the French making progress one day, the British the next and the Canadians the next. The reports are meagre, giving only the bare facts, but they speak volumes for the efficiency of the Allied artillery and the valor of our infantry. Nearly sixty thousand prisoners have been captured since Dominion Day when the great offensive had its birth, and many guns have also been taken. All along the western front, the enemy is on the defensive with a gradually backward movement. Before winter sets in, it is possible that the whole of the north of France may be in the hands of the Allies. The Verdun attack by the enemy has given place to defensive warfare, with the French trying to break through in a great effort to drive the Germans out of a very valuable mineral country from which the enemy is drawing much material for making steel.

On the eastern front, the Russians are steadily gaining in their campaign in the Carpathians, and, from reports emanating from the Hungarian parliament, the situation in that country is acute and an invasion by the Russians and Rumanians is looked forward to with dread.

The Italians have resumed their drive for Trieste and the Austrians are again retreating. The taking of this important port will give entire Italian control of the head of the Adriatic and a most important point made towards ultimate victory.

On the Balkan front, the big offensive has begun in earnest and the latest reports indicate that the Serbians, French and British are steadily driving the Bulgarians and Germans northwards. The armies of the Central Powers in the Balkans will be subjected to a big squeeze and they will have great difficulty in escaping being crushed be-

tween the Russians and Rumanians in the north and the Allied armies to the south.

What Greece is doing, or will do, is not taken seriously. The Allies are pursuing their way practically unconcerned as to the decision of King Constantine. The king says that the Greek nation will come in at the opportune moment. The opportune moment for Constantine is long since gone and the Greek nation, and the nation alone, will receive proper consideration. There are many Greeks already serving with the Allies and public sentiment is largely against the king and his Teutonic Consort.

It begins to look as if Lord Kitchener's original estimate of the war is to be realized and that it will probably end next August. Germany is reported to be considering important changes, involving great sacrifices, which probably means a general shortening of their fronts by drawing in towards their centre. Under existing conditions, it is hard to see how such a movement could be carried out without bringing disaster to the retreating armies, if the Allied transportation facilities are at all on an equality with those of the enemy. The next three weeks should bring along important developments on all fronts.

people. He said that the French soldiers had a different attitude towards the war than those of their allies, the reason being that the war had been carried into the heart of France, and that the men in the trenches felt strongly that they were defending their wives, sisters and mothers, who were not many miles in the rear.

The British troops gave the necessary back-bone to the western line which brought about the first great German reverse at the Marne, while later the colonial

troops had done magnificent work, especially at Ypres and St. Julien.

He also dwelt upon the splendid spirit which filled the people of Britain, there being many thousands of women producing shells and other munitions while many more did splendid service in hospitals and convalescent homes.

He said it was impossible to tell when the war would be over but one great fact was certain—victory was for the Allies. He also described vividly the work of the Red Cross Society and that of the Army Medical Corps, explaining that the wounded were as carefully looked after as they would be at home. He told of the work done in the McGill Hospital at Boulogne where he saw 600 wounded men arrive in one day, all cheerful, though suffering pain. Of 21,000 cases handled here only 2 per cent. died. After describing the equipment of the hospital ships, on which everything was done to alleviate suffering, he gave a touching description of the cemetery at Etapelle, where each grave is carefully tended no matter though it may be that of a nameless soldier.

Sir George also gave a splendid account of his visit to the cruiser squadron of Admiral Beatty and the Grand Fleet of Sir John Jellicoe, in which he told of the cares and anxieties of the men who keep constant watch on the North Sea.

war, he pointed out that there would be many thousands of men brought back to Canada after the war, and that the moment peace is declared there will be thousands more who are now making munitions, thrown out of employment. He emphasized the fact that we must now prepare for peace. The war found us unready and we must take care that peace does not find us in the same dangerous position. He warned his audience that the selling of a corner lot at an advanced price did not produce anything and was therefore no gain to the country. Speculation must give place to production and the people of Canada must show closer co-operation and more team work. He described speculation as piracy.

Labor and capital must realize that, instead of being opposed to each other, they are inter-dependent one on the other. Separately they could do nothing. The one great factor between the two was vision or brains. This quality was necessary to bring the two into action and each was entitled to its share in the resultant gain.

In dealing with Prince Rupert, he pointed out that the fact that the city has a great harbor and railroad means nothing unless there is production. There can be no trade unless there are the goods to be traded and the first duty of British Columbia is to produce and to keep on producing.

On resuming his seat Sir George was given a tremendous ovation. T. D. Pattullo, M. L. A. for Prince Rupert, proposed a hearty vote of thanks to the speaker, which was seconded by William Manson and carried enthusiastically.

Prince Rupert, it is expected, will return its usual contribution to the British Red Cross Day. This year the method of raising the fund will be from the sale of refreshments and by raffles at the fair.

COMMISSIONERS VISIT PLACES OF INTEREST

On Saturday afternoon, the members of the Dominions Royal Commission visited the drydock, and afterwards the cold storage plant and Prince Rupert cannery at the invitation of T. H. Johnson. Sir George Foster, who, as Minister of Trade and Commerce, was particularly interested in the finished product, sampled cans of Sockeye, Spring, Coho and Humpback salmon in order to see the different qualities. All were delighted with the scenery along the harbor, and, in looking down the harbor from the cold storage, Mr. Lorimer remarked: "What a harbor you have here. You could put the whole British fleet in it."
