CANADIANS FIGURE PROMINENTLY IN WEST

TWENTY-NINE GERMAN DIVISIONS BEATEN -- IMPORTANT MOVE ON MONASTIR

CANADIANS ARE THREE DAYS IN GREAT BATTLE

Germans Using High Explosive and Liquid Fire—British Gain Thousand Yards—Haig Records Victory.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 19.—On the Somme front the British have advanced a thousand yards on a front of a mile.

The Canadians have been prominently engaged in a three days' battle on this front. Many wounded Canadians from the Somme front have reached the London hospitals. They claim that the Germans are using principally high explosives against the Canadian troops and are employing large quantities of liquid fire to prevent reinforcements from advancing to the front trenches.

Haig's Report.
General Sir Douglas Haig announces that the British have defeated twenty-nine divisions of the total of thirty-five German divisions engaged on this front.

Asquith's Son Killed.
Raymond Asquith, the eldest son of the British Premier, has been killed in action. This young officer was a distinguished law student and gave promise of making a name for himself in the political world. Immediately on the outbreak of war he obtained a second-lieutenancy and has been in the trenches for many months.

TELEPHONE EXCHANGE MAY BE TRANSFERRED

The city council last evening decided to adopt Superintendent Kennedy's recommendation that the telephone exchange be transferred to the city hall provided it will mean no increase in the fire insurance.

In seconding the motion of Ald. McClymont, Ald. McRae said that it would mean a saving of \$250 a year in coal and that the old building could probably be made a revenue producer. All the members felt that it was a move in the right direction.

HALIBUT LEGISLATION

The Pacific Fisherman for September says that the Seattle fish packers will not let the halibut situation remain as it is but will bring fresh legislation before the next session of the house.

ENEMY ALIENS

Nanaimo city clerk has sent to the city council a copy of a resolution recently passed by Nanaimo council in regard to the employment of enemy aliens. In protesting against the releasing of aliens from internment camps to work for large corporations, the Nanaimo council demand that those men be re-interned and that all enemy aliens be placed in internment camps.

GERMANS ARE DEFENDING ON VERDUN FRONT

French Capture Deniecourt and Trench on Deadman's Hill—Combles Nearly Surrounded.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 19.—North and south of the Somme River the British and French are maintaining a vigorous offensive.

South of Combles the French have secured additional trenches and their armies now almost completely surround the town, which is bound to fall into the hands of the French very shortly.

Verdun Front.
On the Verdun front, the French have renewed their attack and the Germans have been compelled to evacuate Deniecourt while they have also sacrificed a trench on Deadman's Hill. The promised renewal of the German offensive on this front has not yet materialized and the French are keeping the enemy entirely on the defensive and the Germans are losing ground.

SIMON DUFF WITH THE FIELD ARTILLERY

A letter has reached town from S. B. Duff, formerly of the police force and now of the Canadian Field Artillery, "somewhere in France." Simon says that the 102nd entered the trenches recently and he has met many of the boys from Prince Rupert. Everything is going well and the enemy is beaten. Recently the Germans put the following notice on their trenches: "We know you have us beaten but we have lots of shells."

He has met A. Macdonald, also formerly of the police force and now on Field Ambulance duty, while he also encountered Andy Hepburn, who is driving a motor transport. He says the boys look forward to the arrival of The Daily News.

BODIES RECOVERED IN QUEBEC DISASTER

Quebec, Sept. 19.—Two bodies of victims of the Quebec disaster have been recovered from the St. Lawrence River.

WHO WILL LEAD THE TORY FORLORN HOPE

Ottawa, Sept. 16.—The hunt is on for the strong man to lead the Conservative forlorn hope at the next general election. It is not a Canada-wide hunt—the cabinet being of the firm belief that the right man will be found within its own boundaries. There are four candidates—Borden, White, Rogers and Sam. Perhaps one ought to put Sam first. However, that is a matter of taste.

Premier Borden is said to have no consuming desire to lead his party to inevitable defeat. He came in on a policy of let-well-enough-alone and has merely succeeded in making well-enough-considerably worse. Mr. J. L. Garvin, of the Pall Mall Gazette, once called him Canada's stern, strong, silent son—of which three attributes Mr. Garvin guessed one right. Premier Borden has been silent enough all right. He was silent when the Bertram Shell Committee was getting in its work, silent also when Sam's friend John Wesley Allison was committing his depredations, silent when the Canadian contingents were being loaded up with eight million dollars' worth of useless rifles. Yes, indeed, in that matter of the Ross rifles he was a silent son—of a gun.

Premier Borden has continued silent while food prices rocketed sky-high and although his government at the beginning of the war took to itself, by common consent, the most arbitrary powers to prevent extortion by the food usurers, it has not lifted a finger to help the people and curb its friends. Production has not fallen off during the war. As a matter of fact the Northwest last year had the largest wheat crop in its history. The other fruits of the soil were quite as bountiful and there were fewer people by three hundred and fifty thousand to eat them. There was every reason why prices should go down and no reason at all why they should go up except that a supine government interfered with nobody—using the war as an excuse for pillage.

For example, butter is forty-two cents a pound in Toronto. Eggs at the height of the laying season were thirty-five cents a dozen. The producer did not get these prices, but the middleman. (Continued from Page two.)

DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF NATIONAL SERVICE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Sept. 19.—Sir Thomas Tait has been appointed Director-General of National Service in charge of the new recruiting scheme. Sir Thomas will be practically in the same position in Canada as was Lord Derby in Britain.

It is expected that it will be possible to transfer forty thousand Canadian troops to England before winter sets in. Every effort will be made to carry out this arrangement as climatic conditions in the old country in winter are much more favorable to battalion and brigade training than they are in Canada.

On the motion of Ald. McClymont, seconded by Ald. Dybhavn, it was decided to purchase bonds to that amount.

NEW YORK STRIKE HAS BEEN POSTPONED

New York, Sept. 19.—The various organizations have postponed the promised sympathetic strike in aid of the workers on the electric railways until Thursday. Meantime, Mayor Mitchel is renewing his efforts to terminate the street railway difficulties.

BULGARS' RIGHT WING IN DANGER OF ANNIHILATION

Iron Ring Drawn Tighter Around Monastir—Rumanians and Russians Change Tactics.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, Sept. 19.—The French force in the Balkans has taken Florina on which town the Bulgarians and Turks fell back on Monday.

The Serbians are advancing in Macedonia and the Bulgarians are retiring in disorder in the direction of Monastir.

Monastir, the Bulgarian base of support in Macedonia, is menaced by an iron ring which is drawing tighter and tighter and threatening to throttle the defending army in its clutches.

The Bulgarian right wing is in the gravest peril of being annihilated or captured by the Franco-Russian-Serbian force which is forming on the Allies' left.

Rumanians Ready.

Rome, Sept. 19.—In order to prevent any advance on the part of the armies of the Central Powers in the Dobrudja region the Rumanians and Russians have ceased to retreat and have now definitely established their battle line from the Black Sea to the Danube.

The retreat was a purely strategic one in order to take up stronger positions, but the success of the Allies to the south has tempted the armies in the north to hold to their original positions so that they may remain in closer touch with the enemy in the event of a drive by the French, British and Serbians from Macedonia.

did. The middleman is favored by the Borden government's high tariff. Everything the people eat or wear has been increased in price and decreased in quality. All the traffic will bear and then add fifty per cent. on account of the war—that is what the Borden government's let-well-enough-alone policy has brought us to. The food inspection in this country is a joke. Cold storage which promised to be a blessing, has been allowed to become a curse. Such a thing as a cheap, well-made shoe is no longer to be found in Canada. Sugar has advanced seventy-five per cent. Milk is nine cents a quart and blue at fifty cents a ton on the pretext of a railway strike in the United States, which did not come off.

Premier Borden is Canada's "silent son" all right. He remains silent while the people pay through the nose for the necessities of life in order to enrich the beneficiaries of the Borden trade policies. To make matters worse, the Borden government refuses to let the Northwest make Canada rich by allowing the farmers there to sell their wheat in a free market, which would bring them ten cents more a bushel. So far as one can see from this corner, all Canada can

expect from the Borden government is higher taxes and greater trade restrictions. The let-well-enough-aloners will take it out of us going and coming.

Premier Borden's silence while all these things are happening lends color to the doubt whether he will be the strong man for the Conservatives at the next general election. The people cherish no grateful memories of his administration and the premier feels it. He is credited with a desire to withdraw to the seclusion that the Canadian High Commissionership in London grants—that is to say if Baron Shaughnessy doesn't want the job for himself. And this is natural enough, because Sir Robert must be tired of playing second fiddle as he has done ever since he became premier in 1911. One word from him and that cabinet of his does as it pleases—such is the discipline he exercises.

Next comes the Hon. Bob Rogers. He is known as the Minister of Elections and certainly the elections need a great deal of ministering if the Conservative defeats in various parts of the country are any sign. They need ministering of a kind that the Hon. Bob is not able to give them. What the elections need is a policy that will give the common people a chance, but as that is

PREPAREDNESS

Sir George E. Foster, in his magnificent speech of Saturday night, did not have time to deal with all phases of the war, but his address must have been provocative of much thought. One point which must never be forgotten is that the war did not begin on August 4th, 1914, but some forty-three years before that date. The actual outbreak of war was merely the eruption of a volcano which had been smouldering for many years in Europe, though the vast majority of the British people seem to have remained ignorant of the fact.

It is the urgent duty of the Empire today to prepare for peace; that is to prepare for the day when actual hostilities shall cease and an agreement is signed between the belligerent countries. The signing of this agreement will not end the war, any more than the invasion of Belgium started it. The war will go on steadily for many years though the guns may be silent and the opposing forces withdrawn from the field of battle. The slaughtering of men will give place to the slaughtering of trade. A commercial, financial and diplomatic war will be carried on by Germany with just as much cleverness and just as much venom as have been shown in the raids on England; the submarine attacks on our liners and the trench warfare which has been waged so bitterly on the fields of France and Flanders.

Germany is now preparing for that war. Her manufacturers, who have fought for years to control the markets of the world, are piling up stocks with which to flood the world's markets the moment peace is declared, and the fiercest trade war the world has ever seen will develop immediately and will be kept up for many years. One great lesson which Germany has taught us is that of

national co-operation in every line. The German manufacturers' agent is more than a mere salesman; he is a trade representative of his government, just as the German private financial agent is the financial representative of the Kaiser and his ministers. The British agent has been merely an individual, representing an individual firm, with no national backing.

How best to deal with the trade war which Germany is certain to wage, and wage most bitterly, is one of the great questions which is agitating Great Britain today. It is suggested that a prohibitive duty on all German manufactures shipped into the Empire is necessary, while others argue that this would have little effect and that nothing short of absolute prohibition will be effective. In the first instance, however, the great essential is production and an ever-increasing production by the various parts of the Empire. If one part of the Empire is able to produce enough of its particular lines to supply itself and to have enough left over to supply the other parts with what they do not produce, it will do much to keep out the enemy. New Zealand mutton and butter must be paid for in Canadian lumber, flour, etc., and so on all along the line. The Dominion Royal Commission which is concluding its work now will be able to furnish much interesting and valuable information towards this end, while it will also produce reports on the mines throughout the Empire, many of which are controlled by German capital. This is particularly so of the Broken Hill and other lead and zinc properties in Australia, and it is no secret that the British government will take steps to oust the German from this business inside the Empire. Meantime, as Sir George Foster demanded, Canada must go on pro-

 The last thing the Borden government wants to do the Honorable Bob must have recourse to his old arts which are now outworn. Even at that the Honorable Bob is said to be more in touch with the people than is Premier Borden, because the West has a way of stating its grievances in good set terms, which the Honorable Bob can hardly avoid overhearing. Strange though it may seem the Honorable Bob is a better bet as a strong man than Sir Robert. At least he has the courage of his convictions—said convictions at present centering around Tom Kelly and the three Manitoba cabinet ministers. Just now the Honorable Bob is engaged in adding perhaps ten millions to Canada's prospective debt of a billion dollars by giving us an entirely new Parliament Buildings at Ottawa, where the old one might have been done over. But this, as we have said before, was only to be expected. The Hon. Bob as Minister of Public Works, with most of the public works held up, is under eclipse to Sir Sam as Minister of Militia with the greatest war in history on his hands. Sir Sam can't be allowed to spend all the money. The Honorable Bob must do his bit, too. If strong-arm work makes a strong man, then the Honorable Bob's heroic measures in re-

Of course, there is always Sir Sam. What about running him as a khaki hero with Orange trimmings and let it go at that? Sir Sam is doing a little publicity work in England right now, with the aid of Sir Max Aitken, who, when he is not eye-witnessing Sir Sam's triumphs, is committing merger or something like that. Sir Sam is a strong man—that is to say his friendship with the late Honorary Colonel John Wesley Allison gives out a strong smell.—H. F. Gadsby.

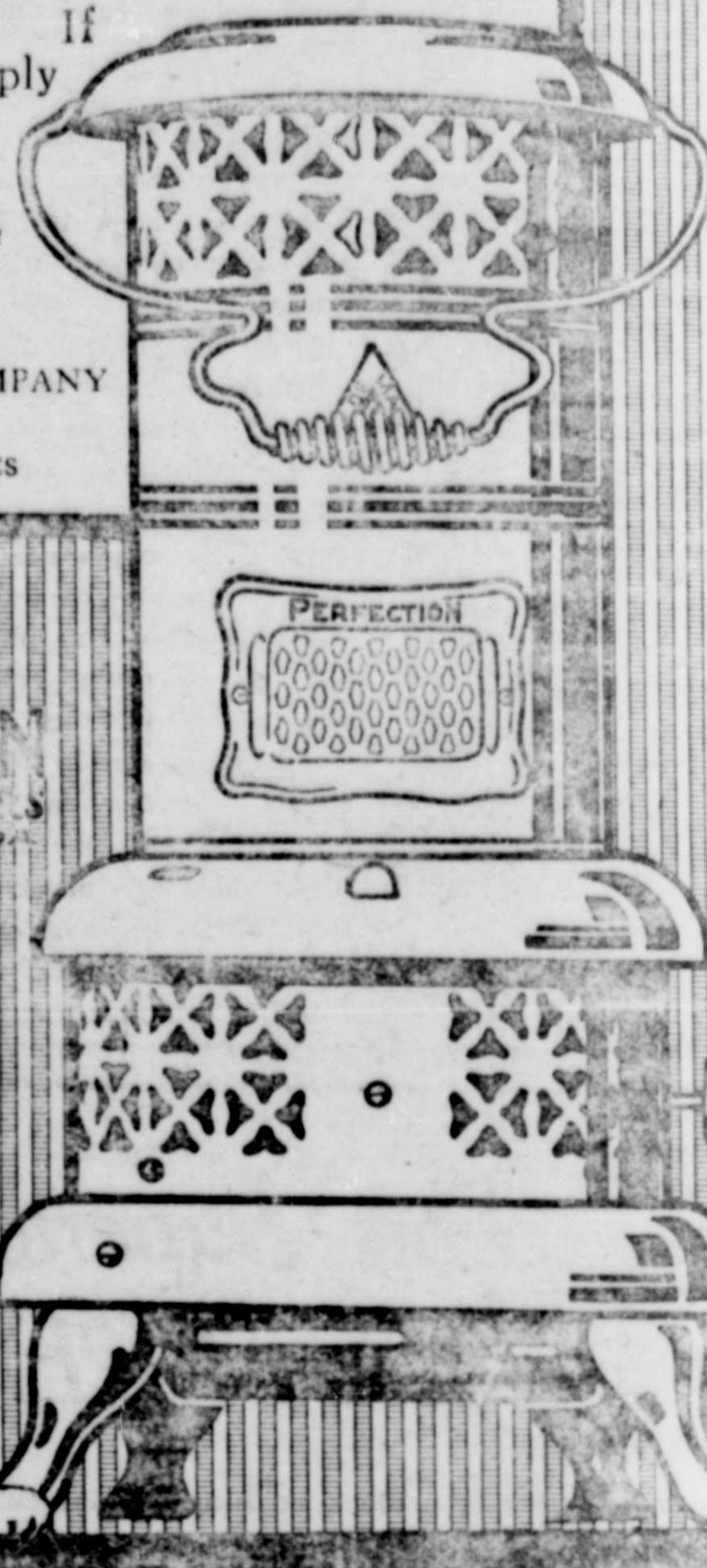
