AUSTRIANS PREPARING TO LEAVE TRIESTE

CANADIAN CASUALTIES ARE LIGHT -- GERMANS AND AUSTRIANS CLAIM SUCCESS

AUSTRIANS ARE PREPARING TO LEAVE TRIESTE

Italians Still Gaining—Kavala is Destroyed—Bulgarians are in Trouble—Monastir May Fall.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Sept. 20.—It is reported from reliable sources that the Austrians are preparing to evacuate Trieste on account of the steadily successful Italian advance.

Kavala Destroyed.

Wireless reports state that the Greek port of Kavala has been destroyed by the Entente bombardment and that the population has been transported into Bulgaria.

The new Foreign Minister, Carapanos, has received congratulatory visits from all the diplomats in Athens, with the exception of the representatives of the Entente Allies.

Evacuating Monastir.

London, Sept. 20.—It is unofficially reported that the French and Serbians have surrounded the Bulgarian army which was retreating towards Monastir and that the Bulgarians are evacuating Monastir.

Northwest of Saloniki the Bulgarians made counter attacks upon the Serbians but were driven back. The French, who occupy Florina, are being left alone by the enemy, the Bulgarians making no attempt to re-take the town.

ALICE ARM SILVER PROPERTY OF PROMISE

The silver property in which John Munro and his partners are interested is called La Rose and La Rose No. 1 and is situated seven and a half miles from the head of Alice Arm and six miles in on the Dolly Varden trail. The assays run as high as \$700 to the ton and the average is \$100 per ton. A contract has just been let for the putting in of a 200-foot drift on the ledge. They have from fifteen to twenty tons of ore on the dump. Samples of ore from this property are displayed at the Exhibition. That the mine will prove as valuable as its namesake in Cobalt will be the hope of all Jack's friends.

CASUALTIES ON WESTERN FRONT ARE VERY LIGHT

Artillery Fire and Motor Attacks Saved the Men—Heavy Rain Interferes—British Air Raids.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 20.—On account of the splendid work accomplished by the heavy artillery batteries and the use of the great new armored motor cars in the recent fighting on the Somme front, the Canadian casualties were exceedingly light compared to the previous engagements.

Directed from the air, the heavy British artillery poured a terrific and accurate fire into the German lines, levelling the trenches and filling them up with dead. The infantry attacks of the British and Canadian troops were preceded by the new form of automobile attack and the work of the men on foot was made comparatively easy. The Canadian troops captured the town of Courcellette in great style.

The situation on the Somme front is unchanged today as very heavy rains have interfered with military operations.

On other parts of the western front there is activity, the Germans making five attacks upon the Russians. The enemy was driven back by machine gun and artillery fire.

Air Raids.

A squadron of British aeroplanes made successful raids to the north of Richebourg, northwest of La Bassée. Five of the British machines are missing.

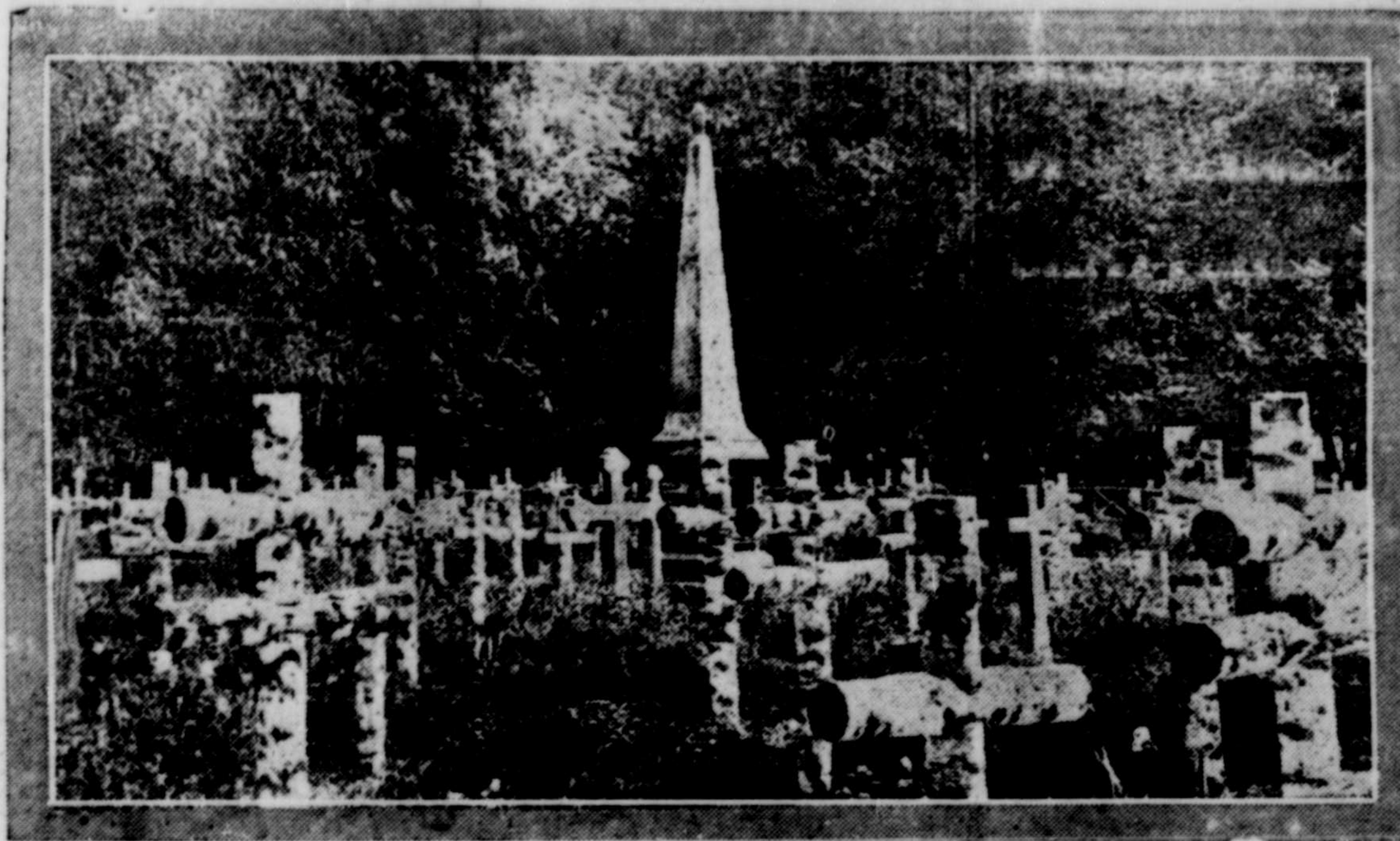
Major M'Mordie was transferred from the 48th Battalion, in which he enlisted, to the 3rd Pioneers.

MAYOR M'CAFFERY OPENS EXHIBITION

At one o'clock this afternoon, Mayor McCaffery declared the Exhibition open. In a very appropriate little speech, he welcomed the visitors from the surrounding districts and thanked them for their splendid efforts in providing Prince Rupert with the material for such an exhibition. He said that the city depended for its upbuilding upon the outside districts, while the people on the outside would more and more look to this city as an outlet for what they produce. The city and the farming and mining districts are inter-dependent on each other, the growth of one making for growth in the other.

As usual, the building is beautifully decorated and the exhibits are tastefully displayed. In spite of a poor season in general, the district exhibits are of a very high order. Of particular interest to citizens is the Bulkeley exhibit on account of the fact that it displays oats, wheat and barley grown by A. J. Prudhomme, the president of the association, on his ranch near Telkwa.

ANOTHER GERMAN RAIDER REPORTED

NEW YORK STRIKERS STORMED CAR BARN

It is believed that seven hundred thousand men belonging to the various unions will go on strike.

BERLIN CLAIMS VICTORY OVER THE RUSSIANS

Germans Claim Capture of Many Prisoners Near Lemberg and Gains Over Rumanians—Vienna Reports Gain.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 20.—Berlin announces the capture of 4,200 Russians southeast of Lemberg and also victories over the Rumanians in Transylvania and in the Dobrudja region. The Germans claim that they have penetrated the Russian-Rumanian line between the Black Sea and the Danube and have occupied many villages.

Vienna's Claims.

Vienna, Sept. 20.—The Teutonic Allies have chased the retreating Russians across the Stokhod River, capturing 2,500 prisoners and several machine guns. The Austrians have penetrated four lines of Russian trenches.

Steamers Sunk.

London, Sept. 20.—The British steamers Lord Tredegar and Wa Wa have been sunk.

PRODUCTION

The Exhibition of the Northern British Columbia Agricultural Association opened here today and it once more gives ample evidence of the fact that the north is capable of producing crops which will compare favorably with those produced in any other part of the Dominion. The association offers splendid encouragement to the rancher and there is no doubt that it has done much in the last few years to foster development throughout the farming districts of the north.

In view of the demand for increased production, it is possible that, by extending the scope of its prize list, the association may be a still greater factor along this line. The demand today is for increased acreage under crop and it would be a splendid thing if this association could make arrangements for the offering of prizes for the greatest new acreage brought under the plow in one season, while it could also render great assistance to the development of the north by offering prizes for the biggest crop per acre of various lines of produce. This suggestion is not made by way of criticism, as every citizen of Northern British Columbia is well aware that the association has offered prizes to the limit of its financial resources set aside for that purpose. If fresh funds are not forthcoming, a re-arrangement of the present prize list might be made so as to admit a few new classes along the line of greater development. The Agricultural Association has done, and is still doing, magnificent work, and it is worthy of the hearty support of every citizen of Prince Rupert and its hinterland.

It is particularly gratifying to notice that the mineral exhibits this year are on a larger and better scale than ever before, as the fact that much of the future prosperity of the north depends upon its mining

development requires constant driving home, and there is no greater driving force than an exhibition of what is being already produced.

The future of this city depends largely upon mining development but there must be along with that sufficient farming development to provide produce for the mining towns which are springing up, and will continue to spring up, during the next few years. This city will only increase in prosperity in the ratio in which its hinterland and its surrounding islands prosper, and there can be no great city of Prince Rupert without a correspondingly great surrounding country producing ore for the smelter and food for the miner. On the increased production of today depends the increased prosperity of the future.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The greatest hope for this province lies in the fact that Premier Brewster thoroughly realizes the magnitude of the task that is before him. He knows that the next five years will be no time for "joy-riding" and that this province is facing the most critical period in its history.

the finest ever displayed here and are attracting widespread interest. The Hazelton exhibit, which was arranged by Stuart J. Martin, shows a splendid variety of ores from the different properties in this rich mining country, including silver-lead, zinc, bornite, antimony, lead from the Deben-ture Group, and splendid specimens from the Rocher De Boule. Of particular interest is a sample of anthracite from the Ground-hog country, while there are also samples of coal from Seaton.

Alice Arm presents specimens of silver-lead, molybdenum and copper; Surf Inlet, gold; Porcher Island (Bald Mountain) copper; Porcher Island (Frizzell Group), copper, zinc and gold in various forms. George Kerr has some specimens of free gold from Kit-sumkalum Lake; a piece of marble from up-river and samples of asbestos from the North Skeena. The Granby exhibit shows copper in its various stages, the ore and fluxes, then copper matte; slag white metal and finally blister copper. The blister exhibit is a slab of 300 pounds. There is also a very fine series of photos of the different parts of the plant at Anyox.

The commercial exhibits are fewer this year than formerly.

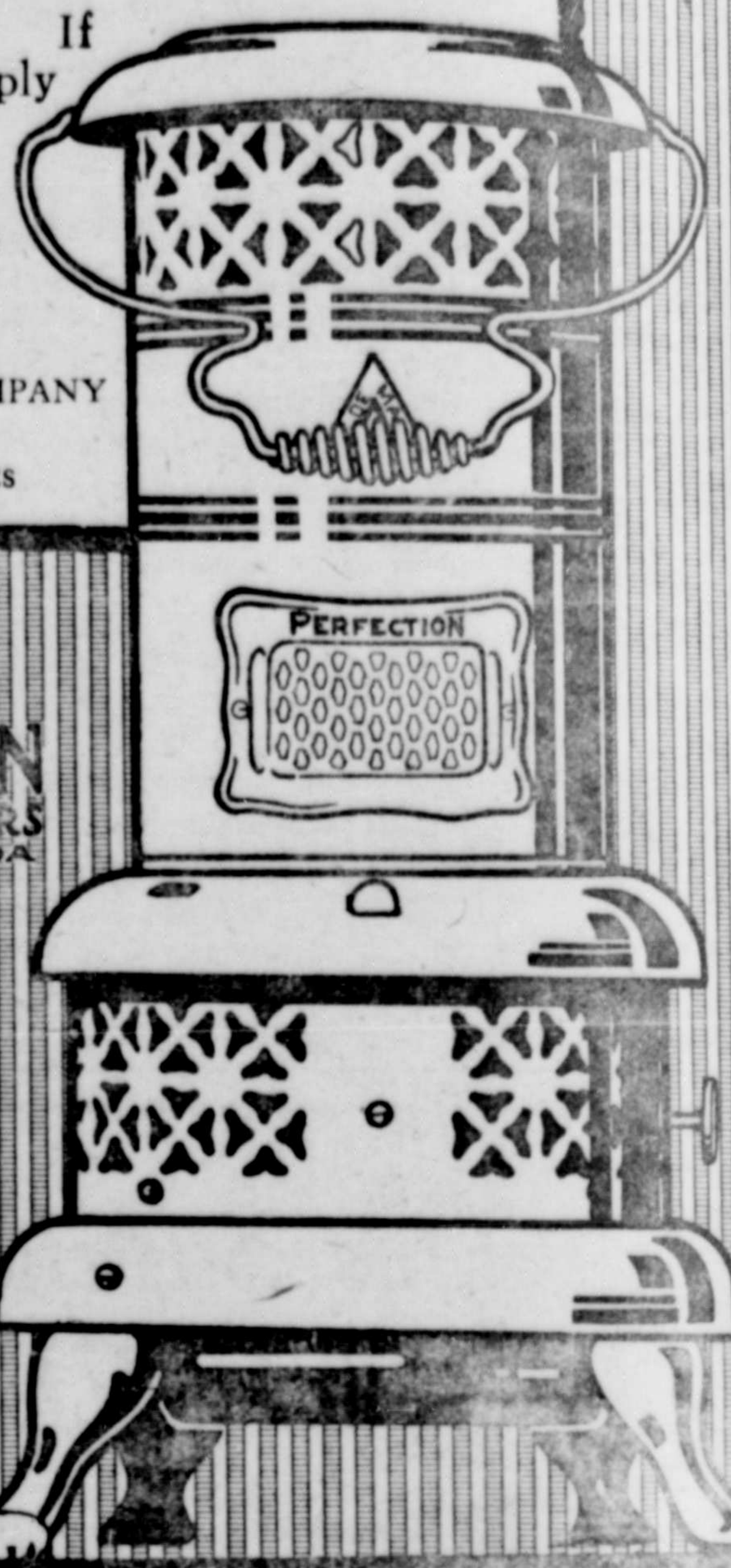
