

BERLIN CLAIMS VICTORY OVER THE RUSSIANS

Germans Claim Capture of Many Prisoners Near Lemberg and Gains Over Rumanians-Vienna Reports Gain.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 20.-Berlin announces the capture of 4,200 Russians southeast of Lemberg and also victories over the Rumanians in Transylvania and in the Dobrudja region. The Germans claim that they have penetrated the Russian-Rumanian line between the Black Sea and the Danube and have occupied many villages.




