DEADLY FRENCH BAYONET WORK—GREECE SENDS AN ULTIMATUM TO GERMANY

GENERAL BYNG PROUD OF HIS CANADIAN BOYS

Officer Commanding Canadians Cables Congratulations to Borden—Germans Lose Many Men.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, Sept. 21.—General Sir Julian Byng, in command of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, has cabled congratulations to Premier Borden on the splendid gallantry and resourcefulness shown by the Canadian troops in the recent prolonged battle on the Somme front.

Germans Repulsed.
Despite the inclement weather, the British and French have repulsed numerous exceptionally fierce German massed formation attacks on a three-mile front in the Le Priez farm district.

During this desperate fighting the enemy penetrated a portion of the village of Bouchavesnes, but the French quickly dislodged them with their bayonets. After the attack had been repulsed the battle field was covered with German dead. The Germans also gained a footing at Hill 76 for a short time but the same fate met them there.

LABOR SHORTAGE IN MUNITIONS WORK

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—On account of the inability of manufacturers to secure sufficient assistance in the manufacturing of munitions, the government may find it necessary to suspend the Alien Labor Act.

GREECE SENDS AN ULTIMATUM TO KAISER BILL

Athens Anxious to Display Greek Change of Heart—Serbians Gaining—Allied Air Raid on Drama.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 21.—It is reported from reliable sources that Greece has at last decided on a departure from her stand of neutrality and, in order to dissipate the apparent mistrust of the Allies in the new Greek cabinet, has addressed an ultimatum to Germany demanding the immediate return of the Greek soldiers captured by the Germans and Bulgarians in the taking of the Greek port of Kavala.

Serbian Success.
The rival armies in Macedonia continue their severe fighting and the Bulgarians are reported to be hastily evacuating Viglitsa, while they are still retreating north of Sisogerie.

On the Allies' left wing the Serbians have succeeded in capturing heights of 2,625 feet after most desperate fighting at close quarters.

A squadron of Allied aeroplanes has carried out a most successful raid on Drama, a Greek town northeast of Kavala, which is held by the Bulgarians.

DERBY SAYS WAR WILL LAST THRU WINTER MONTHS

Winston Churchill Credited With Aiding in the New Armored Motor Idea—Railway Crisis Over.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Sept. 21.—Lord Derby, who figured prominently as the director of the last great recruiting campaign in Britain, announces that he is satisfied that the war must last throughout another winter.

Churchill's Idea.

Winston Churchill, who resigned his seat in the house to accept a commission in the army, is credited with distinction in connection with the manufacture of the new armored motor cars which have struck such terror into the Germans, who describe them as travelling forts, while others describe them as "armored land-ships." Mr. Churchill, who is a son of the late Lord Randolph Churchill, and a descendant of the famous Duke of Marlborough, figured prominently in the South African campaign as a war correspondent and later as a soldier. He has always been a man of original ideas.

Railway Crisis.

The railway crisis in England, which threatened to dislocate arrangements for the shipment of troops and munitions, has now been amicably settled. A compromise has been made by offering the employees a double war bonus.

CROP COMPETITION IN BULKLEY VALLEY

In the crop competitions held under the Bulkley Valley Farmers Institute, A. J. Prudhomme, in his first season as a rancher, had the satisfaction of taking second place for potatoes and third place for oats. The government offers \$25 in prizes and to this was added \$20 by the institute so that \$45 was divided into three prizes. NEW YORK CITY FACES SERIOUS LABOR PROBLEM

Companies Refuse to Heed Mayor Mitchel's Appeal—Running Fight in Streets—General Walkout Coming.

(Special to The Daily News.)
New York, Sept. 21.—The strike situation here has assumed alarming proportions and the transit companies have flatly refused to consider Mayor Mitchel's personal appeal to effect a settlement with the strikers.

The union men and their friends attacked four surface cars and engaged the police in a running fight. Several men were injured and one woman. Many arrests were made.

The unions are completing their preparations for a general walkout. The whole trouble arises out of the fact that the traction companies absolutely refuse to recognize the union and have engaged non-union men to take the places of the strikers. The various labor organizations are determined to lend their assistance to the railroad employees and it is feared that 700,000 men will quit work on short notice.

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS COMMITTEE TROUBLES

Ottawa, Sept. 21.—The government has requested Sir Wilfrid Laurier to appoint new Liberal representatives to the committee for the reconstruction of the Parliament Buildings. The Liberal members formerly on the committee resigned because they did not agree with the plans of Hon. Robert Rogers for the construction of an entirely new building at enormous expense while the two million dollar wall of the old building could have been used in the reconstruction.

BAD NEWS

Yesterday's despatches from Berlin and Vienna are rather disquieting, though German and Austrian despatches have not in the past been remarkable for their truthfulness.

The Russians are spread over an enormously extended front and are far away from the shipping point of their supplies and it is not unlikely that, for the time being, they are short of munitions, and the fact that their recent efforts have been spasmodic and confined to small sections of the front rather confirms this idea.

Though the Austrians are getting very short of men, they still, like the Germans, have ample supplies of shells and big guns. It has been proven in every battle of the war that the army which has the munitions, though it may be short of men, is immensely superior to the army which has an abundance of men but a shortage of munitions.

This is, of course, viewing the matter from the worst standpoint and it may be that the reported German and Austrian victories are of an insignificant character and that the Russians will shortly re-

turn to the attack with renewed vigor and greater success than ever. The fact that the northern offensive from Riga has not been carried out as expected this summer tends to the belief that Russia is not getting the supplies of ammunition necessary for an offensive from the Baltic to Transylvania and that preference was given to the pursuing of the war in the south, while they were content to simply hold a large German army on the northern section of the front.

One point in the enemy despatches which savors of a diversion from the truth is the statement that the Rumanians have been defeated in Transylvania. A new army, thoroughly equipped, as the Rumanians were, was not likely to succumb to an Austrian horde which had been thoroughly trounced for months, and it may be that this and the rest of the news has largely originated in the imagination of the powers in Berlin and Vienna. Let us hope so.

GERMANS FIRED ON THREE ENGLISH LADIES

Mrs. Longfield, of Hull, England, a cousin of Mrs. T. H. Johnson, Seal Cove, had a most exciting experience recently on a voyage from Petrograd to Hull. Mrs. Longfield had been in Petrograd visiting her husband and was returning home on the Wilson liner Eskimo, a popular tourist steamer which before the war carried tourists from Hull to Norway, when the vessel was fired on by a German cruiser while a few miles off the Norwegian coast in the Skaggerrak. The Eskimo was eventually captured and taken in tow by the German cruiser and Mrs. Longfield and two other lady passengers were transferred to a neutral vessel bound for England.

The ladies had a terrifying experience when the cruiser opened fire, as pieces of shell came right through their cabins and they narrowly escaped being killed. One piece of shell struck Mrs. Longfield's steamer trunk and only the fact that she was on the opposite side of the vessel from the cruiser saved her from death. Mrs. Johnson's father, who is captain of a Hull liner, has been in Petrograd since the outbreak of the war, having been unable to bring his vessel out of the Baltic.

R. J. VENABLES WRITES FROM MEXICAN BORDER

Private R. J. Venables, a brother of Jack Venables of this city, is stationed at Calexico with a company of United States volunteers. Before enlisting for service on the Mexican frontier, Mr. Venables was practicing law. He says the heat is terrific and all the boys are afflicted with a "desert thirst" which it takes them all day to keep under. They are free from 9 a. m. until 5 p. m. and spend most of that time in the shade of the canteen drinking iced beer, milk and pop, the canteen doing a flourishing business in soft drinks.

He says Calexico is a prosperous town of 5,000 people and that "there are no saloons or gambling halls of any kind," the town being strongly prohibitionist. The boys are camping in a field of alfalfa, for which they are truly grateful, as it is much cooler than the adobe flats. Mr. Venables says that the country is rich in agriculture and that watermelons and canteloupes are grown with great success. The flood system of irrigation is used. The farm houses are large and have an air of prosperity about them. Though they are right close to the Mexican boundary, none of the United States soldiers ever venture across as the penalty is severe enough to prevent any exploration. The thermometer keeps

steadily around 105 to 110 in the shade. All business in Calexico is transacted in the early morning or in the evening, everybody remaining in the shade during the day.
